Teamwork – TKE believes that compassion, selflessness, and relationship building are the keys to successful teams. When chapters reach their potential, they will achieve a level of excellence in athletics, campus activities, chapter business, and anything else they do.

Brotherhood – TKE provides a family environment in which members establish solid friendships that last a lifetime. Tekes around the world act as a network of friends, which can be beneficial both personally and professionally. Stated in our Declaration of Principles, "We believe that the essential elements of true brotherhood are love, charity, and esteem."

Prepared to enter the world, our men embody the principles promoted by the Fraternity and are poised for success. They belong to TKE, 'The Fraternity for Life.




Failing to Plan is Planning for Failure

he spring recruitment season is winding down and final exams are just around the corner, but that doesn't mean you put the Fraternity on hold until next fall. You need to start planning now and this summer to give your chapter a leg up on the competition.

Summer Recruitment Plan

A successful summer recruitment program enables you to meet potential new members during the summer in a relaxed environment. The formal recruitment process is sometimes intimidating to incoming freshmen, but many come to campus



during the summer months to get a few classes out of the way. This is also a great time to meet upperclassmen who may be interested in joining, but couldn't during the traditional school year. Summer recruitment provides an opportunity to meet these men before they have a full load of classes and other activities distracting them in the fall. Contact is the basis to forming new friendships, and the summer is an ideal time to start this process. Even if your campus does not allow bidding potential members during this time, you can introduce

them to the Fraternity and some of the members.

First, you will need to appoint a summer recruitment chairman. This should be someone who will be around the campus all summer and available to coordinate events. Once a man is appointed, he should work with the Crysophylos to set a summer budget that includes money for small events, phone calls, copies and other expenses. The chairman should assign a group of Fraters who live in different areas to target students who will be coming to your school and host events in those areas. The recruitment team should then meet to identify prospective members. The list can be generated from several different sources.

- Incoming freshmen list from the Admissions Office
- List of men admitted with scholarships
- Other students who have expressed interest through the Greek Life Office
- Friends or younger brothers of chapter members
- Alumni recommendations
- High schools encourage Fraters to return to their high school for a list of students attending the institution
- Men who joined other clubs on campus

After compiling a solid list of men, fill out the online form (at www.tke.org) for a recruitment package or call the Offices of the Grand Chapter. This will include flyers, posters, bid cards and other public relations materials you can use to

promote your events. The next step is to make plans and set goals with the summer recruitment team. Goals should include how many men you want to meet, what events you want to have, and how much this will all cost. Then compile a list of where all Fraters will be over the summer months, so you contact them if you have potential members from their area or simply notify them of the upcoming events. Create and distribute a calendar of summer recruitment events, including the time, place and description of the event.

Before the end of the semester, hold a chapter meeting explaining your plans and the goals you have for the summer. You should also offer a refresher course on how you should recruit members.

Contact is the basis to forming new friendships, and the summer is an ideal time to start this process.

Creating a Summer To-Do List

There are several activities to do during summer. Though the following list seems daunting, if you have a good team in place, each team member can take a piece of the puzzle. Remind Fraters that this will impact the overall health of the organization, infusing it with new ideas, potential leaders, money for events, and the opportunity to out-recruit all other fraternities on campus.

Sample To-Do List

- Create a welcome letter to the college or university to all incoming freshman male students. This does not need to include how great the chapter is – that will come later. Simply concentrate on welcoming them to the next step in their life.
- Start meeting contacts from your prospect list. Assign certain members a list of men who are in or near where they are during the summer (utilizing the summer whereabouts list). Invite them to lunch or dinner and just get to know them, again concentrating on creating a friend not selling TKE. Find out as much information about them as possible and then invite them to a second meeting with a few of your other friends, such as a pick-up basketball game or something else they may be interested in. At the next meeting, invite them to a recruitment event.
- Aside from those you meet, be sure to publicize the recruitment events through flyers and campus calendar publications.
- Hold small recruitment events that are free from alcohol to ensure you attract the right kind of men.



- Follow-up with all attendees and non-attendees, letting them know about other upcoming events and what TKE is and is not.
- If you are allowed to bid men in the summer, do so. If you cannot, explain the recruitment policies on campus and that you would like them to continue coming around during that time period so you can extend them a formal bid.
- Keep in contact with all the prospective members during the summer and into the fall through email, Facebook, phone calls or text messages to keep them engaged. This will also keep TKE on their mind when they come on campus in the fall.


Recruitment is very simple if you break it down to Fraters like this: MEET HIM - Find out where the prospect is and go there. MAKE HIM A FRIEND - Be interested, not interesting. INTRODUCE HIM TO YOUR FRIENDS -Invite him to lunch. INTRODUCE HIM TO THE FRATERNITY – Tell him about Excellence. ASK HIM TO JOIN - Make your friend a Frater!

What Do We Do in the Fall?

It is crucial for a chapter to recruit in the fall for many reasons: to gain new members with fresh ideas, to continue the existence of the chapter, to become a stronger campus organization, to create more impact, and to share the bonds of the organization with others. Determine where else to find potential members and refer to the list of prospective new members created for the summer. Try to add any more to this list. It's important to always keep that list fresh with new men by contacting professors who may have good male students, Greek Life Administrators to see if they have been contacted by new men, and/or sorority members to see if they have friends coming on campus.

Other Ideas to Utilize in the Fall

- Utilize the same methods you did for the summer, including goals and plans.
- At the first chapter meeting, tell other Fraters about these plans and the calendar of events.
- Remind your chapter of the recruitment basics such as what





the fraternity stands for, prominent alumni and other things found at www.jointke.org.

- Arrange to have a table on campus.
- Host an on-campus event, like an alcohol awareness program or community service event.
- Plan for fall recruitment public relations materials such as Tshirts, banners and posters (contact the Offices of the Grand Chapter for ideas and a recruitment package).
- Plan out formal recruitment events that you would want to attend like a barbecue, game night or karaoke.
- Make your organization known through clever marketing like organization nights hosted by the campus, place an ad in the campus newspaper, radio or TV station, purchase an ad on Facebook or other means.

