

Fisher-Orcutt, Inglis-Herbert Duos Tie In Leewood Member-Guest Even

Leading Pairs Card Net 65's; Champion-Park Tandem Third

CRESTWOOD—Yesterday was a perfect day for golf and perfect golf is just what William Fisher Jr. and Maureen Orcutt of White Beaches, N. J. fired at Leewood Golf club to lead a fine field of 44 tandems in Leewood's third annual mixed Scotch foursomes invitation tournament.

Playing brilliantly via the alternate stroke route, the victorious duo fired a two-under-par gross tally of 34, 35—69 to capture gross honors by two shots over Pete Inglis and guest Mrs. Jerome Herbert of Old Oaks, who had 71.

Play was conducted under the "Pinehurst system" whereby partners take alternate shots and play the best of the second shots through the remainder of the hole.

Miss Orcutt, eight time Met champion and twice a losing finalist in the national championship, teamed up excellently with the former Leewood club champion in winning. They combined for four birdies, with Fisher providing the victory shot by holing out from off the edge for a winning birdie-3 at the 18th.

They also shared low net honors at 65 with the Inglis-Mrs. Herbert team, but naturally chose the

gross award. The runner-up had a net tally of 71-6-65.

Second net went to Mrs. Edward Campion and Gordon Park of Glen Ridge, N. J., with 76-9—67, while five other duos followed with nets of 68. A drawing gave third prize to Leewood champion Fred E. Wright and Mrs. Donald O'Brien of Winged Foot, with 72-4—68.

The tourney attracted one of the strongest fields ever to vie in the event, for included along with the aforementioned, were such standouts as Willie Turnesa, Mrs. Gordon Park, Mrs. William Tracy, Mrs. John H. Bartol, Dorothy Lowenstein, and Mrs. Arthur Flash.

Also in the deadlock at 66 were pro Steve Doctor of Siwanoy and Phil Flashnick with nines of 32, 34. Doctor had a par-matching 71 himself.

Brosch's round included six birdies and a bogey-5 at the 18th and a bogey-4 at the seventh.

Pete Cooper of Century had 70 himself while Fred Onnon of Ryewood, the new Westchester open champ, had 71.

Clarence Doser of Scarsdale, the Westchester P.G.A. champ, had 76, although he took a seven at the par-3 ninth with two shots out of bounds. Herman Barron of Fenway had putting difficulties and soared to 77.

No individual amateur scores were honored but best of the day was a 74 by Dr. Harold Fink and a 76 by Sam Eisenstark.

Jim Clark Meets Jim Turnesa In Ft. Wayne Playoff

FORT WAYNE, Ind.—Jimmy Turnesa of Elmsford, N. Y., and little known Jimmy Clark of Laguna Beach, Calif., clashed today in a special playoff in the \$15,000 Fort Wayne Open Golf Tournament.

The rivals clashed over the 18 hole route with the winner taking home \$2,400 and the loser \$1,800 today.

Turnesa, the new PGA champion, and pro at the Briar Hall Club in Briarcliff, N. Y., a 10-foot putt for a par-four at the 18th hole to post a 69 and his 16-under-par total of 272 for 72 holes.

Clark, who never led during the event shot a 67 yesterday for his 272.

Marty Furgol of Chicago finished third with 273, good for \$1,400 and National open champ Julius Boros of Mid Pines, N. C. tied with Fred Haas Jr. of New Orleans for fourth at 274.

Turnesa, who led the field with 203 going into the final round, didn't have a bad round in the tournament. His eight nine-hole scores consisted of six 34s, one 33 and one 35.

Doug Ford of Yorkers, N. Y., and Willows Country Club in Harrison, N. Y., was one of five pros to pull into a 277 tie for 10th place. Ford, after three sub-par rounds, slipped to 71 yesterday.

French Golf Course Gets Shade Of Napoleon

NEW BEDFORD, Mass. (AP)—The manager of a golf course in France, laid out on a one-time hunting preserve used by Napoleon, was delighted to get from a New Bedford tree fancier a descendant of the willow that shaded Napoleon's grave.

"There's hardly a willow around here that didn't come from Napoleon's grave," according to Laurence Books, retired cotton broker whose hobby now is wood and trees.

