Roding Valley is a co-educational comprehensive school serving part of the communities of Loughton and Buckhurst Hill. The school is also a Specialist Performing Arts College.

The School is situated in the centre of Loughton close to the Central Line Station and served by many bus routes.

Roding Valley is a large school and we pride ourselves on our communication with parents and others interested in the school.

First point of contact is the school's Reception Office. Our staff will be able to put you in touch with the right person or take a message if he or she is teaching. We will try and answer your query immediately but it may be that the member of staff you are looking to contact is teaching or in a meeting. In this instance we will take a message and the member of staff will contact you within 24 hours.

### Welcome to Roding Valley High School.

This is a school that takes pride in enabling and encouraging every one of its students to do their very best. Our motto is 'Enjoyment, Achievement, Success' and we aim to provide as wide a range of experiences as is possible for all our students. Everything we do is focused on ensuring that each individual student achieves the grades they are capable of, that they experience a rich and varied education and that they aspire to excellence in everything they do. It is my privilege to be the Headteacher of Roding Valley High School. I am proud of the dedicated and well-qualified staff who all share the belief that every child is special and are determined that they achieve their potential. I am delighted that we gained a record number of students gaining 5 A\*-C grades in 2010 and the number of students achieving an A\* or A grade rose as well. Almost 100% of our students left with at least 1 GCSE pass.

We are extremely proud of our academic success and have a deserved reputation as an excellent school. We are developing innovative approaches to teaching and learning and these are ensuring that more students than ever are achieving academic success. Whilst our approach to teaching is innovative, it is underpinned by an insistence on the traditional values of excellent behaviour, courtesy to others, wearing school uniform with pride and self respect and discipline. It is my belief that students will only achieve their potential if these values are exhibited by everyone.

We are also equally proud of our other successes at District and County level in a range of sports including football, netball, basketball, athletics, tennis and cross-country. Thanks to the talent of our students, and the skill and professionalism of our staff, we were also extremely successful in the national Shakespeare Schools' Festival with our interpretation of 'The Tempest', which also enabled us to secure the Princess Diana Award. Our Performing Arts Specialism enables us to provide a huge variety of experiences in the Arts, Drama and Music to our students. Our school production of 'Hairspray' this year was hugely successful.

We have excellent facilities which are constantly being developed and improved. In the last four years we have invested heavily in our ICT provision. All ICT suites have been developed and this summer has seen the building of 2 further state of the art ICT suites. We have also installed a new reception area for parents and visitors and will be upgrading our school hall.

Virtually all our teaching areas now have the latest multi-media equipment to further enhance teaching and learning with a rolling programme to develop them even more. Our excellent range of facilities includes a 4-court Sports Hall, a floodlit Astroturf pitch, an Art Gallery and superbly equipped Music Studio and Drama Studio.

None of this would work without strong, enthusiastic and committed teaching and support staff. This is recognised by Universities and Teacher Training Institutions that regularly seek our assistance in educating the next generation of teachers.

It was therefore no surprise when we gained Specialist School status for Performing Arts at our first attempt and received Healthy Schools Status in July 2007. We received re-designation to both these awards in 2010.

I hope that this prospectus gives you a flavour of the exciting, dynamic and forward thinking school community we are. No written document, however, can do justice to the rich diversity of exciting and successful work undertaken at the school and I encourage you to visit the school where you can experience it at first hand. I look forward to meeting you soon.

### **Admission Policy and Open Evening Arrangements**

As a Community School, Roding Valley High School's admissions are arranged by Essex Local Authority. The criteria for allocation of places are as follows:

- Children Looked After
- Children living in the priority admission area with a sibling attending the school
- Other children living in the priority admission area
- Children resident in the priority admission areas of Buckhurst Hill Community Primary, Chigwell Primary and Limes Farm Junior Schools with a sibling attending the school
- Other children resident in the priority admission areas of Buckhurst Hill Community Primary, Chigwell Primary and Limes Farm Junior Schools
- Children living outside the priority admission area with a sibling attending the school
- Remaining applications

In the event of oversubscription within any of the above criteria, priority will be determined by straight line distance from home to school, those living closest being given highest priority. Exceptional medical circumstances (supported by medical evidence) may override the above.