Takeaways

We can learn a lot about recruitment by glancing across the campus to the athletic department. Coaches on the staff identify gaps in the team that they need to fill with new recruits. A list of potential new team members is created and each scout receives a list. The scouts then visit recruits and talk with them about what interests them to find things they can offer them. Based on the scouts' evaluations, recruits are then invited to visit the campus and meet the team. After this year-long process, recruits sign a letter of intent to attend the college. The signing is a formality similar to extending a bid. If a relationship has been established, it only comes naturally that the prospect would join you.

T-shirts and banners are important to have, but personalized recruitment goes well beyond these public relations tools. Think back to when you became a new member. You can probably remember who extended you a bid, but can't remember what the T-shirt looked like. TKE can meet the wants and needs of incoming students by providing hands-on service learning, a foundation to gain leadership and professional skills, and a mentor or role model. Fraters engaging in everyday dialogue and inviting these men to typical chapter activities will create friendships, which in turn will produce new members.

Recruitment with Teamwork and Brotherhood

ecruitment is a time to assess what your chapter or colony has, what it wants, and what it needs to be even more successful than it currently is. Take an honest look at what each member has to offer and, more importantly, any weaknesses of the collective group. Maybe your chapter runs effective meetings, but struggles in intramural competition: you need athletes. Maybe your chapter has good grades, but doesn't do community service events: you need service-oriented men. Whatever the case, you can find the missing puzzle pieces by putting the chapter through brotherhood and teamwork building exercises.

Employers in every workplace talk about building the team, working as a team, and my team, but how can you learn these skills as a college man or recent graduate to have a leg up on the competition? Few men understand how to create the experience of teamwork or how to develop an effective team. Belonging to a team, in the broadest sense, is a result of feeling part of something larger than yourself. It has a lot to do with your understanding of the mission or objectives of Tau Kappa Epsilon, your organization (see mission, vision, purpose statements at www.tke.org).

In a team-oriented environment, you contribute to the overall success of the organization. You work with fellow Fraters to produce these results. Even though you may have a specific job function and you belong to a specific department of the chapter, you are unified with other organization members to accomplish the overall objectives.

The bigger picture drives your actions; your function exists to serve the bigger picture. You need to differentiate this overall sense of teamwork from the task of developing an effective, intact team that is formed to accomplish a specific goal. People confuse the two team building objectives. Developing an overall sense of teamwork is different from building an effective, focused work team when you consider team building approaches.

Here is one Teamwork and Brotherhood building activity you can do.

Carousels

Instructions:

All chapter members should make one large circle. Instruct members to count off by twos. Ask all ones to take one step inside the circle and face out, thus facing one of their Fraters on



the outside circle. This step should form two circles. Make sure each has a discussion partner.

Instruct the men that they will be given a topic to discuss with their partner for 60 seconds. Each partner should share during that time. Let them know

that you as the leader will let them know when their time is up.

Ask all to stop talking when their time is up. Instruct the inside circle to move one person to their right. All members should now have a different discussion partner. Give them another topic. Continue through the following questions.

- 1) Initially, what drew you to our Fraternity?
- 2) What is brotherhood?
- 3) How do you define respect?
- 4) What is your favorite brotherhood building activity?
- 5) I am most proud of this Fraternity because ...
- 6) A brother is considering dropping out of school and the chapter. What would you say to him?
- 7) What is trust?
- 8) What do you enjoy most about our Fraternity?
- 9) Finish the sentence: I feel closest to my fellow Fraters when ...
- 10) I am most frustrated with our chapter when \dots
- 11) The most important aspect of our Fraternity is ...

Take some time to discuss these topics in the large group to review what has been said and on the minds of other Fraters.

Outcomes:

- Chapter members who don't normally share these insights with each other will have a safe climate to deepen their bond as brothers.
- Some of the questions are designed to bring light to issues members are struggling with but don't feel comfortable speaking out about. The discussion afterwards would allow the comments to be anonymous.
- Brothers who normally remain silent when brainstorming will not have that option, and often will discover an answer to one of the issues your chapter is struggling with.

Sample Questions to Ask During Debrief

To help participants reflect and learn upon this experience, the following are some good sample questions to ask following the Carousel team building activity:

- What do you think is the purpose of this team building activity?
- 2) What was it like to answer these questions?
- 3) Did you have any difficulty answering these questions? Why or why not?
- 4) Why is trust in the Fraternity important?
- 5) What are some other questions that need to be asked and answered by members?
- How does this relate to Tau Kappa Epsilon and more specifically our chapter?

RECRUITMENT LEGEND KEEPS ON TICKIN' ... CELEBRATING 35 YEARS

n 1969, Dennis "Buckwheat" Perry (Opportunity Out of Defeat Club), Alpha-Nu, University of New Hampshire, became the Recruitment Chairman's assistant at Alpha-Lambda Chapter at Kansas State University. He planned all of the summer recruitment events including cookouts, mixers, and even set the schedule for the chairman's visits. It was during this time that he became intrigued by the idea of recruitment, a passion he still holds dear even today. The chapter broke every record TKE had during a time dubbed as "The Fraternity

Brought into a summer recruitment conference held at the newly opened Offices of the Grand Chapter in 1972, Frater Buckwheat was asked by the Grand Council why he was so successful during a time with steadily declining recruitment numbers. After much discussion, Executive Vice President Frater T.J. Schmitz (Leaders Society), Iota-Omicron, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, decided to create a position dedicated solely to recruitment. The idea had never been approached before in the interfraternal world, so its effectiveness was untested.

