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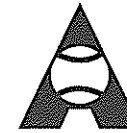
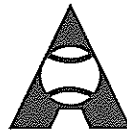

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

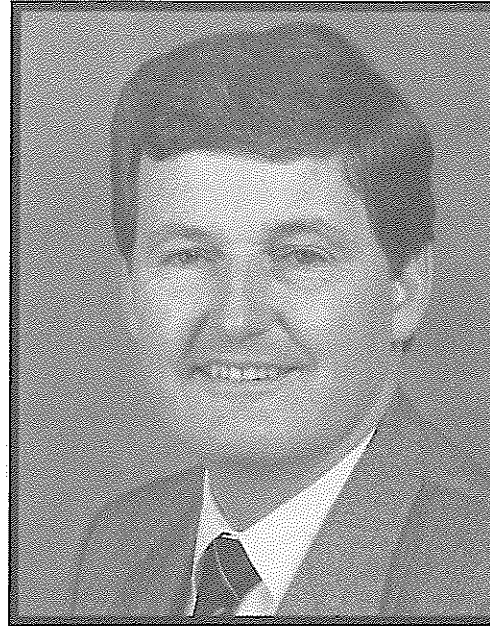


On behalf of Tennis Australia, it gives me great pleasure to present for your consideration the 86th Annual Report of the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia Limited, trading as Tennis Australia. This report covers the programs and activities of the Association for the year ending 31 December, 1990.

Although this is my second Report as President of Tennis Australia, it is the first covering a full period of twelve months as President. 1990 was one of our most encouraging years in terms of Tennis Australia Development programs. The hard work from the coaches and players has continued to contribute to the success of such programs as McDonald's Junior Tennis Australia, BP Achievers' and the Australian Institute of Sport.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the very fine performance by the BP Australian Davis Cup Team. Although unseeded, they reached the final where they performed most creditably against the powerful United States Team on the unfamiliar slow indoor clay court in St. Petersburg. The Australian Team demonstrated to the world that they can perform as well when playing away on clay as they do at home on grass.

The 1990 Ford Australian Open was an outstanding success. In an exciting year on the world circuit when all four Grand Slam Championships for both men and women were won by different players, the Australian was the only one where the world's number one ranked players, Ivan Lendl and Steffi Graf, were victorious as both retained their titles.

Off the court, the value of the 1990 Ford Australian Open to the Victorian economy was calculated by the National Institute of Economic Research as somewhere between \$34 million and \$58 million. In employment terms, the Open created the full time equivalent of somewhere between 980 and

1330 jobs. In addition, the Ford Australian Open, more than any other event, puts Melbourne high on the world's sporting calendar.

As the game of tennis continues to prosper world-wide, the international circuit delivered in 1990 the changes proposed the previous year. In the men's game, the ATP TOUR had a successful inaugural year despite criticism of the "best-of 14" computer ranking system, the sanctioning of appearance money and a spate of first round losses by highly seeded players. The women's tour welcomed the appearance of a non-cigarette company as all tournaments came under the umbrella of Kraft General Foods. The Grand

Slam Cup survived 12 months of controversy to be quite successful and will probably be able to accommodate women as well from 1991.

Tennis Australia was able to increase its profit from \$20,057 last year to \$132,781 this year, the highest since 1986. This has enabled the Association to make a cash distribution to the States (excluding the usual coaching and administration grants) for the first time since 1983. Sponsorship support remains firm with our two major development sponsors, BP and McDonald's, both renewing for another three years.

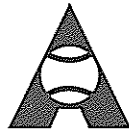

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## HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

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The 1990 Ford Australian Open was staged at the Flinders Park, National Tennis Centre, Melbourne and broke all the records set the previous year with a total attendance of 312,000.

- ▲ The world's number one ranked male and female players, Ivan Lendl and Steffi Graf, retained their Ford Australian Open Men's and Women's Singles Championships respectively.
- ▲ The National Institute of Economic and

and Women's Open (Sydney), Rio Challenge (Adelaide) and the Ford Australian Open, and all were telecast on the Australian Television Network (Channel 7).

- ▲ Australian players won three titles on the world circuit with Richard Fromberg winning in Bologna and Bastad and Pat Cash winning in Hong Kong. Mark Kratzmann was ranked number seven in the world in doubles, and with Darren Cahill reached the ATP Doubles Final.
- ▲ Australian players improved significantly

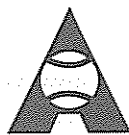

## FORD AUSTRALIAN OPEN



The 1990 Ford Australian Open was the third played at Flinders Park, National Tennis Centre. The event continues to grow in strength and stature and broke all the records set the previous year.

Total attendance in 1990 exceeded 300,000 persons for the first time. One additional night program was scheduled so that the event now includes 14 day and 8 night sessions.

All 22 sessions were telecast live on the Australian Television Network and the picture relayed to some 35 countries around the world and an estimated audience exceeding 500 million people.

Prizemoney this year rose another AU\$1 million and now totals AU\$4 million which is shared equally between male and female competitors. Each winner received US\$200,000.

Ivan Lendl retained his Australian Singles title, when he defeated Stefan Edberg in the final in an intriguing match, which was cut short in the third set when Edberg retired through injury after two hours' play.

However, the greatest media exposure during the fortnight was not given to the final but to a fourth round match between John McEnroe and Michael Pernfors. McEnroe was forfeited for three violations of the Code of Conduct and then claimed he was not aware the Code had been reduced from four to three violations.

Steffi Graf won her third Women's Singles Championship defeating Mary Jo Fernandez in the final, after the draw had opened up when second seed, Gabriela Sabatini, was forced to withdraw in the fourth round when she fell and sprained her ankle.

The victories by the two reigning champions, Lendl and Graf, both of whom were ranked number one in the world, was proper recognition of the true Grand Slam status the event now enjoys.

It was also a result none of the other Grand Slam Championships could repeat, as the new found depth and strength in both men's and women's tennis produced eight different Grand Slam Singles Champions in 1990.

