SETTING THE SCENE

- In the first game of its 94th season, Ross-Ade Stadium will host its first Friday night game as the Boilermakers and Bobcats are set to square off.
- The game is the first under Purdue's new permanent light structures at Ross-Ade Stadium. Full information about the new lights can be found at the bottom right of this page.
- The Boilermakers are coming off a hard-fought 35-28 loss to No. 16 Louisville in a game played at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis to open the 130th year of Purdue football.
- Ohio is coming off a 59-0 win over FCS Hampton.
- The Boilermakers are playing just their second Friday game home game and the first at Ross-Ade Stadium.
- The Boilermakers have played on Fridays nine times previously and carry a 4-4-1 in such contests into the Ohio game. Purdue's history of Friday games can be found on page
- The game will be televised on Fox with Tim Brando, Spencer Tillman and Holly Sonders on the call.

SERIES HISTORY

- Purdue and Ohio meet for the eighth time in series history. The Boilermakers are 7-0 all-time against the Bobcats, though the teams have not met since 1988. Every meeting has been in West Lafayette.
- Purdue has scored 220 points in series history while Ohio has 26.

ROSS-ADE'S NEW LIGHTS

- Work began at the end of April to install Purdue's brand new lighting system.
- There are 15 light poles, 11 that span the east side of the stadium and one in each of the four "corners."
- Ribbon-style lighting connects the 11 east-side poles and is replicated on the west side, attached to a new 360-foot catwalk atop the Ross-Ade Pavilion.
- There are 320 LED sports lighting fixtures, each one individually controllable via a DMX control system, which allows for full remote adjustment options. There are 140 diodes per fixture, for an approximate total of 45,000 diodes.
- The lights yield 320,000 total watts of power and more than 36 million lumens of light output.
- The project was completed two weeks ago with an approximate cost of \$5.6 million.

▶ HEAD COACH JEFF BROHM

- Jeff Brohm was named the 36th head coach of the Boilermakers on Dec. 5, 2016, becoming the first signal caller to lead the Cradle of Quarterbacks in nearly half a century.
- Brohm, who played collegiately at Louisville and for seven seasons in the National Football League, is widely regarded as one of the most innovative offensive masterminds in college football.

Brohm's Playing Career

- He was a three-year starter at Louisville, playing for the Cardinals from 1989 to 1993.
- He still ranks sixth in program history in touchdown passes (38), seventh in total offense (5,410), eighth in completion percentage (.562), eighth in passing yards (5,451), eighth in passing efficiency (129.97), ninth in passing attempts (715) and ninth in completions (402).
- Brohm was voted the team's Most Valuable Player as a junior and senior, and his number 11 became part of Louisville's Ring of Honor in 2006.
- Brohm still has the 11th longest touchdown pass in school with an 80-yard strike to Ralph Dawkins vs. Texas in 1993.
- Brohm threw 20 touchdown passes in 1993, which is tied for 10th most in a single season.
- Brohm played in the NFL with the San Diego Chargers (1994), Washington Redskins (1995-96), San Francisco 49ers (1997-98), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1998), Denver Broncos (1999) and Cleveland Browns (2000).
- In eight career games - all with the 49ers - he completed 37-of-58 passes (63.8 percent) for 353 yards with one touchdown and one interception.
- His best game came Oct. 27, 1996, when he completed 19-of-30 passes for 176 yards and a touchdown to lead San Francisco to a 10-9 win over the Houston Oilers.
- In 2001, Brohm played in the XFL for the Orlando Rage and was named first team All-XFL.



Brohm at Western Kentucky

- Brohm came to the Boilermakers from Western Kentucky, where he compiled a remarkable 30-10 overall record (.750 winning percentage), including a 19-5 Conference USA mark (.792), from 2014 to 2016.
- The Hilltoppers were league champions in 2015 and 2016, the school's first back-to-back titles as an FBS member.

- They won the 2014 Bahamas Bowl (49-48 over Central Michigan) and the 2015 Miami Beach Bowl (45-35 over Miami, Fla.), as well as the 2016 Boca Raton Bowl (51-31 over Memphis under interim head coach Nick Holt).
- Western Kentucky was ranked No. 24 in the final 2015 Associated Press poll.
- Under Brohm, the Hilltoppers averaged 44.6 points, 356.6 passing yards and 526.2 yards of total offense per game over three seasons.
- Their starting quarterbacks completed 69.2 percent of their passes and threw 131 touchdowns with merely 25 interceptions.
- Western Kentucky broke more than 75 school offensive records since 2013, when Brohm served as assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

More On Brohm

- Brohm was a standout player at Trinity High School in Louisville, Kentucky.
- He won the Kentucky Mr. Football Award as a senior in 1988 while leading the Shamrocks to a state championship and undefeated season.
- Brohm was named the Kentucky High School Player of the Decade for the 1980s and was inducted into the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 2014.
- A native of Louisville, Brohm (born April 24, 1971) earned his bachelor's degree in business administration in 1994.
- He and his wife, Jennifer, have a son, Brady, and a daughter, Brooke.
- Jeff is one of four family members to be a football letterwinner at Louisville, along with his father, Oscar (quarterback 1966-69), and brothers, Greg (wide receiver 1989-92) and Brian (quarterback 2004-07).
- The Brohm family, including mother, Donna, and sister, Kim, was inducted into the Louisville Catholic Sports Hall of Fame in 2013.

