A small toll was taken en route in nearly all of these, but on the whole we are very lucky that the consignment arrived so safely. Everyone, last night, seemed to be walking about in a new pair of beautiful white shoes. They are very good ones, with rope soles, and are very much appreciated. I can only again ask you to convey from all our very best thanks to everyone who has contributed to sending us such a fine lot of comforts. Where we are now 91° is our hottest; last year same date about 105°."

When a party of the enemy had broken through the Brigade front he led the *personnel* of his Headquarters as a fighting formation, and, co-operating with the counter-attacking battalion, inflicted heavy losses on the enemy, and captured two machine guns and some prisoners. On the following day, when the enemy attacked in force, he organised and led a counter-attack with two companies. He repulsed the enemy and re-established and advanced the line. Later, when the enemy attacked some advanced posts, he counter-attacked and drove the enemy off with loss. ORTHES.

On February 27th, 1814, Wellington attacked Soult, who held the strongly fortified position of Orthes. Hill's Division, of which the 50th formed part, was posted opposite the bridge over the river Gave de Pau, but being unable to force the bridge, crossed the river somewhat higher up, and driving back the troops opposed to him, seized the heights beyond, thereby cutting off the town of Orthes, and intercepting the French retreat on Pau. Then Hill, learning of the success of the other attacks, advanced along the ridge in rear of Soult's position, parallel to another ridge, which was Soult's only line of retreat, and converging on it.

Both wings of Wellington's army, having now joined, were forcing back the French, who were vigorously contesting every inch of ground, when the imminent danger of being cut off by Hill, rendered their retreat hurried and confused. Hill, observing this, quickened his pace, till at last both sides began to run violently. Many men broke from the French ranks across the fields towards the fords; and such a rush was made to gain the bridges that the whole country was covered with scattered bands. The cavalry sabred many hundreds, and many prisoners were taken. Wellington himself was wounded in this affair. The 50th suffered but little loss.

The next morning, February 28th, Wellington pursued Soult in three columns. On March 2nd Hill, who commanded the right column, moved on Aire in two columns. The French, under Clauset, were posted in a strong position on a steep ridge in front of Aire. Hill's 2nd Division were at once sent against the French right, and the Portuguese against the centre; the former made a successful attack, but the latter failed, and being vigorously charged by the French, were put to flight. The 50th and 92nd were at once sent to the aid of the Portuguese, and "the vehement charge of these two regiments turned the stream of fight; the French were broken in turn, and thrown back on their reserves." Soult now retreated on Toulouse which Wellington attacked on April 10th, and compelled Soult to evacuate it on the following day. On the 12th official information was received from Paris of the abdication of Napoleon, and on the 21st a cessation of hostilities took place, which was succeeded by a general peace. On the breaking up of the army the 50th marched to Poliac via Bordeaux, from whence they embarked for Ireland on July 20th, and landed at Cork on the 31st of the same month.

PENINSULA.

The honour "Peninsula" borne on the Colours, was apparently bestowed on Regiments to commemorate minor actions in which they were engaged during the campaign. There were, however, three actions in which the 50th were engaged, the names of which are not borne on the Colours, viz., Fuentes d'Onor—Arroyo dos Molinos—and Toulouse. In all these battles the 50th were brigaded with the 71st and 92nd, and these two Regiments carry Fuentes d'Onor on their Colours—but none of these three Regiments have the other two. Surely all are entitled to the three distinctions.

It is to be noted that the Highland Light Infantry (71st and 74th) have Toulouse, but this was obtained from the 74th, not the 71st.

While Acting Adjutant during a vigorous offensive by the enemy he worked incessantly, though under heavy shell fire, night and day. Always cheerful, he set a splendid example and dealt with the situation in a very masterful way, being of the utmost assistance to his Commanding Officer during a very trying time. Regardless of personal safety, he went forward on many occasions and obtained good targets for artillery.

SECOND LIEUT. H. GUESS.

He displayed great courage in controlling his men during a determined hostile attack, and later, when the enemy penetrated the line, he organised his platoon to cover the portion that was broken, and then, counter-attacking regained all lost ground. His services were of the utmost value to his Company Commander.

SECOND LIEUT. G. S. L. HAYWARD (attached R.F.C.).

On three separate occasions when engaged with large hostile formations, he has attacked and sent crashing to earth two hostile machines on each occasion. He has displayed consistent skill, courage, and determination in dealing with hostile aircraft.

SECOND LIEUT. H. G. B. SLADE.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading counter-attacks on three separate occasions, when in spite of heavy rifle and machine gun fire, he succeeded in driving the enemy back, and inflicting heavy casualties on them. His coolness at critical times was most marked, and his skilful leadership proved of great assistance to his Commanding Officer.

ROAN SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

Our hearty thanks are again tendered to the Roan School for their unflinching generosity to our men. As will be seen from the following extract from their "Gazette," they have undertaken to contribute £100 a year towards our Prisoners of War Fund, in addition to their supply of "Comforts" for our fighting men. Truly a noble contribution. From "Roan Girls' Gazette" for July 19th:—

WAR NOTES.

(1) Since the events of last March, we know that a number of West Kent men are Prisoners of War in German hands. The Regimental Committee at Maidstone has made arrangements for the regular supply of parcels, and we have undertaken monthly contributions to be despatched on the 8th, for two prisoners for May and June and after; another has been adopted this month. We have already heard by Red Cross post-card that one set of parcels has been duly received in good order. These three "adoptions" means that our Troops Fund is now responsible for £8 6s. 6d. per month (including of course, our holidays). We shall still keep up the parcels to the men at the Front.

We sent 36 on 5th April and 12 on 31st May. The contents were chiefly stationery, socks, soap, towels, candles, with a proportion of tobacco and sweets. (2) We are knitting, by degrees, 30lbs. of wool for Mrs. Daniell, who provided it from the R.W.K. Regimental Fund. The socks produced will go direct to Maidstone for general use, and not in our own parcels. (3) A collection made at the performance of the French Plays on 9th April amounted to £3, and was sent to Cherbourg. Madame Martin was glad to use it for some of the refugees from the evacuated French towns. (4) On 4th July at the evening entertainment which again took the place of Miss Walker's "At Home," a contribution of £1 2s. was given for a little girl from the invaded territory.

SHORT STORIES OF BRAVE DEEDS.

With reference to the awards conferred as announced in the London Gazette, dated February 18th, 1918, the following are the statements of service for which the decorations were conferred:—

SECOND LIEUT. (TEMP. CAPTAIN) W. G. DOVE, M.C.

When an attack was held up he collected a few men, and with great courage and skill attacked and captured an enemy position which was held by greatly superior numbers, nearly all his party being killed or wounded. He was taken prisoner, but the enemy retired and he escaped, taking three prisoners. His Commanding Officer having been killed, he assumed command, and directed the attack with the greatest courage and disregard of all danger.

