Data on Mental Health Treatment Facilities

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CHAPTER 1

DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES SURVEY (N-MHSS)

This report presents findings from the 2010 National Mental Health Services Survey (N-MHSS) conducted from June 2010 through January 2011 with a reference date of April 30, 2010. The N MHSS collects information from all known facilities¹ in the United States, both public and private, that provide mental health treatment services to persons with mental illness.

The N-MHSS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and utilization of organized mental health treatment service providers throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. territories. The survey obtains basic data on the number and characteristics of these specialty mental health treatment service providers and the persons they serve. See Appendix A for a copy of the N-MHSS questionnaire.

The N-MHSS is the only source of national and State-level data on the mental health services delivery system reported by both publicly-operated and privately-operated specialty mental health care facilities. The N-MHSS complements, but does not duplicate, the information collected through SAMHSA's survey of substance abuse treatment facilities, the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS).

The N-MHSS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. mental health treatment delivery system. The objective of the N-MHSS is to collect data that can be used for multiple purposes:

- To assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in State-funded, State-operated, and other mental health treatment facilities, and in forecasting mental health treatment resource requirements;
- To update SAMHSA's Inventory of Behavioral Health Services (I-BHS), an inventory of all known mental health and substance abuse treatment facilities in the United States, which can be used as a frame for future surveys of these facilities;
- To describe the nature and scope of mental health treatment services and conduct comparative analyses for the nation and States; and
- To update the information in the mental health component of SAMHSA's online Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator, a searchable database of licensed and accredited public and private facilities for the provision of mental health treatment. The Facility Locator is available on the Internet at http://findtreatment.samhsa.gov.

In this report, entities responding to the N-MHSS are referred to as "facilities." Chapter 1, page 3, *Survey coverage* provides definitions of the types of mental health treatment facilities included in the N-MHSS.

Highlights of the Data

- Most (77 percent) mental health treatment facilities were privately operated.
- Most clients in mental health treatment facilities received services in outpatient care settings.
- The number of beds reported to be designated for hospital inpatient treatment was 113,569 and the number of beds reported to be designated for residential treatment was 68,053.
- Most mental health treatment facilities offered exclusively designed treatment programs or groups for adults with serious mental illness (63 percent) and for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders (58 percent).
- Over 90 percent of psychiatric hospitals, general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, and U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs medical centers provided psychotropic medication therapy.
- Over half of mental health treatment facilities (58 percent) reported that they employ a crisis intervention team to handle acute mental health issues.
- Most mental health treatment facilities indicated that they accepted Medicaid for payment of services (88 percent) and most indicated that they accepted Medicare for payment of services (69 percent).
- Mental health treatment facilities reported that 99,493 clients received 24-hour inpatient treatment services on April 30, 2010; 60,764 clients received 24-hour residential treatment services on April 30, 2010; and 3,026,379 active clients still enrolled in treatment as of April 30, 2010 received less than 24-hour outpatient treatment services.
- Of the total number of clients in mental health treatment facilities, males accounted for 59 percent of persons receiving inpatient care; 69 percent of persons receiving residential care; and 49 percent of persons receiving outpatient care.
- Among clients who received 24-hour hospital inpatient mental health treatment services, 21 percent were under age 18; 68 percent were age 18 to 64; and 11 percent were age 65 and older. Among clients who received 24-hour residential mental health treatment services, 53 percent were under age 18; 42 percent were age 18 to 64; and 6 percent were age 65 and older. Among clients who received less than 24-hour outpatient mental health treatment services, 28 percent were under age 18; 65 percent were age 18 to 64; and 8 percent were age 65 and older.
- Of the total number of clients enrolled in mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, an estimated 19 percent had diagnosed co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders.

Data Collection Procedures for the 2010 N-MHSS

Field period and reference date

The field period for the 2010 N-MHSS ran from June 11, 2010, through January 27, 2011. The survey reference date was April 30, 2010.

Survey universe

The initial N-MHSS universe of 15,562 facilities (Appendix B) included all known specialty mental health facilities in the United States and its territories at the beginning of the data collection period. Most facilities in the 2010 N-MHSS frame were identified from a 2008 SAMHSA database. To

enhance the existing SAMHSA database of eligible facilities, a list of currently-operating mental health treatment facilities was requested from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and national professional organizations. These entities provided information for additional mental health facilities that were added to the initial survey frame. A small number of newly identified facilities was added to the survey frame over the course of the 2010 N-MHSS. The final total N-MHSS facility universe was 16,197 mental health treatment facilities.

Survey coverage

The following types of mental health treatment facilities were included in the 2010 N-MHSS:

- Psychiatric hospitals—Facilities licensed and operated as state/public psychiatric hospitals or as state-licensed private psychiatric hospitals that primarily provide 24-hour inpatient care to persons with mental illness. They may also provide 24-hour residential care and/or less than 24-hour care (i.e., outpatient, partial hospitalization), but these additional service settings are not requirements.
- Non-federal general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit—Licensed general hospitals (public or private) that provide inpatient mental health services in separate psychiatric units. These units must have specifically allocated staff and space for the treatment of persons with mental illness. The units may be located in the hospital itself or in a separate building that is owned by the hospital.
- VA medical centers—Facilities operated by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, including general hospitals with separate psychiatric inpatient units, and/or residential treatment programs, and/or psychiatric outpatient clinics.
- Outpatient or day treatment or partial hospitalization mental health facilities—Facilities that (1) provide only outpatient mental health services to ambulatory clients, typically for less than three hours at a single visit or (2) provide only partial day mental health services to ambulatory clients, typically in sessions of three or more hours on a regular schedule. A psychiatrist generally assumes the medical responsibility for all clients and/or for the direction of their mental health treatment. Throughout this report (text and tables), these facilities will be referred to as outpatient clinics.
- Residential treatment centers (RTCs) for children—Facilities not licensed as psychiatric hospitals that primarily provide individually-planned programs of mental health treatment in a residential care setting for children under age 18. (Some RTCs for children may also treat young adults.) RTCs for children must have a clinical program that is directed by a psychiatrist, psychologist, social worker, or psychiatric nurse who has a master's or doctoral degree. To qualify as an RTC, the primary reason for admission of more than half of the clients must be mental illness or emotional disturbance that can be classified by DSM-III/DSM-III-R, DSM-IV/DSM-IV-TR, or ICD-9-CM/ICD-10-CM codes, other than codes for mental retardation, developmental disorders, and substance use disorders.
- Residential treatment centers (RTCs) for adults—Facilities not licensed as psychiatric hospitals
 that primarily provide individually-planned programs of mental health treatment in a residential
 care setting for adults.

 Multi-setting (multi-service, non-hospital) mental health facilities—Facilities that provide residential and outpatient mental health services and are not classified as psychiatric or general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit or as RTCs.

Exclusions

The 2010 N-MHSS survey universe excluded Department of Defense military treatment facilities, Indian Health Service-administered or tribally-operated facilities, private practitioners or small group practices not licensed as a mental health clinic or center, and jails or prisons.

Content

The 2010 N-MHSS survey instrument was a 10-page document with 36 numbered questions (Appendix A). Topics included:

- o Facility type, operation, and primary treatment focus
- Facility treatment characteristics (e.g., settings of care; mental health treatment approaches, supportive services/practices, and special programs offered; crisis intervention team availability; and seclusion and restraint practices)
- Facility operating characteristics (e.g., age groups accepted; services provided in non-English languages; and smoking policy)
- Facility management characteristics (e.g., computerized functionality; licensure, certification, and accreditation; standard operating procedures; and sources of payment and funding)
- Client demographic characteristics

Data collection

Three data collection modes were employed: a secure web-based questionnaire, a paper questionnaire sent by mail, and a computer-assisted telephone interview (CATI). Initially, respondents could select either the web-based or paper mode to complete the survey. Approximately two weeks before the survey reference date (April 30, 2010), an advance letter from SAMHSA was mailed to the attention of the facility directors of all eligible facilities to alert them to expect the survey and to request their participation in the N-MHSS (Appendix B). The letter also served to update records with new address information received from the U.S. Postal Service. A data collection packet (including the questionnaire, SAMHSA cover letter, definition package, State-specific letter of support, information on completing the survey on the web, fact sheet of Frequently Asked Questions, and postage-paid business-reply envelope) was mailed to each facility in June 2010. The web-based survey also became available in June. Each facility had the option of completing the paper questionnaire and returning it by mail or completing the questionnaire via the secure survey website.