Whether you live in-catchment or out-catchment, it is essential you apply to Essex County Council by 31<sup>st</sup> October 2010.

An Open Evening will be held at the school on Thursday14th October from 6.00pm. The Headteacher will talk to parents at 6.15pm and 7.45pm. Tours will be available during the evening, and on the mornings of Monday 11<sup>th</sup>, Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday 13<sup>th</sup> September. On these mornings prospective parents will have an opportunity to meet the Headteacher and other senior staff and be given a tour of the school so that they can view the school on a normal working day. No appointment is necessary and tours start at 9.00am. Please report to reception on the morning of the tours at 8.50am.

For entry in September 2009, 586 applications were received for the 240 places available in Year 7.

### **Safeguarding and Child Protection**

Roding Valley is fully aware of the need to safeguard our children by paying attention to all of the following areas:

- Recruitment of staff (CRB checks)
- Staff child protection training and policy/procedure packs
- Guidelines to prevent abuse of trust
- Visitors' Policy

Miss Cordwell (member of the Senior Leadership Team) is the designated Child Protection Person who picks up and deals with any concerns. All issues are dealt with strictly in accordance with the Essex procedures which cover all eventualities. We take our duties in this area very seriously indeed.

### **Pastoral Care**

The Head of Upper School and Head of Lower School work with the Heads of Year to ensure the academic and personal well being of each girl and boy in the year. Each student is allocated to a tutor group and he or she will see the tutor twice each day, every day for up to five years. In this way, every student is known well and comes into daily contact with a member of staff who can help, guide or advise as necessary. The Head of Year leads a team of tutors and co-ordinates liaison with parents. Each student has regular mentoring sessions with their tutor to check their progress.

Great importance throughout the School is attached to high standards of conduct and the formation of good character. We set high standards in dress, work and behaviour and expect students to maintain these standards at all times.

The standards of behaviour expected are based on the need for consideration for others and the needs of a learning community. Students are expected to treat staff and each other with respect at all times.

The school has its own Learning Support Unit to support some of our more vulnerable pupils and also offering a range of pupil workshops.

Students are expected to be prepared for lessons by bringing the correct books and equipment. They are expected to be punctual and to attend School regularly; bringing a note from parents to explain any absence, following a telephone call to school from parents on the morning of the first day of absence.

Our behaviour data shows significant improvements over the last four years. Discipline is firm and friendly, on the basis that children will respond to the positive approach of encouragement, praise and reward. We expect students to be polite and courteous at all times and we also expect them to aspire to excellence in everything they do within a learning

environment that is safe, positive, respectful, inclusive and welcoming. We go to great lengths to recognise and celebrate good behaviour and acts of kindness by our students. When sanctions are deemed necessary they may involve routine impositions, reprimand, detention or referral to senior staff. Parents and students will be invited, or may wish, to meet senior staff to discuss particular problems.

Parents will be given 24 hours notice of after-school detention, however parents should be aware that the notice is not seeking their permission for the detention, it is a courtesy to allow you time to ensure that you can make any alternative arrangements to get your child home .

Parental support is expected for school discipline at all times. We also work closely with a range of outside agencies.

In serious and/or persistent cases of indiscipline, the Headteacher may exclude a student from the School for a fixed term (up to 45 school days). In exceptional circumstances, the Headteacher may recommend to the Governing Body that a student be permanently excluded. Parents have the right to appeal to the Governing Body and the Local Authority.

### **Curriculum Organisation**

All students in Key Stage 3 (Years 7-9) take courses that follow the required eleven National Curriculum subjects.

There are four **CORE** subjects:

Mathematics English Science ICT

There are **FOUNDATION** subjects:

Art Geography History Modern Languages Music

Physical Education Technology Learn to Learn

Key Stage 3 students also take a course that follows the locally agreed syllabus in Religious Education. In addition to this they take courses in Citizenship/Personal Social Health and Economic Education (PSHEE) and Drama. In Years 8 and 9 they also follow a course in Expressive Arts, which leads to the Arts Award level 1 and level 2 qualifications.

In Years 7 and 8 students also study Learn to Learn, where they develop their personal learning and thinking skills.

In Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11) there is added flexibility in the curriculum on offer. All students continue to follow courses in Mathematics, English, Science, Citizenship and Physical Education.

