## HEAVY PACK OF EVAPORATED MILK IN AUGUST - STOCKS VERY LOW

September evaporated milk markets are firm, as a result of continued light supplies and an active movement from manufacturers' hands. last year, totaling 358,780,000 pounds, were Perhaps the outstanding feature of the past month thus more than three times heavier than this has been the unusually low stocks of September 1. 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evaporated milk and butter show the heaviest reductions. In terms of milk equivalents, stocks of the principal manufactured dairy products on September 1 were almost a third below a year ago, and about 13.0 percent below average.

Production of evaporated milk during August, estimated at 183,428,000 pounds, was 14.0 percent heavier than last year, and the increase makes the total pack for the year 2.5 percent greater than during January to August, inclusive, in 1935. The seasonal decrease in August this year, as compared with July, was 9.3 percent, while the average decrease during recent years has been 16.5 percent. August production was the heaviest of record for that date, and that this should have occurred at a time when such is not the general trend of dairy production, was probably due to the extreme shortage of current supplies previously referred to, and the resulting effort of numerous manufacturers to build up reserves, or at least to retain their prevailing supply situation. Butter production in August was about 12.5 percent below last year, and total U. S. milk production as estimated for September 1 was about 8 percent lower than in 1935 and 5 percent lower than in 1934. The

final report of the Bureau on total production of evaporated milk in 1935, which has just become available, shows a total pack of case goods last year amounting to 1,838,890,000 pounds. This is an increase of 127,000,000 pounds over 1934. Production of evaporated milk has almost doubled in the past 15 years.

Prices paid producers supplying condenseries, being based upon the formula set forth in the Federal marketing agreement, follow largely the changes in butter and cheese markets, and thus in August were higher than in July, the average price per cwt. for 3.5 percent milk these two months being \$1.74 and \$1.63, respectively. In August 1935 the average price paid producers was \$1.18 per cwt. September prices are not generally available as yet, although average butter and cheese prices so far this month do not show nuch change from August. August selling prices, averaging \$3.20 per case, were slightly above July, and as yet there appears to be no material change in September selling values. Current selling prices, however, are 60 to 65 cents per case above a year ago.
