Introduction

The format of the teenage tournament has always aimed to give all confederations an equal chance, especially in this developing age group. In 2007, the number of participating teams was increased from 16 to 24, and the places allocated amongst the confederations as follows: AFC 4, CAF 4, CONCACAF 4, CONMEBOL 4, UEFA 5, OFC 2, and the host country 1.

From 1985 to 1993, matches were played over two 40-minute halves (extra time was ten minutes each way). In Ecuador in 1995, the standard duration of matches was increased to the traditional format of 45 minutes per half (with 15 minutes per half in extra time). In 2011, extra time was abolished for the FIFA U-17 World Cup and the FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup after a proposal put forward by the FIFA Medical Committee and the FIFA Task Force Football 2014.

Team Facts

India return to the finals of a FIFA competition after 57 years. The South Asians participated in four consecutive editions of the Olympic Football Tournament between 1948 and 1960.

India are the 18th Asian team to take part in the U-17 World Cup. The last AFC representatives to make their tournament bow were Iraq in 2013.

More editions of the U-17 World Cup have been held in Asia than in any other continent. The campaign in India will be the fifth after those staged in China (1985), Japan (1993), Korea Republic (2007) and United Arab Emirates (2013).

USA are contesting their 16th U-17 World Cup and share the record for the most participations with Brazil. The Americans only missed out on the 2013 campaign, following 14 consecutive appearances, and their best finish of fourth place came in 1999.

The Stars and Stripes have racked up more defeats (28) and conceded more goals (96) than any other side in the tournament's history. Between 1999 and 2007 they failed to keep a clean sheet in 16 consecutive U-17 World Cup games.

The 1000th goal in the history of the U-17 World Cup was struck on 20 September 2005 by an American, Ryan Soroka, who was the last scorer in his side's 3-1 group-round victory against Italy. A total of 1859 goals have been netted ahead of the 2017 edition and the milestone of 2000 is another 141 away, a tally that has been reached in all five tournaments since the 24-team format was adopted.

Colombia return to the finals of the U-17 World Cup eight years after their last appearance in 2009, when their fourth-placed finish equalled their previous best showing at the 2003 edition.

Only Spain, who thrashed New Zealand 13-0 in 1997, have scored more goals in a single U-17 World Cup fixture than Colombia, who trounced Finland 9-1 in 2003.

Colombian Carlos Hidalgo is one of a quartet of players who have scored four goals in an U-17 World Cup match, having struck four times in the 9-1 win over Finland in 2003. The other three quadruples were bagged by Spain's David in 1997 against New Zealand, Côte d'Ivoire's Souleymane Coulibaly in 2011 against Denmark and Nigerian Kelechi Iheanacho in 2013 against Mexico.

Ghana return to the finals ten years after finishing fourth in Korea Republic 2017, which is the longest break between appearances among the 24 sides competing in India.

The Black Starlets have scored in their last 21 matches, a record series also achieved by Germany between 2007 and 2015. The Ghanaians will edge ahead if they find the target in their opening match in India.

The West Africans are the only side to have contested four consecutive finals in the U-17 World Cup, having reached the deciding match between 1991 and 1997 and won two titles in 1991 and 1995.

Paraguay are making their fourth outing in the U-17 World Cup and achieved their best result on their debut in 1999, when they were eliminated in the quarter-finals by the eventual champions Brazil.

Los Guaranies have scored an average of 4.2 goals in the ten U-17 World Cup matches they have contested, netting two goals in only one game and at least three in the other nine.

In the South American Under-17 Championship, Paraguay booked their ticket to India one day before the end of the competition by overcoming Venezuela 3-1 to ensure they finished third. That was followed on the final matchday by an inconsequential loss to Colombia, after four wins and four draws between the first stage and the final group round.

The reigning vice-champions lost the final of the U-17 World Cup 2015 to Nigeria. Mali have reached the knockout stage in all but one of their four previous participations, exiting at the group stage in 1999 with no goals scored and just one conceded.

Among the sides that have played at least ten matches in the U-17 World Cup, Mali have conceded the lowest average number of goals per match, with 0.61 based on a total of 11 goals shipped in 18 fixtures. *Les Aiglonnets* kept clean sheets in ten of their games.

Mali are the reigning African champions, having won the U-17 Africa Cup of Nations after beating fellow finalists Ghana to successfully defend the title they claimed in 2015.

