Emmeline

Pankhurst, this

city's most

famous

daughter, coined a slogan in 1903: "deeds, not words". Without deeds - concrete and concerted action - the structural inequalities that condemn women and girls to being, at best, second-class citizens will remain.

It is 113 years since Pankhurst set up the Women's Social and Political Union at her home in Nelson Street to campaign for women's suffrage and other key reforms, yet still women are underrepresented in politics and working life, paid less than men - if paid at all, and penalised for time spent looking after others as parents and caregivers. Violence and harassment are integral to the female experience; we are told it is our duty to protect ourselves and therefore our failure if we are attacked or abused. Society, schools and the media too often reinforce the message that this is the natural order.

It is not. Unlocking the potential of half the population would benefit the whole population. The reason the Women's Equality Party has grown so quickly and performed so strongly at our first elections is because you – our founding members, supporters and activists – understand this and share our impatience for change. The old parties too rarely match deeds to words because they are riven with conflict and competing priorities.

Our focus is clear and our collaborative political model is unique. We will continue to challenge the other parties to do better, and we will also work with them whenever possible to implement our policies.

Those policies are our lifeblood. The Women's Equality Party published a first policy document in October 2015 and has continued to develop and augment that platform in consultation with branches and members. This party conference marks our coming of age, the moment when policy-making devolves to the membership.

We founded the Women's Equality Party, we communicated a vision, and we continue to work every day for its success, but we do not own it or control it. This is your party. We could not be more excited or happy than to entrust it to your care.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION

Our aim is to make sure you feel confident on all things conference. Below is some essential information to make sure your first Women's Equality Party Conference runs as smoothly as possible. Our team of staff and volunteers is on hand to help at any time.

Registration

Our friendly registration team is available to help throughout the three days of Party Conference. Find them at the entrance to the venue where you will collect your name badge. Please arrive promptly and have your booking information and photo ID to hand to ensure that everyone is able to access the venue quickly and easily. Volunteers can answer any questions and help with any issues you may have.

Conference passes

For security reasons, conference delegates are requested to wear conference passes at all times. Please remember that delegate passes are non-transferable, and if you are found in possession of someone else's badge you will be charged for the full conference pass. Your pass lets the WE team know whether you are a voting delegate or observer.

Conference volunteers

We have a fantastic team of more than 150 volunteers who are giving their time and energy to help make this event a success. Volunteers will be wearing a Women's Equality Party sash and are on hand to answer questions, give directions and provide whatever help is needed to ensure that you get the most out of the event.

Accessibility

The Women's Equality Party is committed to ensuring that all delegates are able to access all aspects of conference events. Hearing loops, accessible seating, large-print programmes and menus, reserved parking and step-free access have been arranged for those who have requested it upon booking tickets. If you have access needs of any kind, please ask for the access coordinator at registration to help us ensure that you can access all aspects of conference.

Cloakroom and left luggage

For delegates wishing to store their coats, bags or luggage during the day, a cloakroom can be found in Shed C at the rear of the building. It costs £2 to store each item and when belongings are removed from the cloakroom they will be treated as new items if they are returned. The cloakroom will close promptly at the end of each day so please collect any belongings you need in plenty of time.

Toilets

There are toilets on both floors of the conference venue. An accessible toilet can be found on the ground floor by the main entrance.

First Ai



Lost property should be handed in to the cloakroom attendant in Shed C at the rear of the building, who will endeavour to find its owner. This is also where lost property should be collected from.




MAP OF MANCHESTER

THE WOMEN'S EQUALITY PARTY

WE are a focused mainstream party. WE have six core objectives: equal representation in all areas of working life; equal pay; equal parenting and care-giving; equal education; equal media treatment; and ending violence against women and girls – and one overarching goal: gender equality. Societies and economies cannot thrive unless women thrive.

WE are the only collaborative force in UK politics. WE try wherever possible to work with other parties towards improving the status of women. WE have already coauthored amendments to revenge porn legislation with the Liberal Democrats, and are working on ratification of the Istanbul Convention to end violence against women with the SNP. Our #NoSizeFitsAll campaign drew crossparty support from the Greens and Liberal Democrats. WE do not believe that the push for gender equality belongs solely to one part of the political spectrum, and so we open our membership to members of other political parties. WE do believe that England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland have the potential to be the first gender-equal countries in the world.

WE also stand candidates in our own right and earned more than 350,000 votes at our first elections in May 2016 in London, Scotland and Wales. One in 20 of the votes cast for London mayor went to WE candidate Sophie Walker – an astonishing achievement for such a young party. Our success continued in October 2016 with local candidate Rebecca Manson-Jones taking 7% of the vote in a Lewisham by-election.

Ours is an intersectional approach that understands that women start at a structural disadvantage to men but are also discriminated against based on their ethnicity, age, disability, family background, sexuality and religion. WE welcome members and supporters of all genders. Equality is better for everyone.

This Party Conference will add to our policy platform and may change existing policies. WE do not seek to take a party line on issues outside our remit of gender equality.

DEBATE AND DECISION-MAKING

Party Conference is the supreme decision-making body of the Women's Equality Party. Get ready to have your voice heard!

WE will...

- Oiscuss and approve the WE Constitution
- ✓ Improve and endorse the WE Policy Document
- Select a Policy Committee and explore how WE want to make policy decisions
- Meet our new Steering Committee, which will hold the decision-making power between Party Conferences, and elect five of its representatives
- Discuss and decide on motions
- Form new policy proposals in the Saturday breakout debates

There will be workshops and training and you will meet WE members and supporters from across the UK.

How does this work?

