Remembering Mala Sen

¶ he Nehru Centre organised an event to pay tribute to the distinguished author Mala Sen, who died on May 21. Over a hundred guests attended the event.

Writer and her former husband, Farrukh Dhondy read a note on Mala's life — how she came to London and became a researcher in many television programmes and later, an author.

Rahim Baksh, a Bangladeshi colleague, recalled how Mala had encouraged members of the Bangladeshi community at East End, to fight for their rights. Playwright Ash Kotak read a poem by Kalidas, Look to This Day. Actress Sudha Bhuchar read extracts from the Bandit Queen, as did filmmaker and friend, H.O. Nazareth. Actor Bhasker Patel read an extract from her second book, *Death by Fire*, while members from the artistic fraternity, including actors Harmej Kalirai, Rehan Sheikh, Ajay Chhabra, Leena Dhingra; filmmakers, Parminder Vir and Faris Kermani and artist Jeroo Roy came to honour and remember the woman who had been a source of inspiration for many.

Mala was also highly regarded by the Afro-Caribbean community, among whom she was active during the 1970s. Poet, Linton-Kwesi Johnson, and broadcaster Darcus Howe too paid their respects, as did Margaret Busby, OBE, the copy-editor of the book Bandit Queen.