The New Zealanders are taking part in their eighth U-17 World Cup and the sixth in a row. Two years ago they reached the Round of 16, thus equalling the best ever finishes achieved in 2009 and 2011.

The U-17 team's 2-1 win over Poland in 1999 was the first positive result achieved by a New Zealand side in the finals of a FIFA competition, in both men's and women's football.

In February, the Junior All Whites won their seventh continental title in this age group and the sixth on the trot. In the last six editions of the OFC U-17 Championship, which also doubles as the qualifying tournament for the U-17 World Cup, New Zealand dominated with 27 wins and one draw from 28 matches played, scoring 116 goals (an average of 4.14 per game) and conceding 15 (0.53 per game on average).

Iran went beyond the group round twice in their three previous participations, in 2009 and 2013. On both occasions, the Iranians were subsequently eliminated in the Round of 16: 2-1 by Uruguay after extra time in 2009 and 4-1 by eventual champions Nigeria in 2013.

Apart from India, who qualified automatically as the host team, Iran were the first side to book their finals berth, winning 5-0 in the quarter-finals of the AFC U-16 Championship on 25 September 2016. Japan followed them into the finals only a few hours later on the same day.

An Iranian was the scorer of one of six goals netted inside the first minute of play in the U-17 World Cup. The player in question was Mostafa Hashemi, who struck after 55 seconds against Argentina in 2013. Only four players have bagged earlier goals.

Niger are one of three teams making their tournament bow this year, together with India and New Caledonia. They are the 20th African side to take part in the U-17 World Cup, making CAF the second-most represented confederation in the competition, behind UEFA which has fielded 22 sides.

Together with Mali, Niger were the last side to qualify for the finals, beating Tanzania 1-0 on 21 May in the first round of the U-17 Africa Cup of Nations, where they eventually finished fourth.

In the second qualifying round of the U-17 Africa Cup of Nations, Niger sensationally eliminated the reigning world champions Nigeria. After losing the away leg 1-0, the *Junior Menas* won the return match 3-1 and the decisive goal that knocked out the Nigerians was scored late on in the 90th minute by Abdoul Karim Tinni Sanda.

A Brazilian netted the first goal in U-17 World Cup history. On the opening day of the inaugural edition in 1985, Bismarck found the target after just nine minutes against Qatar.

A Canarinha qualified for the U-17 World Cup by winning the South American U-17 Championship for the 12th time in 17 editions, collecting seven wins and two draws in their nine games, with 24 goals scored and three conceded.

Japan are taking part in their eighth U-17 World Cup, having ventured furthest in 1993 and 2011 when they reached the quarter-finals.

On the way, they scored 46 goals and conceded none, notching six wins in as many games, including qualifiers, of which the most emphatic was a 17-0 victory over Mongolia. However, Japan's progress was halted with a 4-2 defeat in the penultimate round by eventual champions Iraq.

Iraq are one of six sides that have lost all their matches in the U-17 World Cup, and the only one participating in the 2017 edition. The Iraqis collected no points from three games during their only previous campaign in 2013.

In the 2013 edition, Iraq faced the two eventual finalists Nigeria and Mexico in the group round.

Iraq arrive in India as the reigning Asian champions after winning the AFC U-16 Championship 2016 for the first time, following a penalty shoot-out win over Iran in the final.

Mexico are two-time champions (in 2005 and 2011) and this is their 13th U-17 World Cup campaign, taking them equal-third with Argentina in terms of the number of participations, behind Brazil and USA who will each be making their 16th appearance.

Mexico jointly hold the record for the most consecutive wins in the U-17 World Cup, totalling seven (all obtained during the 2011 edition). *El Tri* share the record with Brazil, Nigeria and Switzerland, although only Switzerland's winning streak remains unbroken.

In the 2013 quarter-finals against Brazil, Mexico won the highest-scoring penalty shoot-out in the history of FIFA competitions. The end result was 11-10 to the Mexicans and 21 spot-kicks were scored from a total of 24 attempts, with the other three being saved.

This is Chile's fourth U-17 World Cup outing and their second in a row. The Chileans' best finish of third place came on their debut in 1993.

La Rojita recorded their only clean sheet from 13 games in a 2-0 victory over Tunisia in 1993.

Chile qualified for India 2017 by coming second in the South American Under-17 Championship, thereby equalling their best finish in the 1993 edition of the continental event.

This is England's fourth participation in the U-17 World Cup and their second in a row. The only edition in which they failed to get beyond the first round was the last one in Chile two years ago, when they collected two draws and a defeat.