"January 1, 1973, I came on staff with the approach that we were going to run this like a business," said Frater Buckwheat. "We had mass marketing plans, recruitment materials to spread the word about TKE, and ran the first ever newspaper ad. Within four years, every fraternity headquarters adopted this idea because of our success."

Armed with the ability to sell the

Fraternity to prospective members, Frater Buckwheat set out to start chapters from scratch. He quickly fell in love with the West and spent much of the first 20 years expanding in the states of Arizona, California, Nevada, Texas, and many more. His most memorable moment was a special hello from Frater Ronald Reagan (Founders Society), Iota, Eureka College.

"In the early days of his campaigning, the Secret Service always let Tekes past security for the sole reason that they wore the letters T-K-E," said Frater Buckwheat. "But what keeps me going all these years is a small gesture by then-President Reagan during a difficult time in my life. I had surgery and was recovering in my room, when a nurse came in all flustered. There was a huge bouquet of red carnations from the president of the United States. They said, 'Who is this guy that would get flowers from the president?' But that's the kind of guy he was and it really touched me."

During the eight years of President Reagan's administration, he sent Frater Buckwheat a telegram to read at each of the new chapter installations. On top of that, Frater Buckwheat said he gets several phone calls a year from Fraters who say thank you for believing in them. There is no greater joy in his life, he said, than taking those phone calls and seeing the difference he makes.

During his 35-year tenure on the TKE Professional Staff, Frater Buckwheat has travelled around the United States and Canada, helping men realize their potential and strive to be gentlemen of TKE. Congratulations, Frater Buckwheat, from the Offices of the Grand Chapter and the entire TKE Nation. W



The Sit Down with Edmund C. Moy

rater Edmund C. Moy was sworn in as the 38th director of the United States Mint on September 5, 2006, approximately 30 years after joining Tau Kappa Epsilon. Upon arriving at the University of Wisconsin campus, Frater Ed knew he had the tools to become a leader but needed to sharpen them. After being turned away at the door of other fraternities, he landed on the steps of Lambda Chapter, who welcomed him inside. Since that time, he has excelled at every stage of his illustrious career.

As director of the United States Mint, Moy leads the world's largest manufacturer of coins, medals, and numismatic (coin) products. In 2005, the United States Mint manufactured more than 15 billion circulating coins and generated a total revenue of \$1.77 billion, contributing \$775 million in earnings to the United States Treasury.

Prior to becoming director, Moy was a special assistant to the president for presidential personnel at the White House. He was responsible for recommending to President George W. Bush candidates for political appointments for the U.S. Departments of Health and Human Services, Education, Labor, Agriculture, Interior, Energy, and the Environmental Protection Agency.

THE TEKE: The themes of this magazine are teamwork and brotherhood. As head of the United States Mint, how have you taken your collegiate experience into the professional world?

Moy: In my experience with the Fraternity and the skills I took from there to the various areas of my career, and as I have grown older, one of the key factors in getting everyone inspired and motivated to move forward in the right direction as a team, is the need for a common mission, vision or goal. Once people focus on something, they all can relate to and think they are an important tool, and will begin working to get to that spot or accomplish that goal. All of the dissent or ill feelings disappear when you have the common bond of a higher purpose, and they all begin working together.

THE TEKE: Is there an example of teamwork at your current position?

Moy: Recently, at the Mint, we needed to refocus our efforts because we were getting lost managing so many products that veered off our mission. We went through a revisioning process, examining what we were and why we were here. We determined that we are the maker of the nation's coins and medals and that is who we are. So what are we supposed to do with that? We came up with "wanting to embody the American spirit in all of the coins and medals we create." What that means is that with every coin produced, we want them to say something great about America. Whether it was the workforce that made it, the quality of the coin, the design of the coin – all those things should say something great about the country, and we at the Mint are the ones who do that. What that has done is to bring two departments that are fighting amongst each other to the point where they are saying there is this new and noble goal we are shooting after. As a result, they are working closer as a team.

THE TEKE: Do you see any parallels from this example to your collegiate days?

Moy: Absolutely. That also happened in my chapter (Lambda, University of Wisconsin) when we re-chartered. We didn't want to simply survive, but rather thrive and succeed. That mission attracted many guys and at the end of my days, we had a 120-man chapter. There is something very special about rallying a team around a common goal and purpose. It is very exhilarating to see so many men on the same page, fighting for the same reason. It not only was a testament to our strong executive team, but also how strong our brotherhood was and later became.

THE TEKE: Recruitment is something we talk a lot about with our collegiate members and volunteers. How do you, as a leader of the Mint, find the right pieces to the puzzle?

Moy: What was key for us in recruitment at Lambda Chapter is right in line with hiring the team around me in the Mint. You need to take a look at what skill sets you need. Each member needs to honestly assess what strengths and weaknesses they possess. Each man needs to ask himself, "Am I brave enough to bring in someone who is really strong in those weak spots that will show me up, but together we will be a better leadership team?" Anyone can be an ego-maniac that bosses everyone around, but that does not help others grow. As a result, you need to be clear on what skill sets you are recruiting for and be ruthless to seeking those out.

THE TEKE: What kind of recruitment practices do you see in the professional world?

Moy: What a lot of people end up doing in the business world is recruiting friends because they trust them, but they might not have the right skill sets. And then you have a problem. Conversely, skills are very important, but once you narrow the field down, the next step is fit. What was important in our chapter was getting men who were honest, had integrity, had humility, but had a lot of raw leadership skills. In the corporate world, you can hire a well-skilled, experienced person; in fact, the person could be a complete jerk and get the job done well. What you find out is that a jerk causes a lot of tension in the workplace and that slows you down. It's really about finding the skills that you need, and once you narrow the field with those, finding the one that fits the office culture. Each chapter has to define their culture, and I think our Founders did a really good job defining our principles and values. We want men who are not embarrassed about that and actually embrace that. Once you get those people, along with whatever skills and experiences you are looking for, you can have a really strong chapter or work setting.