LIEUT. E. S. NICOLL.

He led his Company with great courage and determination under heavy fire, and took command of the whole line against a strong enemy force. He showed splendid energy and initiative.

PUNNIAR.

Towards the end of the year 1843 the army of the native State of Gwalior was in open rebellion against their ruler, who was supported by the Government of India, and a force was ordered to assemble under Sir Hugh Gough. The 50th was told off to the 2nd Infantry Brigade of the left wing of this army, under Major-General Sir John Grey, K.C.B.

This Brigade consisted of the 50th, the 50th and 58th Native Infantry Regiments, 9th Lancers, 11th Light Cavalry, 5th Light Cavalry, Horse Artillery, and Engineers under Brigadier-General Blackhall. Lieutenant-Colonel Anderson being in command of the 50th.

On December 18th the Brigade left Duboi, and forded the river Scinde on the 23rd. A halt was made at Somaree for a short time on the 27th. Here information was received that the Mahratta troops were in considerable force in the Autree Pass, about eight miles in front, on the main road to Gwalior. On the 28th Brigadier-General Blackhall met with a pistol accident, and Lieut.-Colonel Anderson assumed command of the Brigade, Major and Brevet Lieut.-Colonel Petit taking command of the Regiment.

On December 29th Sir J. Grey's force, leaving the Autree Pass on their right, moved on Himutgur and Punniar, in order to turn the right of the enemy's position.

The advanced guard of the 2nd Brigade was formed from their light companies, that of the 50th leading. The Brigade arrived on its camping ground about noon, after a hot march of 16 miles, having passed several of the enemy's forts on the way. Heavy firing commenced on our line of baggage about 2 p.m., and two hours later the enemy were observed taking up a strong position on a chain of hills.

The whole force was immediately ordered to be ready for action. The Buffs with the 1st Brigade marched off first and at 5 p.m. the 50th, with the rest of the 2nd Brigade, followed. For about three miles, they marched over the ground where the Buffs had been engaged, passing their killed and wounded, and a party of their men working one of the enemy's captured guns.

The 2nd Brigade were then ordered to attack the enemy's left, formed on the crest of a hill, a movement which they executed in a most brilliant manner.

The following description is from the diary of the Acting Adjutant of the Regiment:—

"We passed the General and his staff, who ordered us to clear a small valley to the right, the Buffs having gone to clear one on the left. As we reached the head of the hill, which overlooked the vale, we formed line on the Grenadier Company, and there being no room for the two native Regiments (50th and 58th) they remained in open column of companies. Directly we reached the top of the hill—as well as during our progress to the top—the enemy's cannon balls were falling right and left of us, but did no harm, being badly directed. We moved a few paces over the hill, when they opened a heavy fire of grape and canister upon us, with four guns planted about fifty paces from the bottom of the hill, besides a hot fire from their infantry, who were in a small ravine. We made the best of our way down the hill, which was very high and steep, keeping the best order possible, and continuing our fire the whole time. We halted at the bottom under cover of a small bank and hedge, keeping up our fire for about ten minutes, when we were ordered to charge which we did with a glorious cheer. But so well did the enemy stick to their guns, that the last discharge took place when we were within ten yards of them, and the gunners were only driven from their guns at the point of the bayonet. So determined were they, indeed, that until actually unable to move from wounds, they cut away with sharp sabres at our men, many of whom were severely wounded by them. Thus ended this short but sharp

skirmish with the capture of four guns (one a large brass one) and a few prisoners. It was 8 o'clock when we ceased firing, had it been light we should have done more execution. We collected our killed and wounded and marched home, the Regiment remaining under arms all night."

Captain Cobham and eight privates were killed, Lieut.-Colonel Anderson, commanding the Brigade, three sergeants, one drummer and 28 privates were severely wounded Major and Brevet-Lieut.-Colonel Petit, commanding the Regiment, had his horse shot under him, while leading the charge.

The following General Order was issued the next day:—
"The Major-General begs to congratulate the officers and men engaged with the enemy yesterday on the brilliant victory they have gained over a force five times their number, occupying a very strong position, defended by all their artillery and infantry. The former stood until cut down at their guns. No troops could have behaved more gallantly and fought under greater disadvantages, having come off a long and fatiguing march of 16 miles. Major-General Sir J. Grey, in his despatch, specially mentioned Lieut.-Colonel Petit and Captain Tudor, and commented on the gallant charge of the 50th."

The Governor-General of India also reported as follows:—
"The Buffs and the 50th added new lustre to the reputation they gained in the Peninsular War."

THE SPECIAL RESERVE BATTALION.**CRICKET.**

Below will be found the scores of ten cricket matches played by the Special Reserve Battalion up to date. This year we have a cricket team up to the standard of a good Public School side. The Battalion has only lost one match, the one with the S.R. Middlesex on the 25th May, and that only by 12 runs, and it will be noticed that "extras" won the match for them.

Of last year's team, so far only Captain Stone, Lieut. Fulcher and Captain Jones are available for the team. Of the new players, Lieut. R. F. Knight, the Northants County player, is a tower of strength to the batting, having already made a century. 2nd Lieut. D. C. A. Harris, Lieut. E. C. Lewin, 2nd Lieut. A. O. Hyland, 2nd Lieut. B. Howlett, and Lieut. R. D. Kent are all quite good bats, ably backed up by Captains Stone, Jones and R. B. L. Hill. Lewin is a most useful wicket-keeper.

The bowling is very strong; Howlett (last year's Sandhurst fast bowler), Fulcher, Stone, Lieut. D. D. Smith and Sergeant Johnson forming a good variety, and being quite capable of getting a good side out fairly cheaply. Lieut. R. D. Kent, M.C., is our Captain, with Fulcher and Smith as Joint Secretaries. In addition there are several reserve players of quite good capabilities. These include Captain C. Tuff, Captain H. U. Nisbet, Lieut. G. J. Joel and Lieut. Simes.

On the 26th of June we journeyed over to Mid Kent to play a Territorial Battalion of the Regiment. Great keenness was shown by both sides, as we knew that this Battalion were an unbeaten side. Our skipper won the toss and we went in first on a good batting wicket, starting at 11.50 a.m. and by lunch time we had 100 up for two wickets. After lunch Kent played a lively innings and with Howlett put on runs very quickly. The innings closed after a slight collapse for 200. We must here add that their best all-rounder, Captain Moorcroft, was away sick, but we were short of Stone, Hyland and Johnson, all suffering from "Spanish 'flu'." When our opponents started batting our team showed brilliant fielding and were thoroughly "on their toes," which put our bowlers on their best behaviour, determined to do their very best, which they did. After the first three good players had been got rid of things were easy for us, the whole side being out for 47. Our best thanks are due to our adversaries for the splendid way they entertained us and saw after our every want. Their band played during lunch and in the afternoon on the ground. Quite a number of wounded men watched the game with interest.