• **NOTEWORTHY:** On this date in 1984, the Boilermakers defeated eighth-ranked Notre Dame 23-21 in the dedication game of the Hoosier Dome in Indianapolis. Junior defensive end Don Baldwin secured the win when he intercepted a Steve Beuerlein screen pass at the Notre Dame 35-yard line with 2:25 remaining. Purdue had 12 players on the field, which would have nullified the interception, but the referees failed to notice. Junior quarterback Jim Everett, who was named Purdue's starter the day before the game, completed 20 of 28 passes for 255 yards and two touchdowns to earn "Sports Illustrated" National Offensive Player of the Week honors.

PURDUE HEAD COACH DEBUTS

- Jeff Brohm's Purdue debut was last week against No. 16 Louisville.
- It was just the second time a new Purdue head coach opened against a ranked opponent.

WEEK 1 REWIND

- The Boilermakers took No. 16 Louisville to the wire at Lucas Oil Stadium before eventually falling 35-28.
- Purdue led the game for 18 minutes and 8 seconds in the game, while it was tied for 11 minutes and 53 seconds.
- The Boilermakers led 14-10 at the half after Elijah Sindelar, in his first quarterback start, found Jackson Anthrop for a first quarter touchdown and David Blough hit Richie Worship with 51 seconds left in the half for another score.
- Blough then hit Brycen Hopkins for a 2-yard touchdown in the third quarter to give the Boilermakers a 21-13 lead, but a pair of interceptions, including one for a touchdown, aided Louisville to a 25-21 lead heading into the final quarter.
- Sindelar came back and hit Anthrop for a 14-yard touchdown to give Purdue a 28-25 lead with 10:48 to play, but the Cardinals scored the final 10 points to come back for the win.
- Ja'Whaun Bentley forced two fumbles, both recovered by the Boilermakers. Danny Ezechukwu, Markus Bailey and Jacob Thieneman all had fumble recoveries for Purdue.

HOME OPENERS

- Purdue is 88-36-4 in home openers.
- The Boilermakers have won 13 consecutive home openers and 19 of their last 20.
- Purdue has won its last three home openers against teams currently in the Mid-American Conference.
- The Boilermakers are 18-4 all-time in home openers against teams currently in the Mid-American conference, including 5-0 against Ohio.

BEND DON'T BREAK

- Purdue's defense had a pair of goal line stands against Louisville and the reigning Heisman Trophy winner, Lamar Jackson.
- The first came in the opening quarter when the Cardinals had 3rd & goal at Purdue's 1. Danny Ezechukwu picked up a Jackson fumble and dragged him to the 37-yard line.
- The second came early in the second quarter. Again at Purdue's 1, Ja'Whaun Bentley stripped running back Jeremy Smith as he reached for the end zone. Markus Bailey picked up the loose ball and returned it 19 yards to the Boilermakers' 20-yard line.
- The Cardinals had eight trips into the red zone and scored just three touchdowns and three field goals. The field goals were from 23, 30 and 32 yards.
- Purdue also stopped Louisville without points

- before the half as the Cardinals got to Purdue's 14-yard line as the clock expired.
- Louisville had four takeaways in the game, including one returned for a touchdown. On the other three, the defense forced two three-and-outs and came up with a fumble recovery.

PAIR OF TOUCHDOWN PASSES, PAIR OF QBS

- Elijah Sindelar and David Blough both threw two touchdown passes against Louisville.
- The Boilermakers have not achieved that feat in a game since 1998 when the Boilermakers beat Indiana 52-7 in Ross-Ade Stadium.
- Drew Brees was 20 for 33 for 237 yards, four touchdowns and an interception before David Edgerton came in and completed 3 of 4 passes for 37 yards and two scores.

BRING THE BALL BY BENTLEY? BEWARE.

- Senior linebacker Ja'Whaun Bentley forced two fumbles against Louisville in the opener, both recovered by the Boilermakers.
- Bentley is one of just four players in the country who forced two fumbles in the first week of the season.
- He is one of just two who did so against a Power 5 Conference team.