A debate in Congress has begun over the increasing cost of creating pennies and nickels. Each year, the U.S. Mint generates eight billion new pennies, using hi-tech presses that operate faster than the eye can see, stamping out Abraham Lincoln on blank pieces of metal. Despite inflation, eight billion pennies still add up to \$80 million. But to produce \$80 million in pennies, the government spends \$134 million; to produce 1.3 billion nickels, as the Mint did in 2007, costs \$124 million, even though the coins are worth only about half that amount.

Nickels are made mainly of copper; pennies are 98 percent zinc. On the frenzied commodity exchange, the price of copper has tripled in the last five years, while zinc has doubled. Both metals are in heavy demand, used in everything from electrical wiring to suntan lotion, so both coins are worth less than the metals they contain. A media frenzy has ensued and Congress has begun to debate potential solutions to this issue. One of the proposed solutions is to allow the Mint to decide metal combinations in order to keep cost down. Some members of Congress are worried about giving the executive branch more authority, while others believe since the Mint concentrates in this area, they are the best to make these decisions.

THE TEKE: The cost to produce the penny and nickel has been in the news. You have been interviewed by several media outlets and asked to address this issue. What's the story?

Moy: Certain metals have been in great demand as the economy has gotten really hot. Copper, zinc and nickel are three of those metals and both coins are made with those metal combinations. The prices have risen dramatically to the point that the penny now costs 1.7 cents to produce and 9.5 cents for the nickel. Why that's important to taxpayers is when the Federal Reserve orders coins from the Mint, they pay face value for them. So when they order dimes, quarters and dollars, we make money, but when they order pennies and nickels, we lose money. Last year, I lost more than 100 million dollars on those two coins. All the profit I make is returned to the taxpayers each year, but with this cost they are getting less money back to offset taxes. The issue is that by law the Constitution gives Congress authority to decide the metal content, but the Mint has processes in place to do that really well. We have asked Congress to change that law to allow the Mint to determine what the metal combinations are whenever we need to. In the past, metal prices were very stable for very long periods of time, so they could decide the penny should be made out of zinc with a copper coating and the prices would stay stagnate

for many years. Today, the prices vary so wildly within a day, we could make a penny for .9 cents and the next day 1.7 cents. In order to adjust for those fluctuations, we could react accordingly with an open bidding process to reduce the cost of our

THE TEKE: Is there any resolution in sight?

Moy: What we have seen is healthy debate on what the solution ought to be. There are members of Congress excited about our idea and others say that gives up too much legislative authority to the executive branch. What we have done is elevated the issue and spurred healthy debate in Congress, where it should happen, and we are supporting Congress in whatever solution they come up with.

THE TEKE: Knowing that you have a term limit on your position, what does the future hold for you?

Moy: I have a lot to do at the Mint and have a lot of goals to accomplish to help the taxpayers. I am fortunate that I have one of the few political appointments that come with a term, a five-year term, and I have three and a half years remaining. I have far too many things to do each day to worry about my next career move so far away.

THE TEKE: What are some of those exciting things you are working on at the Mint that Fraters may be interested in knowing about?

Moy: There are three key products that Americans are paying attention to. The first is the 50 State Quarter Program. It's the most popular coin program in the history of America –150 million people are collecting state quarters, which is almost half the population. This is the last year, so New Mexico, Arizona, Alaska, and Hawaii are left. Congress has passed a new law enabling the Mint to make quarters for each of our territories, including the District of Columbia, for the year 2009. The second interesting product will be for the penny. Congress has asked the Mint to create four new pennies in 2009 to commemorate the

bicentennial of Abraham Lincoln's birth, as well as the centennial of putting Lincoln on a coin. He was the first person to be put on a coin, in 1909, so we will put out one every three months depicting different parts of his life – his birth, his time as a young professional, running for Congress and then becoming president. The third is something Congress passed a year and a half ago, which was the Presidential \$1 Coin Act, trying to get more dollar coins in circulation. We just issued the James Monroe dollar coin and will have three more issued before the program is completed. We only projected 300 million of these coins, but the public demanded 850 million, so it looks like this dollar coin will get into circulation much quicker than any other dollar coin in history.

THE TEKE: One final question, why did you join this Fraternity? What attracted you to TKE?

Moy: When I was going through the recruitment process, I had not known what fraternities were when I went to the University of Wisconsin. A bunch of my friends were interested in rushing, so I decided to check them out as well. As we looked at the fraternity houses, what I saw at the time (in 1975) was when I went to the house I would be stopped at the door and told my friends could enter, but they didn't need any more people interested in the fraternity. "Just wait outside until your friends get out," they would say. "Soon I got the hint that I was not welcome based solely on how I looked. It wasn't until I went to TKE that the door was not only opened, but I was welcomed once inside. What I saw was a bunch of guys that were very much like me. They wanted to do some great things in the world, but didn't have backgrounds of great wealth or stature in the community. Regardless of their background, I saw a great group of guys that wanted to be there for a bigger reason than just party. That is what attracted me to TKE then and attracts me to it still today, enough to volunteer for the Grand Council. Even amidst a hectic schedule, I still want to find time and volunteer as much as I can to help the Fraternity that I love so much." W

record number of attendees carpooled or flew to the 2008 Regional Leadership Conferences. The RLCs, a staple leadership development program since the late 1970s, brought together collegiate and alumni Fraters to share, learn, and live the principles of Tau Kappa Epsilon.

This past February, nearly 700 Fraters participated in leadership training at four sites: St. Louis, Charlotte, Los Angeles and Philadelphia.

Building on momentum from the previous years, the 2008 Regional Leadership Conferences featured a number of enhancements. Each RLC opened with a Welcome Reception and Ritual Workshop on Friday, along with the execution of the Formal Ritual and, for alumni and graduating seniors, the Fraternity for Life Ritual.



