Smithsonian Accepts Yankee Air Museum as an Affiliate

A familiar force is lifting the Yankee Air Museum's (YAM) ascent as a museum whose quality meets the highest standards. The YAM is now an affiliate of the Smithsonian Institution (the "Smithsonian"). As a Smithsonian Affiliate, YAM is better positioned to advance its mission and public education purposes through opportunities for sharing exhibitions, enhanced programming and professional development expertise.

"This is an accomplishment of major significance," exclaimed **Ray Hunter, Chairman of the YAM Board of Directors**. "One of the components of our mission is to tell the story of the huge Willow Run bomber plant and how this area became an arsenal of democracy. This is where major corporations and civilian men and women worked to defend freedom during World War II." Hunter explained that while the public has already seen results of much labor with the opening of new buildings in the past year, the YAM has also focused efforts on strengthening its management and organizational structure.

"I am very enthused by what the Smithsonian Affiliation means in terms of staff development," said **Randy Hotton, Executive Director of the YAM**. "There are strict guidelines to which the YAM must adhere to maintain this status. Our staff will continue to grow as consummate museum professionals under this relationship."

"For many of us who have been with Yankee since the early years, this is truly a watershed moment," said **Bob Hynes, Life Member and Chairman of the YAM Public Relations Committee**. "We won't be looking back, only forward as this recognition and affiliation lays an entirely new foundation upon which the YAM will continue to build," he concluded.

The Smithsonian Affiliations agreement became effective on July 30, 2011 and is renewable annually.

Stinson Returns to Willow Run

In late August, Tom Collard and Ray Hunter drove to the Grosse Ile airport. They pushed the Stinson out of the hangar where it had been since October, 2009, added a couple of gallons of oil and some fuel. After a good pre-flight and run-up, Ray flew the Stinson back to Willow Run while Tom drove back in Ray's vehicle. Lou Farkas arranged for a few sections of airport fence to be taken down and the AC was towed to the Yankee Collections and Exhibits building. The fuel and the oil tanks were drained and the yellow bird was given a quick wash. It is now on display in the high bay. As most of you know, the 1943 Stinson Gull Wing V-77 airplane was built in Wayne, Michigan and will prove to be a great exhibit with plenty of local interest.

The YAF is organized exclusively to obtain, restore, preserve and operate historic and vintage aircraft, related components for historical research and public educational purposes, and to establish a museum to facilitate the public display and exhibition of such items.

Executive Director Report

The fall has settled upon us and we celebrate the anniversary of our first year in our new building and our 30th Anniversary. The Yankee Dispatch Riders hosted the 6th Annual Detroit Tigers Bike Night, held on 9/22 at Comerica Park. We threw out the first pitch and had an honor guard to represent the Museum. Did you see us on TV?

Much like our fantastic Detroit Tigers, back in May a lot of people said they did not have it. Guess what, they surprised a lot of people. The Yankee Air Museum has come through a year much like that. We faced an uncertain future following our move in a year ago. We have come

a long way since then, the growth in our visitor ship and retail sales are indicative of our progress. We have become a place known to more and more people outside of our Yankee membership. The Headquarters Building has put us on the map. We have enhanced our visitor's experience through the efforts of our tireless volunteers.

In honor of our 30th Anniversary, The Annual 'YANKEE GALA' will be held on November 12th, 2011 here at the Museum. The keynote speakers and special guests of honor are a high-ranking official of the FAA, yet to be confirmed and the new Wayne County Airport Authority CEO Turkia Awada Mullin, who oversees the operations at Detroit Metro and Willow Run Airports. Awada-Mullin is also a decorated, eight-year Veteran of the U.S. Army where she received the Army Commendation Medal and the Army Achievement Medal. Moving forward, the event will be known as 'The Yankee Gala: A Celebration of American Aviation' and promises to be the 'must attend' aviation event of the year. The Annual Yankee Gala is our chance to shine to the public and demonstrate our relevance in the region as we work to keep the legacy of Willow Run alive for future generations. We continue to move toward fulfillment of our 2011 goals set at our January off-site meeting.