The U-17 side is one of two English teams to have won a penalty shoot-out in the finals of a FIFA competition, having outsmarted Argentina from the spot in the Round of 16 in 2011. The other side is the U-20 team, who edged Mexico in the quarter-finals in 1993. By contrast, the senior team have been involved in three penalty shoot-outs and lost every one, all in the FIFA World Cup™.

England lost on penalties to Spain in the final of the UEFA European Under-17 Championship 2017. Nevertheless, they qualified for the U-17 World Cup 2017 by edging Republic of Ireland 1-0 in the quarter-finals.

History

A glance over recent years serves to illustrate how the organisers of the past championships endowed each one with an individual flavour.

CHINA PR 1985

The inaugural FIFA U-16 competition in 1985 – the first international football tournament to be held in China PR – saw stadiums filled to capacity, and the Workers' Stadium in Beijing, with a capacity of 80,000, packed to the rafters no fewer than four times. African supremacy, which was to leave its mark on championships in later years, began to assert itself, with Nigeria emerging as the winners and Guinea reaching the semi-finals.

CANADA 1987

The sprawling cities of Toronto and Montreal and the picturesque provincial venues of Saint John (New Brunswick) and St. John's (Newfoundland) provided the backdrop to the second FIFA Under-16 World Tournament in Canada in 1987. Nigeria were on the verge of repeating their 1985 triumph in a thrilling final only to be downed by the Soviet Union in a penalty shoot-out.

SCOTLAND 1989

1989 was the turn of the first European country, namely Scotland, with its long and sophisticated tradition in professional football, to host this FIFA championship. At the memorable final in Glasgow's Hampden Park, a crowd of more than 50,000 watched transfixed as the home team, two goals up at half-time, allowed Saudi Arabia to creep up on them and narrowly beat them on penalties after a goalless extra time.

ITALY 1991

The Italian FA pulled off a feat of organisational prowess at very short notice when it managed to arrange yet another "Italian summer". A series of unforgettable matches at six venues scattered all over Tuscany, culminating in technically superior, irresistible winners from Ghana, was the mark of this first U-17 World Championship. In 1991, the age limit for the tournament was raised from U-16 to U-17.

JAPAN 1993

In 1993 (shortly after the triumphant launch of the J.League), the Japanese proved themselves to be perfect and, above all, technologically superb organisers. Nigeria beat Ghana 2-1 in the final, setting new standards in technique and tactics for this age category.

ECUADOR 1995

Ghana's youngsters made it three in a row for Africa as they swept to a thrilling 3-2 victory over Brazil in the final of the 1995 U-17 World Championship in Guayaquil, Ecuador.

EGYPT 1997

Brazil became the first South American team to win the U-17 World Championship and added the FIFA/JVC Cup to its unparalleled list of international honours. In a repeat of the 1995 U-17 final in Ecuador, Brazil encountered Ghana but this time the roles were reversed. While two years earlier the Africans had held the upper hand, winning 3-2 in the final, this time it was Brazil who came out on top, coming from a goal behind to snatch a dramatic victory from the holders. Africa was the only continent that saw all of their teams – three – make it to the last eight.

NEW ZEALAND 1999

On a day when football in New Zealand set a new record for U-17 crowd attendance, Brazil edged out Australia 8-7 in a penalty shoot-out to retain their crown. A crowd of 22,859 spectators crammed into the stadium to watch. The Aussies, who had made it to their first-ever FIFA final, came close to pipping Brazil with a couple of excellent chances.



TRINIDAD & TOBAGO 2001

France won their first FIFA U-17 World Championship in comprehensive fashion, leading throughout the entire tournament thanks to the lethal strike partnership of Florent Sinama Pongolle and Anthony Le Tallec. Sinama Pongolle scored nine goals, the most in a single U-17 World Championship.

FINLAND 2003

Brazil triumphed 1-0 over Spain at Helsinki's Töölö stadium to become U-17 world champions for the third time. Although the eventful final produced the strike that equalled the all-time record for the most goals at a single FIFA U-17 World Championship (117 at Egypt 97), the final did not live up to the raucous goalscoring standards of Finland 2003. As always, the competition showcased a wealth of young talent, with the USA's remarkable 14-year-old Freddy Adu leaving a lasting impression.