Saturday morning presented a day filled with educational programming. Each attendee selected their own session, which varied at each site. Love, Charity and Esteem, principles in TKE, were the module themes, which were then broken down into chapter operations, leadership, organization, growth, and chapter

not covered. In short order, the chapter responded with clothes and toys. They also discussed possible involvement in some work crews put together with the church's men's group.


Mu-Sigma Chapter Morehead State University

Epsilon-Chi Chapter had an outstanding recruitment class, intitiating 18 members in the fall and following-up in the spring with nine new members in the candidate program. The Tekes hosted a blood drive, along with Kappa Delta Phi Sorority, for the American Red Cross.

The chapter also recently hosted and participated in a DUI speaker event presented by fellow Frater Mark Sterner. The Tau-Mu Chapter alumnus came to Buffalo University to educate attendees on the consequences of drinking and driving.



Rho-Omicron Chapter Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo

Rho-Omicron Frater Adrian Herrera has been recognized nationally for his proactive stance and efforts to halt hazing at his chapter and campus. The aerospace engineering senior was recently named one of the nation's anti-hazing heroes by hazingprevention.org.

After attending a workshop at the Western Regional Greek Leadership Conference (WRGLC) last spring, Herrera decided to report his own

fraternity; though hazing was considered common practice by most fraternities on their campus, he wanted to put a stop to it.

For more than a year, Herrera was concerned with his chapter's activities involving new members. After he attended an Undergraduate Interfraternity Institute Conference, he realized there was an anti-hazing policy within Tau Kappa Epsilon. This conference, along with the WRGLC, stirred a turn of events that the chapter was not anticipating. As a result, TKE and the university suspended the chapter from all new member activities and social events.

"The international headquarters was very supportive of my decision and proactive about the situation by interviewing every person," said Frater Adrian.

Stephan Lamb, Cal Poly adviser to the Interfraternity Council, is proud of Herrera and his actions. "Adrian is a man of conviction," he said of the current IFC president. "He emulates values of TKE and the whole Greek community on campus by standing up and taking an unpopular position. That speaks to strength and to the ideals of the organization."

With the no-hazing policy of TKE fully enforced, they recruited 18 new members this past fall. Frater Herrera now plays the role of IFC president in addition to being involved in the Cal Poly Democrats, the Associated Students, Inc. Lobby Corp., the Philanthropic Council, University Diversity Enrichment Council, Week of Welcome, and the Multi-Cultural Center.





Kappa-Tau Chapter University of Arizona

As part of Homecoming weekend, the Tekes held their first major charity fundraising event, the TKE Ride to Remember Classic Car Show, to benefit the Alzheimer's Association. The event took place November 4 on the University of Arizona Mall near McKale Center with free admission and musical entertainment provided throughout the afternoon. In addition to more than 30 classic cars, the show featured food and refreshments prepared by members of the chapter, and T-shirts and information about Alzheimer's disease and the work that is being done to fight it. The entry fee was \$50 per car and a number of prizes were awarded to car owners.



Beta-Chi Chapter Southern Illinois University

Weekend, the Carbondale Tekes appeared on

Fraters continued to assist the community by leading the biyearly SHAPe retreat (Spring Hill Awakening Program) and helping to run a blood drive. Outside of the Spring Hill community, Fraters participated in political campaigns, visited nursing homes, and helped build houses for Habitat for Humanity.

Nation commitment to effect positive growth and retention. "All Hands on Deck was more than a fancy name to a PR push for our organization – it became an attitude among the Grand Council, the profes-

sional staff, and our dedicated volunteers. All staff of TKE, paid or unpaid, began the year with an amazing push to not only visit our nearly 270 chapters, but build a relationship with

them and help them to be successful in their endeavors even after they had left. The most evident statistic of the success of those efforts was our highest recruitment marks

in over 10 years for the first quarter of the 2007-08 academic year. These visitations, coupled with the great PR pieces, have resulted in the highest numbers of RLC attendance, scholarship applicants, as well as Leadership Academy applications in TKE history."

"There were several groups across the West who received a visit from someone in our office to let them know that we

Fundraising for Philanthropy

Get Ready to Throw a Rocking Event

Raising money for philanthropy can be easy if you have some good ideas. The key to raising money is actually raising awareness, as it will result in more widespread involvement rather than a few concentrated donations. For example, it is better to receive \$1 from 100 people than it is to get \$100 from one person, because it means that vou have reached more people who are likely to continue to donate in the future. Here is one idea ripped straight from what some of our most successful chapters have done in both fundraising and raising awareness.



Battle of the Bands

There are undoubtedly some budding rock stars on your campus or in the community. Now you can give them the opportunity to showcase their talents for a good cause. Set up a battle of the bands by following these simple steps and throw a rocking event that will focus everyone's attention on your cause.

Pick a date, time, and location ...

Choose a date and time, and then start searching for the perfect location. Be sure to check your campus calendar before booking a venue to ensure the date doesn't coincide with another big event. The middle of campus, on a sports field, or inside an auditorium – are all good options, but check with the university administration to make sure of availability and cost. A school setting is ideal, because you can probably work with their band/orchestra/theater group to use their sound equipment (microphones, speakers, amps, etc.). Also, establish a name for the show and suggested donations or admission costs.

Technical Details

Once the date, time and venue are selected, start searching for a master of ceremonies (MC), musical talents, and volunteers who can help with refreshments. You may want to check out local delis, restaurants, or bakeries to see if they would consider donating some food for the event, because having great snacks always helps an event to succeed.

Talent Scouting

Finding talent should be relatively easy, but posting lots of signs around campus and the community as well as email related messaging will help get the word out. Hold auditions for spots if there are too many applications for admission, and have your fellow Fraters judge the best applicants. Also, you should find an MC for your show if you don't want to do it yourself. The person should be outgoing and as excited about the event as you are.

