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



### Minnesota residents by race in 1860




### MN today by race/ethnicity (Hispanics removed from all other race groups)

### Understanding diverse groups

- Race and Hispanic origin are available on the latest (2010) decennial census for all geographies
- Race and Hispanic origin are also available in the U.S. Census Bureau's annual Population Estimates (done in between the years ending in -0) for counties and higher geographies
  - 2014 data released in June 2015. See News>SDC in the News
- Finally, the ongoing American Community Survey
   (ACS) also has race/ethnicity (for all geographies),
   PLUS nativity/birthplace, ancestry, language, years in the U.S., mobility (residence abroad one year ago)
  - ACS data are better for some groups than others...



## Race and ethnicity (according to the Census Bureau)

- On the ACS or decennial census, respondents are first asked if they are of "Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish" origin. This is <u>ethnicity</u>, and entirely independent of <u>race</u>.
- Then respondents can select <u>one race</u>, or <u>as many races</u> as they want. (This was new beginning in the 2000 decennial census. For 1990 and earlier years, you had to pick 1 race only.)
  - Persons picking only 1 race show up in "XX race alone" tables
  - Persons picking 2+ races show up in "XX race alone or in combination" tables
- In addition, you can select "Some other race" if you don't like any of the available check-boxes.

### Somalí

(For example: Italian, Jamaican, African Am., Cambodian, Cape Verdean, Norwegian, Dominican, French Canadian, Haitian, Korean, Lebanese, Polish, Nigerian, Mexican, Taiwanese, Ukrainian, and so on.)

About 9 percent of respondents don't answer this question



### Birthplace

- Works well for Somali foreign-born community
- More challenging for Hmong foreign-born because some were born in Laos, while many younger Hmong born in Thai refugee camps
- Plus, nearly 40% Hmong living in MN today were born in MN











unevenly


Persons of Color By county, 2013


### Populations of Color in MN reached 1 million in 2014

#### **Populations of Color, MN**





### Foreign-born populations growing since the 1990s







### Foreign born in Minnesota (Largest groups in 1900 and 2010)





### MN foreign-born populations: Largest groups by country of birth, 2013






## Percent of MN young people who are "children of immigrants"

"Children of immigrants" are foreign-born themselves, or have one or two foreign-born parents




## Largest <u>ancestry groups</u> reported by Hispanic Minnesotans, 2008-2012





## Which MN kids are leaving high school in 4 years with a diploma? (2013 data)


- 79% of all high school students (2009: 74%) + 5 pts
- 49% of American Indian students (2009: 41%) + 8 pts
- 78% of Asian students (2009: 68%) + 10 pts
- 58% of Hispanic students (2009: 43%) + 15 pts
- 57% of Black students (2009: 43%) + 14 pts

Two fastest growing demographic groups in MN

- 85% of White students (2009: 82%) + 3 pts
- 77% of boys (2009: 72%) + 5 pts
- 82% of girls (2009: 77%) +5 pts