During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available by telephone to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Web-based support for facilities completing the questionnaire on the web was also available. Multiple reminder letters were sent to non-respondents over the course of the data collection period via fax, mail, and email. To increase the survey response rate, State mental health agency representatives were contacted during the data collection period to inform them of their State's progress and to request additional help in encouraging responses. CATI follow-up of non-respondents began in late September 2010 and ended in late December.

Eligibility and unit response rate

Table 1.1 presents a summary of eligibility and response rate information. Of the 16,197 mental health treatment facilities in the survey, 24.8 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey because they did not provide mental health treatment services, had a primary treatment focus of substance abuse services or general health care, provided treatment for incarcerated persons only (i.e., in jails or prisons), or were an individual or small group mental health practice not licensed or certified as a mental health center or clinic.

Ninety-one percent of the 12,186 eligible facilities completed the survey, including 692 facilities that provided administrative services only. Half of the respondents (53.4 percent) completed the survey on the web, 24.4 percent through the mail, and 22.2 percent on the telephone.

Quality Assurance

All mail questionnaires underwent a manual review for consistency and missing data. Calls to facilities clarified questionable responses and obtained missing data. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. The reviews incorporated the rules used in manual editing plus consistency checks not readily identified by manual review. The web-based questionnaire was programmed to be self-editing; that is, respondents were prompted to complete missing responses and to confirm or correct inconsistent responses on critical items. The CATI questionnaire was similarly programmed.

Facility Reporting and Selection for the 2010 N-MHSS Report

Table 1.1. Among the 11,118 eligible respondents, 693 provided information but were deemed out-of-scope, and thus excluded from the analyses in this report. The excluded facilities and reasons for exclusion fell into two categories:

- The number of facilities that provided only administrative services totaled 692. These facilities are included in SAMHSA's online Behavioral Health Treatment Services Locator; however, given that these facilities do not provide mental health treatment services, they are considered out-of-scope for this report.
- One facility reported a facility type as "other" and could not be categorized into one of the remaining six categories. This facility is considered out-of-scope for this report.

An additional 51 facilities whose client counts were included in or "rolled into" other facilities' counts and whose facility characteristics were not reported separately were excluded from facility counts in this report's Chapter 2 and Chapter 4 tables. However, their client counts are included in this report's Chapter 3 tables.

After the exclusion of the 693 out-of-scope facilities and 51 rolled-up facilities, data from 10,374 eligible respondent facilities were included in this 2010 N-MHSS report.

Number of respondents reporting facility and client data

The number of eligible respondents to the 2010 N-MHSS that reported data totaled 10,374. Of the 10,374 facilities in the N-MHSS, basic facility information, service characteristics, and client counts were reported for 9,139 facilities. The remaining 1,235 facilities are excluded from Chapter 2 tables since their service characteristics were not reported. The breakdown of facility data and client counts reported by respondents is summarized below.

9,139 facilities:

- 7,107 facilities reported basic facility information, service characteristics, and client counts for their own facility.
- o 645 facilities reported basic facility information and service characteristics for themselves and provided client counts for their own facility and other facilities.
- 1,387 facilities reported basic facility information and service characteristics for their own facility. Their client counts were provided by another facility.

1,235 facilities:

- o 366 facilities reported basic facility information and client counts for their own facility.
- 47 facilities reported basic facility information and client counts for their own facility and other facilities.
- 822 facilities reported basic facility information for their own facility. Their client counts were provided by another facility.

Item Non-Response

Extensive follow-up during data collection and careful editing minimized item non-response. Thus, resulting item response rates were generally high, averaging approximately 98 percent across all 149 separate items. The average item response rate for items excluding demographic client counts in questions 3b, 4b, and 5b was approximately 99 percent.² The average item response rate for demographic items was lower, averaging approximately 85 percent.

Data Considerations and Limitations

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2010 N-MHSS. Some general issues are listed below. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- The N-MHSS attempts to obtain responses from all known mental health treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There was no adjustment for the 8.8 percent facility non-response.
- The N-MHSS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the mental health treatment system and its clients as of a pre-selected reference date (April 30, 2010). Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, the N-MHSS provides a "snapshot" of mental health treatment facilities and clients on an average day or month.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain questionnaire items (for example, mental health treatment approaches offered and functions that are computerized). Tabulations of data for these items include the total number of facilities reporting each response category.

Organization of the Report

The balance of this report is organized into the following chapters:

- Chapter 2 describes key characteristics of facilities and the programs and services they provided in 2010.
- Chapter 3 describes key characteristics of clients in mental health treatment on April 30, 2010.
- Chapter 4 presents State-level detail for some of the tables presented in Chapters 2 and 3.
- Appendix A contains the 2010 N-MHSS mail survey questionnaire.
- Appendix B contains details of the data collection procedures.
- Appendix C contains a description of the methodology used to unroll client counts.
- Appendix D contains information on item response rates.
- Appendix E contains a description of the methodology used to edit client count, bed count, and admission count data.
- Appendix F contains a description of the procedures used to impute missing data.

Only one item (question B8: What percent of the admissions reported in question B7 (MHAdmissions) above were military veterans?) had a response rate below 90 percent.

CHAPTER 2

FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter describes key features of mental health treatment facilities included in the 2010 N-MHSS. See Chapter 1 for definitions of the types of mental health treatment facilities included in the N-MHSS.

Facility Operation and Facility Type




Figure 2.1. Facility Operation: 2010

Facilities were asked about the type of entity responsible for the operation of their facility. The operational structure of the 10,374 mental health treatment facilities (i.e., the type of entity responsible for operating the facility) is presented in Figure 2.1.

Most of the 10,374 facilities were privately operated (77 percent). As noted in Figure 2.2, among both publicly- and privately-operated facilities, most were outpatient clinics (63 and 60 percent, respectively). The proportions of the remaining six types of publicly-operated facilities ranged from 1 percent to 11 percent and the proportions of the other five types of privately-operated facilities ranged from 4 percent to 13 percent.

Service Settings Offered

As noted in Table 2.1, the three types of settings (level of care) in which facilities offered mental health treatment services were 24-hour hospital inpatient; 24-hour residential (non-hospital); and less than 24-hour outpatient, or day treatment, or partial hospitalization, hereafter referred to as **outpatient setting** or **outpatient care**. A facility could offer care in more than one type of setting.

The proportions of all facilities offering care in the different types of settings are presented in Figure 2.3.5




Figure 2.3. Service Settings of Mental Health Treatment Facilities: 2010

With the exception of psychiatric hospitals, the service settings provided by public versus private facilities differed little. Seventy percent of public psychiatric hospitals provided only inpatient care compared with 27 percent of private psychiatric hospitals. While 16 percent of public psychiatric hospitals provided both inpatient and outpatient care, 48 percent of private psychiatric hospitals provided care in both settings. Three times as many private psychiatric hospitals provided care in all three types of settings (inpatient, residential, and outpatient) than did public psychiatric hospitals (19 versus 6 percent, respectively).

Approximately 98 percent of all VA medical centers reported that they offered mental health treatment services in an outpatient setting (about 64 percent outpatient only; 34 percent in combination with inpatient and/or residential).

Facility Size

For inpatient and residential settings, facility size is defined by the number of clients in mental health treatment on April 30, 2010. For outpatient settings, facility size is defined by the number of clients in mental health treatment during April 2010 who were still enrolled (active clients) on April 30, 2010.

As presented in Tables 2.2, 2.4, and 2.6, about 19 times as many active clients were treated in outpatient settings overall than were residents in inpatient and residential settings combined on April 30, 2010. The median number of persons treated was 200 in outpatient settings, 23 in inpatient settings, and 15 in residential settings (Table 2.8). Figure 2.4 shows that the highest median numbers of outpatient clients were treated in VA medical centers (508 clients), multi-setting facilities (223 clients), and outpatient clinics (219 clients).