Sponsors and Donations

If time allows, consider approaching stores or

restaurants that have a vested interest in the campus or the philanthropy for sponsorships and donations to cover the cost of renting a venue, sound equipment, printing, contestant prizes, etc. Offer the businesses advertising on your event promotional material in exchange.

Promotion

Designate a Frater to be in charge of promotions. Design posters and flyers for distribution around the community, and contact the campus newspaper a couple of weeks in advance with event details. Give posters and flyers to the bands performing to pass out as well, since they will also no doubt want to see a big crowd. T-shirts worn by Fraters around campus prior to the event are also a great way to generate buzz about the event. Make sure that your cause is highlighted as the reason for the event.

Deciding on the Winners

Once you have your talent, form a panel of judges. Ask professors, sororities, or even another campus organization to make the important decision as to who gets crowned the winner. Make sure to have a diverse group of judges and to choose people who you can assure will be fair and unbiased (no playing favorites). You may also want to let the crowd have some say in the winner ... perhaps having an additional judge being the collective vote of the crowd or by naming two winners: a judge's choice and a crowd favorite. You should also buy (or have donated) a prize for all participants, such as restaurant gift certificates or movie tickets, and trophies or a grand prize for the top act.

It's Showtime!

Have Fraters help you to set up the space for the show, microphones, speaker systems, and organizing goodies. Have someone man the door to collect donations or admission money (whichever you decide to do), and maybe also have your friends act as ushers. Make sure to have your schedule of musical acts down (maybe have a dress rehearsal the day before just to be safe) and then enjoy the show.



LLT Spotlight: FRATER LES HUDSON

What inspires you?



What does the future hold?



Greek Life Administrator of the Quarter:

ast year, Tau Kappa Epsilon began reaching out to volunteers and collegiate members to find the best Greek Life Administrators in the TKE Nation. Advising Greek Life can be one of the most thankless jobs on a university or college campus. However, some members of this select group go above and beyond the call of duty, working with both TKE and the other Greek organizations. On the campus of Oklahoma State University, this dedicated individual is Ival Gregory, manager of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs.

Gregory, who began at OSU eight years ago, has been selected for this honor because of his efforts to restart the IFC Judicial Board. It had fallen into ill repute and was being bypassed by university administrators because it had not been performing as it should. One of his primary goals was that not just IFC, but all Greek-letter organizations on campus were self-governing and as autonomous as possible. In pursuit of that goal, he gained the support of various campus administrators who agreed to let the IFC J-Board hear cases of policy violations again. It has become an all-business jury of peers that hold chapters accountable to a standard only dreamt of on some campuses. The IFC Judicial Board is empowered to hear all cases of policy violations (except for hazing), both university and IFC, at OSU.

Gregory loves his job and all of the students he advises. "I know it



is trite, but our students are our future," said Ival. "It amazes me how these students can be so over programmed that the only time some campus leaders can all get together is 10:30 p.m. on Sunday and they still excel in every arena."

Gregory said that no other collection of people even claim to seek the values that are the foundation for the Greek-letter organizations on our college campuses today and that tomorrow's leaders are wearing Greek letters today, just as today's leaders wore Greek letters during their college days.

"Greek life can be both an asset and an obstacle on campuses," said Gregory. "When the host institution, the local alumni, the headquarters staff, and the collegiate members are supportive of each other and strive for success of the student, great things can happen. When any of these pieces is missing, it can be the recipe for disaster, literally."

Tau Kappa Epsilon extends a heartfelt thank you to Ival Gregory and to all Greek Life Administrators who work hard to make their Greek community strong.

rater Rodman Smith (Zeta-Tau, Shippensburg University), the Volunteer of the Month for April, has been selected for his work with a new colony at Penn State University-Harrisburg and his countless hours working to revitalize chapters in the Dutch Province. In addition, he has been instrumental at Province Education Conferences and at Conclave, helping with the food service for Kids Day. The lifelong relationships he says he has made

Crediting leadership and patience, Frater Rodman was selected for this distinction because he has worked tirelessly with groups in the Dutch Province. Understanding that change does not happen overnight, he has been there for his groups, seeing them through both trials and growth.

rater Herb Huser (Founders Society), Grand Province Advisor (Beta-Gamma, Oklahoma State University), said Frater Sebastian Volcker (Fraters Society) has done more than any single person to keep Rho-Kappa on the rolls as an active

chapter. "He has advised, cajoled, and cheered the chapter on in good times and bad. Recently, he raised funds through the Rho-Kappa Alumni Association to bring Frater Buckwheat to Longwood University and Rho-Kappa Chapter to lend impetus to recruitment. He also recruited a Campus Advisor for the chapter, has attended numerous Province Planning Meetings, Province Education Conferences, and Regional Leadership Conferences. I value him as a Province

Upon joining Rho-Kappa as a colony in 1986, Frater Sebastian was infused with a passion he hadn't felt before. "When a TKE colony was started at Longwood College (now University, in Farmville, Virginia) in 1986, I had the good fortune of being swept up by what would become a major component of my life," said Frater Sebastian. "We were all leaders back then and it was an explosive, yet dynamic, force which ran the campus for my college years."

Frater Sebastian credits his college fraternity experience with teaching him many lessons, but none more important than the value of democracy. He said during the 'marathon meetings' the chapter would debate on both trivial and vital issues they were facing. No matter the decision, he said, the chapter would always come together as one collective force.

"I think we all knew that we had something special as we formed an alumni association as soon as enough of us graduated," said Frater Sebastian. "My volunteering for TKE is but a normal consequence of my passion for those sometimes infuriating brothers I call my friends."

He has held many offices in the alumni association and since 2002 has served as president. It is his mission to maintain contact with as many Fraters as possible in the state of Virginia. They currently hold two annual events – the Summer Teke Fling and a Toys for Tots party. Grand Province Advisor Huser asked Frater Sebastian to become a Province Advisor for Virginia, a position he has held since 2003.

