Real to Real presents an annual film festival, the Reel 2 Real International Film Festival for Youth, and media arts programming year-round. Through public screenings, hands-on workshops, interactive panel discussions, and public forums, our mission is to involve youth in actively viewing and discussing professionally made films; expose youth to new ideas and cultural perspectives; offer high-quality cinematic entertainment outside the mainstream; explore issues that are important to youth; engage youth in discussions with filmmakers about their work; increase understanding of the art and craft of filmmaking; and promote the production and presentation of high quality independent films for youth.

Feature & Mid-Length Director: Karen Duthie Canada, 2004, 59 min, Grades 8+



Canadian downhill mountain bike champion Michelle Dumaresq has been shaking up the world of sports. But it's not her riding talent that's sparked controversy and international media attention - it's the fact that for the first 20 years of her life Michelle was Michael.

This documentary is an adrenaline-fueled ride-along on Michelle's controversial foray into international women's competition. Combining verité scenes, interviews, home movies and dynamic footage of some of the best mountain bikers in the world, we follow Michelle from her first local race, to the World Championships where she makes history as the first transgendered athlete on a national team, to the glare of the media spotlight.

33-year-old Michelle is witty, charming and confident as she faces active protest from the other racers - some of whom she once considered friends. While some of her opponents merely question her right to compete, others challenge her very identity as a woman. As Michelle struggles for acceptance - as an athlete and a woman - we're forced to ask questions ourselves, not just about fairness in sport, but also about the nature and definition of gender. Winner of the Edith Lando Peace Prize, Reel 2 Real 2005, for the film that "best conveys the values of empathy, non-violence, inclusion and respect."



Breekfest with Scot



Canada, 2007, 95 min, 12+ Ed and Sam's world and relationship turns upside down with the arrival of Ed's nephew, an exceptionally flamboyant 11-year-old boy named Scot. Sam is a former professional hockey player who now works as a broadcaster at a major sports network. His colleagues have no clue about the true sexuality of the outwardly masculine sportscaster; the same can be said about his longtime partner Ed, a high profile hockey player with a reputation for roughness on the

irresponsible father is currently out of town - is an expert in the subjects of knitting and show tunes, but when it comes to the topic of sports he just can't be bothered. Sam knows well the terror of having to hide your sexuality from the masses and, in order to save Scot from the torment of classmates - and perhaps prevent his own secret from being revealed - the knowing uncle does his best to straighten out the effeminate young man. Laurie Lynd's funny and heartwarming story explores what it truly means to be a family, contrasting familial stereotypes with the realities of family life and showing how it feels to be a boy who doesn't quite fit into the role society expects of him. Noah Bernett steals the show as Scot, whose wide-eyed incomprehension of the ways of the world is both hilarious and deeply affecting.

Leeps and Bounds VANCOUVER PREMIERE



Director: Petter Naess Sweden, 2006, 86 min, 11+ In Swedish with English subtitles.

Fourteen-year-old Azad loves to do the high jump and Swedish gold medal-winning high jumper Kajsa Bergqvist is his hero. After surviving a bomb blast near his home, his parents arrange for him and his younger brother Tigris to travel from Iraq to Berlin. The two brothers end up in Sweden by mistake, when an unscrupulous man tricks them out of their connecting flight tickets. In order to blend in with the family that hides him, he has to pretend that he is nine-years-old. Feeling alone in a new country where he doesn't

understand the language, he hopes to be reunited with his real parents and seeks the help of a hot dog vendor, a school friend, and Kajsa Bergqvist. When a friend introduces Azad to the high jump team at school, he astonishes everybody with his skills, but runs into the problem of how an illegal immigrant can join the team that will compete in Germany. Norwegian director Petter Næss (Elling, 2001) sensitively portrays the loss of homeland and family, and the rewards of new friendships and successes.




Director: Yasmin Ahmad Malaysia, 2006, 90 min, Grades 8+ In Malay, English, and Mandarin with English subtitles.