### Economic Impact Study

The National Tennis Centre Trust and the Melbourne Olympic Candidature 1996 commissioned an Economic Impact Study of the 1990 Ford Australian Open. This independent research was carried out by the National Institute of Economic and Industry Research.

The Report showed that the Ford Australian Open increased the Victorian Gross State Product by between \$34 million and \$58 million and increased Victorian employment by between 980 and 1330 full-time positions in annual equivalent terms.

The tourism industry was a major recipient from the Ford Australian Open. The

report showed that the Open attracted 10,700 additional interstate visitors and 2,800 additional overseas visitors to Victoria. Together they generated 113,000 additional visitor nights in Victoria.

Intangible benefits cannot be quantified in the above assessment. Quite clearly the Ford Australian Open enhances awareness of Victoria and Australia as a tourist destination and exploits Melbourne's position as the sporting capital of Australia.

Flinders Park, National Tennis Centre was an important element in the Melbourne

Olympic Bid with many IOC members, including President, Juan Antonio Samaranch, making their visit to Melbourne during the Ford Australian Open. The Open also clearly demonstrated Australia's ability to host a major sporting event.

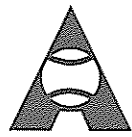
Finally, the Ford Australian Open, as a Grand Slam Championship, links Melbourne with the three great cities of the world, London, Paris and New York, which is something no other major event can do.

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## DAVIS CUP BY NEC



After fighting so hard last year simply to retain its place in the World Group for the 1990 Davis Cup by NEC Competition, the unseeded Australian Team this year almost stole the Cup from its more fancied opponents.

In the opening round, Australia played France on the lawn courts of Royal King's Park, Perth. The highly regarded French team of Yannick Noah, Henri Leconte and Guy Forget were in fine form, especially Noah who had won the N.S.W. Open and reached the semi-final of the Australian Open.

Henri Leconte struck the opening blow for France when he defeated Darren Cahill in straight sets. Masur levelled the tie by defeating Noah in five thrilling sets and the sell-out crowd now knew they were attending one of the great ties in Davis Cup play. Cash and Fitzgerald played superb tennis to defeat Noah and Forget in the doubles to give Australia a two-one lead. On the final day, Wally Masur displaying a whole new composure in Davis Cup play, defeated Henri Leconte, also in five sets, and Australia was through to the second round. Yannick Noah defeated Darren Cahill in the dead rubber in a most enjoyable match.

The second round was played just six weeks later on the grass court at Milton, Brisbane. New Zealand was the surprise opponent following its defeat of the seeded Yugoslav team in the first round. Wally Masur again displayed his newly found excellence in Davis Cup competition winning both singles while John Fitzgerald, some-

what surprisingly, lost both his singles. Darren Cahill and Mark Kratzmann won the all important doubles and Australia was again a semi-finalist.

In the semi-final, Australia played Argentina, who had defeated the top seeds and current titleholders, West Germany. However, on the fast grass at White City, Sydney, the Australian team continued their fine form and defeated their more highly ranked opponents by five rubbers to nil. However, the match was much closer than the score indicated. On the opening day, Wally Masur recovered from two sets to love down to win in five sets against Martin Jaite to keep intact his Davis Cup record which now extended to seven successive singles victories. Darren Cahill and Mark Kratzmann were taken to 15-13 in the fifth set before winning an incredible doubles match. On the other hand, Pat Cash dropped just 11 games in his two singles matches to demonstrate again that he is one of the best grasscourt players in the world.

In the other half, the USA won a thrilling semi-final 3-2 against Austria in Vienna when Michael Chang recovered from a two set deficit in the final singles to defeat Horst Skoff in five sets in a match spread over two days. This set up a final between the two stalwarts of Davis Cup play, the USA and Australia, to be played at St. Petersburg, Florida. Controversy surrounded the match when the USTA failed to announce the court surface within the time regulations, despite an extension of time. When the surface was announced, it turned out to be imported European clay. Australia protested success-

fully that this was outside the regulations and the USTA changed to an American equivalent. A second protest that this was still outside the regulations, as there were no courts of the same surface readily available in America, was dismissed by the ITF. The USTA also sparked controversy over the hours of play selected for each day. The ITF refused to intervene, but has since introduced regulations to prohibit a repeat of the unsatisfactory hours of play adopted for the 1990 final.

It is now history that Australia lost the final by three rubbers to two, with our two victories coming in the dead rubbers on the final day. Playing in his first Davis Cup match ever, young Tasmanian, Richard Fromberg, led Andre Agassi by two sets to one and with a little bit of luck might have pulled off an upset victory in the opening singles match. If he had won, how different the tie might have been. However, he lost, as did Darren Cahill against Michael Chang and Cash and Fitzgerald in the doubles, and the Davis Cup had returned to the USA for the first time since 1982.

The meritorious performance by the Australians this year, not just in the three successful grass court matches in Australia, but also on the slow clay in America in the final, demonstrates that Australia will continue to be a major force in the Davis Cup at any venue and on any surface.

BP Australia continued as sponsor of the Australian team and its support is most appreciated. The sponsorship has been renewed for another three years.

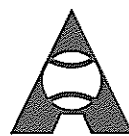

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## FEDERATION CUP BY NEC



The 1990 Federation Cup by NEC was played at the Peachtree World of Tennis in Atlanta, Georgia, host city for the 1996 Olympic Games. Despite reaching the semi-finals the previous year, which, under Davis Cup Rules, would have meant automatic third or fourth seeds this year, Australia again entered the Federation Cup as an unseeded team.

Australia's chance of success thus depended heavily on the luck of the draw and in this regard we were not very fortunate when late player withdrawals caused the draw to be remade and Australia's second round opponent changed from Italy to Czechoslovakia.

The Australian team of Rachel McQuillan, Liz Smylie, Janine Thompson and Kristin Godridge scored a good first round win over Indonesia, before losing to the powerful Czechoslovakian team. The USA won the Federation Cup defeating USSR in the final.

