## THE POSTAL SERVICE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF BOYACA by $\operatorname{Jim}$ Cross

Thle articie contains more mystery than history. As I have written previoully, there are no references in the literature to the stamps or postal service of the Dapartment of Boyaca. In the Mey 158\% CUPACARTA, I suggested that the national government probebly suspended postal service on the Northwest Route to Venezusla which passed thru Boyaca soon atter the outbreak of "The 1800 Days" in October 1899. It is known that Oucuta and the surrounding area ware in the hands of the rebels from that month until June 1980. Since an alternate route to cucuts existed via the Northesat Route to Pucaramenga and Pamplona, it is possible that service on the Northem Route was not resumed even when Cucuta was retaken in June 1900.

The first isgue of Boyace was chronicled in the Amarican Journal of Philately in June 1902, although it was probably igeued aarlier. Since it consisted of only a 5 centavoe stamp, it wes protably issued prior to 1 March 1902 when the national government ralsed the rate for internal letters to 18 centavos. Most of the departments seem to have tollowed the rate wchachles of the national government. The Temprano catalon lists the date of the first 15sue as 1899, but this may be too early. The 10, 28, and 50 cantevole and 1 peso stamp of the second issue of Boyara were reported in the July 1903 isu* of the Amarican Journal of Philately. A postal card in my pomeenaion from Antonio Rincon addressed to the New York Philatelian and dated July 1903 announced: "the government of the Department of Boyaca is planning to put into circulation stamps in the denominations of 5 and 10 pesos in quantitiee prom 26,000-36,000." Possibly thetwe stamps wers issued to support a rewintion of parcel post service. Untortunately the Rincon postal card does not ghow a dated cancel. Recalpt of these two high values was announced in the American Journal of Philately for Septenter 1923.

I previously reported that I knew of no covers from Boyaca. Brian Moorthouse has sent me a photocooy of a letter from Cocyly to Bogota, shown below, tranked with a perforated copy of the 5 pesos stamp. The cancelation of the Agencia Gutierrez, Coouy also appears at the lower laft without a date. Since this appears to be inflation franking, the cover probably was matled in 1904. This marking is also tound on used single stamps and is the only