Top four 2011 Goals

1. **Enhance the visitor Experience** with major improvement No Later Than (NLT) Dec 31st, one per quarter.

Franklin Glider is still on our list of exhibits coming, but is being delayed in its arrival. It was built in Ypsilanti, Mi. during the 1930's

A new Exhibit of US military combat meals has been put together by our collections' team. You get to see Iron Rats (WWI), K-Rats (WWII), C-Rats (Vietnam) and MRE (Gulf) meals.

We now have life like figures to further enhance our Link Trainer Exhibit. We have one standing next to the Tuskegee Airman Exhibit and it looks like Col Jefferson. Plus we have a WWII USMC Exhibit, showing a Marine in both Combat and Dress uniforms.

2. **Hire a Development Director** NLT April 30th, this goal has been achieved and Velda is bringing a wealth of museum experience to our organization.

We have finished defining our three year goals and first year objectives to match our Museum Mission and Vision statements.

These will be used to guide us in setting our 2012 action plan at our January Off-Site meeting.

The last part of our strategy planning is for the Board of Director's to address Governance. The board has scheduled a training meeting in October with Diana Kern, our Non-Profit consultant. When this training is complete we will have completed our initial strategy development process.

3. **Further develop Web Site** to pursue E Commerce

Our "Donor Perfect" software has been put to work with the integration of the membership and B-17 rider data bases.

This will allow a systematic search process for potential donors.

We are now using "facebook" to promote our B-17 rides and the initial feedback has been good.

4. **As a Smithsonian Institute Affiliate Museum**, we have reciprocal benefits with the Smithsonian for Yankee Air Museum members. These will be covered in a future issue of Hangar Happenings.

Again, it is my pleasure to serve the Yankee as your Director of Development. A lot has been accomplished thus far and there's much more to go to establish a dept. from scratch and achieve our desired results. To do so, the following critical issues are being addressed to better our chances to secure funding:

1. Development of a Museum-Strategic Plan

The Strategy team has identified five Critical Areas for immediate improvement. 3-year goals, annual strategies, action plans, and accountabilities will result. A critical area identified is fundraising. The plan includes the establishment of formal strategies for all current and potential sources of revenue, strengthening our current operations to better position us for growth, and allow us to stand alone as an effective, efficient organization independent from outside influence and without reliance on just one or two sources of revenue.

2. Establishment of a comprehensive database

We have manually entering and reviewing seven years history of support to the Yankee Air Museum. Completed and in

time to conduct our first mailings, test mailings to donors with highest giving potential & identify major gift prospects.

3. Developing and implementing an effective Annual Fund program and the various types of campaigns and solicitations that will contribute toward the Annual Operating Fund. Campaigns will be segmented and customized. Giving Societies and recognition levels are being established, and an attractive memorial/honorarium program will be marketed. Donations via website are forthcoming.

4. Establish Relationships and maintain a major gifts portfolio, including a cultivation, stewardship program. At least 30 major gifts prospects that have been identified and relationships are under development.

5. Strengthen Corporate and Foundation relationships. This is where a bulk of our funding will result, citing my strong success in securing new dollars from corporations and foundations. I hosted Raytheon, Boeing, and 5/3rd bank at Thunder and beneficial partnerships will result from these opportunities.

These orientations are intended to acquaint you with our Museum, let you meet with some of our Department Managers and to give you the opportunity to volunteer at our museum.

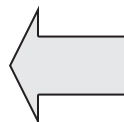

Thanks go to **John Romanski** and **Jim Hart** for organizing a great **Volunteer Orientation Program** (VOP?) that is informative and very helpful for interested volunteers.

GENERAL NEWS

Exciting news! On Thursday, July 21, we received a trailer load of parts for our PB4Y-2 Privateer located in the Air Park. The key prize was the waist turret for the starboard (i.e., right) side of the aircraft. We had been looking for this for many years. We had an extra port (left) side shell, but the two are not interchangeable, but the interior components are. This piece is in very good condition. We now have all the required turrets for our US Navy version of the B-24 bomber. It is all coming together!