The ITF was so appalled by the withdrawal of so many top players from the Federation Cup over recent years and 1990 in particular, that they have introduced a new \$500,000 bonus scheme to encourage the top players to participate, and indications are that most will return in 1991 when the Cup is played in Nottingham, England.

Australia's young team performed creditably and gained valuable experience for the future. However, to have a reasonable chance, Australia must first reach a seeded position and to do this we need two players in the top 25 rankings, as the seedings are determined solely by WTA computer rankings.

BP Australia continued as sponsor of the Australian Federation Cup Team and its support is most appreciated. This sponsorship has been renewed for another three years.

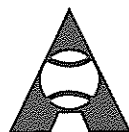

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## INTERNATIONAL CIRCUIT

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The International Circuit had a new look in 1990 as a result of significant developments announced during the previous year.

The women's tour was essentially the same group of Grand Slam and other tournaments as before, but they now come under the banner of world-wide sponsor Kraft General Foods in place of Virginia Slims. The circuit was launched in Australia with the three women's tournaments in Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne. However, the men's tour was, unfortunately, divided into Grand Slam and other tournaments as the ATP TOUR commenced operations. The tournaments were essentially the same, but there was a new sense of purpose amongst the players and tournament directors, and the first year appears to have been most successful. The ATP TOUR opened an office in Sydney to service all tournaments outside of Europe and USA. The TOUR began with

our tournaments in Adelaide and Sydney plus those in New Zealand.

The independent Grand Slam Championships of Australia, France, Wimbledon and US, which continued to grow in strength and stature during the year, introduced the Grand Slam Cup in Munich in December. This \$6 million event offering an incredible \$2 million to the winner caused much controversy when announced, but was a most successful event and is now well accepted. Pete Sampras defeated Brad Gilbert in the final of the inaugural event. Discussions have begun to offer a similar event for women. Apart from the huge prizemoney, the Grand

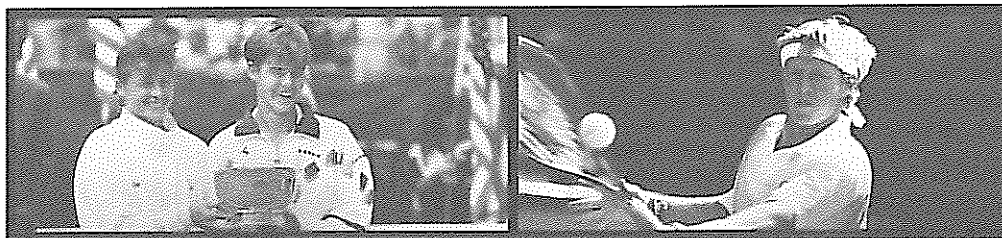
Slam Cup provides \$2 million to the ITF Grand Slam Trust Fund to help develop the game of tennis on a world-wide basis.

In Australia, four ATP TOUR events were held in addition to the Ford Australian Open and all offered substantially increased prizemoney, especially the Australian Indoor Championships in Sydney, which now offers \$1 million prizemoney. Prizemoney for the two women's events in Brisbane and Sydney that precede the Ford Australian Open also increased in line with international women's regulations.

Richard Fromberg was the best performed Australian, winning two titles at Bologna

and Bastad, while Pat Cash was successful in Hong Kong. Australian players were amongst the most improved on the circuit, and eight players achieved top 100 ranking. Cash jumped 287 places from 368 to 81, Fromberg 94 places from 126 to 32 and Woodbridge 81 places from 131 to 50. The ATP TOUR ranks both Masur and Cash in the top ten grasscourt players and Fromberg in the top 10 claycourt players. Mark Kratzmann is number seven in doubles, and with Darren Cahill reached the ATP Doubles Finals.

Australia had four women players in the top 100 this year, but none won singles titles. However, Rachel McQuillan reached the finals in Brisbane and Kitzbuhel and Liz Smylie was a finalist in Tokyo. Smylie won the Virginia Slims Doubles Championships with Kathy Jordan (USA) and the US Open Mixed Doubles with Todd Woodbridge. Young Kirrily Sharpe reached the final of the Girls' Singles at Wimbledon.

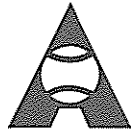

The primary role of satellite circuits is to provide players breaking into professional tennis with the opportunity to compete for computer points on which depend their ranking and entry into major tournaments.

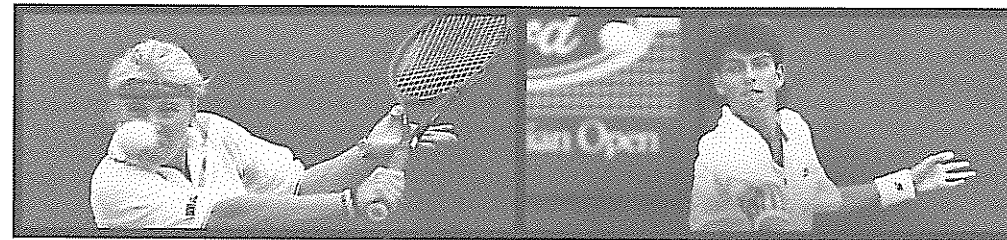
They also provide weeks of continuous competitive play, as well as prizemoney to assist young players with travel and accommodation costs.

These circuits provide a bridge between junior ranks and major tournaments.

Satellite squads were introduced in 1990 during the Australian Davis Cup Tennis Foundation Men's Satellite Circuit. In a special BP Achievers' squad, training with former full-time BP Achievers' Coach, Bob Carmichael, were Sandon Stolle, Andrew Kratzmann, Darren Patten and Bret Richardson.

A Tennis Australia Squad also formed for the Satellite, under the guidance of Barry Phillips-Moore, consisted of Heath Denman, Matthew MacMahon, Jason Cask and Michael Brown.

Challenger tournaments are the next higher level of tournament and must offer at least US\$25,000.

