WELCOME to the West Point Cemetery, America's oldest military post cemetery and a national historic landmark.

Located within the gates of the United States Military Academy, the cemetery provides a serene locale for the thousands of visitors who walk the grounds each year.

Prior to its designation as a military cemetery in 1817, the grounds were used by local residents for burials, and the graves of Soldiers from as far back as the Revolutionary War can be found here.

The interred include distinguished Soldiers, Medal of Honor recipients, astronauts, athletes, and family members.


THE OLD CADET CHAPEL stood across from the clock

stood across from the clock tower at Bartlett Hall until 1910, when, instead of demolition, it was moved to the cemetery at the request of the cadets who wished to save it for posterity.

VISITORS are welcome seven days a week, year-round, from sunrise to sunset. Parking is available on-site at the cemetery.

- Immediate family members of the interred.





The West Point cemetery provides the final resting place for many distinguished Soldiers, including men and women from every major conflict in our nation's history. Listed below are some notable individuals:

- **GEN Lucius D. Clay (USMA, 1918):** WWII Allied Commander in Europe. Architect of the Berlin Airlift, which is still hailed as an amazing feat of logistics. XVIII-G-079
- **GEN Alexander "Sandy" Patch (USMA, 1913):** Commanded the invasion forces at Guadalcanal and the Seventh Army in Europe for the invasion of France. I-C-058
- **GEN William Westmoreland (USMA, 1936):** Commander of US military forces in Vietnam War and later 25th Chief of Staff, US Army. XVIII-F-066
- 4 GEN Bernard Rogers (USMA, 1943): A Rhodes scholar, the 28th Chief of Staff, US Army and later the 8th Supreme Allied Commander of NATO.
- 5 LTG Winfield Scott: USMA cadet gray uniforms come from his Battle of Chippewa victory. XXVII-A-016
- 6 LTG James Gavin (USMA, 1929): "Jumpin' Jim" was the youngest Division Commander in Europe during WWII. Served as ambassador to France under President Kennedy. X-M-36
- TITG Ying-Hsing Wen (USMA, 1909): Admitted to USMA by a special act of Congress as first Chinese cadet. First Asian USMA graduate. XXVII-F-218
- MG John Buford (USMA, 1848): Distinguished and meritorious service at the Battle of Gettysburg. XXVI-A-006
- MG Robert Anderson (USMA, 1825): Commander of Fort Sumter at the start of the Civil War. The fountain by the cemetery caretaker's cottage is a memorial to him. XXVII-A-004
- MG George Goethals (USMA, 1880): Oversaw the construction and the opening of the Panama Canal. XVIII-G-082
- MG Ethan Allen Hitchcock (USMA, 1817): "Pen of the Army."
 A recognized philosopher and published scholar. XXVII-A-007
- MG George Sykes (USMA, 1842): Division Commander during the Second Battle of Bull Run; thwarted enemy attempts to take Little Round Top during the Battle of Gettysburg. XXVI-A-001
- MG Wesley Merritt (USMA, 1860): Distinguished officer during the Civil War and the Spanish-American War. XXII-A-009
- MG Daniel Butterfield: Medal of Honor recipient and composer of the bugle call, "Taps." His monument is the most ornate in the cemetery and it documents thirty-eight battles and engagements of his career. XV-D-050

- BG Sylvanus Thayer (USMA, 1808): Fifth West Point Superintendent and known as the "Father of West Point." XXV-A-022
- BG John Thompson (USMA, 1882): Distinguished service in the Spanish American War and World War I. Inventor of the Thompson Submachine Gun, *Tommy Gun*. XIII-A-038
- 17 BG Egbert Viele (USMA, 1847): The Chief Engineer who oversaw the development of New York's Central Park. XXIV-F-259
- COL David "Mickey" Marcus (USMA, 1924): Served with distinction during the 1948 Arab-Israeli War, then was recruited to become Israel's first modern general and was the Commander of Jerusalem. VI-B-125
- LTC George Armstrong Custer (USMA, 1861): Served as a Brevet Major General during the Civil War, was a distinguished cavalryman up until his Last Stand at the Battle of Little Big Horn. XXVII-A-001
- 20 LTC Edward White II (USMA, 1952): First American to walk in space, and posthumously awarded the Congressional Space Medal of Honor. XVIII-G-080
- 21 1LT Laura Walker (USMA, 2003): First female graduate killed in action. Fell in Afghanistan in 2005. XXVI-B-064C
- **ENS Dominick Trant:** Buried in 1782, his headstone is the oldest grave marker in the cemetery. XXX-H-317
- MSGT Martin Maher: Rose from the ranks of a civilian dishwasher, enlisted and completed a fifty year career at West Point. His story is told in the book "Bringing Up The Brass" and in the movie "The Long Gray Line" (1955). XIII-E-174
- 23 Earl "Red" Blaik (USMA, 1920): Served as USMA Head Football Coach with a 166-48-14 record. Led the 1944 and 1945 National Championship teams and coached three Heisman Trophy winners. X-G-131
- Margaret Corbin: Heroine of the American Revolution. When her husband fell in battle, she took his position at the cannon during the defense of Fort Washington. XI-A-001
- Susan & Anna Warner: Both sisters resided on Constitution Island prior to willing the land to the Academy; Susan wrote the well-know children's song "Jesus Loves Me, This I Know." XXX-Q-586-587
