With our new Assessment Cycle in place the opportunities to write about all of our achievements and activities has reduced whilst the variety and intensity of all that goes on remains the same – high. That is how we like it and in this edition you will be able to read about all that has gone on since our last edition.

As we built up to Christmas we were concentrating upon, what proved to be, a successful school production 'The Mysteries' as well as the customary events such as the Celebration of Christmas and the Senior school prize giving. However, in the midst of all this we received a visit from Ofsted. We knew we were in-line for a visit but had not anticipated that we may have one so close to the Christmas holiday. However, having established systems in place supported by clear lines of accountability and a conscientious workforce ensured that we rose to the challenge. The support of the students and the Academy Council coupled with the positivity of our whole community ensured that the inspectors gained a true and accurate picture of SRWA.

The picture that they formed endorsed our own self-evaluation. We know that the examination successes of our Year 11s are crucial. We are also aware that all our students need to be challenged so that they are able to realise their full potential and meet or exceed their designated targets through effective teaching, which ensures appropriate learning.

Such findings, and there are others, which may be read on our website indicate that we have work to do in order for us to progress as an institution. Areas as diverse as our reporting system and the implementation of differentiation pose their own challenges but we will address them.

The findings concluded that there were many positives that we may be proud of, which will form

the foundations for further growth. Leadership, subject knowledge, the successes of a variety of subjects providing example to others and their observation that the students are 'well cared for and feel safe'. This was



further endorsed by their comment 'Inspectors saw very few incidents of thoughtless or silly behaviour'. All these qualities bode well for the future.

One quality that they highlighted and that I am particularly proud of relates to our work, in all of its forms, with the local community. The comment 'The Academy's work in the community is outstanding and imaginative.', encapsulates our philosophy of being at the centre of the community providing learning, leisure, social and cultural experiences for one and all. Indeed, our current proposals for a floodlit 3G playing facility fit with our vision and beliefs. The concept is currently at consultation stage and if you wish to look at the plans and hopefully make a comment they may be viewed at www.planning.adurworthing.gov.uk/online-applications with reference number AWDM/1883/15.

As is customary at the beginning of a new year – despite it being February – we may set 'resolutions' (objectives) that will impact upon the Academy. These resolutions come from several sources that include our own Self Evaluation procedures, the Ofsted Report, the Academy Improvement Plan, ideas from our Parents' Forum, the Academy Council and our own Academy community of students and staff. What is certain is that we are looking to achieve great things and transform the life chances of our young people coupled with being a resource and facility for all the community to utilise. Together I believe we can.

Discovering Democracy Award

Students took part in a voting project to identify the issues that they believed were most concerning for young people in the UK. They decided that the most important issue was the right to a living wage, followed by the need for the government to provide apprenticeships that prepare students for work in a changing economy.

The Mysteries - A Spiritual Experience

From 1st-3rd December 2015, The Sir Robert Woodard Academy was treated to a seasonal production of a traditional story which goes back thousands of years and the style of the telling is hundreds of years old.

In the spirit to which we have now become accustomed, The Alan Strong Studio Theatre was unrecognisable. If we have come to expect anything over the past few years it is that we don't know

what to expect when Ms Venn gets her hands on a project! On this occasion, the Theatre became a dark place that was part industrial heartland, part bible. Objects and characters emerged out of shadows and nothing was obvious. It was a setting for a modern, spiritual experience, from the tin cans twinkling in the roof, like a postindustrial milky way, to the sculptural shapes on

the set that morphed from the Ark to the Stable in the blink of an eye. The Drama Department has a reputation for producing outstanding shows and this took that reputation up a further notch or ten – unbelievable though that might seem to those who saw

'A Midsummer Night's Dream' in the summer. Every aspect of the production was executed with such apparent simplicity to create a highly complex, allencompassing experience. The



acting was sublime. The in-house costumes perfectly constructed. The lighting, sound, make-up, stage management and front of house all run by our expert team of students and ex-students were flawless, and the original music, performed by a band of students

and staff was ethereally exquisite.

This was the nativity story, shaken up and re-told for a modern audience – fresh, vital and relevant. The subject

matter leant itself to a deep spirituality shared by millions across the globe, but the most moving and powerful aspect of the whole experience was seeing and hearing young people explore the story, together as a finely balanced team. There were no egos here, no stars - just a group of students who loved what they were doing, loved working with one another and delighted in the quality of what they were

able to produce together. Ms Venn weaves golden tapestries of theatre, hand-in-hand with these talented performers, and that was where the roots of this transformative experience lay. It was an honour to have witnessed it

The Sussex Study Experience, is a programme organised by the University of Sussex for year 12 students. The students are able to select a specific subject and learn alongside a leading academic in their chosen field and discover things at the cutting edge of research. Below are some comments from two of our year 12 students.

Lauren Neal

I am currently studying the history and media strand on the Sussex Study Experience at the University of Sussex. I feel extremely lucky to have been chosen to go on this course as it was only open for first generation scholars and many people applied. This course gives a detailed insight into how some university courses run and a complete overview of

life at university. On the course, we have people travelling from as far away as London in order to gain the knowledge and experience this course offers. Whilst completing the course, I got to talk to different tutors and people who attend the university and get their opinion on their particular subject and their views on the university and everything surrounding it as a whole.

The Sussex Study Experience has really helped me gauge a better understanding about university life and what certain subjects have to offer. I have also met some great people in both my subject strand 'Writing Brighton' and the others. I am very glad to have been given the opportunity to take part as places were limited.

Year 8 Multi Taster Day



We took twenty, year 8 students to the University of Sussex for a taster day where they were able to experience first-hand what it was like to study at the university. They spent time in the lecture theatre and attended three subject taster lessons which were run by academics and university students. The subjects included law, which covered human rights; reasearch into ants; simulating different outcomes using computers; and art history; where students had to look at paintings and discuss what they felt the artist was trying to portray.

Barclays Life Skills

We had four members from Barclays Life Skills come into the Academy and work with a group of our year 11 students on how to compile a CV. These sessions were really beneficial for the students as they allowed them to interact with professional people. The service that Barclays offers to schools is free of charge and an invaluable resource.

Pilot Project

We were contacted by University of Brighton and asked if we could take fifteen of our students from year 7 and year 8 to the university for a day to take part in a pilot project. The students were involved in five practical activities, where the aim was to raise the students' awareness of different subjects and how many skills can be transferred into different areas. An example is the Health Professional activity, where
