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SPRING SOWS IN 9 STATES UP 10 PERCENT:

The number of sows farrowed and intended to farrow in the spring of 1959 (December through May) for 9 of the Corn Belt States is 10 percent larger than in the spring of 1958, but 1 percent less than the 1948-57 average, according to the Crop Reporting Board. The number is now estimated at 5,558,000 head for the 9 States (Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, South Dakota, Nebraska, and Kansas). Farrowings in all of the above-named States this spring are up from a year earlier, ranging from 4 percent in Wisconsin to 16 percent in both South Dakota and Kansas. An increase of 15 percent is indicated in Nebraska, 13 percent in Minnesota, 10 percent in Illinois, 9 percent in Iowa, and 8 percent in both Ohio and Indiana. The March 1 survey indicates a decrease of less than 1 percent or 13,000 head from the spring farrowing intentions reported for these States as of December 1, 1958. The 9 States included in this report accounted for 67 percent of the 1958 United States pig crop.

DECEMBER-FEBRUARY FARROWINGS UP 12 PERCENT:

Sows farrowed in the 9 States during December, January, and February totaled 1,857,000 head, 12 percent more than for the same period a year earlier, and 82 percent more than the average. These farrowings represent 33 percent of the estimated December-May total--the same percentage as a year earlier--and may be compared with the average of 18 percent. Farmers' reports indicate that most of the increase in the December-February sow farrowings, as compared with a year earlier, occurred during December and January, which have been relatively light months, with February farrowings at about the same level as in 1958.

MARCH-MAY INTENDED FARROWINGS UP 9 PERCENT:

Sows bred and intended for farrowing in March, April, and May this year in the 9 States totaled 3,701,000 head, 9 percent more than a year earlier, but 20 percent less than the average. This is 1 percent, or 51,000 head, more than the farrowing intentions reported for these States in December. All of the 9 States show increases from a year earlier for this period.

JUNE-AUGUST INTENTIONS ALSO UP 9 PERCENT:

Reported breeding intentions indicate 2, 287, 000 sows to farrow during the 1959 summer quarter (June through August). This would be an increase of 9 percent or 195, 000 head from the 2, 092, 000 that farrowed during the same period (Continued on page 4)

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a year earlier, and 39 percent more than the average. Farmers in Kansas report 2 percent less sows for 1959 summer farrow than a year earlier and no change from a year earlier is indicated in Nebraska. All other States show increases ranging from 2 percent in Indiana to 21 percent in South Dakota. Increases in other States are as follows: Minnesota, 20 percent; Iowa, 12 percent; Illinois, 10 percent; Ohio, 9 percent; and Wisconsin, 4 percent.

ALL HOGS AND PIGS IN 9 STATES UP 12 PERCENT:

The number of all hogs and pigs on farms on March 1, 1959 in the 9 States totaled 37, 430, 000 head. This is 12 percent more than the 33, 497, 000 head a year earlier. All States show increases, ranging from 7 percent in Wisconsin to 25 percent in Minnesota. Hogs and pigs six months old and over totaled 12, 577, 000 head, 9 percent more than a year earlier. Total commercial slaughter of hogs for the United States during January was 5 percent more than a year earlier and Federally inspected slaughter for February was 27 percent larger than in February 1958.

The number of pigs under 6 months of age in the 9 States was 13 percent larger than March 1, 1958. There was an increase of 15 percent in the 3-6 month age group, and an increase of 11 percent in the number under 3 months of age. A decrease in litter size for the December-February period as compared with a year earlier is indicated with a decline in the Western Corn Belt States more than offsetting small increases in the Eastern Corn Belt States. Severe weather conditions during the winter have been a factor in the decline in litter size in the Western Corn Belt States. The 12,947,000 pigs under 3 months old on farms March 1 accounted for 35 percent of all hogs, and the 11,906,000 head in the 3-6 month age group represented 32 percent of the total.