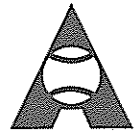

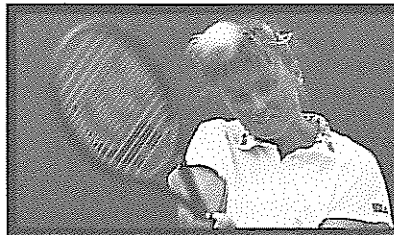

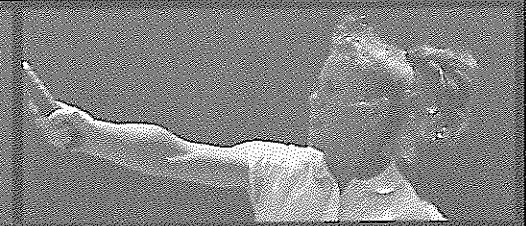

After several years as Coach of the Men's Squad, Bob Carmichael decided that, primarily as a result of the amount of travel involved and the desire to settle in Melbourne, he did not wish to be considered for the position in 1990. Fortunately, Ray Ruffels in late 1989 decided that he did not wish to renew his contract as Head Tennis Coach at the AIS, and Ray was subsequently appointed to the position of Coach of the Men's Squad. Tennis Australia expresses its appreciation to Bob for his many years of excellent service as a respected and popular BP Achievers' Coach.

Ken Richardson was again appointed to be Coach of the women's squad.

This program provides a coach to our most promising male and female tennis players to provide them with guidance as they travel the world in an attempt to make the transition from junior to world senior rankings.

The overseas concept has long been a feature of Australian tennis and has proved beneficial by providing players with a support system, as well as the guidance of a coach.

Through the BP Australia sponsorship, financial incentives are offered to players, who

have not gained selection in either of the BP Achievers' Squads, but who perform to specified standards.

These awards are in two categories. The first is for outstanding performances in the men's and women's satellite circuit held in February each year, and the second is related to the improvement of a players' computer ranking over the full calendar year.

Performances of Squad Members during 1990:

**Richard Fromberg** – Richard had an outstanding year improving his singles ranking from 126 to 32. In ATP Tour events, he was runner-up in Singapore and won in Bologna and Bastad. He also won the doubles at Schenectady.

In December 1990, he made his Davis Cup debut in the Davis Cup final against the United States in Florida. On day one, he lost to Andre Agassi in an outstanding match in five sets and on the third day he defeated Michael Chang.

At the conclusion of 1990, he was Australia's No. 1 male ranked player.

**Todd Woodbridge** – Todd also had an excellent year improving his singles ranking from 131 to 50, and his doubles ranking from outside the top 150 to 25.

In the ATP Tour, he won doubles events at Casablanca and Brisbane, and in singles he was runner-up at Newhaven and a semi-finalist in the Australian Indoor Championships in Sydney.

**Johan Anderson** – Johan suffered illness throughout the year and his singles ranking dropped from 101 to 174. However, he did reach the quarter finals in singles at ATP Tour events in Casablanca and Cairo.

**Neil Borwick** – Throughout the year, Neil worked hard to improve his game although his singles computer ranking remained relatively static from an opening ranking of 162 to an end of year ranking of 189.

**Rachel McQuillan** – Rachel performed creditably throughout 1990, lifting her singles ranking from 79 to 39.

These performances led her to becoming the No. 1 ranked Australian female player at the end of 1990.

In singles, she was runner-up in Brisbane and reached the last 16 of the Australian Open, and in doubles was runner-up in the Pan Pacific Event.

Her performances also led to her being included in our Federation Cup Team for the first time.

**Kristin Godridge** – A year of outstanding improvement in both singles and doubles for Kristin. In singles, she moved from 341 to 120, and in doubles from 304 to 77 by consistent performances throughout the year. Singles highlights included being a quarter finalist in Brisbane and Moscow, and winning the doubles events at the US Junior Championships and Clarins Open in Paris.

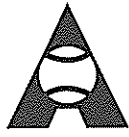
As for Rachel, Kristin was also selected in the 1990 Federation Cup Team for the first time.

**Kristine Radford** – Kristine had an unfortunate year with injury and illness. As a consequence, her singles ranking deteriorated from 168 to 279.

**Jo-Anne Faull** – After a very promising 1989, Jo-Anne also had difficulty making progress in 1990 when her singles ranking deteriorated from 70 to 164. However, her doubles results remained very creditable and, in fact, she did improve her doubles ranking from 61 to 44, which included being a doubles finalist in Bayonne.



## McDONALD'S JUNIOR TENNIS AUSTRALIA



McDonald's Junior Tennis Australia is the official junior development program of Tennis Australia which provides a hierarchical structure through which players progress.

The program is now 'bearing fruit'. Graduates of the program, such as Todd Woodbridge, Richard Fromberg, Johan Anderson, Nicole Provis and Rachel McQuillan, are having an impact on the world tennis scene.

These players are now recognised as products of the MJTA Program, which obviously has a significant impact on their tennis development.

Tennis is a very extensive and competitive international industry and there are approximately 80 countries which have serious player development programs, with many spending more per capita than Australia. For our young Australian players to succeed in this highly competitive environment is a difficult assignment.

The MJTA Program provides a strong infrastructure which offers a path from grass roots tennis in the schools or the local club to a place at the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) or one of Tennis Australia's post junior programs. There is a definite progression a player can follow from a school's program, possibly involving a modified version of the game (Ace Tennis), through development squads, talent squads and state squads to the AIS.

Some States now have links with State Institutes of Sport and players can take advantage of the specialist services (for example, sports science, Institute coaches, facilities and funding) that the government can provide.

Tennis Australia was delighted when, towards the end of 1990, McDonald's Family Restaurants decided to continue to support Tennis Australia's Development Program with a sponsorship renewal for a further three years.

McDonald's very significant sponsorship of the Program (1991 will be the seventh year of the sponsorship) will be of tremendous benefit to all junior tennis players in Australia, as it will be to the general welfare of the game.