PERU 2005

After Ecuador in 1995, Peru became the second South American country to host the FIFA U-17 World Championship. With total attendance figures of over half a million spectators, Peru 2005 is in third place in the all-time FIFA U-17 World Championship ranking behind China PR 1985 and Egypt 1997. Triumphant Mexico sealed their first FIFA World Championship title at youth level, cruising past Brazil 3-0 in the final

KOREA REPUBLIC 2007

In 2007, the tournament was held on Asian soil for the third time and, having scaled the heights at China 1985 and Japan 1993, Nigeria left the continent with their third global crown. The *Golden Eaglets* also completed a virtual clean sweep of all the other accolades up for grabs at Korea Republic 2007. They edged past Spain on penalties in the final, and their ranks also boasted the adidas Golden Shoe and adidas Silver Ball winner – Macauley Chrisantus.

NIGERIA 2009

This was the second time, following Egypt in 1997, that the FIFA U-17 World Cup had been held on African soil. Switzerland, who were taking part in their first U-17 World Cup, claimed the title with a 1-0 win over Nigeria in the final in Abuja. For the hosts and defending champions, the defeat meant that they narrowly missed out on becoming the first country to win four U-17 crowns, a feat that would have seen them pull clear of Brazil.

Mexico 2011

The tournament was hosted by CONCACAF for the third time following Canada in 1987 and Trinidad & Tobago in 2001. By defeating Uruguay 2-0 at the legendary Azteca Stadium in Mexico City, hosts Mexico claimed the title for the second time, the first being in 2005. Uruguay reached the final for the first time.

United Arab Emirates 2013

The FIFA U-17 World Cup UAE 2013 featured exciting matches and stunning results, with the young Nigerians claiming the trophy by overcoming Mexico in the final. The Africans therefore became the only country to win the tournament four times, surpassing the achievements of Brazil, crowned champions on three occasions.

Chile 2015

Nigeria became the first country to win the title for a fifth time, and with Mali also reaching the final, Chile 2015 had the first all-African final since 1993 when Nigeria saw off Ghana. There was another surprise team on the last step of the podium, with Belgium taking bronze despite being less fancied than other European participants, such as France and Germany, who both shone before being knocked out in the round of 16.



Facts to know about the FIFA U-17 World Cup

The 2017 edition in India will be the 17th FIFA U-17 World Cup. The competition was first held in 1985 and has since been held by all six confederations: Africa (twice, in Egypt and Nigeria), Asia (four times, in Korea Republic, China PR, Japan and the United Arab Emirates), Oceania (once, in New Zealand), North, Central America and the Caribbean (three times, in Canada, Trinidad & Tobago and Mexico), South America (three times, in Ecuador, Peru and Chile), and Europe (three times, in Scotland, Italy and Finland). Up to and including the 2005 edition, the tournament was played with 16 teams, which was increased to 24 as of 2007. A total of 79 associations have taken part in the FIFA U-17 World Cup to date. Of the 22 associations that have qualified just once for the tournament, only Switzerland (2009) and the Soviet Union (1987) won the title at their first attempt. Excluding the first edition of the tournament in 1985, the highest number of debutants was seven in 1987, 1989 and 2007. India, New Caledonia and Niger will be the three debutants at this year's tournament. With 47 wins in the under-17 age group, Brazil lead the all-time ranking closely followed by Nigeria 46 wins. Seven of the 16 tournaments have been won by two African teams – Ghana (2) and Nigeria (5). Nigeria have reached eight finals (1985, 1987, 1993, 2001, 2007, 2009, 2013 and 2015) and won five, in 1985, 1993, 2007, 2013 and 2015. Ghana reached the final four times in a row (1991, 1993, 1995 and 1997), winning twice (1991 and 1995). Brazil have made it to the final on five occasions (1995, 1997, 1999, 2003 and 2005), winning three times (in 1997, 1999 and 2003). As for the number of times that teams have taken part, the USA and Brazil (15 apiece) are practically evergreens, ahead of Argentina (13). Only Brazil and Nigeria have successfully defended their title: Brazil (1997 in Egypt and 1999 in New Zealand) and Nigeria (2013 in the UAE and 2015 in Chile). The highest average number of goals per match was recorded at the 1997 and 2003 tournaments in Egypt and Finland (3.66 goals per match), followed by Peru 2005 (3.47) and

Japan 1993 (3.34).



Facts to know about the FIFA U-17 World Cup

> 612 matches have been played since the inaugural tournament in China PR in 1985.

Brazil have contested the most matches (75), followed by Nigeria (63) and Argentina (61).

Nigeria have won an impressive 73% of their FIFA U-17 World Cup games.