Students then choose an additional four subjects from a range of courses that includes:

GCSE: French, German, History, Geography, Sociology, ICT, Business Studies, Art,

Drama, Music, Statistics, Media, Sports Studies, Product Design, Catering, Psychology, Dance, Performing Arts, Photography, Health and Social Care

OTHERS: B.Tech Performing Arts, Alternative College Courses, DIDA, Enhanced Option

(ASDAN COPE Award)

Our stated aim of 'Enjoyment, Achievement, Success' is facilitated by the broad and balanced curriculum on offer. It is supported by the many other initiatives and developments that assist the delivery of the curriculum and the assessment of student progress. These include: a thorough assessment programme reporting progress to parents three times each year; a well established mentor programme; enhanced ICT facilities in all subject areas; a strong Special Educational Needs Department; clear identification of exceptionally able students with supporting curricular and extra-curricular activities, and a very active Careers Department with a very effective Work Experience programme. We recognize that academic success is incredibly important, but we also believe that students should experience as wide and varied a curriculum as possible.

In addition to the above options courses, we run a number of link courses with local colleges. These include Health and Beauty, Construction, Motor Vehicle Studies, Manicure/Pedicure and Hairdressing.

### **Extra Curricular Activities**

The students of Roding Valley enjoy access to a wide variety of experiences beyond the classroom.

### Student responsibility

If we want our students to become 'good citizens', they must learn how to take responsibility. Our Year 11 prefect programme has grown year-on-year with training and development for 90 prefects in 2010. The School Council is flourishing at year and school level and now has two representatives at Epping Forest Youth Council level. Students are actively involved in all major decision making in the school through the school council.

### **Sporting**

Students may choose to take part in many sporting activities. Thriving football and netball teams compete at the highest level and continue to be very successful, winning a number of local cups and leagues. Other activities available to students include dance, trampolining, outdoor pursuits, volleyball, rugby, basketball, hockey, athletics, tennis and cricket. The school also enjoys success in Cross Country Events.

### Cultural

Roding Valley is proud to have gained Specialist School Status for Performing Arts. The school has an outstanding Creative Arts Faculty. There are annual school productions which have recently included 'West Side Story', 'The Musicians', 'Oliver', 'Le Café des Etoiles', 'Bugsy Malone' and our hugely successful 2010 performance of 'Hairspray'. These performances have been very enjoyable and always play to full houses. Music concerts are held at the end of each term and show a wide range of music talents. We are rightly proud of the degree of participation from the students at the school. Instrumental tuition covering many instruments is available to the beginner and more experienced musician alike, although a charge is made for this facility. The school also hosts a weekly music school, to which many students belong.

### **Study Support**

Roding Valley uses the local and wider community's facilities to the full, when providing support for students at the school. A daily homework club is very popular and is supported by a wide variety of visits, including GCSE revision courses in London and regular theatre and gallery visits.

### **Foreign Visits**

Students from Roding Valley are given the opportunity to travel to many varied destinations with the school. Recent destinations have included: Paris and St Omer – France and skiing in the USA. These trips have been accompanied by school staff and have proved very successful and enlightening for the students attending.

### **Children with Special Educational Needs**

At Roding Valley High School, every student has the right to be able to access the curriculum and be given the chance to reach his or her full potential. We have a team of staff, consisting of the SEN Co-ordinator, Teachers and Learning Support Assistants who work with class teachers to address the individual needs of students who may need support with any aspect of their school work.

Special Educational Needs is the term we use to describe children who may, for one reason or another, have a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of their peers. This can range from weaknesses in literacy and numeracy to physical and sensory impairments and/or medical conditions. It can include children with emotional and behavioural problems, whose difficulties are related to the learning process.

We have an SEN Policy that outlines the way we identify and plan for individual children's needs. Our policy encourages children to be interested and involved with their own learning, with an open and positive input from parents. We organise a range of support across the school, including in-class, small group and individual support. If necessary, we can call upon specialist outside agencies to help us with advice and strategies in planning for the range of needs that children display.

Copies of the school's SEN Policy can be found on the school's website in the 'Parents' section. Paper copies are available on request from the school.

