IMPROVING ACCOMMODATION IN ASIA AND AFRICA



In Davao, Philippines, the members of the district of Asia have inaugurated the renovated buildings acquired by the district recently. On 17 October, the three formators and seven students moved into their new accommodation. For the past 22 years the property by the sea in Dumalag, loaned to the Marists, has been used for local and international formation. The new property is more suitable for the

students and has space for the building of a District house thereby consolidating two communities into one in Davao.

Also in Africa there is an ongoing process of improving the patrimony of the District. Currently the District is constructing a community residence at Obili, Yaoundé (Cameroun). It will be the district administrative centre, and a residence for the Marists working in the parish of Obili. The confreres will take up residence early in 2017.