Orked is a tomboy who has no trouble confronting bullies at her Chinese school, and likes dancing in the rain with her English-speaking mother. She would much rather attend a soccer match then play wedding with the other girls. When Mukhsin and his older brother come to stay in the village, after their mother leaves their abusive father, it is no surprise that he is instantly drawn to Orked and her free-spirited family. Orked and Mukhsin become inseparable, taking the audience with

them on their journey around rural Malaysia in this gentle, witty story of the awkwardness of trying to turn friendship into love. In this semi-autobiographical story, Malaysian director Yasmin Ahmad returns to her favourite family, portrayed in earlier films, including Rabun (2003), Sepet (2005) and Gubra (2006). She says of Mukhsin, "I feel it's an interesting human condition to look at, because I myself have never been able to understand how, sometimes, something as beautiful as Love can threaten to end something else that's just as beautiful – Friendship."

does not really understand the full drama of losing a diary, he sees a chance to spend time with her, and offers help. Having no other choice, Paula accepts. The two complete opposites set up an exciting manhunt and, thanks to Tobi's efforts, the diary is returned. Every November, Reel to Real offers workshops in film criticism. This is a challenging and interactive experience where students sharpen their critical eye, gain an appreciation for international films, and learn what makes a film great. Two Youth Juries are chosen from successful workshop graduates (ages 9-12 and 13-19). In January, these juries evaluate every film in their age category, and chose the award winners. This evening we are proud to announce this year's award winners. The screening of Red Like the Sky will follow the award celebration.

This evenings festivities are hosted by Kenji Maeda.

Mirco is a bright 10-year-old who loves going to the movies. While playing with his father's rifle, he accidentally shoots himself and loses his sight. The year is 1971, when blind people were considered handicapped. Thus, Mirco is forced to leave family and friends to attend a school for the blind in Genoa. Life at the strict school isn't easy, but Mirco is feisty and determined. One day he finds an old reel-to-reel tape recorder, and discovers that by cutting and splicing tape he can create fairy tales by recording and editing sounds. The religious authorities that run the boarding school forbid this activity, but Mirco refuses to give up, involves his classmates, and soon they rediscover they have dreams and capacities beyond those offered by their school. Red Like the Sky is a beautifully crafted film that shows us the importance of tolerance, self-respect, and creativity. It features blind actors in many of the roles, and is based on the true story of Mirco Mencacci, a blind man who is one of Italy's top sound designers for film.

Director: Lisa Helminen **Finland/Sweden**, 2005, 86 min, 6+

Favourite children's performer Rick Scott will introduce this classic from Reel 2 Real's past ten years. PUMKIDS, his latest release from Pied Pumkin, won the Best Children's CD at the 2007 Canadian Folk Music Awards.

The pelican that alights on the beach one summer afternoon is an extraordinary bird. He seems to be extremely interested in people, and observes them attentively. Then one day he decides to become human. Amazingly, the



pelican's transformation is so complete that nobody seems to notice whether he is a pelican or a human being. He even gets a job as a stagehand and finds himself an apartment. 10-year-old Emil realizes in a flash what's up with the bird, but decides to keep it to himself; it'll be their secret, just the pelican and him. Emil teaches his new friend how to read and, before long, the pelican discovers the delights of newspapers and books, poetry and science, love stories and philosophy. Emil, too, learns a great deal from the pelican and together they begin to explore the city. At the annual harvest thanksgiving party all the other neighbours are simply enchanted by the pelican's charming way - until his bird-allergic landlady becomes suspicious.

TIXICE and the Mysterious Mind-Machine

After a series of strange disappearances, four young detectives—Tim, Karl, Klumpling, and Gaby (TKKG)—attend a demonstration by high school psychics genius Kevin. His latest invention is a machine designed to help improve students' brainpower, but the demonstration does not go as planned. With their curiosity piqued, TKKG take advantage of a camping trip without parents to sneak into Kevin's abandoned house.

What they find inside draws them into a complex mystery of power, and the pursuit of science. Someone is preventing them from learning more. This intriguing adventure story raises questions about the cost of scientific discovery and the value of friendship. Based on the phenomenally successful book by German author Stefan Wolf, and the TV and video game series, TKKG will take you on a journey of real and virtual surprises.

