









We have a strategy and a policy to guide us

The Engineering Services Branch and City Design are working towards:

- Improving lighting levels through veranda skylights & canopy lights
- Footpath pavement upgrades
- Supporting existing tram terminus & pedestrian accessibility and movement
- Improving Traffic access & parking
- Increased street cleansing

- New Public Realm Open Space including updated tram terminus (requires road closure with limited / no parking)
- New street furniture
- New street lighting & tram wires
- New landscape & trees
- Improving Pedestrian amenity and safety
- Creating space for cafes & other activation

This approach contributes to the safety of the city by increasing social behaviour and negating the normalising of anti-social behaviour.