Frater Sebastian is the innkeeper of Clover Forest Plantation and also splits his volunteer time with organizations such as The Richmond Bridal Association, the Chamber of Commerce, serves as editor of the Goochland County Historical Society magazine, and is an election officer.

olunteering for Tau Kappa Epsilon is a selfless act of giving time, energy and talents. Like many volunteers, Frater James Upton (Iota-Omega, Glenville State College in Glenville, West Virginia) said TKE has been such a big part of his life, he felt the desire to give back in any way that he could. He was a crucial part of the West Virginia Province Education Conference held at the Stonewall Jackson Resort and has been a great asset to the rebuilding of Region 3, specifically in West Virginia. His passion and action have led him to volunteer as Province Advisor and subsequently to be chosen as Volunteer of the Month for June.

Frater James learned about TKE from his father and has met many other Fraters in the military, each having an integral part of his



formation as a man. "I just hope and pray that I have the chance to make a similar impact on a young man's life," said Frater James. "I am commonly asked what I get from all of the work I do. I respond that the continued friendships I develop as a volunteer and the self-gratification that I stand for something besides money and power is all I need."

In his opinion, volunteering is one of the most important attributes that TKE has to offer young men. He believes that when undergrads see businessmen, professionals

or other Fraters giving back to the Fraternity, it sinks in. He is commonly asked if he gets paid for the work he does, but when collegiate Fraters hear that he does this because he loves the Fraternity, the members pay closer attention to what he says. He said they begin to understand that there is more to the Fraternity than social activities.

"The skill I have noticed that is most important to the volunteer is, first and foremost, patience," said Frater James. "You are not going to accomplish anything overnight. Everything takes time and effort which will get recognized the longer you interact with them. Some other key skills are innovative thinking and humility. You have to be creative looking at things from another angle and realize you will never have all the answers – that is what the other talented volunteers are for."

Frater James said his favorite moment as a TKE volunteer is each and every day he gets to volunteer. Long car rides with recruitment legend Frater Dennis 'Buckwheat' Perry (Alpha-Nu, University of New Hampshire) are a close second. Listening to Frater Buckwheat reflect on his life and allowing him to mentor him is an honor, Frater James said.

Frater James is a proud member of the U.S. Army Reserve and regularly volunteers for funeral detail for veterans. In addition, he participates in the local Make-A-Wish Foundation chapter and helps the Republican Party in West Virginia. Ψ

He retired from teaching in August 1995 and divided his retirement residence between his homes in Cookeville, TN, and Mayfield, KY. He co-authored over one thousand pages of genealogical research and worked on an autobiography nearly as long. One part of the autobiography covering the years of 1959-1964 has been used by Beta-Pi as a part of its chapter history, and the following section is currently used by Mu-Omicron in its recruitment training program as a history of the Tennesseee Tech fraternity system. Bill also authored a local initiation ritual honoring the founders of Alpha Nu Delta, based on the principle that the history of the local chapter is at least as important to it as the history of Tau Kappa Epsilon. Mu-Omicron moved into a new half million dollar addition to its house, financed in part (60 percent) by Frater Jones, in recognition for which he was voted Honorary Scroll Number Mu Omicron Zero.

Illinois Wesleyan University (Alpha)

Frank L. Livingston, '48 (Opportunity Out of Defeat Club), entered the Chapter Eternal

December 3, 1997. He owned and operated a lumberyard and hardware store in Chatsworth, Ill. According to his son, Richard B.

Livingston, his father had met at least one of the TKE Founders and attended his initiation into Gamma-Psi (Butler University) in February 1977, one of his best memories. He was preceded in death by his uncle, W. Dean McCully (Alpha).

Iowa State University (Epsilon) James A. McIlrath '39, entered the Chapter Eternal July 27, 2007. He was founder and chairman of Dry Storage Corporation, now DSC Logistics, an integrated logistics and supply chain management company, headquartered in Des Plaines, Ill. He received his bachelor of science degree in chemical engineering from ISU and began his career in logistics in Army Corps of Engineers, working in France to help rebuild transportation and water systems at the close of WWII.

Millikin University (Beta) Harry Frederick Sockler '27, the longtime coach of the Western Illinois University Lab School (1950-1968), entered the Chapter Eternal January 15, 2008, at the age of 99. His last visit to WIU was in May 2007, not long after he committed to a planned gift valued at \$387,500 to fund athletic scholarships at Western.

Sockler, who earned his master's degree at Western Illinois in 1951, coached the WIU Lab School football team for an unprecedented 114-12 record, a 90.5 winning percentage, during his 18 seasons.

In 1976, Sockler was inducted into WIU's Athletic Hall of Fame. His plaque reads that he "is unparalleled in Illinois high school coaching; his records are unsurpassed. He has set goals others may attempt to reach, but are unlikely to attain."

Tri State University (Beta-Epsilon) **Victor E. Brown, Jr.** '47, entered the Chapter Eternal September 5, 2007.

He received a bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering in 1948 from Tri-State and did graduate work at the University of Michigan and Hillsdale College.

He was responsible for setting up surplus World War II machinery donated by the government to college laboratories for use in aero and mechanical engineering student requirements. He was engaged as an instructor in those laboratories as well as an assistant for several professors in writing textbooks and papers.

He was very active in civic affairs and was elected to the Town Council of Litchfield, Mich., for four terms, serving as mayor pro tem during his last term in office. He retired from Stencel Aero Engineering Co. in 1985.