A very exciting finish occurred on the 15th June against the Special Reserve Batt. Wilts. After several thrilling incidents we just managed to get home by four runs. We were delighted to play against that fine sportsman, F. H. Knott, the Oxford and Kent player, who skippered the Wilts team very well.

So far drafts for overseas have not interfered with the side very much, but by the time these notes appear Fulcher, R. B. L. Hill and Wingfield will be across the water, and several other cricketers are expecting to go at any time.

In April we, or rather the "Surplus Officers," made an excellent cricket ground, but owing to various "tactical situations" we decamped to a delightful watering place several miles away, where no home ground can be made.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Since the outbreak of the war the difficulties in connection with the publication of "The Queen's Own Gazette" have steadily increased. Many of our contemporaries have unfortunately been compelled to suspend publication, and all have either appealed for donations, or raised the subscriptions to enable them to carry on. Happily up to date we have, owing to the generosity of the Battalions, kept our head above water. We are now, however, in danger of being submerged.

The four years of war have affected the publishers and the printing trade to a very serious extent, the price of paper is now four times what it was in 1914, and the postage, if the Gazette consists of over ten pages, doubled.

To quote an example:—The publishers' bill for the issue of August, 1917 (2,300 copies, 14 pages) came to £16 8s. 10d., whereas the issue of August, 1918 (2,350 copies, 14 pages), cost £30 8s. 8d. To this must be added the postage, which on the month's issue amounted to £4 15s. 7d. The cost of each copy being therefore over 3½d.

We have now on our books 661 subscribers at 4s. and 146 (N.C.O.'s and men) at 2s., *i.e.*, an annual income of £146 16s. plus about £11 for advertisements.

We, however, fear the number of our subscribers are diminishing for whereas 92 subscriptions expired last July only 32 of these had been renewed on Sept. 1st. We are reducing our expenses as much as possible by not reproducing photographs, by the use of smaller type, and by limiting the number of the pages. We do not consider we can possibly use a paper of inferior quality. The situation, therefore, is as follows:—The lowest cost of the Gazette per month must be put at from £30 to £35, *i.e.*, £360 to £420 per annum. From £200 to £260 must be raised therefore if the paper is to be carried on for another 12 months. There was a balance debt of £22 12s. 3d. on Sept. 1st, to meet which we have £95 invested in War Loan, which must now be realised unless help is given quickly.

About 1,000 copies are issued free every month to Battalions on Service, and to Hospitals, which at 3½d. per copy amounts to £175 per annum, from which there is no return.

There are three courses open to us:

- (1) To discontinue the free issues, and limit each number to 8 or 10 pages.
- (2) To increase all subscriptions to 12s. per annum (N.C.O.'s and men to 6/-).
- (3) To treble the number of subscribers.

To adopt the first alternative would, we consider, be a calamity, as the free issues are much appreciated.

As to the other two alternatives, even if we get the requisite number of subscribers it would take many months before the increased income would be appreciable.

We can, therefore, think of only one remedy, and that is in the hands of the Regiment itself. Does the Regiment consider the Queen's Own Gazette worth keeping up or not? If so, we must ask for a donation of £2 per month from each Battalion and from the Depot to enable us to carry on. We are deeply sensible of the generosity that has been extended to us hitherto by most of the Battalions, and it is with great hesitation that we ask for this, but if it is not forthcoming we shall be compelled to suspend publication at the end of the year. Donations, however small, from individuals, will also be welcome. We may add that the Q.O.G. is the oldest Regimental paper in existence, having been first published in 1875. Is it worth keeping up or not?

MOODKEE.

In November, 1845, the Sikh army was reported to be making preparations to cross the Sutlej river at a time of profound peace with the avowed intention of attacking Ferozepore. They crossed this river on December 13th, and their whole army encamped near Ferozepore on the 16th.

The 50th was inspected at Ludiana by the Governor-General, Sir H. Hardinge, on December 11th, who told them that they would soon be employed. He stopped near the Colours of the Regiment and told Colonel Ryan that he hoped his men would behave as he had seen the old 50th do in the Peninsula. The Colonel replied that "they were only anxious to be tried." On the 13th the Regiment received orders to march at daybreak on 14th, and reached Busseau at sunset after a fatiguing march of 30 miles over sandy roads, no tents or baggage coming up until the following morning. General Sir H. Smith and the Umballa Force came into camp on the 15th, and his Division was composed as follows:

1st Brigade, under Brigadier-General Hicks: 31st Regiment, 24th and 47th Native Infantry.

2nd Brigade, under Brigadier-General Wheeler: 50th Regiment, 42nd and 48th Native Infantry.

Prince Waldemar of Prussia, who had been attached to the 50th for the past six weeks, accompanied the Regiment. (The doctor in attendance on him was killed later at the battle of Ferozeshah).

At 3 a.m. on the 16th the 2nd Brigade marched off, being the leading Brigade of the whole army, the 50th being the leading Regiment of the Brigade. Wudnee, 17 miles off, was reached about 1 p.m., and the next morning marched to Bhago Pooranah about 10 miles distant. They continued their march at 4 a.m. on the 18th, and after a fatiguing march of 17 miles, during which they suffered from want of water, they halted close to the village of Moodkee, the Light Company and No. 8 being ordered out on picket.

At 3 a.m. the whole force was called to arms, the enemy having taken up a strong position on our front. The 50th was formed in Quarter Column, left in front on the extreme right of the line of infantry, having the 3rd Light Dragoons and a battery of Artillery on its right front. In this order it advanced, and formed line just before coming within cannon range of the enemy, the Artillery still maintaining their position on its right. The Brigade at first formed square to resist the enemy's cavalry, but Sir H. Smith ordered the 50th to reform line and advance, which it immediately did, closing with the Sikhs with three cheers, and after a desperate struggle, during which the enemy stood their ground, and returned volley for volley, by a final charge the 50th succeeded in capturing the guns opposed to them and driving back the enemy's infantry. The Native Infantry Regiments remained in square for some time after the advance of the 50th, and the fire of one of them came into our ranks.

The losses of the Regiment were 3 officers and 25 other ranks killed, and 3 officers and 94 other ranks wounded.

During the advance Brigadier-General Wheeler was wounded, Colonel Ryan taking command of the Brigade, and Major and Brevet Lieut.-Colonel Petit the command of the Regiment. Both these officers had their horses shot under them.

SHORT STORIES OF BRAVE DEEDS.

With reference to the awards conferred as announced in the "London Gazette" dated March 26th, 1918, the following are the statements of service for which the decorations were conferred:—

MILITARY CROSS.