### **Gifted, Able and Talented Students**

The school has a significant programme that helps students who have been identified as gifted, able or talented in one or more subjects. We have a Gifted, Able and Talented Coordinator, who is a member of staff with specific responsibility for developing strategies that promote the development of gifted students in lessons. We were particularly pleased to see the number of A\* and A grades significantly increase at GCSE level this year, mainly due to the focus and emphasis on pushing our most able students to ensure they achieve the grades they are capable of.

### **School Day**

The school day starts at 8.40am. The curriculum is organised to give 25 hours per week teaching time, compared with the Department for Education and Skills recommendation of 24 hours per week with 1 hour 15 minutes in addition for tutorial work, assemblies and mentoring. School ends at 3.10pm each day.

As a recognised 'Healthy School', we meet the requirement of a minimum of two hours PE each week for every student.

### **Equipment**

Every day each student requires:

- 1. a rough work book for notes
- 2. the Student Planner (supplied by the school)
- 3. pens, pencils, rubber, ruler and pencil case
- 4. geometry equipment and calculator
- 5. reading book
- 6. a plain, dark school bag that will carry an A4 file

Much of this equipment is available from the school shop. Equipment is an essential part of life. Not having the correct equipment can disrupt lessons and we ask that parents ensure that their children have the correct equipment for school.

### Uniform

At Roding Valley High School the uniform is designed to be smart and practical and it is an integral part of being part of the community at Roding Valley. We place emphasis on students wearing uniform properly and expect all students to come to school appropriately dressed. Pupils are expected to wear full school uniform in school and on the journey to and from school and we ask parents to support us in ensuring that students come to school dressed in the correct uniform. Full school uniform consists of:

### **BOYS**

Trousers black tailored trousers

Blazer black (with school badge) to be worn at all times

Shirt plain white with no logos

Tie school tie

Jumper (optional) black 'v-neck' jumper with Roding Valley badge or black sleeveless 'v-

neck' with Roding Valley badge. Only these jumpers, with the school

badge, can be worn. No other form of jumper is acceptable

Shoes black, classic leather style shoes only (boots, trainers, canvas shoes,

backless shoes or sandals are not acceptable)

Jewellery no jewellery except for a small stud, only one in each ear, and a wrist

watch. Facial, or other body piercings, are not acceptable

Coats dark (black or dark blue) raincoat, overcoat or jacket (not denim or

leather and without badges or slogans)

### **GIRLS**

Kilt royal blue/black/white check kilt. The kilt must be worn to knee length.

The kilt should not be tailored in any way. Kilts which are altered to an excessively short length are not permitted under any circumstances

Trousers black tailored trousers

Blazer black (with school badge) to be worn at all times

Blouse plain white with collar. Blouses should have no 'frills' or patterns on

them

Jumper (optional) black 'v-neck' jumper with Roding Valley badge or black sleeveless 'v-

neck' with Roding Valley badge. Only these jumpers, with the school

badge, can be worn. No other form of jumper is acceptable.

Shoes black, classic leather style shoes only (boots, trainers, canvas shoes,

backless shoes or sandals are not acceptable)

Tights tights must be plain black or natural coloured. Patterned tights are not

acceptable.

Ankle socks may be worn however knee length socks are not

acceptable.

Jewellery no jewellery except for a small stud, only one in each ear, and a wrist

watch. Facial, or other body piercings, are not acceptable

Coats dark (black or dark blue) raincoat, overcoat or jacket (not denim or

leather and without badges or slogans).

Extreme or bizarre hairstyles or colours will not be tolerated. If colour is being used on hair it must be a natural colour. Colour such as blue, red, purple etc is not acceptable. The minimum length of haircut is a 'Number 2'. There should also be no patterns in hair. Students may be sent home until the hairstyle is acceptable.

A boot is considered anything above the ankle.

Headphones are banned and will be confiscated.

Students are not encouraged to bring mobile phones into school, as their security cannot be guaranteed. If students bring mobile phones onto the school site they must be switched off and out of sight whilst students are on the school site. Any phone that is seen on the school site will be confiscated.

N.B. The school has the legal right to confiscate mobile phones or iPods.

If parents are in doubt about the suitability of any items of uniform they intend to purchase, they should contact the school. This will enable us to work together to maintain high standards of dress.