Median number of outpatient clients per facility




Figure 2.5. Facility Size, by Service Setting: April 30, 2010

For each type of service setting, facilities were sorted into five groups based on the total number of clients receiving services on April 30, 2010 (inpatient and residential) or active clients on April 30, 2010 (outpatient). The smallest-size facilities were defined as having fewer than 15 clients and the largest as having more than 120 clients (Tables 2.3, 2.5, and 2.7). Overall, inpatient and residential settings accounted for more small-size facilities than outpatient settings (Figure 2.5). Thirty-one percent of inpatient settings had fewer than 15 clients, ranging from 14 percent of psychiatric hospitals to 50 percent of RTCs for adults and multi-setting facilities. Forty-eight percent of residential settings had fewer than 15 clients, ranging from 9 percent of VA medical centers to 66 percent of RTCs for adults. Seven percent of outpatient settings had fewer than 15 clients, ranging from 3 percent of VA medical centers to 44 percent of RTCs for adults.

Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates




Figure 2.6. Designated Beds for Mental Health Treatment per Facility, by Service Setting and Facility Type: April 30, 2010

As noted in Table 2.9, facilities reported the number of hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) beds designated for mental health treatment on April 30, 2010. Facilities serving inpatient clients reported that 113,569 beds were designated for inpatient treatment. Overall, there was an average of 57 designated inpatient beds per facility. Facilities serving residential clients reported that 68,053 beds were designated for residential treatment, with an average of 29 designated residential beds per facility. As shown in Figure 2.6, public psychiatric hospitals had the highest average number of designated beds per inpatient facility (168 beds). Public psychiatric hospitals and VA medical centers had the highest average number of designated beds per residential facility (79 and 71 beds, respectively).

Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of hospital inpatient or residential clients by the number of designated hospital inpatient or designated residential beds, respectively. Given that mental health treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates could be more than 100 percent. For example, a facility may have more residential clients than residential-designated beds; therefore, the additional residential clients may occupy inpatient-designated beds.




Figure 2.7. Hospital Inpatient Bed Utilization Rates, by Facility Type: April 30, 2010




Figure 2.8. Residential (Non-hospital) Bed Utilization Rates, by Facility Type: April 30, 2010

Overall, facilities were utilizing 88 percent of designated inpatient beds and 89 percent of designated residential beds for the provision of mental health treatment services. Figure 2.7 illustrates that RTCs for children had the lowest inpatient bed utilization rate (62 percent). Public RTCs for adults, public psychiatric hospitals, public general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, and private multi-setting facilities had inpatient bed utilization rates of at least 90 percent (100, 93, 91, and 91 percent, respectively). As shown in Figure 2.8, public psychiatric hospitals had the

lowest residential bed utilization rate (72 percent). Public RTCs for children had a residential bed utilization rate above 100 percent (112 percent). Both public and private outpatient clinics (reporting the provision of residential treatment in addition to outpatient care) also had residential bed utilization rates above 100 percent (108 and 103 percent, respectively).

Treatment Approaches Provided

As reported in Tables 2.10a and 2.10b, facilities indicated whether they offered specific types of treatment approaches. Among facility respondents,⁶ the most commonly offered treatment approaches were cognitive/behavioral therapy, individual psychotherapy, group therapy, and psychotropic medication therapy.

More than 80 percent of each facility type, with the exception of RTCs for adults (53 percent), offered cognitive/behavioral therapy. Over 80 percent of each different type of facility offered individual psychotherapy and group therapy; the exception is RTCs for adults (40 percent offered individual psychotherapy; 57 percent offered group therapy).

Over 90 percent of psychiatric hospitals, general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, VA medical centers, and public multi-setting facilities provided psychotropic medication therapy. By comparison, psychotropic medication therapy was provided less often in RTCs for adults, RTCs for children, outpatient clinics, and private multi-setting facilities, although its use was still high. With the exception of RTCs for adults, psychotropic medication therapy was provided at over 75 percent of these facilities.

The least common mental health treatment approach provided by facilities was electroconvulsive therapy, offered at only 6 percent of all facilities. It was more likely to be offered in general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit (36 percent), private psychiatric hospitals (19 percent), and VA medical centers (19 percent).

Supportive Services/Practices

Overall, case management and family psychoeducation were the most common types of supportive services/practices offered at all facilities (74 and 60 percent, respectively). As illustrated in Tables 2.11a and 2.11b, RTCs for children and multi-setting facilities were most likely to offer case management (83 and 86 percent, respectively), and family psychoeducation (75 and 71 percent, respectively). Public psychiatric hospitals and general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit were least likely to offer case management (55 and 57 percent, respectively), and RTCs for adults were least likely to offer family psychoeducation (about 27 percent).

Legal advocacy (8 percent) and therapeutic foster care (7 percent) were the least common types of supportive services/practices offered. Public psychiatric hospitals were most likely to offer legal advocacy (31 percent), and RTCs for children (20 percent) and multi-setting facilities (25 percent) were most likely to offer therapeutic foster care.

Age Categories

Fewer than half (43 percent) of all facilities accepted persons of all ages (youth under age 18, adults, and seniors) for treatment, as indicated in Table 2.12. Private psychiatric hospitals (60 percent),

Of the 10,374 facilities in the N-MHSS, basic facility information, service characteristics, and client counts were reported for 9,139 facilities. The remaining 1,235 facilities are excluded from the tables since their service characteristics were not reported. outpatient clinics (59 percent), and public multi-setting facilities (61 percent) were most likely to accept persons of all ages. Facilities serving both adults and seniors were the next most common (30 percent).

Of facilities accepting only one age group, youth-only facilities were the most prevalent. Thirteen percent of all facilities accepted youth only, 5 percent accepted adults only, and 2 percent accepted seniors only.

Programs for Specific Populations

As evident in Tables 2.13a and 2.13b, among all types of mental health facilities, most were likely to offer exclusively designed treatment programs or groups for adults with serious mental illness (63 percent) and for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders (58 percent).




Figure 2.9. Facilities Offering Programs for Individuals with Co-occurring Mental Health and Substance Abuse Disorders, by Facility Type: 2010

Most facility types—publicly- or privately-operated—offered special programs or groups for adults with serious mental illness, with the exception of RTCs for children. Compared with other types of facilities, private psychiatric hospitals (78 percent), public multi-setting mental health facilities (77 percent), and VA medical centers (75 percent) were more likely to offer programs for individuals with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders (Figure 2.9).

Not surprisingly, facility types serving a specific population were most likely to offer exclusively designed programs for such populations. For example, 88 percent of RTCs for children operated programs designed for youth with serious emotional disturbance compared with only 43 percent of all facilities combined (ranging between 2 and 59 percent for other facility types). VA medical centers were most likely to offer programs designed for veterans and individuals with traumatic brain injury (99 and 64 percent, respectively) compared with only 23 percent of all facilities operating programs designed for veterans (ranging between 0 and 34 percent for other facility types), and

12 percent of all facilities operating programs for individuals with traumatic brain injury (ranging between 4 and 16 percent for other facility types).

Languages Used for Treatment Services

As noted in Table 2.14, most facilities offered mental health treatment services in English only (61 percent). RTCs for adults, VA medical centers, and RTCs for children were most likely to offer English-only services (80, 76, and 72 percent, respectively). About one-third of all facilities (30 percent) provided mental health treatment services in Spanish in addition to English.

Offering mental health treatment services in a language other than English or Spanish was not prevalent. Only 1 percent of all facilities offered services in English and another language other than Spanish, and 7 percent of all facilities offered services in English, Spanish, and another language. Psychiatric hospitals were most likely to offer services in three or more languages (10 percent).