TEMP. 2nd LIEUT. F. CARVILLE.

During a raid on the enemy's trenches he led his men with great courage and determination into the enemy's lines, and personally accounted for two of the enemy. Though he was twice wounded, he succeeded in withdrawing all his party safely, after being out for more than two hours.

* * * * *

2nd LIEUT. (TEMP. LIEUT.) A. W. CATT, attached Nigeria Regiment. (Since Died).

He rendered invaluable assistance to his Commanding Officer, and when the latter became a casualty, he assumed command, and continued to hold the line until the enemy retired. He has previously displayed fine soldierly qualities in action.

* * * * *

TEMP. 2nd LIEUT. F. J. JANAWAY.

During a raid on the enemy's trenches he blew a gap in the enemy's wire under heavy fire from the enemy. During the raid he remained for three hours in the enemy's wire, sending back valuable information as to the progress of the raid, though he was continually fired on by the enemy. He also brought some wounded men back to safety. He showed splendid coolness and courage throughout.

2nd LIEUT. (ACTING CAPTAIN) H. WILKIN.

He, during the attack, behaved with splendid courage and coolness, moving about under heavy shell fire so as to obtain the greatest possible amount of observation.

NOTES FROM INDIA.

The Depot Royal West Kent Regiment officially no longer has any existence and is now known as No. 3 Company of a Reserve Battalion (India). We have now been in Bangalore for over sixteen months, and your readers perhaps may have wondered that no news of us has appeared in the "Queen's Own Gazette."

This lack of news is not the fault of your correspondent, who sent you twelve months ago a long letter giving all the Depot news, but this letter presumably was lost at sea, for it does not seem to have reached its destination.

However, the absence of news from us in the columns of the "Q.O.G." will no doubt have been to some extent compensated for by news through private channels, for since our arrival in Bangalore at the beginning of February, 1917, we have had drafts from Home.

The Depot, which up to February, 1917, had been included in a Combined British Infantry Depot had been stationed since July, 1916, at Bhurban in the Murree Hills, and at Chak-Lala Camp near Rawal-Pindi, arrived at the beginning of February, 1917, at Bangalore, having on the journey from Rawal-Pindi traversed a distance of more than two thousand miles, and having spent a week in a crowded train. At Bangalore the old Combined Depot which had existed at Bhurban and Chak-Lala was broken up, the Depot formed part of a new Combined British Infantry Depot, No. 4. Captain A. K. Searight temporarily commanded the Combined Depot; Captain A. K. Searight temporarily commanded the Combined Depot; Captain G. Bonham-Carter commanded the Battalion Depot, and Lieut. E. C. Hilder was the only other West Kent Officer. Sergeant J. E. Wright was Acting Regimental Sergeant-Major, and Quartermaster-Sergeant A. L. Bellion was Regimental Quartermaster-Sergeant to the Combined Depot. Sergeant Vickery was Orderly Room Sergeant; and Sergeant Rouse was Band Sergeant. Other Warrant Officers and N.C.O.'s attached to the Depot were Company Sergeant-Major Clear, C.S.M. Cockle, Sergt. Purkis, Sergt. Bamblett, Sergt. Rowland, Corporal (Acting C.Q.M.S.) Laws, Corpl. (Acting C.Q.M.S.) Gill, Sergt. Kill, Corpl. (now Acting Sergeant) Mitchell, Corpl. Pierce, Corpl. Gibbs (now Acting Sergeant) F. Hunt. Non-Commissioned Officers who joined us later were: Sergt. R. Hunt, Sergt. Reeves, Seigt. Feist, Sergt. Larking, Corpl. Squires (who has since obtained a commission), and in order to deal with drafts of recruits which soon began to arrive numerous acting promotions have gradually been made, as, for instance: Acting Sergt. Wilkinson, Acting Sergt. Crouch, Acting Sergt. West, Acting Sergt. Stanway (who has lately obtained a commission), Acting Lance-Sergt. Runacres, Acting Lance-Sergt. Strickland (Kut prisoner), and others.

No more West Kent Officers arrived until May, when 2nd Lieut. Vine-Stevens joined the Depot from sick leave, and it was not until September, 1917, that there were any further arrivals. Since then Officers have been coming and going every month.

An Officer well known to many readers of the "Q.O.G." who has now been in Bangalore 17 months, but has not during that time been with our Depot, is Lieut.-Colonel (Temp.) C. W. Case-Morris. Whilst still a Captain, Colonel Case-Morris, having been invalidated from Mesopotamia, Commanded the Depot Royal West Kent Regiment soon after its formation, and was afterwards for a time Adjutant to the Combined Depot at Bhurban, Murree Hills, and at Chak-Lala Camp, Rawal-Pindi. Having then attained the rank of Major, in December, 1916, he was appointed Commandant of the British Details Camp at Deolali. He only held this appointment for about six weeks, for at the beginning of 1917 he was ordered to Bangalore and given Command of the Combined British Infantry Depot No. 3. On the reorganisation of the Bangalore Brigade in January, 1917, No. 3 Depot was broken up, and Colonel Case-Morris was then made C.O. of a Reserve Battalion (India), the appointment which he now holds.

Since the beginning of May numerous N.C.O.'s and men have been arriving in Bangalore on furlough from Mesopotamia. Furlough men are allowed to go to any place which they may choose, with a few exceptions, but all must come first to their Regimental Depots, and if they like they may remain for the whole of their furlough at the Military Station of their Depot. The men are quartered in separate furlough camps under specially detailed Officers and N.C.O.'s. They are allowed as much liberty as is possible, consistently with good order and discipline. A good deal has been done this year for their entertainment by the Military Authorities and the Residents of Bangalore, so it is to be hoped that they enjoy their furlough. Furlough in India cannot be anything but a poor substitute for furlough spent at home, but at any rate India is a good deal better than Mesopotamia, and compared with England has the advantage of plentiful supplies of provisions of all sorts, and has no necessity for food tickets, or for such regulations as lighting restrictions, curfew orders, and so forth, which vex the soul of people at home.