In 1990, the McDonald's sponsorship was in turn matched by Tennis Australia. The MJTA Program's other sponsors were the Australian Sports Commission, Coca-Cola and NEC.

### MJTA Program highlights included:

- A new Player Development Board was established and John Newcombe was appointed Chairperson. The Board will examine the full spectrum of player development, including schools programs and post junior programs.
- In 1990, there were 132 prestigious MJTA National Points Tournaments. This represents a 43% increase in tournaments since 1987.

- 20 International Tennis Associations were represented at the 1990 Australian Junior championships, compared to 12 in 1989.
- In 1990, MJTA touring teams comprising 26 players played in nine different nations – United Kingdom, France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, Netherlands, USA, Japan and Hong Kong. Each player makes a financial contribution to the cost of an overseas tour.
- The National Director of Coaching, Denis Colette, conducted a number of MJTA coaching seminars, which involved over 300 participants.
- NEC continued its support of the NEC Junior Tennis Fund, and \$21,000 was awarded in scholarships during 1990.
- The marketing of the MJTA Program was increased with mass coaching clinics involving identities such as Pat Cash, a media day to announce the sponsorship renewal, MJTA features in souvenir programs, McDonald's player profiles for the media, increased identification on players and a series of coaching resources. Over 600 MJTA press clippings were generated in 1990.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF OVERSEAS TOURS

- Kirrily Sharpe had an outstanding European tour, a highlight being reaching the third round of the French Open. After qualifying for the tournament, she had a marvellous win in the second round defeating Rafaella Reggi of Italy, the 13th seed.

Another highlight was Junior Wimbledon, where she was a finalist in both the singles and the doubles.

Prior to these tournaments, she had success on the British Satellite being a doubles winner and singles semi-finalist at both Bournemouth and Swansea (\$10,000 events).

In her US tour, she teamed with Kristin Godridge to win the US Junior Doubles. This pair also won the Clarins Open doubles in Paris.

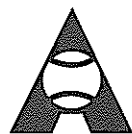

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## FLINDERS PARK

(NATIONAL TENNIS CENTRE)

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1990 was an exciting year at Flinders Park with many new and diverse events attracting over 1 million visitors.

The year began with a record breaking Ford Australian Open. In its third year at Flinders Park, the event attracted the world's greatest tennis players and a record audience of 312,000 people over the 22 day and night sessions of play.

Televised to 500 million viewers in 35 nations around the world, the event provided a magnificent showcase for Melbourne's bid for the 1996 Olympic Games.

Several International Olympic Committee delegates attended the event including the President, Juan Antonio Samaranch. Whilst Melbourne's bid was not successful, the effort certainly enhanced Melbourne's reputation as one of the great sporting cities of the world.

During the Australian Open, an economic impact study was undertaken to assess the economic contribution of the event to Victoria.

The findings were impressive revealing that the event contributed between \$34 million and \$58 million to the state economy, created the equivalent of 980 full-time jobs within Victoria and attracted 10,700 additional interstate visitors and 2,800 additional overseas visitors.

A busy concert schedule followed the tennis with successful performances by Elton John, Kylie Minogue, Cliff Richard, Phil Collins, Fleetwood Mac, Midnight Oil, Eric Clapton, Cher, Jimmy Barnes and many others during the year.

There were many highlights, but the most memorable event and a first for the venue, was the presentation of Bizet's opera Carmen by the Victoria State Opera and Classical Productions.

The four performances of this amazing event were staged in May to a total audience of 52,000. The production featured a cast of 400 led by the renown Maria Ewing as Carmen. All available space in the venue was utilised by the cast and crew. There were 1,600 costumes and thousands of props including a carriage and 7 horses. The stage itself was a technical feat covering 1500sq metres and weighing 100 tonnes.

Carmen was a great success and proved once again the excellent acoustics and the suitability of the venue for opera.

Other highlights included Placido Domingo in concert with Julia Migenes in September, and the return to the Melbourne stage of John Farnham for eight fabulous concerts prior to Christmas. Both events were attended by enthusiastic capacity crowds.

Sport also featured during 1990 with the return of the Supercross Masters motorcy-

cling competition for the third year in a row, the staging of another WBC World Title Fight and several junior tennis events, including the Australian Junior Championships.

In other activities, 70,000 people played tennis on the public courts and several hundred functions and conferences took place. Toyota launched their new vehicle range at a spectacular presentation, and the Australian Gift and Homewares Exhibition was held on centre court during a week in August.

Under Tennis Australia's management, the activities at Flinders Park generated a \$5.822 million operating surplus in 1989/90. In addition, considerable effort was made to improve services and facilities for patrons and hirers and, in so doing, to retain the position of Australia's premier multi-purpose venue.

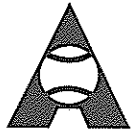

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AIS REPORT



The AIS Tennis Program based in Canberra, has been established since the inception of the AIS in 1981.

The program involves on-court Tennis sessions, off-court physical training and psychology, which is incorporated into the program. The facilities at the AIS are first class, and the athletes are able to utilise sports science and medical facilities. Education is of prime importance and deemed vital to the overall development of each individual athlete, and is therefore an integral part of the program.

Players are selected based on national results, attitudes on and off court and willingness to strive to achieve their full potential. The AIS, in consolidation with Tennis Australia, conducts talent identification camps each year. These are designed to let athletes experience the environment of the AIS, and are used as a pointer to future scholarships at the AIS.

1990 saw the emergence of our once junior players climbing the ranks of the senior ladder. This has been led by Richard Fromberg and current scholarship holder, Todd Woodbridge, currently ranked 1 and 3 respectively in Australia. These players both made their Davis Cup debut in the past 12 months, as with Kristin Godridge, who was a member of the Federation Cup Team.