University of Nevada-Reno (Pi-Iota) Derek Jensen '02, entered the Chapter Eternal October 28, 2007. He was the victim of a triple homicide at a Halloween party in Reno. A past Prytanis, Derek was scheduled to graduate in December and wanted to be a physical therapist. He was known for his charity work for blood donation, breast cancer, Alzheimer's disease, and helping adults with Down syndrome. Over 500 people attended a candlelight vigil organized by TKE members. "He was a gentle giant," said Chris Driscoll, Epiprytanis. "D.J. was a very tall, hefty guy, but he never abused his size. He was always so respectful of others, and he exemplified everything our Fraternity stood for: love, charity and esteem. W



nnually the TKE Educational Foundation provides a number of Named Scholarship Awards for members of Tau Kappa Epsilon. These awards are designed to encourage academic excellence, foster leadership skills and enhance the personal development of deserving students in pursuit of their college degrees. Each scholarship fund has specific criteria in regards to academic achievement, and requires applicants to be involved in leadership roles within their chapters and their college communities.

Named Scholarship Funds are established by alumni or friends of TKE. An initial fund corpus of \$5,000 is required to establish a permanent fund before any awards may be granted. The average corpus of new funds usually amounts to \$10,000 or more in order to generate more meaningful annual awards, which are based upon earnings on the fund. Cash Gifts

The most common method of giving to the Foundation, cash gifts of any size are welcomed any time and may be in response to the Foundation's annual fund drive or to support a specific Foundation program. Prior to making any such gift, the securities should have been held for at least one year. Broker to broker transfers are possible.



raternity men, and more importantly Tekes, are sometimes accused of thinking only of themselves. However, for every chapter that acts in a dubious manner, there are countless others working to disprove this false accusation by looking after their fellow Fraters, offering good programs and leadership opportunities, and making donations that improve their community.

Such a donation was recently received at the Offices of the Grand Chapter. The men of Theta-Eta Chapter (University of South Dakota) sent a group of checks for \$18.99, representing the year TKE was founded. It's not the amount of the gift or the number of checks, but rather the intent of the gift. These men want to see change among our Fraters, and they want to inspire others to give to the organization that is continually working to produce tomorrow's leaders. They have asked for the donations to be placed in the Annual Fund.

Putting into action an idea developed while attending the American Leadership Academy in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, in January, these 19 Fraters put their money on the line in order to generate a buzz across the TKE Nation. They believe it is important to show all of TKE's alumni that the collegiate members are committed to giving back, even though they already have daunting financial obligations.

"Just think if all of our chapters had at least 15

men donate \$18.99, it would equal almost \$77,000," said Frater Chad Carman, Prytanis. "We feel that if alumni found out that collegiate members sacrificed like this, they wouldn't hesitate to give something to the TKE Educational Foundation for the future health of TKE."

The collegiate members of this chapter are like most others in the TKE Nation, working and attending school full-time, constantly struggling to make ends meet. This seemingly small amount of money is a huge gesture of goodwill. Imagine a Regional Leadership Conference or Conclave where thousands of collegiate members could attend free of charge and what kind of impact that would have on the future leaders and volunteers.

What kind of world would we live in today if Frater Ronald Reagan wasn't given assistance by Tekes so he could attend college? The Fraters at Theta-Eta Chapter, almost 80 years removed from that act of generosity and faith, sent in \$360 in order to start a new trend of giving among Fraters. Citing TKE Membership Standards: "... not for wealth, rank, or honor, but personal worth and character," the Theta-Eta members are asking for alumni to help keep this the customary recruitment criteria. They are invested in this awesome organization and are asking you to help keep costs to collegiate members down by donating a small amount in honor of their sacrifice. They have stepped up to this challenge ... will you?

Shaping Destiny to Target the Future TKE commits resources to expansion

au Kappa Epsilon is always interested in expanding to colleges and universities by starting new chapters. In fact, we have two full-time paid Expansion Consultants who work on-site for six to eight weeks building an interest group from the ground up, helping it become a colony. When it becomes a colony, our Colony Coordinator and Regional Directors help it become a chapter.

Sometimes a group of interested students will contact us, sometimes it's a group of alumni, sometimes we select the campus, and other times the university contacts us. Regardless of how we get involved, we start off with an initial assessment of students, alumni, and the campus. From there, we determine the resources available for the expansion project.

Only a few sites are selected each year for the Expansion Consultants, but we have plenty of other interest groups working to become colonies with assistance from our Professional Staff and volunteers. In 2002, Tau Kappa Epsilon unveiled its enhanced expansion program, designed to recruit and educate only the highest quality men on campus, through a cooperative effort with the host institution, local community, and alumni. The direct and intended purpose of this program is to build a fraternity chapter that consistently ranks in the top 20 percent of all fraternities on campus in the categories of recruitment, academics, service, campus involvement, and alumni relations. Though the destiny of any chapter on any campus ultimately depends on the attitudes, standards, and values of the initial core group, Tau Kappa Epsilon pledges and commits the human and financial resources necessary to develop a successful chapter through our expansion program. The Vice President of Fraternal Services works with Expansion Consultants and university officials, seeing that they have all the tools necessary to be successful, while the Expansion Consultants are the field staff charged with finding, recruiting, and educating high caliber undergraduates and training the alumni advisors.

Tau Kappa Epsilon makes a determination on a targeted expansion site based on alumni support and the targeted institution's reputation and receptivity. TKE's prerequisites for an expansion include a supportive university/college administration, a supportive IFC and a strong and willing alumni base. Once a mutual agreement is made by TKE and the university/college, the Vice President of Fraternal Services will formally request a time when expansion is feasible for both TKE and the university/college. A vital part of the Tau Kappa Epsilon Expansion Program is the concerted effort to work with the university/college administration and local IFC in the organization of a colony.

The Expansion Consultants will be on campus a minimum of four weeks to conduct the colonization. Their time is spent attaining the following five goals:

- Developing a positive working rapport with the host institution and the local community.
- Developing a positive relationship with the campus and Greek communities.
- Recruiting and training alumni to ensure effective advisement and support.
- Recruiting the highest quality men on campus.
- Educating the membership on the ideals and operations of a fraternity.