HONORING BOB DEMOSS

- The Boilermakers will honor Bob DeMoss, the patriarch of the Cradle of Quarterbacks and a member of the Purdue Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Game with a helmet sticker. DeMoss, a former Boilermaker quarterback and head coach, passed away July 23 at age 90.
- DeMoss initially gained fame as a freshman at Purdue in 1945. He helped the Boilermakers win their first four games and move into the national rankings at No. 9. Their next opponent was fourth-ranked Ohio State on Oct. 20 in Columbus. Purdue raced to a 28-0 lead and went on to an improbable 35-13 victory before 73,585 fans, the most ever to watch the Boilermakers at that time.
- DeMoss went on to be Purdue's primary quarterback through 1948, passing for 2,759 yards and 23 touchdowns during his career, and then played professionally with the New York Bulldogs in 1949.
- DeMoss subsequently embarked on a 42-year tenure at Purdue as an assistant coach (1950-69), head coach (1970-72) and assistant athletics

FIRST TIME STARTERS

- Ten Boilermakers made their first start for the Old Gold and Black in last week's season opener against Louisville.
- Senior wide receiver **Anthony Mahoungou** made his first start and had four catches for 33 yards, including one that went for a first down.
- Redshirt freshman **Grant Hermanns** made his first collegiate appearance as the starter at left tackle. He is Purdue's first freshman - true or redshirt - to start at left tackle in the season opener since Mike Otto in 2003. Otto went on to be drafted by the Tennessee Titans in 2007.
- Junior **Shane Evans**, an immediately eligible transfer from Northern Illinois, started his first collegiate game. Evans, who appeared in 18 games for the Huskies, was the starting left guard.
- Graduate transfer **David Steinmetz** is no stranger to starting as he now has 30 collegiate starts. The first 29, though, came at FCS Rhode Island. He started his first FBS game at right tackle against Louisville.
- Junior kicker **Spencer Evans** is an immediately eligible transfer from Baylor. He was their starting kickoff specialist, and started at the same spot for Purdue against Louisville. He also made two extra points, splitting time with **J.D. Dellinger**.
- Redshirt freshman wide receiver **Jackson Anthrop** started at one of the wide receiver positions and led the team with seven catches for 82 yards and two touchdowns. He is the first freshman with two touchdowns in a season opener since Kory Sheets had a pair of scores against Akron in 2005. Sheets' TDs came on a blocked punt and a rush. No freshman receiver has hauled in two touchdown catches in a season opener since pre-1999.
- Sophomore **Tario Fuller** carried the ball eight times for 29 yards. He was the team's leading rusher in his first career start.
- Graduate transfer linebacker **T.J. McCollum** has

started 26 games at the FBS level, but 25 came before joining the Boilermakers. The transfer from Western Kentucky, who started at UAB, was second on the team with nine tackles in the opener.

- Graduate transfer cornerback **Josh Okonye** appeared in 37 collegiate games at Wake Forest, but his first start came against Louisville. He finished with nine tackles, including the team's only tackle for loss.
- Junior college transfer safety **T.J. Jallow** made his first start. He finished with six tackles.

FOOTBALL PERFORMANCE COMPLEX

- The football performance complex, which is located adjacent to the north end of the Mollenkopf Athletic Center, was completed in August of 2017.
- The three-level structure – amassing 112,000 square feet – includes a locker room, team meeting room, position group meeting rooms, player development room, weight room, sports medicine and hydrotherapy area, nutrition station, and coaches' and support staff offices, as well as a grand entrance lobby showcasing the Boilermakers' history and tradition.
- The state-of-the-art complex has significantly enhanced the football student-athlete experience. In addition to the first-class amenities, having all of them located in one facility results in more efficient use of the student-athletes' time. Previously, football-related facilities were housed in multiple buildings.
- A \$65 million project, the football performance complex was designed by Populous, while construction was managed by the Hunt Construction Group. The groundbreaking ceremony took place April 15, 2016 – with 11 Purdue Super Bowl champions in attendance – and construction took 16 months. The facility will be dedicated Sept. 8, 2017.

- Blough also touched on his service trips to South Africa where he and teammates have worked at an orphanage.

BLOUGH'S SUMMER WITH THE MANNINGS

- Junior quarterback David Blough spent time this summer working at the Manning Passing Academy in Thibodaux, Louisiana. He was selected by a panel that included Archie Manning.
- At the camp, which was in its 22nd year, counselors worked extensively with the younger campers, from 1-on-1 instruction to teaching technique and fundamentals, to various other drills.
- Blough was among more than 25 other college quarterbacks, including Lamar Jackson of Louisville.
- In evening meetings, Blough and the other college quarterbacks were able to pick the Mannings' brains on everything from game preparation, film study, technique and more.

BLOUGH ON MULTIPLE WATCH LISTS

- Blough was named the the Wuerffel watch list. The award, named after 1996 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Danny Wuerffel, is presented annually to a player who best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement.
- Blough is also on the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award watch list.
- The Golden Arm Award is presented at the end of each football season and the winner is selected based on his accomplishments both on and off the field. Candidates must be a college senior or fourth-year junior on schedule to graduate with their class.

THE CAPTAINS

- The Boilermakers voted on captains in the team's first meeting of fall camp. Six individuals were chosen with three on offense and three on defense.
- The offensive captains are junior center **Kirk Barron**, junior quarterback **David Blough** and senior wide receiver **Gregory Phillips**.