There were many personal successes during 1990. A few highlights are as follows:

- Todd Woodbridge rose to around 40 after two outstanding performances in New Haven (finalist), and the Australian indoors semi-finalist defeating Brad Gilbert in an earlier round.
- Johan Anderson and Jamie Morgan were constant placings in finals of challengers and other international events.

**Our girls made a large impact on the women's circuit.**

- Kristin Godridge was a quarter-finalist of the Queensland Women's Hardcourt.
- Kirrily Sharpe reached the third round of the French Open singles, was a finalist at Wimbledon Junior Girls' singles, and both Kirrily and Kristin teamed together to win the Clarins Open \$150,000 doubles. Kirrily also won the Tennis Australia Satellite at the start of 1990.
- Rennae Stubbs won the \$25,000 Challenger singles and doubles with (Jo-Anne Faull) in Perth.

Junior successes were prevalent in both male and female categories. The AIS teams dominated the national 18's titles in Adelaide and had overseas successes, especially in the junior "Grand Slam" events.

The coaching staff has seen a major change in structure. Chris Kachel was appointed in April to take the role of Head Coach of the AIS. The other coaches are Peter Campbell, Des Tyson and Natalia Leipus. 1990 saw the introduction of a new apprentice coach program. Karen Deed undertook the opportunity to develop further her coaching career

under this system and was an asset to the program. Geoff Damm continued with the physical conditioning of the players, with Karen's assistance, whilst psychologists, Jeff Bond and Mark Spargo, worked on the mental coaching area, on and off court, with the coaches.

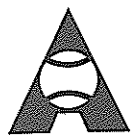

### NEW SOUTH WALES TENNIS ASSOCIATION

The New South Wales Tennis Association celebrated 100 years of tennis during 1990 and this was recognised with the conduct of the Legends of Tennis event at White City, along with a Centenary Ball at Darling Harbour, which was attended by some 550 people.

Many changes have taken place through the years, none more so than at White City where two new stands have been built, twelve Rebound Ace courts installed and through all of this, the 20 grass courts have been professionally cared for and rate amongst the best grass courts in the world.

White City was officially opened on 21 October, 1922 with an exhibition match between J.O. Anderson and G.L. Patterson. The ground still holds the world record crowd in attendance for a tennis match of 25,578 in 1954 when Australia played U.S.A. in a Davis Cup match.

The Holden N.S.W. Open is currently attracting crowds of approximately 39,500 over the week of the tournament, where patrons are able to see some of the world's great tennis players in action.

There is, of course, tremendous history involved with the New South Wales Tennis Association's 100 years of achievements and the past and present administrators, as well as the players, can all take pride in being part of the success that the Association is currently enjoying.

It is worth noting that the New South Wales Tennis Association Limited is one of the strongest sporting organisations in this country, as it owns grounds, stands, clubhouse and other additional assets worth millions of dollars.

### VICTORIAN TENNIS ASSOCIATION

A boost was given to tennis in Victoria during the year with its inclusion as one of the 13 sports in the Victorian new Institute of Sport Program.

Victoria's elite squad of juniors will receive financial assistance for tournaments and intensive coaching from the V.I.S head coach, Peter McNamara, Victorian State Coach, John McCurdy and their own personal coaches.

The merger between the V.I.S and V.T.A programs aims to extract from the individuals their full potential so that they can develop into prominent world tour players of the future.

The elite squad is part of Victoria's strong McDonald's Junior Tennis Australia program. During the year, Victoria reaped the rewards from the program, winning three of the four individual titles at the 14's and 16's National Championships and four of the eight Interstate Teams' competition trophies.

State Pennant had a record number of entries in 1990 with 232 Women's teams and 645 Men's. Mark Woodforde represented Dingley Tennis Club during the season and used the competition to gain vital matchplay before re-entering the international circuit.

With 21,850 children participating in the Quit program throughout the year, the tennis future of Victoria is certainly looking bright.

### SOUTH AUSTRALIAN TENNIS ASSOCIATION

The South Australian Tennis Association ushered in the new decade by staging the first event of the newly established IBM/ATP Men's Tour. Appropriately, the "Australian Men's Hardcourt Tennis Championship" offered its largest prizemoney since its inception in 1938 viz. US \$ 150,000.

The high profile beginning to the year set the scene for other pivotal changes, both organisationally and otherwise.

In an historic meeting in June, the Association adopted a revised Constitution which effectively changed the management of Tennis in South Australia.

A new board of seven (7) persons was created, providing opportunities for the appointment of "outside expertise" in key areas viz. finance, marketing, aimed at aiding the development of the game.

Junior Development, in particular, was the major winner in the announcement in September of a grant of \$300,000 from Foundation S.A. About two thirds of the funding will be directed towards a Schools' program. The aim of this scheme is to bolster numbers at the introductory level and to provide better opportunities to those wishing to "try their hand" at one of Australia's great games.

South Australia's pacesetter elite training program, conducted through the very successful South Australian Sports Institute, continued to gain momentum when an additional full time coach was added to the program.

Those involved in the junior field were encouraged by the results achieved by Louise Stacey, who won the Canadian Girls' title, was runner-up in the Australian Girls and a quarter-finalist in the US Junior Girls. Her efforts resulted in an end of year I.T.F. world ranking of 3.

Our continued heavy sponsorship involvement with Foundation South Australia, the South Australian Sports Institute and the McDonald's Junior Tennis Australia program should result in further achievements equal to, or better than, those achieved by Louise Stacey.

### WESTERN AUSTRALIAN LAWN TENNIS ASSOCIATION

The second annual Hopman Cup was an absolute sell-out success at the Burswood Superdrome, and was a great start to what was an eventful and successful year for Tennis West.

Our 12 and under girls team won the Margaret Court Cup, Siobhan Drake-Brockman captured the National 12 and under girls' singles title and Angie Marik was ranked No.1. for the girls' 14 and under singles.

Western Australia won the Pizzey Cup for the first time and Stephanie Martin also secured the Colgate Cup by winning the

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Australian Secondary Schools girls' singles championships.

