

PEI Liberals remain the preferred party despite declining support over the past three months

- PEI Liberals continue to be the preferred party, although support has declined since last quarter
- Green Party support has increased, as has preference for its leader
- Satisfaction with the performance of the PEI provincial government remains stable this quarter
- Premier Wade MacLauchlan remains the preferred party leader but by a smaller margin than last quarter

HALIFAX, NS December 6, 2016: The Prince Edward Island (PEI) Liberals continue to enjoy a lead over other provincial parties, although preference for the party has decreased significantly this quarter, according to the most recent survey conducted by **Corporate Research Associates Inc**. Specifically, just under one-half of decided voters support the PEI Liberal Party this quarter (46%, down from 64% in August 2016). Backing for the Progressive Conservative Party stands at 25 percent (compared with 19%), while support for the Green Party has increased significantly (22%, up from 9% in August 2016). Meanwhile, fewer than one in ten support the New Democratic Party (7%, compared with 8%).

One in six Islanders are undecided (15%, unchanged), while four percent refuse to state a preference (compared with 7%), and four percent either support none of the parties or do not plan to vote (compared with 6%).

With regards to government satisfaction, six in ten PEI residents are satisfied (60%, compared with 65% three months ago). Meanwhile, one-third of residents are dissatisfied (35%, compared with 29%), and the number of residents who do not offer a definite opinion stands at five percent (unchanged).

In terms of leader preference, just under four in ten PEI residents express their support for Premier Wade MacLauchlan this quarter (37%, down from 46% in August 2016). Meanwhile, preference for interim leader Jamie Fox of the PC Party is stable (13%, compared to 11%), support for Peter Bevan-Baker of the Green Party has increased (31%, up from 22%), and five percent back Mike Redmond of the NDP (unchanged). Finally, four percent prefer none of these leaders (unchanged), and one in ten residents are undecided or do not offer an opinion (9%, compared with 12%).

These results are part of the **CRA** *Atlantic Quarterly*[®], an independent telephone survey of Atlantic Canadians, and are based on a sample of 300 adult Prince Edward Islanders, conducted November 7 to November 29, 2016 with overall results accurate to within ± 5.6 percentage points, 95 out of 100 times.