Included with this shipment was a *complete, unused still in its crate Ranger V-770-11 inverted v-12 in-line engine*. Ranger was the engine division of Fairchild Aircraft, and this engine was used for their twin engine advanced trainer the AT-21 Gunner. Fairchild built 175 of this aircraft. This engine will be prepared for exhibit in our engine collection.

We will soon be getting a Franklin PS-2 single seat glider that will be on permanent loan to the museum. This aircraft will require minimal restoration work. This 36 foot wingspan bird will be exhibited above the floor in the large bay area. The PS-2 is of special interest to us as it was manufactured in Ypsilanti; the factory building is still there.

DC6B

Bob DuBert and **Mal Stockinger** have been very busy repairing corrosion damage in the window area of the aircraft fuselage. They have made great strides in making this ship look so much better. On the inside, **Hank Grudzien, Roger Peterson** and **Charlie Ward** have been re-installing the wall panels which were removed to inspect for corrosion of the interior. Some 2,000 stainless steel screws and washers were purchased to replace corroded ones. More will be needed to complete the job, but these should keep the fellows busy for a while, unless they get "too screwy".

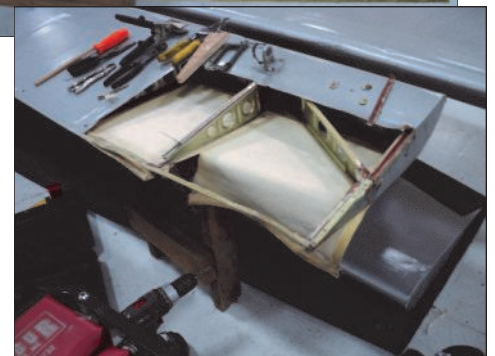
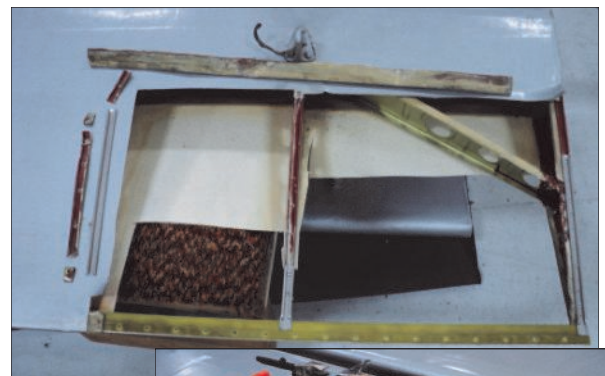

He has extensive aviation related experience, and has been an immense help in working on our center piece (that is, the Ford Built mid-section of the aircraft). **Phil Howard, Ron Huber** and **Bob Pilz** each used their talents in fabricating the wheeled legs that will be used for this section in order for it to be moved about the museum floor as necessary. Stop by and we'll show and tell you all about this, and to see what great craftsmen we have!

Antonov AN-2

Crew chief **Ralph Koehler** has pretty much settled on the paint scheme he will use for this huge Russian biplane that is located in the air park. We are expecting to paint the fuselage soon, so that progress on this aircraft will be seen by visitors. The wings and their control surfaces are being repaired inside the museum building. One aileron was damaged significantly during one of our storms. However, with the direction of **Ralph Koehler** and the expert metal working skills of **Ron Huber**, no one will be able to tell that it was so badly mangled. See the before and during work pictures. **Chester Ford, Ken Nelson** and **Phil Howard** repaired some trailing edge damage to one of the flaps.

PB4Y-2

Crew chief **Joe Amend** and his team have been making a lot of progress on restoring the Erco nose turret. **Jeff Altshuler, Hank Grudzien, Dave Nowak, Nick Gabriel, John Marker** and **Barry Terrell** have been very instrumental in making this a key part of the aircraft restoration. **John Marker** has begun working on the landing gear on August 13. Both main landing gear assemblies must be replaced before we move the plane to our new airpark. We have the replacements in hangar F6.