Darren Patten had a fine year on the Australian Satellite Circuit, which earned him a spot in one of the BP Achievers' Squads and a position in the Australian Galea Cup team.

To help foster and accelerate progress at junior level, the Association sponsored a six week tour of Germany for six youngsters, under the control of State Coach, Jeff Schneider. The overseas results were encouraging, as is the development in the player's games since their return.

On the wider scene of International events, the first round Davis Cup Tie, Australia vs France was held at Royal King's Park Tennis Club.

The sell-out crowd of 4,500 for each of the three days came within just a few weeks of the 60,000 plus aggregate attendance at the Hopman Cup.

The international line-up of visitors gave Perth added status, and all the overseas officials were full of praise for the event.

Philippe Chatrier, the President of the International Tennis Federation and a proud Frenchman keen to see his country do well, was gracious in defeat, acknowledging the great courage of the lower-ranked Australian team and the fighting Aussie spirit.

After an absence of three years, WA players were able to pit their talents against interstate and international players when the WA Open, sponsored by the Commonwealth Bank, re-

turned to Royal King's Park in November.

Coaching and Administration tours were undertaken to the Kimberley and Pilbara areas, and Level "O" Coaching Courses were conducted in outlying areas North, East and South of Perth.

The importance of establishing greater coaching depth, and increasing the number of people in the country areas who are aware of current coaching technique and methods, will be the focus of tennis for many years to come.

### ROYAL QUEENSLAND LAWN TENNIS ASSOCIATION

Tennis in Queensland is entering an exciting new era. State Director of Coaching, Gary Stickler, has achieved excellent results with four Regional Directors of Coaching. Therefore the decision was made to appoint two further Directors early in 1991 to conquer the distances and disbursement of population throughout Queensland, as well as the development of elite juniors.

This policy of reaching out to Associations and Clubs is already reflected in an emerging new enthusiasm for tennis within the State.

Appointment of a Chief Executive, Rick Davies, and a resolution of the Board and Council to restructure to meet the challenges of the new age of professionalism in marketing and development in sport, and to seek ways to renew ageing facilities at Milton, has been popularly received.

Successful staging of the Danone Australian Women's Hardcourt Championships, Commonwealth Bank Men's Open and a

Davis Cup Tie against New Zealand, together with a comprehensive Tennis Calendar for all levels of Junior, Senior and Masters players auger well for the future of Tennis in the Sunshine State.

### TASMANIAN LAWN TENNIS ASSOCIATION

Richard Fromberg's rapid rise in World rankings during 1990 culminated in a marvellous Davis Cup debut in the final tie against the U.S. at St. Petersburg, Florida in December. The memory of Richard's suspension-packed first day match against Andre Agassi will live with Tasmanian tennis followers for many years to come.

The achievements of this fine young Tasmanian during the year are just reward for many years of tremendous hard work and dedication. Richard's level of commitment throughout his junior career and now at senior level is nothing short of phenomenal.

In becoming the first ever Tasmanian to play in Davis Cup competition for Australia, coupled with his achievement of becoming the first ever Tasmanian man to be the highest ranked player in the Nation, Richard was an obvious choice for the TasTV/Cascade Sportsman of the Year and Caltex/Mercury Sports Star of the Year Awards for 1990.

On a more local note, the Junior Development Committee of the Southern Tasmanian Tennis Association joined with the Mercury Newspaper in perpetual trophies aptly named the Richard Fromberg Trophies for

the winners of the 16 and 18's events at the major Tasmanian Junior Championships held in January each year. The trophies not only recognise Richard's great achievements as a junior, but serve also to remind Tasmania's up and coming young players of the level of attainment possible when a commitment to excellence is coupled with the patience and hard work required to achieve it.

The 1990 Australian Davis Cup Tennis Foundation Challenger held in Hobart in November gave another pair of Tasmanians the chance to show their wares.

Simon Youl, granted a wild card entry to the tournament by Tennis Australia's selectors, won the singles final 7/6 7/6 against Jamie Morgan.

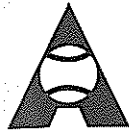

At the other end of the age scale, several of Canberra's juniors had creditable results and Todd Larkham and Ben Ellwood had trips overseas as Australian representatives.

At the highest level, Wally Masur put together a string of Davis Cup singles victories that were instrumental in Australia getting through to the final. Wally was not chosen for the final, which saw an especially slow court being used, but we expect to see him representing Australia again when it has matches on fast surfaces.

During the year, the lawn courts at the Lyneham complex were converted to synthetic grass, a sound economic move given the need to rest lawn courts during Canberra's winter and the faster recovery after rain of synthetic grass. The block of courts concerned were named the Charles Boag courts

in honour of one of the stalwarts of ACT tennis. They were declared open and the name announced during the 20th birthday celebrations of the move to the Lyneham complex. That weekend also saw the final of the Civic Advance Bank ACT Men's Open (Challenger) event in which New Zealand Davis Cup player Brett Steven defeated Andrew Kratzmann. The doubles saw Peter Doohan and Brett Custer run out winners over David Adams and Jamie Morgan.

The AAMI ACT Ladies Open (Satellite) event saw Janine Thompson take out her second Canberra title in a row, with Danielle Jones being the runner-up. The doubles went to former World number five Mima Jausovec and Darija Deskovic, who defeated fellow Yugoslavians Tanja Cerne and Vera Elter in the final.

### THE NORTHERN TERRITORY TENNIS COUNCIL

The NTTC, the parent body for tennis in the Territory, has a jurisdiction of some 1,346,200 square kilometres of Outback Australia. The Council was established in 1980.

During its first decade, the Council has been able to achieve significant progress for Territory tennis, having developed a sound base with respect to its affiliates, its finances and its relationship with Tennis Australia.

There has been particular development in the area of junior activities, under the guidance of N.T. Director of Coaching, Guy Thomas. Initiatives over the broad range from grass roots to interstate competition have borne fruit.