Of other events affecting the Depot there is not much to say. Life at a Regimental Depot in India is now-a-days not exactly a rest cure, and we are kept hard at work. The old pre-war Thursday holiday has long been abolished, and not only is every forenoon well filled up with training, lectures and the numerous fatigues inevitable in every large Military Station, but afternoon parades and night operations are frequent. However we do find some time for games, and we have had Depot, and of late Company, matches in cricket, football and hockey. We also have had some boxing competitions, cross-country races, and one athletic sports meeting. Last year the Combined British Infantry Depot No. 4, with a team composed partly of West Kent men and partly of Connaught Rangers, of which Pte. Highams was centre forward, in the final round against the Combined British Infantry Depot No. 3, after playing two matches which resulted in ties, at the third were successful in beating their opponents after a hard game, and won the Brigade Tournament Challenge Cup. In one of the Brigade Boxing Competitions, a Novices' Competition, our men by winning more events than any other Regiment, gained a small silver cup. Acting Sergeant Gibbs, Private G. Hill and Drummer Dartnell entered for the Southern India Open Boxing Tournament at Madras in May, 1918. Sergeant Gibbs won his first bout and was only just beaten on points in his fight with Corporal Woods, A.S.C., heavy-weight champion of Southern India. In the Feather-weights, Drummer Dartnell was just beaten by Pte. Holman, R.E. He had another very good fight, a special contest with Sergeant Cook, Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry, last year's All India Feather-weight Champion, but had to own himself beaten by retiring in the seventh round. In the Open Light-weights, Pte. C. Hill won his fights in his first two contests. His fight against Private Davies, A.S.C., was a very good one, and was only won after an extra round. Unfortunately owing to a bad cut over the eye, under the Medical Officer's orders he was obliged to scratch in the final round.

Under the new organisation of Reserve Battalions, our Officers and men are not all in one company, so that there is little opportunity for regimental matches and competitions, and the men do not seem to show quite the same keenness about games. The Training Battalion, which had so short a life, nevertheless entered a team for the All India Association Football Tournament, and was successful in carrying off the fine challenge cup given by Messrs. Murray and Co., of Lahore, but the Battalion had no representative in the team except one waiting man, Sergeant Mitchell, and he did not have a chance of playing. An Inter-Brigade Cricket Tournament is shortly to be started.

Captain M. Robertson is Sports Officer to a Reserve Battalion, and has shown much energy in organising matches. He also arranged an athletic meeting with Colonel Case-Morris's Battalion, in which the former Battalion was just defeated. Captain Robertson is also our best cricketer both with bat and ball, with both of which he has done some very good performances in Battalion and Company matches.

Bangalore has the reputation of being one of the most healthy Military Stations in India. It has for India a temperate climate, the thermometer even during the hot weather scarcely ever touching 100 degrees F. in the shade, and not often exceeding 96 degrees F. The hottest months are March, April and May. With the coming of the monsoon, which usually arrives at the beginning of June, the temperature at once falls about 10 degrees F. The nights and early mornings are always cool, the night temperature seldom, except in the hottest weather rising above 70 degrees F. There is a second hot weather about the time of the autumn equinox, but as the rains are not then completely over, the heat is not excessive. Bangalore is only 13 degrees north of the Equator, the same latitude as Madras, but it stands on a tableland 3,000 feet above the sea level, and it is to its high situation and to the fact that both on East and West it is only 200 miles from the sea, that it owes its temperate climate. The rainfall of Bangalore averages 37 inches.

December, January and February are the driest, as well as the coldest, months in the year, and, except for the dust, to an Englishman this season is the most pleasant. The Military Cantonments of Bangalore occupy an area of about two miles square in the eastern part of the town, and are bordered on the south by an irregular shaped tract of undulating and broken waste ground four or five miles square, called Agram Plain, which offers excellent opportunities for military training. The Civil Administration of the Cantonments is in the hands of a magistrate directly appointed by the British Government, but

the rest of Bangalore comes under the ordinary rule of the Maharajah of Mysore, who is one of the most important rulers of Indian protected States. Bangalore is a beautiful place. At first glance, at any rate, it is an ideal garden city. It covers an extent of ground about four miles every way, and is full of beautiful and umbrageous gardens, public and private, and of large open spaces. It is traversed by wide roads and avenues. The bungalows of the European and of the more wealthy members of the Indian population stand in large compounds, and having their walls distempered in colours, with pillared verandahs and red tiled roofs, in the bright Indian sunshine they are always picturesque, and sometimes also architecturally pleasing. There are several large Churches and some handsome public buildings, which relieve the usual monotony of one-storied bungalows, and are landmarks for all the country round. There are also some remarkable Hindu temples and an old Fort. The only parts of Bangalore which have nothing of the air of pleasant spaciousness, otherwise the characteristic of the place, are the Indian commercial quarters, which present the usual aspect of Indian bazaars, with small houses, narrow, smelly streets, and picturesque, but dirty inhabitants.

BATTLE OF THE FIFTH ARMY IN MARCH.

The following is taken from an article with the above heading, published in the "National Review" for October:

"Of the many incidents of heroism which were done this day (March 22nd) showing the grand spirit of resolution, self-sacrifice and coolness which animated the troops of the Fifth Army, two or three may be mentioned. During the afternoon a message was received from the O.C. 7th Royal West Kents 'Holding out, Boche all round within fifty yards. Can only see fifty yards, so it is difficult to kill the blighters.'"

AN APPRECIATION.

Lieut Colonel J. P. Dalison having relinquished the command of the Depot, Major General Sir E. Leach, K.C.B. Colonel of the Regiment, desires to place on record his high appreciation of the very efficient manner in which he has carried out the work connected with the Comforts Fund, and the Care of our Prisoners of War. He heartily regrets that Lieut. Colonel Dalison is leaving the Depot, and thanks him not only personally but in the name of all the Battalions of The Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment for the untiring work and devo'ed interest he has displayed in all matters affecting the welfare of the Regiment.

REWARDS FOR SERVICES IN THE FIELD.

The King has been pleased to approve of the award of the VICTORIA CROSS to the undermentioned Non-Commissioned Officer:—

No. 1937 CORPORAL FREDERICK GEORGE COPPINS, Manitoba, R.

For conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty when, during an attack, his platoon came unexpectedly under fire of numerous machine guns. It was not possible to advance or to retire and no cover was available. It became apparent that the platoon would be annihilated unless the enemy machine guns were silenced immediately. Cpl. Coppins, without hesitation and on his own initiative, called on four men to follow him, and leapt forward in face of intense machine-gun fire. With his comrades he rushed straight for the machine guns. The four men with him were killed and Cpl. Coppins wounded. Despite his wounds he reached the hostile machine guns alone, killed the operator of the first gun and three of the crew, and made prisoners of four others, who surrendered.

Cpl. Coppins, by this act of outstanding valour, was the means of saving many lives of the men of his platoon, and enabled the advance to be continued.

Despite his wound, this gallant N.C.O. continued with his platoon to the final objective, and only left the line when it had been made secure and when ordered to do so.

Corporal Coppins after serving four years in our 1st Battalion emigrated to Canada, and joined the Canadian Forces in September, 1915.

This information has been sent to us by Co.-Sergt.-Major W. F. Horton, who says "This news will be highly appreciated by all of 'The Queen's Own' through your wonderful little paper."

VICTORIA CROSS.