SPAD

Crew Chief **Bill Rodgers** has **Larry Arnett, Gene Blanchard, Dale Burgess, Chris Curran, Dan Davis, Ken Hauser, Joe Kosek** and **Ray Wall** working diligently on the construction of our World War I fighter. One wing has yet to be fabricated, but you may have noticed the paint job and the hat and ring insignia. **Ron Huber** has been helping with the metal cowlings for the cockpit and engine. The dummy engine made of wood has been fooling visitors, but some wise guys have been saying “whaddya expect for a wood airplane?”

AIR PARK NOTES

During the air show, we had many visitors that were interested in our aircraft. We offer the experience of walking through the Privateer, DC6B, Caribou and Argosy. That is something they cannot do with most of the participating air show aircraft. We get lots of questions! We are getting pricing quotes for filling our static aircraft tires with foam so we will not have to be concerned with inflating them frequently. We feel this will be necessary before we attempt to move the aircraft to our future air park that will be adjacent to the headquarters building.

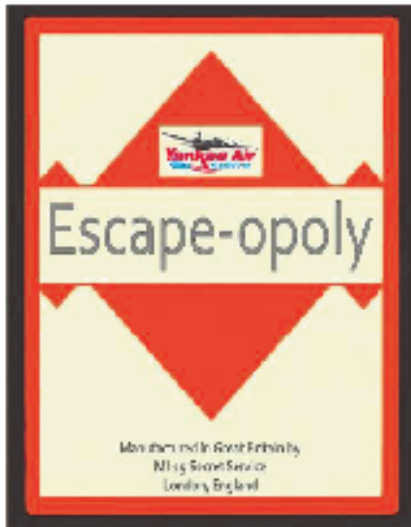

Education Department Report

This past August 2011 the Museum participated in a grant with Eastern Michigan University. The Education Department was approached in February of 2011 about becoming a partner in this grant opportunity. The Library of Congress was offering a grant for an institution to develop and host a teacher’s workshop using primary sources. After a few meetings with Dr. Brigid Beaubien and Dr. Russ Olwell from Eastern Michigan University, Rachel Krumwiede – Director of Education at the Museum and Debbie Nickell – Manager of the Oral History Department at the Museum, offered the idea of using oral histories as a “primary source” for teachers to use in their classrooms. The grant was written, submitted, and accepted by the Library of Congress. For the next several months Debbie Nickell and Rachel Krumwiede worked extensively with volunteers from the Museum, professors from Eastern Michigan University and teachers from around the area to put this workshop together.

The workshop was a 3-day event where teachers learned about how to use the Library of Congress website in their classrooms as a part of their lesson planning as well as how to conduct a good oral history interview. Twenty-four teachers from around the area participated in the workshop. The oral history interviews were conducted on-site at the Yankee Air Museum which gave the session a certain historical ambience that added to the day. The guests that were interviewed ranged from “Rosie the Riveter’s” that worked in the Willow Run Bomber Plant, WWII veterans and Tuskegee Airmen. It was a very moving and emotional day both for the teachers, our honored guests and their families. “Debbie did a fantastic job coordinating all of the oral history interviews. Without her and the other volunteers that helped out that day this event could not have happened.” – (Rachel Krumwiede). When asked how the event at the Museum went Debbie stated, “The event was a huge success. Everyone had a very memorable experience and I overheard many talking about bringing others back to tour the museum. This event promoted community service as well as providing an innovative educational tool. I am proud to have been involved and most of all honored to have met so many wonderful people that served our country.” – (Debbie Nickell).

Now that the workshop is complete, the Education Department will be able to utilize the lessons and oral histories gathered to promote the Education Department to the local community. All of the oral histories and lesson plans developed will be available online through Eastern Michigan University’s website, the Library of Congress’s website and the Yankee Air Museum website. Once the oral histories and lessons plans are available on the website it will help the Education Department in its process to formalize the program’s curriculum, as well as introduce the Museum and all it has to offer to teachers around the state of Michigan. “Our plan is to use the oral histories and lesson plans that were developed in this workshop as part of our overall curriculum plan.