The island of St. Helena where Napoleon was exiled and died was a port of call for whaling vessels. Books pointed out, and many a New Bedford whaling captain and captain's wife broke off a twig from the willow over Napoleon's grave. It was brought home in a water-filled bottle to root in New Bedford soil.

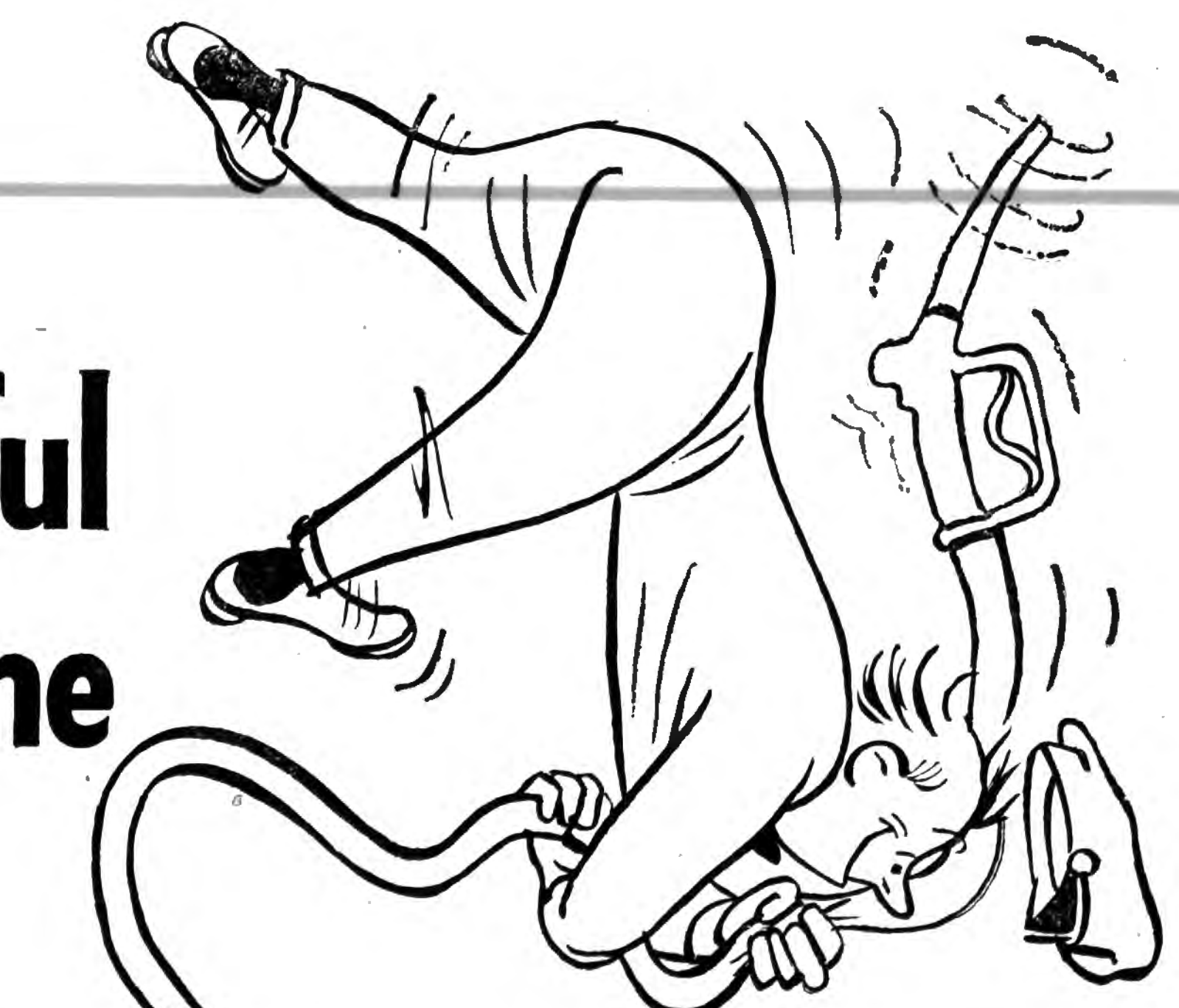