We have received information, just as we are going to press, that the Victoria Cross has been awarded to 358 Sergt. T. J. Harris, who, we regret to state, was killed on August 8th, while attacking single-handed a hostile machine gun, after having previously put two others with their detachments out of action.

The King has been pleased to approve of the following awards to the undermentioned Officers, W.O.'s, N.C.O.'s and men of the Regiment in recognition of gallantry and devotion to duty in the field:—

BAR TO D.S.O.

TEMP. MAJOR (ACTING LIEUT.-COL.) H. J. WENYON, D.S.O.

He organised defences against heavy enemy attacks, and held vastly superior numbers of the enemy at bay, inflicting heavy losses on them. He set a very fine example of courage and good leadership. (D.S.O. gazetted October 18th, 1917, published in "Q.O.G." November, 1917).

D.S.O.

TEMP. CAPTAIN V. HOLDEN, M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy advance. When his Battalion was surrounded he withdrew his company with marked skill through the enveloping enemy and collected men near him and formed a new line of defence. Throughout his fine leadership and coolness under most difficult circumstances were of a high order.

BAR TO THE M.C.

TEMP. CAPTAIN L. G. PRESTON, M.C.

During a raid by his Battalion, he was in command of the first wave and remained in the enemy line for over an hour, although all his subalterns became casualties early in the raid. His splendid example inspired those under him and the raid was a complete success. After getting his men safely back to the front line, he went about "No Man's Land" searching for wounded. (M.C. gazetted Sept. 26th, 1917, published in "Q.O.G." October, 1917).

MILITARY CROSS.

TEMP. CAPT. (ACTING MAJOR) A. S. BROWN.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the first attempt of a raiding party, organised by the Battalion, had been unsuccessful this Officer was entrusted with the arrangements and conduct of a second effort. He personally went out and laid a tape across "No Man's Land" to within 50 yards of the enemy's trenches, when he was heavily fired on. Returning to his own lines, he took command of the party who had assembled, and, guided by the tape, he successfully launched them into the enemy trenches. He then took up a position on the enemy's parapet and directed the fighting parties in the trenches, where they did much damage and captured prisoners. He remained there until all these parties had returned to their lines. His energy and resource were conspicuous, and the success of the second raid, after the first attempt had failed, was largely due to the fine example of personal courage set by him.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. STACEY CHEEL.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy advance. When most of the Officers in the Battalion had become casualties, he collected all men near him and organised them for defence. Throughout his work was of a high order, and he was of great service to his Acting Battalion Commander.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. J. B. CRYER.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. Though severely wounded he remained visiting the posts under very heavy machine-gun and shell fire, and later assisted in a successful counter-attack. Though greatly weakened through loss of blood, he remained at duty till the Battalion was ordered to withdraw. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. W. J. GODDARD.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in a successful counter-attack under heavy machine-gun and shell fire, kept his men well in hand, and maintained his position under extremely heavy fire during the next day.

TEMP. LIEUT. E. O. GOULDEN.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. He carried out a series of very valuable reconnaissances under heavy fire and brought back information which materially assisted the defence. Throughout he behaved with great gallantry and set a fine example to all ranks.

CAPTAIN F. C. LOVETT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a counter-attack by his Battalion. He showed splendid leadership and personal hold upon his men, and led them through heavy machine-gun and shell fire successfully to his objective. He was severely wounded.

SECOND LIEUT. D. T. PIGGOTT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. A raid on the enemy's trenches organised by the Battalion having been unsuccessful, and volunteers for a second attempt being called for, this Officer at once came forward, and without preparation or previous examination of the ground led one half of the party, boldly penetrating along some 50 yards of the enemy's trenches, doing much damage and capturing two prisoners. His conduct throughout was most fearless, and the success of his section of the raiding party was chiefly due to his inspiring leadership.

SECOND LIEUT. H. L. SHRIMPTON.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty after an ammunition and gun-cotton dump had been blown up by enemy shell fire near the Battalion transport lines. Although badly shaken, having been thrown some distance by the explosion, he organised rescue parties, and got both soldiers and civilians out of burning buildings, though high explosive shells were bursting round, and explosions from the dump continued. He also assisted to save about fifty horses.

TEMP. LIEUT. H. R. SMITH.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when his company was held up by heavy and continuous machine-gun fire from an enemy post. With a party of Lewis gunners he worked his way round the flank of this post and brought a heavy fire to bear on it, enabling the remainder of his company to advance, and himself led the final assault, capturing the post. He set a splendid example of dash and good leadership.

SECOND LIEUT. B. STEPHENS.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the enemy had secured a footing in a forward trench he promptly organised a cutting-out party and went fearlessly over the open to attack the enemy from a flank. He was badly wounded, but entirely successful in dislodging the enemy and re-establishing the position.

SECOND LIEUT. P. H. TYLER.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while commanding a post with a small garrison against enemy attacks. He was wounded early in the day, but continued to hold his post with the greatest determination, and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. G. A. E. WALLIS.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After a first unsuccessful attempt, this Officer and the raiding party of which he was in command penetrated into the enemy's trenches, where they did considerable damage and secured prisoners. Having given orders to his men to withdraw with their prisoners, he himself remained in the enemy's trenches until all his parties had retired. Throughout the operations he acted with great coolness and determination, setting a most inspiring example of personal courage to all under his command.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. R. P. WOODYEAR.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading his company in an attack on an enemy position under heavy machine-gun and shell fire. He led his men with great dash, and never wavered until the objective was reached. He consolidated his position and maintained it until relieved. By his determination he succeeded in restoring a critical situation.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. W. R. VINCE.

During an enemy attack, after the enemy had penetrated the line, he led forward his platoon of the reserve with the greatest dash, and drove them back. After this he took up a position with his own men and others and held it all day against several hostile attacks. He behaved splendidly.

ATTACHED OFFICERS.

TEMP. LIEUT. R. P. BUSH, CHESHIRE REGT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in commanding his company. He personally superintended the establishment of a Lewis gun post and so held up the enemy for some hours, and caused them heavy casualties. Later, he carried a wounded non-commissioned officer to a place of safety. Throughout he inspired his men with confidence by his example, untiring energy, and fearlessness under heavy fire.

CAPTAIN S. G. THOMPSON (YEOMANRY).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. He commanded his company most successfully, showing fine courage and sound judgment. He was of great assistance to his Commanding Officer under very difficult circumstances, and throughout set a high example to his men.

BAR TO D.C.M.**1219 REGT. SERGEANT-MAJOR R. RANKIN, D.C.M.**

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during enemy attacks. He did invaluable work in assisting in organising defensive positions. Throughout very heavy fighting he showed untiring energy and fine courage. Thanks to him the men in the forward posts were never short of ammunition. (D.C.M. gazetted January 1st, 1917, published in "Q.O.G." January, 1917).

