

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The 130 North 8th structure is a two story commercial building in the downtown business district of Quincy, Illinois. The second floor is unfinished and unoccupied. Architect Ernest M. Wood blended the use of elongated straw colored brick and stone while combining styling of Queen Anne, Eastlake and Tudor in this 83 year old photographic studio. The original structure had a shingle roof and a bay window at the north side (rear) of the building. Except for these changes and the added storm door and storm glass protection at the entry area at unknown times, the building remains unchanged since it was erected in 1900. The sweeping movement of the roof which extends over an entry area, the sharply pitched roof and Tudor styling at the second floor level lends an English touch to the studio. The second floor level, if finished, would provide a light, bright artist studio with light from the north, west and south windows.

The interior of the building was remodled for a physician's office during the 1944-46 period. Panelling was placed over the heavy butternut woodwork and hides the beauty and craftsmanship for which Architect Wood was noted. The several offices/examining rooms provided by the physician have not been changed since these offices provide excellent offices, computer room, file room and receptionist area for the four accountants who now occupy and lease the building.

The building represents the traditional Ernest Wood work prior to the Prairie style influence of his studio erected in 1912 and which is located immediately south of the 130 North 8th Street building. It is a miniature commercial version of the Otho Poling house, which reflects Silsbee influence, and which is shown on Page 8 - The Prairie School Review - Volume XI No. 2 Second Quarter, 1974 and which was built in 1897 ---- three years before the 130 North 8th Building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Well-known, western Illinois architect, Ernest M. Wood (6/27/1863 - 3/7/1956) designed and supervised the building at 130 No. 8th St. in 1900. It was built twelve years before the prairie style building Wood designed and occupied as his office and studio in 1912 and which is listed on the National Register. The two buildings, side-by-side, reflect the dramatic influence Frank Lloyd Wright's work had on Architect Wood. Wood's career commenced under Architect Harvey Chatten in 1886-87 with whom he remained until 1890-91. While together, Chatten and Wood constructed two Romanesque Revival residences, the Richard F. Newcomb house and the Theodore Poling house during 1890-91.

The 130 North 8th Building is symbolic of the traditional architectural work of Wood. This structure, located immediately next door to the dramatically modern style of it's day, and influenced by Wright's pioneer work, deserves to be preserved as a testament to the achievements of an important regional architect.

The 130 North 8th building was first occupied by H. Milton Waide, Photographer according to the 1900-Ol Quincy City Directory. By 1912, it was occupied by Lieberherr Photographers and later by Biersell Photographers. During the 1930's the building was used as an office by a chiropracter and from 1944 to 1981 served as offices for Dr. A. W. Rokita, M.D.

The land for the building was acquired by Dr. E. B. Montgomery in 1890. Montgomery graduated from Jefferson Medical College in 1858. He commenced medical practice in Quincy in 1879. He was a cousin of Architect, Ernest M. Wood. Dr. Montgomery's offices were in the building immediately north of the 130 North 5th building and he commissioned his cousin Wood to build the 130 No. 8th office in 1900. Dr. Montgomery practiced medicine for a longer period than any other Illinois physician and was an active member of the county medical society for 71 years.