Of special importance in this arena has been the assistance provided by the Northern Territory Government, Tennis Australia and the McDonald's Junior Tennis Australia program.

Recent highlights have included the establishment within the South East Asian circuit of an ITF World Ranking Points Junior Tournament for Darwin, the expansion of the Territory's participation in the junior interstate Cups' competitions and the annual touring of a Territory team in the South-East Asian region.

Highlights of Senior activities include the success of annual tournaments, in particular the N.T. Open in Darwin and the Central Australian Open in Alice Springs. For the past several years, the latter has offered the largest prizemoney of any regional tennis championship in Australia.

In addition, there has emerged a strong and energetic Veterans' Tennis Association of the N.T.. The sport has also established a strong presence in the biennial Honda Central Australian Masters Games in Alice Springs.

The Northern Territory Tennis Council is confident of the future of Territory tennis, having regard to that which has been achieved to date, and the enthusiasm and energy of people involved in the sport in the Territory.

### INTERNATIONAL LAWN TENNIS CLUB

Under the leadership of former all-time great and I.C. Club President, Frank Sedgman, the International Lawn Tennis Club has be-

come much more active. Australian teams now travel overseas regularly and host I.C. teams from other countries.

During the Ford Australian Open, Tennis Australia and the International Club combine to host a popular dinner at the Royal South Yarra Lawn Tennis Club on the final Saturday of the Ford Australian Open. On the following morning the I.C. Club now host a final day brunch which is fast becoming a traditional event at the Championships.

### AUSTRALIAN WOMEN'S TENNIS ASSOCIATION

The Australian Women's Tennis Association has decided to change its name to the Australian Federation Cup Tennis Foundation and to establish similar aims and objectives for women's tennis as the Davis Cup Foundation has achieved for the men.

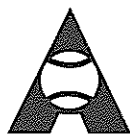
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## DIRECTORS AND STAFF

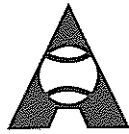

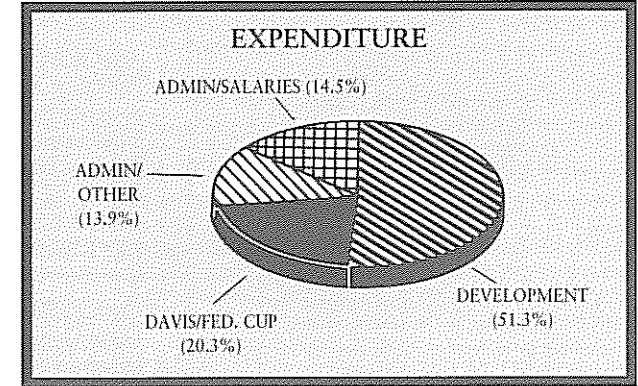
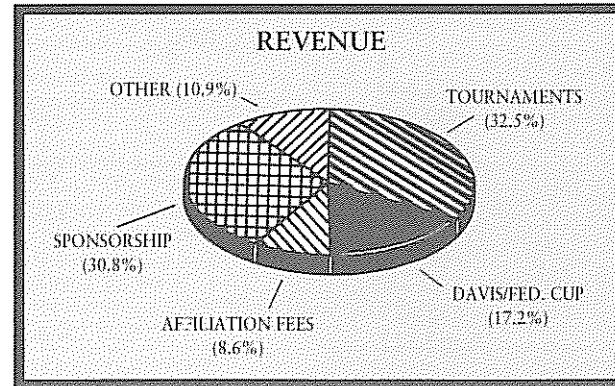
The operating result of the Association for the year ended 31 December, 1990 shows a profit of \$132,781 (before providing for transfers to reverses and distributions to Associations). This result compares favourably to the break-even budget projection and the 1989 profit result of \$20,087.

This result does not include trading results of the events staged at the National Tennis Centre (including the Ford Australian Open). These events are managed by the Association on behalf of the National Tennis Centre Trust.

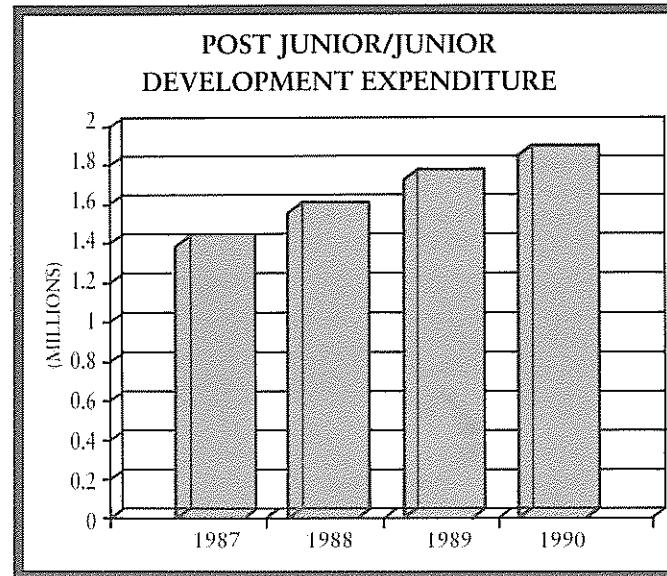
The major reason for the increased level of Revenue and Expenditure over the previous year was that the Davis Cup team won through to the final of the 1990 competition compared to a first round defeat in 1989. This success resulted in higher prize money levels received from the International Tennis Federation and profits from three home ties. The expenditure levels reflected the cost of competing in four matches, being the three home ties plus the final in the USA.

Financial support from major commercial sponsors, and various government sources continues to provide a solid financial base to allow expansion of our tennis development programs. This expanded program will be maintained throughout 1991.

FOR YEAR ENDING 31 DECEMBER 1990



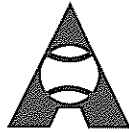

With the continual support of major sponsors and the Australian Government, Tennis Australia has been able to maintain its commitment to training programs for junior and post junior players.



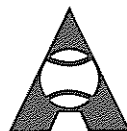