Crisis Intervention Teams

As presented in Table 2.15, over half of facilities indicated that they employ a crisis intervention team to handle acute mental health issues (58 percent). About one quarter of the facilities employ a crisis intervention team only within the facility (24 percent), and another quarter employ a team both within the facility and offsite (24 percent). Facilities that had a crisis intervention team only within the facility ranged from 51 percent of private psychiatric hospitals to 14 percent of outpatient clinics. The proportion of facilities with both an onsite and offsite crisis intervention team ranged from 66 percent of public multi-setting facilities to 9 percent of public psychiatric hospitals. Another 10 percent of all facilities employ a crisis intervention team offsite only.

Computerized Operational Functions

Tables 2.16a and 2.16b examine facility use of computerized functions. The most common type of computerized operational function involved the preparation and submission of bills or claims. Of all facilities, 82 percent indicated that they used computers to perform such functions. Private psychiatric hospitals (92 percent), multi-setting facilities (91 percent), and general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit (90 percent) were most likely to rely on computers to prepare/submit bills/ claims; RTCs for adults were least likely (54 percent). VA medical centers made the greatest use of computerized functions. Eight of the 10 specified computerized operational functions were used by 90 percent or more of VA medical centers including: results reporting; physician order entry or patient prescriptions/directions; sending/receiving clinical data from other providers; creating/ transmitting referrals to other providers or services; creating/maintaining treatment plans; checking medication interactions; scheduling clients/patients; and process note-taking. While only 41 percent of all facilities indicated that they used computers to report results, 93 percent of general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit and 98 percent of VA medical centers indicated the use of such a function.

Quality Assurance Practices

Most facilities indicated that most of the quality assurance practices identified on the N-MHSS questionnaire were part of their standard operating procedures (Table 2.17). Ninety-four percent of

all facilities conducted periodic client/patient satisfaction surveys, 91 percent regularly scheduled case reviews with a supervisor, and 91 percent conducted periodic utilization reviews. Monitoring continuing education requirements for professional staff (89 percent) and regularly scheduled case reviews by an appointed quality review committee (70 percent) were also common.

Post-discharge client/patient outcome follow-up was the least common quality assurance practice, with 53 percent of facilities reporting that such a practice was part of their standard operating procedures. VA medical centers were most likely to implement post-discharge client/patient outcome follow-up (83 percent); public RTCs for adults were least likely to do so (42 percent).

Payment or Funding Sources Accepted

With the exception of VA medical centers, most types of mental health facilities (88 percent) indicated that they accepted Medicaid for payment of services (Tables 2.18a and 2.18b). Most facilities (69 percent) indicated that they accepted Medicare.

Most types of facilities (84 percent) also accepted client/patient fees (i.e., out-of-pocket payment). Nearly 94 percent of private psychiatric hospitals and 93 percent of general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit accepted client/patient fees; however, only 50 percent of RTCs for children accepted this method of payment. The majority of facilities (78 percent) also accepted private insurance; the exception was RTCs for adults, of which only 44 percent accepted private insurance.

Among all mental health facilities, 65 percent indicated that a single payment/funding source accounted for more than half of their funding (Tables 2.19a and 2.19b). More than half of these facilities (56 percent) indicated that Medicaid was that single source of payment/funding; 68 percent of outpatient clinics and 64 percent of multi-setting facilities indicated that Medicaid was that single source of payment/funding (Figure 2.10). Even though only 7 percent of all facilities indicated that Medicare was the single payment/funding source that accounted for more than half of their funding, 50 percent of general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit and 25 percent of private psychiatric hospitals relied on Medicare as their primary source of payment/funding (Figure 2.10). For public psychiatric hospitals, the primary funding source was the state mental health agency or equivalent (62 percent). Nearly one third (32 percent) of RTCs for children relied on State welfare or child/family service agencies as the single payment/funding source for most of their funding (Table 2.19b).

About half of mental health facilities reported that they permitted smoking outdoors only, and 42 percent reported that smoking was not permitted on the property or within any building (Table 2.20). Compared with other types of facilities, general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, public psychiatric hospitals, and RTCs for children were most likely to prohibit smoking altogether (77 percent, 71 percent, and 68 percent, respectively). Most VA medical centers (76 percent), RTCs for adults (69 percent), multi-setting facilities (60 percent), and outpatient clinics (57 percent) permitted smoking outdoors only.

Seclusion and Restraint Practices

As presented in Table 2.21, 29 percent of all mental health facilities reported the use of seclusion or restraint practices at their facility. Over 90 percent of psychiatric hospitals and over 80 percent of general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit and RTCs for children reported the use of seclusion or restraint practices. A majority of these same types of facilities also indicated the adoption of initiatives to reduce such practices (ranging from 77 to 90 percent). About 95 percent of RTCs for adults, 94 percent of outpatient clinics, 65 percent of multi-setting facilities, and 62 percent of VA medical centers reported that they did not use seclusion or restraint practices.

Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

About three-quarters (74 percent) of mental health facilities were licensed, certified, or accredited by state mental health agencies, 63 percent by Medicaid, and 48 percent by Medicare (Tables 2.22a and 2.22b). Over 80 percent of psychiatric hospitals, general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, and VA medical centers were licensed, certified, or accredited by the Joint Commission.

CHAPTER 3

CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS

This chapter describes the characteristics of clients who received 24-hour hospital inpatient, 24-hour residential, or less than 24-hour outpatient (including day treatment and partial hospitalization) mental health treatment services. Throughout this chapter, less than 24-hour level of care settings are referred to as *outpatient services*. The reported characteristics reflect clients who received inpatient or residential services on April 30, 2010, and those who received outpatient services at least once during April 2010 and were still enrolled in treatment on April 30, 2010. The tables for this chapter present client characteristics by type of facility, such as private psychiatric hospitals and RTCs for children.

Clients Receiving 24-Hour Hospital Inpatient Mental Health Treatment Services

As shown in Tables 3.1a and 3.1b, of the 99,493 clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, 42 percent received those services in public psychiatric hospitals, 21 percent in private psychiatric hospitals, and 31 percent in general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit. Despite some variation across facility type, 59 percent of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services were male. VA medical centers and public psychiatric hospitals accounted for the highest percentages of males who received inpatient services (about 88 and 69 percent, respectively). The numbers of male and female clients were relatively comparable for general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit and private psychiatric hospitals (51 percent males and 49 percent females).




Figure 3.1. Ages Served in Inpatient Settings, by Facility Type: April 30, 2010

Twenty-one percent of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, were younger than age 18, while 68 percent were age 18 to 64, and 11 percent were age 65 and older. The age distribution varied by facility type (Figure 3.1). For example, in RTCs for children, 70 percent of clients who received inpatient mental health services were under age 18, and 29 percent were age 18 to 64. (RTCs varied in how they defined children; some facilities included youth up to age 21. Reports of clients age 65 and older who received inpatient mental health treatment services in RTCs for children likely constitute reporting errors.) Hospitals showed greater variation in the ages of clients who received inpatient mental health services. Private psychiatric hospitals served a greater proportion of children under age 18 (38 percent) compared with other types of hospitals. Eighty-three percent of clients served in public psychiatric hospitals were age 18 to 64. General hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit and VA medical centers reported the largest percentages (17 and 15 percent, respectively) of clients age 65 and older who received inpatient mental health treatment services.

Race information was missing or reported as unknown for 45 percent of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services. According to reported information, 36 percent of all clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services were White, and 16 percent were Black or African American. Two percent of clients who received inpatient mental health services were of two or more races, and 1 percent were Asian.




Figure 3.2. White and Black or African American Clients Served in Inpatient Settings, by Facility

All types of facilities that provided inpatient mental health treatment services served a greater proportion of White clients than clients of any other racial group. Twenty-five percent of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services in public psychiatric hospitals were Black or African American, and approximately 9 percent of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services in private psychiatric hospitals, general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, and VA medical centers were Black or African American (Figure 3.2).

Ethnicity information was missing or reported as unknown for 41 percent of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services. According to reported ethnicity information, 7 percent of clients who received these services were Hispanic or Latino, and 52 percent were not Hispanic or Latino.

Across all facility types, 59 percent of all clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, were involuntarily admitted for care; 38 percent of clients were admitted with an involuntary non-forensic (non-criminal) legal status, and 21 percent were admitted with an involuntary forensic (criminal) legal status. Involuntary admissions were highest (85 percent) for clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services in public psychiatric hospitals and lowest (14 percent) for clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services in VA medical centers.

