Forecasted El Niño conditions indicate likely heavy downpours throughout California in the coming weeks. Although these storms will not end our current historic drought and continued conservation is needed, Californians may be under increased risk for

catastrophic flooding. The Southland is of particular concern due to forecasted heavy, sustained downpours leading to flash flooding, mudslides and debris flows.

California Volunteers, as State lead agency for volunteer efforts in disaster preparedness, and the California Department of Water Resources are partnering with local emergency managers and Neighborhood Watch groups. The goal is to encourage residents across the state to come together in neighborhood groups to learn and understand their particular risk of flood even during drought, to prepare a home flood preparedness kit, to discuss evacuation options and to be familiar with local and State resources to manage their risk.