Sunday will be dedicated to our party business where we will debate and decide party policy. Motions are put forward in advance and the proposer is given 5 minutes to introduce it at the conference. Members can ask to speak to the motion. Conference chair decides for how long each motion is debated before it is moved to vote. Every party member who is attending has the right to vote on the motion. If the motion is approved it becomes a WE policy resolution.

What is my role as a delegate?

As a delegate you have the right to participate in debates, to vote on policy motions and to elect the Policy Committee members and the representatives who will sit on the Steering Committee. You have the responsibility to be present during party business sessions and to ensure that the party is operating in line with its core values and policies.

What is a motion?

- A motion is a proposal for discussion and possible adoption as a resolution
- A policy motion can reaffirm the policy of the party or adopt a new policy
- A business motion is a proposal that concerns the internal work of the party
- An emergency motion is a proposal put forward after the deadline for motions has passed to address an issue that has come up in the meantime. Emergency motions are not subject to amendment.

How can I actively participate in Party Conference?

On Friday night there will be an open mic session where members can give three-minute speeches about a topic of their choice. This is a great opportunity to address issues you feel strongly about. Sign up on the spot!

Take part in debates

Topical discussions and debates will take place on Saturday and will result in non-binding policy proposals. Participate in these debates to prepare yourself for discussions on Party Business, the WE Constitution and motions, which will take place on Sunday.

Plan your weekend schedule

With such a full and exciting agenda, it is easy to feel a bit overwhelmed at conference. Make sure you plan your schedule in advance. We recommend picking at least three 'must do' workshops or debates on Saturday that chime with your areas of interest, and at least one that you wouldn't normally attend. Make sure you get stuck in!





Building a man's world: how WE can shift the balance 09.45 - 11.30

Room 1

The infrastructure of society is too often built around men, while the needs of women and other genders are at best an afterthought. This panel debate, chaired by Sue Lawton MBE, global adviser to WEConnect, explores the ways we can change this. Sarah Marie Hall, of the Women's Budget Group, speaks about reconstructing the economy; Julia King, architect and urban researcher at LSE Cities, talks about women in the built environment; Yasmin Rehman, human rights activist and researcher, explains how religious arbitration fails women; and Sarah Childs, professor of politics and gender at the University of Bristol, discusses how Parliament can work for women. The speakers will propose ways that WE can reform these structures. Bring your ideas to the Q&A session.

A threat to equal education or business as usual? Sexual harassment andsexual violence in universities 09.45 - 11.30

Room 2, The McAllister Olivarius Room

This topical debate will be kicked-off by lawyer Ann Olivarius who has dedicated her life to ending sexual violence on US and UK university campuses. She was a leading force in the US lawsuit that established sexual harassment as a threat to equality of education. Ann puts forward proposals for new UK legislation to tackle the epidemic levels of sexual abuse in higher education. Shakira Martin, vice president of the National Union of Students and Amelia Horgan, also from the NUS respond to the proposals and then the floor will be opened to questions and comments. Facilitator Drífa Snædal will bring in decision-making tools from the Icelandic Women's List in which all decisions were reached through consensus. The debate will conclude with legislation proposals for WE's future campaigns.

A woman's place: a look at affordable housing 09.45 - 11.30

Room 4

Affordable housing has started to sound like a utopian dream and political parties tend to provide answers in the number of houses they will build. But what does that mean for women? Facilitated by Carole Easton, CEO of the Young Women's Trust, this panel discussion looks at how women lose out under the current system. Saskia O'Hara shares experiences from the Focus E15 campaign against social cleansing and Betsy Dillner, director of Generation Rent discusses renters' rights. They are joined by Jack Monroe, social commentator, chef and author, who talks about the struggle of single parenthood. and Polly Neate of Women's Aid, who explains what unaffordable housing means for women fleeing domestic violence. After input from the audience, this will conclude with suggestions for a housing policy that works for women as well as men.

Women and the environment: mind-mapping the world 09.45 - 11.30

Room 5

Climate change is one of the greatest challenges of our time. Yet solutions are few and far between. This session explores the gendered impact of climate change. Why are women hit the hardest and what can be done about it? What policy changes are needed in the UK? This unusually personal, participative survey affords a unique insight into women's needs, priorities and values.



Catherine is the author of hree books, Amortality: The Pleasures and Perils of Living Agelessly (2011), Charles: The Heart of

a King (hardback 2015, paperback 2016) and the forthcoming Attack of the Fifty Foot Women (March 2017). She spent more than three decades as a journalist before co-founding the Women's Equality Party.

Born in the US, educated in the UK and Germany, she started on staff at The Economist, and held deputy editorships at Business Traveller and International Management magazines. She contributed regularly to the German edition of Forbes and for 11 years worked as a London-based correspondent for the German news weekly, FOCUS. In 2004, she joined TIME as a senior editor, and later rose to London Bureau Chief, Europe Editor and Editor at Large.

Her biography of Prince Charles, Charles: The Heart of a King, came out in February 2015. A Sunday Times top 10 bestseller, it made headlines across the world.

In March 2015 she proposed the idea of the Women's Equality Party at the Southbank Centre, during the WOW Festival, and agreed with Sandi Toksvig to co-found the party. She left TIME in April of the same year. She is the President of the Women's Equality

Catherine frequently appears on broadcast media. She served as the elected President of the Foreign Press Association in London from 2003-2005. She is on the founding committee of WOW. She served as a trustee of the National Migraine Centre

She was executive producer of Playhouse Live for Sky Arts, and last year was executive producer of six new half-hour films. She is Stephen Fry's replacement for the host chair of QI, BBC2's fiendishly difficult and hugely popular quiz.

Much of Sandi's time is devoted to writing. She has written over 20 books for children and adults, as well as a monthly column for Good Housekeeping magazine. She has also co-authored musicals and plays.

She has begun work on a musical about Dusty Springfield and has numerous other writing projects in the pipeline.