She is a princess but lives a life of misery, mistreated by an odious pair of rats. One day an adorable little unicorn, U, appears and declares that she is there to help her through life and to assure her happiness. The two become inseparable. One day U brings home a charming and funny Lizard, Lazare. Scandalized by this



intrusion to their home, the rats demand the newcomer leaves. In the surrounding woods they meet Lazare's family, the Wewes, a family of musicians living in a tree. Here life couldn't be more different than in the castle, full of pleasure, music and merrymaking. Mona discovers two new things: the wonder of music and a blossoming attraction to the young guitarist Kulka. However U suddenly becomes aware of a worrying dilemma. What will happen to her if Mona finds happiness, which is the sole reason for her existence...? This coming of age fairytale follows the melancholy Princess Mona as she learns about loyalty, love and how to have fun.



ANOTHER WESTERN

Director/Writer: Adeline Huynh **Canada**, 2007, 6 min 13+

Through the whimsical story of a Vietnamese girl, her grandfather and good ol' American Westerns, this film humorously probes issues of race, identity, cultural dislocation and assimilation.



BANJO FROGS

Director: Nick Hilligoss Australia, 1998, 5 min 8+

On finishing the metamorphosis from tadpole to frog, Cyril finds himself on uncommon ground - a garbage dump. Unsure of his surroundings, he croaks out to other frogs. They reject his advances until Cyril picks up an old banjo and dramatically changes his tune. The other frogs are impressed - but who is the stranger and why can he play so well?

DEAR LEMON LIMA

Director: Suzi Yoonessi USA, 2007, 11 min 13+

Vanessa Lemor, a lonely 13-year old girl with a vivid imagination, is dumped by her true love, uber-intellectual Philip Georgey. Vanessa spends the summer obsessing over the heartbreaking tragedy, while working with Philip who is her manager at the local ice cream shack. A chance meeting with 'angel-headed dorks,' Hercules and Nothing, enables her to overcome her anguish on a serendipitous summer day.



DOG BOY

The adults used to let him inside, but a young boy is now part of the pack, and finds himself at home on the street.



FLIGHT OF STONE


LOOK BOTH WAYS

Director: Daniel Oron **Canada**, 2006, 11 min 8+

Tommy and Joey furiously pound on their game controllers as their galactic space battle intensifies. Susie and Jimmy feverishly rock up a storm as they brave level 10 of a dance game. Lori and Bobby are caught up in a star-crossed lovers web chat. Suddenly the power goes out. Against their will, the terrified kids are sent outside. On a seemingly splendid suburban summer day the real battle for survival is about to begin.

LOST MONSTER HOP

Director: Jody Kramer **Canada**, 2007, 1 min 8+



At a signpost by the railway tracks, a tidy little banjo-playing monster is trying to find her way. She sets out on a journey and finds what she is looking for in a rather surprising way.

MAQ AND THE SPIRIT OF THE WOODS

Director: Phyllis Grant **Canada**, 2007, 9 min 8+

Maq and the Spirit of the Woods is the story of Maq, a Mi'gmaq boy who realizes his potential with the help of inconspicuous mentors. The film is adapted from tales told to director Phyllis Grant as a child. Narrated by Grant's father, Mi'gmaq folklorist Gilbert Sewell, it tackles the themes of creation and the discovery of inner resources that build self-confidence and strength. Bold colour, high-quality graphic art and simple movements create a bridge between ancient oral tradition and modern-day animation.



ME, MASI & MR. CLEAN

Director: Nina Sudra & Patrick McLaughlin **Canada**, 2007, 8 min 8+

Eleven-year-old Seema is struggling with her dark skin colour. When she takes drastic measures to bleach herself, Seema ends up learning an important lesson about the illusion of outward appearance. This bittersweet comedy is about accepting the things you cannot change, and focusing on the things that can make a difference.



NIGHTMARE AT SCHOOL

Director: Catherine Arcand Canada, 2007, 9 min 8+

Who hasn't felt apprehensive at the thought of starting high school? This is the central theme of this short animated film. 