Clients Receiving 24-Hour Residential Mental Health Treatment Services

As observed in Tables 3.2a and 3.2b, of the 60,764 clients who received residential mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, 45 percent received services in RTCs for children, and 22 percent received services in RTCs for adults. In addition, 11 percent received such services in multi-setting facilities, 9 percent in psychiatric hospitals, and 6 percent each in VA medical centers and outpatient clinics.

Consistent with the characteristics of clients who received inpatient mental health treatment services, a greater proportion of clients who received residential mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010 were male (69 percent). VA medical centers and public psychiatric hospitals accounted

for the highest percentages of males who received residential mental health treatment services (96 and 76 percent, respectively).




Figure 3.3. Ages Served in Residential Settings, by Facility Type: April 30, 2010

About 53 percent of all clients who received residential mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, were under age 18, while 42 percent were age 18 to 64, and 6 percent were age 65 and older. Figure 3.3 shows the proportions of ages served in residential settings by facility type.




Figure 3.4. White and Black or African American Clients Served in Residential Settings, by Facility Type: April 30, 2010

Race information was missing or reported as unknown for 38 percent of clients who received residential mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010. According to the reported race information, 38 percent of clients who received residential mental health treatment services were White, and 18 percent were Black or African American. Three percent of clients who received residential mental health treatment services were of two or more races. The percentage of clients who received residential mental health treatment services and were American Indian/Alaska Native or Asian was about 1 percent each. With the exception of public psychiatric hospitals, facilities provided residential mental health treatment services to higher percentages of White clients than Black or African American clients (Figure 3.4). Among clients who received residential mental health treatment services in public psychiatric hospitals, 24 percent were White and 26 percent were Black or African American.

Ethnicity information was missing or reported as unknown for 33 percent of clients who received residential mental health treatment services. According to the reported ethnicity information, 7 percent of clients were Hispanic or Latino, and 60 percent were not Hispanic or Latino.

Overall, 60 percent of all clients who received residential mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, were voluntarily admitted for care, with the remainder admitted with an involuntary legal status.

Clients Receiving Less Than 24-Hour Outpatient Mental Health Treatment Services

Seventy-nine percent of the 3,026,379 clients who received outpatient mental health treatment services at least once in April 2010 and were still enrolled in treatment on April 30, 2010, received services in outpatient clinics (Tables 3.3a and 3.3b). Seven percent of clients received outpatient services in VA medical centers, 5 percent of clients in general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit, and about 5 percent of clients in multi-setting facilities.

Unlike the distribution by gender of clients who received inpatient and residential mental health treatment services, the percentages of males and females who received outpatient mental health treatment services were similar: 49 percent were male and 51 percent were female. VA medical centers providing outpatient services predominately served males (82 percent).




Figure 3.5. Ages Served in Outpatient Settings, by Facility Type: April 30, 2010

About 28 percent of clients who received outpatient mental health treatment services were children under age 18, while 65 percent of clients were adults age 18 to 64, and 8 percent of clients were seniors age 65 and older. Not surprisingly, Figure 3.5 shows that RTCs for children served a higher percentage of children compared with other facility types. High percentages of adults age 18 to 64 received outpatient services in public psychiatric hospitals (80 percent) and VA medical centers

(79 percent). Twenty-one percent of clients who received outpatient services in VA medical centers were age 65 and older. The proportion of clients age 65 or older who received outpatient services in general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit was 11 percent.




Figure 3.6. White and Black or African American Clients Served in Outpatient Settings, by Facility

Race information was missing or reported as unknown for 46 percent of clients who received outpatient mental health treatment services. According to the reported race information (Tables 3.3a and 3.3b), 39 percent of clients who received outpatient services were White, about 12 percent were Black or African American, 2 percent were of two or more races, about 1 percent were Asian, and about 1 percent were American Indian or Alaska Native. Figure 3.6 compares the proportions of White and Black or African American clients receiving outpatient mental health treatment services by facility type. Similar to inpatient settings, all facilities served a greater proportion of White than Black or African American clients.

Ethnicity information was missing or reported as unknown for 39 percent of clients who received outpatient services. According to the available ethnicity information, 9 percent of clients were Hispanic or Latino, and 52 percent were not Hispanic or Latino.


Overall, about 82 percent of clients who received outpatient services received care voluntarily, and about 19 percent of clients who received outpatient services received care involuntarily.

Clients with Co-occurring Mental Health and Substance Abuse Disorders

As presented in Table 3.4, of the 3,186,636 clients enrolled in mental health treatment services on April 30, 2010, an estimated 19 percent were diagnosed with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders. The percentages of clients with co-occurring disorders ranged from an estimated 17 percent of clients in RTCs for children to an estimated 30 percent of clients in public psychiatric hospitals.

Table 3.4 also shows that an estimated 33 percent of clients who received treatment in facilities providing only inpatient services and an estimated 35 percent of clients who received treatment in facilities providing both inpatient and residential services had co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders. By contrast, among clients who received mental health treatment in facilities providing only outpatient services, an estimated 18 percent had co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders (Figure 3.7).

CHAPTER 4

SELECTED FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AT THE NATIONAL, REGIONAL, AND STATE LEVELS

This chapter presents selected facility characteristics at the national, regional, and State levels. Throughout this chapter, States/territories is defined as the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. territories, including Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

The 2010 N-MHSS found that 10,374 facilities specialized in the provision of mental health treatment services at a rate of approximately 3 facilities per 100,000 individuals in the population.⁷ The largest numbers of facilities were located in California, New York, Pennsylvania, and Illinois; these four States accounted for slightly over 25 percent of all mental health treatment facilities surveyed in 2010.

Facility Type

Of the 10,374 mental health facilities, outpatient clinics accounted for the greatest number of facilities (61 percent), and general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit accounted for the second-highest number of facilities (11 percent) (Table 4.1).

- In eight of the States/territories, fewer than 50 percent of total mental health treatment facilities were outpatient clinics: Alabama, Delaware, Maine, New Hampshire, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Vermont, and the Virgin Islands.
- In eight States/territories, 70 percent or more of total mental health treatment facilities were outpatient clinics: Arkansas, Kansas, Oregon, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin, Wyoming, and Guam.
- Four States had 10 or more public psychiatric hospitals: California, New Jersey, New York, and Texas.
- Six States had 15 or more private psychiatric hospitals: California, Florida, Louisiana, New York, Pennsylvania, and Texas.
- Five States had more than 50 general hospitals with separate psychiatric units: California, Illinois, New York, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.
- Five States had 35 or more RTCs for children: California, Kentucky, Massachusetts, New York, and Pennsylvania.
- Four States had more than 50 RTCs for adults: California, Illinois, New York, and Pennsylvania.

Based on April 1, 2010, U.S. Census counts in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. The U.S. Census population for these jurisdictions totaled 312,737,090 individuals. This figure was used for subsequent rate calculations in this chapter.

Primary Treatment Focus and Type of Service Setting

Of all facilities surveyed in 2010, 24 percent provided a mix of mental health and substance abuse services as the primary treatment focus. States/territories varied in the percentage of facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse services as their primary treatment focus, from 5 percent in Arkansas to 60 percent in North Dakota (Table 4.2).

Tables 4.3, 4.4, and 4.5 present the type of service settings offered by type of facility and State/territory. Overall findings by service setting include:

- Of the 1,975 facilities that provided treatment services in 24-hour inpatient settings, psychiatric hospitals and general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit accounted for 92 percent of the facilities.
- Of the 2,274 facilities that provided mental health treatment services in 24-hour residential settings, RTCs and multi-setting facilities accounted for 86 percent of the facilities.

 Most of the 7,931 facilities that provided mental health treatment services in less than 24-hour outpatient settings were outpatient clinics (79 percent); 6 percent were general hospitals with a separate psychiatric unit.