6884 CO. SERGT.-MAJOR J. COOPER, D.C.M.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy advance. When his Company Officers had all become casualties he took charge of the company, and by his organisation and coolness under heavy shell and machine-gun fire he held it together until relieved of his command by an officer. He set a fine example to all. (D.C.M. gazetted August 25th, 1917, published in "Q.O.G." September, 1917).

D.C.M.**205807 CO. SERGT.-MAJOR W. J. BYRNE.**

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. This W.O., after an ammunition and gun cotton dump had been blown up by enemy shell fire, although badly shaken by the explosion, immediately organised rescue parties, and showed both courage and coolness in rescuing soldiers and civilians from the burning buildings, while explosions continued to occur and shells to fall in the destroyed area.

6525 SERGEANT E. H. CHERRIMAN, M.M.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. He repeatedly performed dangerous tasks with efficiency, and one night went out alone and captured one of an enemy patrol.

2240 SERGEANT W. G. FOOT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great skill and gallantry, and under heavy machine-gun fire gained his objective, and maintained his position.

5915 LANCE-CORPL. G. T. OGILVIE.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an attack on an advanced trench. He brought an abandoned Lewis gun into action under heavy shell and machine-gun fire, and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. Later he guided an ambulance back alone under heavy fire and brought in a wounded officer. He behaved magnificently.

1575 CO. SERGT.-MAJOR A. T. ROFFEY.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gave great assistance to his Company Commander during a counter-attack, and under heavy machine-gun fire did much to help in successfully gaining the objective. Throughout he set a fine example to his men.

2506 PRIVATE A. E. SMITH.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an enemy attack. Under heavy shell fire he got away much valuable material. Also he kept exposing himself most gallantly, and encouraged men to stubbornly resist the enemy. This young soldier set a fine example of courage and determination.

470 LANCE-CORPL. (ACTING SERGT.) G. TOMKINS.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Having taken up a position with his platoon and "dug in" under heavy fire of all descriptions, he defended the position until the companies on either flank had been withdrawn and were established in fresh positions. On four separate occasions he went along the line with important messages, though exposed to heavy fire. He rendered valuable service to his Company Commander during a most trying period, keeping his men well in hand and inspiring them with confidence by his courage and spirited behaviour.

19762 LANCE-SERGT. J. WHITE.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol to locate a hostile machine-gun which was causing casualties in his company. He rushed this with his party, killed two of the team, and took another prisoner. Finally he got two of his men who were wounded safely back. He showed fine courage and initiative.

"In memory of the Officers, N.C.O.'s. and Men of the Royal West Kent Regiment who fell in the attack and capture of Flers on September 15th, 1916."

THE 5th and 12th DIVISIONS.

The following is taken from the "Times" of September 16th:—

The Fifth Division furnished one brigade to co-operate with the Canadians in the attack on Vimy Ridge in the Battle of Arras last year. The brigade took part in the very hard fighting which went on from April 9 onwards, and especially on the 13th, when some men of the 5th Division fought their way much ahead of the line and, it is believed, penetrated into La Coulotte. At the end of June troops of the 5th Division took part in the attack on the trenches near Oppy, when we captured about 2,000 yards of fiercely-defended trench line, and took 240 prisoners. This year, when they came into the fighting east of the Forest of Nieppe, it was the 5th Division which broke the German attacks around Epinette. On August 21st it was one of the attacking division in the line by Puisieux, and fought its way in the next fortnight for some 8,000 yards in the face of stubborn resistance.

The 12th was one of the divisions which had the hardest work in the Battle of Arras last year. In the original attack on April 9th it was south of the Scarpe, and had to fight its way over ground extremely strongly defended with scattered works, of which the Hun and Holt and Chapel Redoubts were the most famous. Later it had the terrible fighting of May 3rd and 13th, and other days again on the south side of the Scarpe in the Monchy area. On the former of the two dates some East Kents fought their way most gallantly into Keeling Copse, and on the latter date it shared in the attack on the Devil's Trench. At Cambrai the 12th attacked from near Villers-Plouich and broke through both the front and support lines of the Hindenburg system, and it was on it with two other divisions that the weight of the German attack on the south side of the salient burst on November 30th.

One of our Battalions was in the Brigade that co-operated with the Canadians at Vimy Ridge.—Ed.

DEAR SIR,

Perhaps a few words about the work being done here by the Prisoners of War Care Committee may be of interest to your readers.

This Committee came into existence in February, 1918, and shortly after it had begun work Mr. J. L. Spoor, who had for some two-and-a-half years voluntarily looked after our Prisoners of War, died.

The packing and despatch of food at that time was transferred from some 13 Local Associations in Kent to the Central Committee's Offices at 4, Thurloe Place, London, where it is still being done.

The Care Committee's Offices are in these Barracks, and Captain Lees, late 2nd Battalion Royal West Kent Regiment, is Honorary Secretary and deals with the correspondence, which gives him long hours in the office, entailing the replies to endless enquiries to the relations of some 1,903 prisoners.

The work of the Financial Secretary is even more arduous, and for this duty we were lucky enough to secure the services of A. P. Margetts, Esq., a Maidstone man, whose untiring efforts have resulted in the collection since he took over, of some £8,000. His cash Ledger contains over 1,000 different accounts, and is most complicated, and only an extremely expert business man could touch it.

At last we have been able to take over the packing and despatch of our men's clothing, and in spite of a move of quarters, owing to a case of spotted fever, by which we lost an entire week, Mrs. Daniell and her company of devoted lady helpers have supplied the clothing, boots and necessaries for 783 men, which entailed the despatch of 2,348 parcels.

The work entailed in this department is most strenuous and we have been most fortunate in obtaining the services of Mrs. Daniell, who also runs the Comforts Fund, and, extraordinary to relate, her greatest anxiety and difficulty is to get the relations of the prisoners to answer her applications for their men's sizes; even after three applications in many hundreds of cases, she is still without this essential information, and the men in consequence go without their clothes. I hope this may catch the eye of some of the delinquents and be the cause of their supplying the information at once. The following is a list of the present lady helpers, to whom the thanks of the Regiment are most gratefully offered.

MR. FRANK HYDE'S NEW PICTURE.

"Trones Wood."

Mr. Frank Hyde's "Historical Picture of Trones Wood," now on exhibition in the Benthif Gallery of the Maidstone Museum, will add considerably to the reputation of the artist as a successful painter of battle incidents. The glorious stand of the Royal West Kents in Trones Wood has been described in graphic language by several famous writers, including Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, who says:—

"There was an epilogue which was as honourable to the troops concerned as the main attack had been. This concerns the fate of the men of the West Kent, who, as will be remembered, had been cut off in the wood. The main body of these, under the Regimental Adjutant Captain P. N. Anstruther, D.S.O., M.C., together with a few men of the Queen's, formed a small defensive position, and held out in the hope of relief. They were about 200 all told, and their position seemed so hopeless that every excuse might have been made for surrender. They held out all night, however, and in the morning they were successfully relieved by the advance of the 54th Brigade. Once in the early dawn a German officer actually came up to them under the impression that they were his own men—his last mistake on earth! It is notable that the badges of six different German regiments were found in the wood, which seemed to indicate that it was held by picked men or volunteers from many units. 'To the death!' was the password for the night."