Fourteen different teams have played in a FIFA U-17 World Cup final, and eight different teams have lifted the trophy.

Thirty-one sides, with every confederation represented, have reached the semi-finals, indicating a considerably level playing field in this age group.

In 1987, 1989, 1999 and 2007, the final was decided on penalties and on each occasion, a team from a different confederation came out on top. All other finals were decided in regular time.

Only twice have teams from the same confederation met in the final, with Ghana playing Nigeria in 1993, and Nigeria meeting Mali in 2015.

Goals

Most goals

The most goals scored in a tournament was in the UAE in 2013 (172 goals in 52 matches, with an average of 3.31 goals per match). Next are Korea Republic 2007 with 165 goals in 52 matches, with an average of 3.17 goals per match and Mexico 2011 with 158 goals in 52 matches with an average of 3.04 per match.

In a historical overview, Brazil have scored a total of 166 goals in the FIFA U-17 World Cup. In second and third place are Nigeria with 149 goals and Mexico and Spain with 97 goals. The highest goal average nonetheless belongs to the Soviet Union (3.50) who scored 21 goals in 6 matches at their only appearance at the U-17 FWC. They took the FWC trophy home from Canada in 1987, with Nikiforov and Arutyunian leading them to victory.

The most goal-laden match in the U-17 WC was held in Ismailia (Egypt) in 1997, with Spain inflicting maximum damage by crushing New Zealand 13-0. However, other than sealing the Golden Shoe for David, the shower of goals reaped a meagre harvest: Spain were beaten in the semi-finals by eventual runners-up Ghana.

All-time top goalscorers

The world champions have only managed to crown one of their own as top goalscorer on four occasions: Nigeria's Wilson Oruma in 1993, Florent Sinama Pongolle for France in 2001, Mexico's Carlos Vela in 2005 and Victor Osimhen for Nigeria in 2015.

Players

From all the U-17 FWC's, 210 players have gone on to participate in the FIFA World CupTM. Twelve also played in a FWC final match and came out on top- Frenchman Emmanuel Petit in 1998 (France - Brazil), Brazil's Ronaldinho in 2002 (Germany - Brazil), Italy's Buffon, Del Piero and Totti in 2006 (Italy - France), Spain's Casillas, Fabregas, Iniesta, Torres and Xavi in 2010 (Spain – Netherlands) and Germany's Mario Götze and Toni Kroos in 2014 (Germany – Argentina). Three of them have scored in a FIFA World Cup final- The Frenchman Emmanuel Petit (1998), Spain's Andres Iniesta (2010) and Germany's Mario Götze (2014). Spain's goalkeeper Iker Casillas is the only one to have lifted the FIFA World Cup Trophy as captain (2010). Brazil's Ronaldinho is the only player to win both the FIFA U-17 (1997) and the FIFA World Cup (2002) title.

Coaches

Juan Santisteban coached Spain on seven different occasions, but did not finish higher than second (1991 and 2003). Nigeria's Sebastian Brodrick coached teams at four different tournaments and won in 1985. Roy Rees (USA) and Les Scheinflug (AUS) also coached teams at four different tournaments but failed to win a title.

Referees

The U-17 FWC has also served as a springboard for referees, some of whom officiated at important matches during subsequent World Cups – Said Belqola from Morocco was the first African referee appointed for a FIFA World Cup final (1998, France v. Brazil; he sadly passed away after a long illness in June 2002); South African Achmat Salie also officiated in this final as an assistant referee. England's Philip Sharp was also an assistant for the Germany v. Brazil final in 2002. The honour of officiating a final was also bestowed upon Costa Rican assistant referee Berny Ulloa Morera (Argentina – Germany 1986), Argentinian referee Horacio Elizondo (Italy – France 2006) and English referee Howard Webb (Spain – Netherlands 2010).



Spectators

The highest accumulative total audience for a FIFA U-17 World Cup was registered in China PR in 1985 (1,231,000), at an average of 38,469 spectators per match. Crowds of 80,000 or more have watched a single U-17 World Cup match on eight occasions; five times in China PR in 1985, twice in Mexico in 2011, and once in Egypt in 1997 for Egypt v. Germany. A new attendance record was set during the 2011 tournament as 98,943 spectators turned up to watch Mexico claim the title in the final against Uruguay at the Azteca Stadium in Mexico City. The second-highest mark was also set in 2011 at the match for third place when 94,379 people watched Brazil play Germany, again at the Azteca Stadium.