Facility Size and Utilization

Tables 4.6, 4.7, and 4.8 present, by State/territory, the total number of clients and the number of mental health treatment beds, where applicable, for the inpatient, residential, and outpatient service settings. The calculated rates of clients in active treatment per 100,000 individuals in the U.S. population are not shown in the corresponding tables but are described in this section.⁸

Across all facilities surveyed, 3,186,636 clients were in active treatment on April 30, 2010 (total count of clients receiving inpatient, residential, and outpatient mental health treatment services). Persons were in active treatment at a rate of 1,019 persons per 100,000 individuals in the U.S. population.




Figure 4.2. Bed Utilization Rates for Inpatient Settings: 2010

In all facilities surveyed in 2010 that reported having inpatients on April 30, 2010, there were 113,569 inpatient beds designated for mental health treatment services. Figure 4.2 shows the inpatient bed utilization rates for each State. Seven States/territories (Washington, Oregon, Massachusetts, Connecticut, West Virginia, Alabama, and Puerto Rico) had an inpatient bed utilization rate higher than 100, meaning that there were more clients receiving mental health treatment services in inpatient settings than there were inpatient designated beds. Puerto Rico, in particular, had over twice as many inpatient clients as it did inpatient beds.




Figure 4.3. Bed Utilization Rates for Residential Settings: 2010

Across all facilities surveyed in 2010 that reported having residents on April 30, 2010, there were 68,053 residential beds designated for mental health treatment services. Figure 4.3 shows the residential bed utilization rate for each State. Four States (Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, and Kentucky) had residential bed utilization rates above 100.

Based on April 1, 2010, U.S. Census counts in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. The U.S. Census population for these jurisdictions totals 312,737,090 individuals; the rates of clients in active treatment are standardized by this figure and account for clients in active treatment at VA medical centers.

APPENDIX B

DATA COLLECTION PROCEDURES

Survey Frame

The survey frame for the 2010 N-MHSS originally consisted of 15,562 known mental health facilities. Of these 15,562 facilities, most were identified from the National Survey of Mental Health Treatment Facilities (NSMHTF) conducted by SAMHSA in 2008. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) and various national professional organizations provided additional lists of currently operating mental health facilities to supplement the initial survey frame. During data collection, an additional 635 facilities were identified that were previously unknown to SAMHSA. The final survey frame consisted of 16,197 facilities.

Data Collection

Data collection took place between June 11, 2010, and January 27, 2011. During that period, facilities were contacted through mail, email, fax, and telephone to remind them to complete the survey. Facilities whose client counts were provided by another facility (roll-up facilities) were contacted between May 25, 2011, and June 15, 2011, to collect minimal information on facility characteristics. Of the total 16,197 facilities included in the survey frame, 4,011 (24.8 percent) were closed or ineligible. Ineligible facilities included those that did not provide mental health treatment, were a satellite site, focused primarily on substance abuse treatment or general health care, provided treatment only for incarcerated persons in jail or prison, or were an individual or small group mental health practice not licensed or certified as a mental health clinic or center. Table B.1 provides a full break-down of closed and ineligible facilities.

A satellite site is a mental health treatment facility without permanent staff of its own. Staff from another facility visit the satellite site (usually on a regular schedule) to provide treatment.

APPENDIX C

METHODOLOGY FOR UNROLLING CLIENT COUNTS TO "CHILD" FACILITIES

In the 2010 N-MHSS, facilities had the option to (1) report client counts for each of three service settings (inpatient [IP], residential [RC], and outpatient [OP]) for their facility only; (2) report client counts for their facility plus additional facilities; or (3) rely on another facility to report client counts for them. A "self-reported facility" reported client counts for only itself. A "parent facility" reported client counts for other facilities in addition to itself. A "child facility" relied on a "parent facility" to report its client counts. The parent facility together with its child facilities is a "family" of facilities. Client counts reported by a parent facility needed to be distributed ("unrolled") among the family of facilities.

For a family of facilities, the total client count in each service setting is known (variables B3a: IP-Total; B4a: RCTotal; B5a: OPTotal). The service setting(s) offered by each facility within a family is also known (variable A3: SettingIP, SettingRC, SettingOP). The problem lies in how to distribute total client counts among the facilities.

To unroll client counts to several facilities within a family of facilities, an empirical distribution of client counts by service type (IP, RC, or OP) was used conditional on variables believed to influence that distribution. The variables are identified in Table C.1.

For a family of facilities, proportions from the conditional distribution were used to distribute client counts by service type.

Given that combinations of the four variables resulted in a large number of cells with sparse counts/proportions, combinations of the four variables were reclassified by using a "decision tree" technique. Chi-squared Automatic Interaction Detection (CHAID)² was performed using the Statistical Program for the Social Sciences (SPSS) software, Answer Tree.

² Exhaustive CHAID was also performed, which uses more merges and testing of the input variables and considers all possible combinations. The main goal of the Exhaustive CHAID is to leave only two groups for each branch of the tree. Whereas the Exhaustive CHAID is generally more thorough, it tends to create small nodes. Therefore, to prevent small cell variability, it was decided to use the normal CHAID.

CHAID partitions the data into mutually exclusive, exhaustive subsets that best describe the dependent variables (Kass 1980). The subsets are constructed by using small groups of predictors. The selected predictors may then be used in further analysis, such as the prediction of a dependent variable. The analysis produces a classification tree that shows the merges of any allowable pair of categories of the predictor variable if there is no statistically significant difference within the pair with respect to the target variable. The process repeats until it finds no nonsignificant pair. It first selects the variable with the strongest correlation with client counts and then subdivides the variable into separate levels according to its resulting classification. To prevent groupings of the setting variable, it was made the first variable in the tree.

The 7,412 facilities that originally self-reported their client counts³ were used to calculate the proportion of clients in each service setting in a facility. For example, the proportion of 24-hour hospital inpatient clients at a facility is equal to:

$$Proportion \ of \ IPTotal = \frac{IPTotal \ (QB3a)}{IPTotal \ (QB3a) + RCTotal \ (QB4a) + OPTotal \ \ (QB5a)}$$

where *IPTotal* is the variable in the 2010 N-MHSS dataset corresponding to the number of 24-hour hospital inpatient clients in a facility, *RCTotal* is the variable corresponding to the number of 24-hour residential clients in a facility, and *OPTotal* is the variable corresponding to the number of outpatient clients in a facility.

Within each CHAID group defined in Table C.2, the average of the facility proportions of clients in each service setting was calculated, which represents the distribution of services offered conditional on the group. Table C.2 presents the resulting groups and proportions.

³ A total of 7,412 facilities originally reported actual clients counts for themselves. An additional 62 facilities neither provided client counts for themselves nor had their client counts reported for them by another facility. The client counts were imputed for these 62 facilities, so while they are considered "self-reporting facilities," they were not used in calculating the proportions developed for the unrolling process. After the unrolling and imputation processes were completed, one facility with facility type reported as "other" in Question A5 was removed because it could not be classified into one of the six categories in Question A5. Therefore, there are a total of 7,473 "self-reporting facilities" in the final 2010 N-MHSS analysis data set.

An example best illustrates how to use Table C.2 to distribute/unroll parent facility client counts to the family of facilities: if a parent facility reported 60 inpatient clients, 300 residential clients, and 550 outpatient clients and indicated that they were reporting for three facilities, then the parent facility client counts needed to be distributed among three facilities: A, B, and C. Facility A offers all three service settings (Setting = 7); facility B offers RC and OP service settings (Setting = 6); and facility C offers only the OP service setting (Setting = 2). All three facilities are operated by a private non-profit organization (Ownership = 2), are located in New York (Region = 1), and are multi-setting facilities (Facility Type = 6). Drawing on the information in Table C.2, the following proportions are used to unroll the parent client counts to the three facilities:

APPENDIX D

ITEM RESPONSE RATES

To assess the magnitude of item missing data within the facility responses collected in the 2010 N-MHSS, a response rate was calculated for each of the items, $RR_{item\ i}$, as:

$$RR_{item i} = \frac{Number of eligible units responding to item i}{Number of units eligible to respond to item i}$$

In Tables D.1 and D.2, respectively, the item response rates are presented for demographic item groups and for nondemographic items. The item response rates in Table D.2 are presented in alphabetical order by variable name.

