CANNED MILK MARKETS STEADY DESPITE HEAVY, PRODUCTION AND STOCKS

NOTHING UNUSUAL CAN BE POINTED TO AS HAVING FEATURED MARKETS FOR CON-ON THE CENTRATED MILKS DURING FEBRUAPY. WHOLE THE SITUATION DOES NOT APPEAR SO STRONG AS A MONTH AGO, BUT WITH EUCH A CONDITION GENERALLY ANTICIPATED AT THIS TIME OF THE YEAR, THE ACTUAL TONE OF THE MARKET HAS NOT YIELDED FACTORS WHICH OTHERWISE MIGHT EXERT A DEPRESSING INFLU-ENCE. PRODUCTION HAS CONTINUED RELATIVE-LY HEAVY, THE JANUARY REPORT SHOWING AN INCREASE OF ABOUT 8% OVER JANUARY OF LAST YEAR AS WELL AS A SOMEWHAT SIMILAR IN-CREASE OVER DECEMBER. IT IS THUS EVIDENT THAT WINTER PRODUCTION HAS HELD UP WELL. FAVORABLE WEATHER WILL PARTLY EXPLAIN

ALTHOUGH THERE IS A POSSIBILITY OF SOME MILK HAVING BEEN CONCENTRATED, WHICH UNDER OTHER CONDITIONS THAN THOSE EXISTING AT THE TIME, MIGHT HAVE GONE INTO BUTTER OR MAPKET CREAM. INCREASED PRO-DUCTION OF CONDENSED AND EVAPORATED MILK IS IN LINE WITH BIMILAR CHANGES ON OTHER DAIRY PRODUCTE, FOR FROM INFORMATION READILY AVAILABLE IT SEEMS PROBABLE THAT BOTH BUTTER AND CHEESE HAVE SHOWN SUB-STANTIAL GAINS THE PAST TWO MONTHS. ESTIMATES OF INCREASES FOR THESE RUN AS HIGH AS 10% FOR THE MONTHS OF JANUARY AND FEBRUARY OVER THE SAME PERIOD IN 1925.

STATISTICS COVERING MANUFACTURERS! STOCKS SHOW THAT ON FEBRUARY |, THE LATEST DATE FOR WHICH INFORMATION 15 AVAILABLE, TOTAL STOCKS AMOUNTED TO 135.662,000 LBS. THIS AMOUNT 18 SOME 20,000,000 LBS. LESS THAN STOCKS OF JANUARY |, BUT REPRESENTS AN STOCKS OF JANUARY |, BUT REPRESENTS AN INCREASE OVER FEBRUARY |, 1925 OF OVER 1000 THIS MAY OR MAY NOT BE SIGNIFICANT, FOR IN THE FIRST PLACE, STOCKS ON FEB. |

OF LAST YEAR WERE, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF 1923, AT A RECORD LOW LEVEL, AND ON THE 1923, AT A RECORD LOW LEVEL, AND ON THE OTHER HAND, THE FERRUARY | ACCUMULATION THIS YEAR, HEAVY AS IT IS, REPRESENTS AN AVERAGE JANUARY REDUCTION.

ANOTHER CHANGE WHICH HAS OCCURRED IS THE BLIGHT REDUCTION IN BUYING PRICES AT CONDENSERIES. ANNOUNCED PRICES FOR FEBRUARY AVERAGE 10¢ PER CWT. BELOW THOSE OF JANUARY. THIS REDUCTION WAS GENERAL THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY. WHILE THIS CHANGE IS RELATIVELY SMALL, A CHANGE AT THIS TIME IS NOT IN LINE WITH

THE USUAL TENDENCY. PRICES IN TERRITORIES SUPPLYING FLUID MILK FOR CITY TRADE ALSO SHOW PEDUCTIONS, AND CHEESE PRICES ARE LIKEWISE LOWER. BUTTER PRICES WILL AVERAGE ABOUT THE SAME FOR THE MONTH AS IN JANUARY.

EXPORT BUBINESS IS SO LIGHT AS TO SE TERMED ALMOST NEGLIGIBLE BY THE CANNED MILK TRACE. IN JANUARY TOTAL EXPORTS AMOUNTED TO LESS THAN TEN MILLION POUNDS, BEING APOUT THE SAME AS DECEMBER, BUT A MILLION FOUNDS LESS THAN JANUARY OF LAST YEAR. IT IS APPARENT THAT DOMESTIC TRADE MUST EE GOOD, FOR, ON THE BASIS OF PROBUCTION, REDUCTION OF MANUFACTURERS! STOCKS, AND NET EXPORTS, THIS OUTLET ABSORBED APPROXIMATELY 14,000,000 LESS DURING JANUARY. ALL CLASSES OF DOMESTIC DEMAND APPEAR FAIRLY GOOD EXCEPT THAT FROM THE BAKER AND CONFECTIONER TRADE. THERE WAS SOME INDICATION OF IMPROVEMENT EVEN IN THIS AT THE CLOSE OF FEBRUARY.