The item response rates for demographic item groups (gender, age, ethnicity, race, and legal status for inpatient (question B3b), residential (question B4b), and outpatient (question B5b) settings) needed to be calculated differently than other items. For each service setting (inpatient, residential, or outpatient), item response rates were calculated for a demographic "group," such as gender, and not separately for each item in the group (males, females). For example, for the gender group, the criterion used to calculate the number of facilities in the numerator of the gender item response rate calculation was based on satisfying either of the following two conditions:

- The sum of the reported percentage for each of the subcategories of the gender variable (percentage of males and percentage of females) was equal to 100 percent.
- The sum of the counts reported for each of the subcategories of the gender variable (number of males and number of females) was equal to the total number of clients reported (e.g., in question B3a).

The corresponding denominator in these demographic item response rate calculations was the number of facilities reporting that they served clients in a particular setting on April 30, 2010 (i.e., where they reported yes to questions B3, B4, or B5).

APPENDIX E

N-MHSS Editing Methodology

The following editing steps were completed after the unrolling process described in Appendix C.

Editing Steps for Yes/No Questions

The following conventions were used to edit questions containing a list of categories where each required a yes/no response:

- a. If only "yes" responses were reported, then blank responses were coded as "no."
- b. If only "no" responses were reported, then blank responses were coded as "unknown."
- c. If a mix of "yes" and "no" responses was reported, then blank responses were coded as "unknown."
- d. If all categories were left blank, then blank responses were coded as "unknown."

Editing Steps for Client Counts

A. Editing of Setting Total (inpatient [QB3a], residential [QB4a], and outpatient care [QB5a]) When IP/RC/OPSERV = 1 (QB3 = yes, QB4 = yes, QB5 = yes)

For each setting, all demographic "nonmissing" client count totals (i.e., gender total, age total, ethnicity total, race total, and legal status total) were compared with each other to see how many matched when at least three were reported. If three or more of the five demographic "nonmissing" totals were equal to each other, and the setting total differed from this "majority total," the setting total was edited to equal the "majority total."

Given that the respondent completing the survey on the web never saw the demographic totals displayed, it was concluded that, when the sums of what the respondent reported under the demographics often agreed, then this total was more likely to be correct than the one the respondent entered in the setting total box. Such a conclusion would result in the fewest number of revisions to the reported demographic totals.

B. Editing of Demographic Client Counts/Percentages Grid (QB3b, QB4b, QB5b) When IP/RC/OPSERV = 1 (QB3 = yes, QB4 = yes, QB5 = yes) for Gender, Age, and Legal Status

1. Editing of Demographic Percentages Grid

For cases in which reported percentages for categories of a demographic group summed to 100 percent, any missing category percentages were edited to zero. Otherwise, all the percentages were edited to blank; complete counts were used to recalculate percentages after the imputation step.

2. Editing of Demographic Client Counts Grid when the Setting Total is Reported

- a) For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable summed to the setting total (after performing the above step in A), any missing category counts were edited to zero. Reported client counts took precedence over percentages reported; therefore, if counts were reported correctly, percentages were edited to blank to avoid any discrepancies between counts and percentages. Using the client counts, percentages were recreated after completing the imputation step.
- b) For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable were provided, but did not sum to the setting total, the following rules were applied:
 - i. For cases where the reported category percentages summed to 100 percent, the percentages were applied to distribute the overall total to the respective categories.
 - ii. **For age categories only**, question A12 ("What age categories of clients/patients are accepted for treatment at this facility?") was used to edit age counts. If a facility reported that it did not accept a particular age group, those age counts were edited to zero.
 - iii. For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable summed to less than the setting total:
 - If only one category had missing client count information, the count for the missing category was calculated by using the other category counts and the overall total (e.g., if male, but not female counts were provided, female counts were calculated as the difference between the overall total and male counts).
 - If all categories had provided client counts, the reported category counts were summed and that sum was used to calculate the proportion of each category.

 The proportions were applied to the overall total to calculate the counts for each category.
 - If partial information was provided, that is, only one category count of a demographic variable was reported (e.g., legal status or age), the provided category count was retained and the remaining missing categories were imputed.
 - iv. For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable summed to more than the overall total:
 - □ **For gender and legal status**, the reported category counts were summed and that sum was used to calculate the proportion of each category. The proportions were applied to the overall total to calculate the counts for each category.

After completion of the above editing steps, the gender category would be devoid of any partial-information cases. All the facilities would have both male and female client counts or would be missing, to be imputed during the imputation step.

\Box For age:

- If all categories had provided client counts, the reported category counts were summed and that sum was used to calculate the proportion of each category. The proportions were applied to the overall total to calculate the counts for each category.
- If only one count was provided, that category was edited to equal the overall total and all other categories were edited to zero.
- If more than one count was provided, all categories were imputed.
- v. For cases where no client counts were provided, all the client counts were imputed.
- C. Editing of Demographic Client Counts/Percentages Grid (QB3b, QB4b, QB5b) When IP/RC/OPSERV = 1 (QB3 = yes, QB4 = yes, QB5 = yes) for Ethnicity and Race
 - a) For cases where reported percentages for categories of a demographic variable summed to 100 percent, any missing category percentages were edited to zero. Otherwise, all the percentages were edited to blank; after completion of the imputation step, complete counts were used to recalculate percentages.
 - b) For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable summed to the overall total, any missing category counts were edited to zero.
 - c) For cases where missing or incomplete counts were reported, but the percentages provided summed to 100 percent, these percentages were applied to the overall total to calculate the counts for each category.
 - d) For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable summed to less than the overall total, the difference between the reported count(s) and the overall total was calculated and that difference was allocated to the "unknown" category.
 - e) For cases where reported counts for categories of a demographic variable summed to be more than the overall total, the reported category counts were summed and that sum was used to calculate the proportion of each category. The proportions were applied to the overall total to calculate the counts for each category, including cases with a mix of reported counts and reported values of zero for one or more categories.

APPENDIX F

IMPUTATION FOR N-MHSS

Missing data were imputed for the total number of clients and client counts by gender, age, and legal status for each of the three service settings (inpatient, residential, and outpatient). In addition, missing data were imputed for the total number of beds and the total number of admissions.

Overview of Imputation Methodology

To perform the imputations of the N-MHSS data, sequential multivariate regression imputation was used (Raghunathan et al. 2001), and the calculation was performed using the SAS callable program IVEware. This program creates imputations through a sequence of multiple regressions whereby the imputations are defined as draws from the posterior predictive distribution specified by the regression model with a flat or noninformative prior distribution for the model parameters in the regression model. IVEware appropriately models (given the predictors) the regression of imputed variables that depends on the type of the variable: a normal linear regression for continuous variables, a logistic regression for binary variables, a polytomous or generalized logit regression for categorical variables with more than two categories, a Poisson log linear for count variables, and a two-stage model for a mix of categorical and continuous variables (a zero is treated as a discrete category, and values greater than zero are considered continuous).

The imputations are created on a variable-by-variable basis, conditioned on all observed variables. An imputed variable is modeled by using all other variables as predictors. IVEware first selects the variable with the fewest number of missing cases and regresses it on covariates with no missing values. (IVEware selects the most significant variables as covariates from the list of possible variables included in the imputation model.) The predictions from the regression model become the imputed values for that variable. IVEware then selects the next variable with the second-fewest number of missing cases to be imputed and regresses it on the covariates plus the first imputed variable as predictors. The process then repeats, with predictors in the regression updated every time an imputed variable is imputed from the previous step. By the end of the first round, the process produces a set of data with no missing values.

The imputation process then repeats in rounds 2 through c, where the regression model for each imputed variable uses predictors that include covariates and all other imputed variables, except the one used as the dependent variable. This step is followed by replacing the previously imputed values with new imputed values and repeats until stable imputed values occur. The sequence of imputing missing values in a cyclical manner, each time overwriting previously drawn values, builds interdependence among imputed values and exploits the correlation structure among variables.

Imputing N-MHSS Data

The process described above was used to impute missing values of the total number of clients, total number of beds, total number of admissions, and client counts of gender, age, and legal status in the N-MHSS data. Ten regression imputation cycles (c = 10) were performed for each variable that was imputed, each time overwriting previously drawn values, building interdependence among imputed values, and exploiting the correlational structure among covariates (Raghunathan et al. 2002).

Certain conditions and boundaries were imposed on the imputation model in order to obtain valid imputation values. Categorical flags were created with values indicating all the possible combinations of provided client counts that a facility reported for a demographic count group.

Missing values on the race and ethnicity items were not imputed because each of these items had an "unknown" category on the questionnaire and it was assumed during editing that any missing values for these two items belonged to this "unknown" category. The total number of beds item applies only to the inpatient and residential care settings.

These flags were used in the imputation process to indicate which counts in the demographic count group should be imputed. That is, if the gender categorical flag was imputed with a value of 1, then IVEware imputed counts of males and females. If the gender categorical flag was imputed with a value of 2, then IVEware imputed male counts. If the gender categorical flag was imputed with a value of 3, then IVEware imputed female counts. To account for the relationships between variables in the same group (e.g., male and female for the gender group), all variables in the demographic count groups were imputed at the same time.

Some facilities reported counts that were much higher than the 99th percentile of the category's count distribution. These extreme values create problems in imputing missing data because of the potential to impute extremely large values given the posterior distribution. To address this concern, facilities that reported counts of demographic variables above a certain threshold were excluded from the imputation process for modeling. The thresholds were selected after analyzing the distribution of counts and reviewing graphs and distribution plots.

Each treatment setting (IP, RC, and OP) was imputed separately. The following steps describe the imputation process:

- O Step 1. Using IVEware, the categorical flags were imputed for gender, age, and legal status. The possible covariates included all variables in Section A of the questionnaire, the total number of clients, the total number of beds (IP and RC settings only), and all the demographic count variables (excluding ethnicity and race). Step 1 did not yet impute the count, but instead imputed the flag variable (e.g., whether the facility reported both male and female counts or only male or female counts).
- O Step 2. In the first step, the software automatically imputed any missing value it encountered among the possible covariates in the data set. For the software to select the best possible model, it included totals and gender, age, and legal status variables from the previous step. Total client counts, total beds (IP and RC settings only), and the demographic count variables would be imputed by using their corresponding categorical flags with a different set of possible covariates in later steps; therefore, the imputed values for these variables were manually edited back to "missing."
- Step 3. After manually editing total client counts, total beds, and demographic count variables back to the original missing values, imputation proceeded for total client counts, total beds (for IP and RC settings only), and total number of admissions. Counts broken down by demographic count variables were not included as possible covariates because the imputation of such variables

would use the total number of clients (reported or imputed). The lower bound for the imputed values was set to not less than zero.

- O Step 4. Using the newly imputed values for total client counts, this step edited the missing counts for ethnicity and race (groups that were not imputed). If a facility originally provided category percentages that summed to 100 percent, then those percentages were used to distribute the imputed total number of clients to the respective ethnicity or race categories. If a facility did not provide percentages, then the imputed total number of clients was allocated to the unknown category. The unknown category percentage was edited to 100 percent and all other categories to 0 percent. Counts were adjusted for rounding error to coincide with the total client count.
- O Step 5. The data set (now including imputed values for the categorical flags and total variables) was subdivided into three smaller data sets: gender, age, and legal status. Each data set contained Section A responses, the total client count, the total number of beds (IP and RC settings only), and the respective demographic count variables and categorical flags. Outliers were removed from each of the three data sets. The removed facilities were not used for imputation because, as stated earlier, IVEware could potentially impute extremely large values.
- O Step 6. Using the new gender-specific subset created in Step 5, gender variables were imputed. The imputation of male and female counts was restricted given the value of the categorical flag; IVEware automatically imputed a zero in a category if the flag indicated that the category had no counts. Bounds for the imputed value were greater than zero (unless specified by the flag) and less than or equal to the total number of clients.
- Step 7. Using the age-specific subset created in Step 5, age variables were imputed. The imputation of age counts was restricted given the value of the categorical flag; IVEware automatically imputed a zero in a category if the flag indicated that the category had no counts. Bounds for the imputed value were greater than zero (unless specified by the flag) and less than or equal to the total number of clients.
- O Step 8. Using the legal-specific subset created in Step 5, legal status variables were imputed. The imputation of legal status counts was restricted given the value of the categorical flag; IVEware automatically imputed a zero in a category if the flag indicated that the category had no counts. Bounds for the imputed value were greater than zero (unless specified by the flag) and less than or equal to the total number of clients.

Post-Imputation Editing

Because IVEware imputes the demographic variables individually, it was not possible to restrict the imputed values of a demographic group so that the sum of the count variables (such as male and female added) equaled the total number of clients (reported or imputed). Therefore, it is possible that the sum of the demographic variables, using both imputed and original values, did not equal the total number of clients. Accordingly, it was necessary to prorate the imputed values manually by calculating their proportions to match the total number of client counts. Editing was needed in three possible scenarios:

Some facilities provided category percentages that summed to 100 percent. Those percentages
were used to distribute the total number of clients to the respective categories. Counts were
adjusted for rounding error so that they summed across categories to the total client count.

- Ouring the editing process, any partial-count information was kept if it was less than the total number of clients, and the two categories with missing values were imputed (only applies to age and legal status). To adjust the imputed counts so that all three categories sum to the total number of clients, the two imputed categories were first summed, and then the proportion of each of the two imputed categories was calculated. Next, these proportions were applied to the difference between the total number of clients and the originally provided count to calculate the number of clients in each imputed category. The client counts in each category then summed to the overall setting total. Counts were adjusted for rounding error.
- The remaining imputed cases were prorated back to sum to the total number of clients. The imputed client counts were summed, and this sum was used to calculate the proportion of counts in each category. These proportions were then applied to the overall setting total number of clients to calculate the number of clients in each category. The client counts in each category then summed to the overall setting total. Counts were adjusted for rounding error.

Merging Data Sets

After the manual edits were completed for the individual gender, age, and legal status data sets, a multistep process was used to merge all the data sets. First, each individual data set was merged with those cases excluded from the imputation process because of outliers. Second, the gender, age, and legal status data sets were merged. Third, the combined gender, age, and legal status data set was merged with the data set containing the imputed total counts of clients, beds, and admissions (full data set before Step 5 above). This process was repeated for the data sets for each treatment setting (IP, RC, and OP). In the last step, the three treatment setting data sets were merged to create the final data set.

After creation of the fully imputed data set, missing percentages had to be recreated by using the observed and imputed client counts. Unless percentages that added to 100 percent were provided, the percentage values, if provided, were blanked out during the editing step or not provided at all; therefore, the values had to be calculated based on the reported or imputed number of clients. The percentages were then adjusted for rounding errors so that they summed to 100 percent across categories within a demographic variable.

Adjusting for Rounding Errors

Once the missing values were edited and imputed, an adjustment for rounding errors was needed as client count proportions were used to make the demographic category sums equal the total reported (or imputed) client counts in the facility. The following steps were used to correct rounding errors:

The rounding adjustment edit started the adjustment with the category in each group (gender, age, legal status) with the overall largest number of clients provided, followed by the category with the second-largest number of clients provided until the last category was reached. For example, overall, the number of male clients reported was larger than the number of female clients reported; therefore, the adjustment of rounding error would be performed first on the male client counts. If no male counts were reported (or imputed) for the facility, then the rounding adjustment was performed on the female counts.

- The difference was calculated between the total number of clients and the sum of the counts of the categories in each demographic group (for example, total number of clients reported by the facility minus the sum of total number of males and total number of females).
- The selected category in Step 1 (category with overall majority) was adjusted by the difference determined in Step 2. If the selected category had no counts reported (or imputed) or the count in the category was less than the difference calculated, then the category with the second-largest count was edited. For example, if the sum of males and females was one client greater than the total client count, the one client was subtracted from the male category as long as males had at least one client reported (or imputed).

Data Analyses and Final File

Given that this N-MHSS report does not include comparisons and tests for statistical differences, it does not contain any standard errors for the point estimates presented.