Mr. Hyde could scarcely have found a subject more worthy of his brush. His picture depicts how this small, resolute band of West Kents, having become separated from the main body, had determined to defend to the last man their hastily improvised position. A spot had been chosen by them where the undergrowth was not quite so thick as in the other parts of the wood. A shell hole had been strengthened with few old shell bags, for it must be remembered that this wood had been lost and retaken several times after most desperate fighting. The fortunate possession of several Lewis guns had enabled the West Kents to hold out for a considerable time. After hours of strenuous fighting, however, their last cartridge had been fired, and all seemed lost, when suddenly from out of the wood on their right rang out the cheers of the relieving force. Behind the gallant Kent men can be seen puffs of smoke from the rifles of the Germans hidden in the wood, connecting up with those in the foreground of the picture on the left, thus forming a devastating circle of fire round these desperate defenders. On the right, hidden in the branches of a willow tree, are shown a couple of Boche snipers, who had been taken a deadly toll of the brave little band clustering in their cramped position, but both snipers were speedily dealt with by the relieving force. In the middle distance, near a smashed gun, legging it for their lives, are depicted other Germans, but they are too late to save their skins; everyone of them was accounted for including those in the foreground, in whose brutal faces can be seen the abject terror which they have for the bayonet of the British 'Tommys. In the stagnant pool is a wonderfully realistic representation of the final tragedy of a life and death struggle between a West Kent and a Boche that had taken place in one of the previous attacks on the historic wood. As one gazes on this desolate scene of smashed trees, burning grass, and dead men half hidden in the gas-saturated vegetation, one catches a glimpse on a distant hill of a burning sugar factory, set alight by our own shells; the red glow of the consuming fire being in weird contrast to the cold yellow light of the breaking dawn.

No charge is made to view this painting, but a box is placed in the gallery for contributions towards the fund for the permanently disabled men of the West Kent Rgt. At the two previous exhibitions of Mr. Hyde's pictures in Maidstone £70 was raised for this deserving fund, and it is hoped that as a result of the present exhibition this sum will be increased to £100.

An object of great interest is exhibited with the picture—a stick bomb taken from a German trench in Trones Wood and lent by Lieut. Bartholomew.

Mr. Hyde informed a representative of the "Kent Messenger" that he has chosen as his "War Work" the recording of the gallant deeds of our Men of Kent and Kentish Men.

FEROZESHAH.

Sir H. Smith's Division was in reserve on December 21st, 1845, about 300 yards in rear of the first line which opened with musketry, and advanced on the enemy's position, but the severe fire of the enemy told so heavily upon them, that the 2nd Brigade of Sir H. Smith's Division, under Colonel Ryan, was ordered to advance to their support. The 3rd Light Dragoons now made some gallant charges, and the 50th advancing soon came into a gap in the first line, and after a few rounds of musketry, charged into the enemy's trenches, driving the Sikhs back at the point of the bayonet. Corporal Hale of the Light Company, and Private Johnson of the Grenadier Company, each capturing a standard of the enemy.

(A third standard was captured later at Sobraon by Sergeant-Major Cantwell. These three standards for many years were hung in the Officers' Mess, but were transferred some years ago to All Saints', Maidstone, where they now are, enclosed in a glass case).

The 50th were the first regiment that succeeded in entering the enemy's works, they then charged on through their camp, the right wing accompanied by Sir H. Smith, charging through the village of Ferozeshah, the left wing passing outside. It took some time to drive the enemy out of the village, which however was eventually accomplished, the 50th being reinforced by the 9th Regiment (now the Norfolk Regiment) the 1st Europeans (now the Royal Munster Fusiliers) and some Native Regiments. Eventually the two wings of the 50th were united outside the village, and formed a square for the night. Parts of other regiments formed another square some distance off. These squares retained their positions throughout the night of the 21st, though harassed by the enemy's artillery and musketry, and by parties hovering round in the darkness, and firing into the squares, while our men were hardly able to return a shot, not knowing the position of the rest of our army.

The Light Company of the 50th were sent out a little distance from the square, but the Sikhs discovered them, and bringing up a gun in the darkness poured grape shot into them, compelling them to retire. They unfortunately lost their direction, but Lieutenant Frampton, who was with them, happened to pick up a Sikh bugle, sounded the Regimental call, which was answered from the Regiment, and they were then able to make good their retreat.

The Acting Adjutant of the 50th (Lieutenant Belairs) in his diary writes thus of the night:—

"No one can imagine the dire uncertainty—a burning camp on one side of the village, mines and ammunition waggons exploding in every direction, the booming of the big guns, the incessant fire of the smaller ones, the continual yelling of the enemy, together with the intense thirst, fatigue and cold, and not knowing whether the rest of the army were the conquerors or conquered—all contributed to make this night somewhat dreadful." A Council of War in the early morning decided that a retreat to join the rest of the army was necessary, and at 3 a.m. on the 22nd they moved off, after gallantly carrying the batteries still left in possession of the enemy. The Light Company of the 50th led the way; the remainder of the Regiment at first brought up the rear of the force, but were eventually brought to the front to meet any attack, for harassed and exhausted as the brigade now was, the artillery without ammunition, and weakened by the cavalry and some of the artillery having gone off to Ferozepore by mistake, they were threatened with a new danger from the force of Teig Singh, reported to be 30,000 strong, which was covering the retreat of the main Sikh army. The 50th then proceeded to join the main army, and came up between the British line and the enemy, and formed in front

of the centre, four of our guns being on their right flank, but then, after firing a few rounds, retired.

Teig Singh's artillery now opened a heavy fire, and continued their advance. Several of our men being wounded, the Light Company was thrown out in extended order, and the regiment was moved to a more favourable position behind a bank. The enemy's artillery kept up their fire for some time, the British Artillery having gone to Ferozepore for ammunition. The 50th afterwards retired into the general line, but the Light Company remained out for some time.

About 2 p.m. the enemy retired, and the men of the regiment who had had no food for two days, except what they had in their haversacks, managed to get a small bullock, which was distributed as rations. They slept on the ground that night in quarter column with piled arms. The killed and wounded during the two days' fighting were:—Killed, 24 N.C.O.'s and men. Wounded, Captain Knowles, Lieuts. Mouat, Chambers, Barnes, White, and Lieut. and Adjutant Mullen; 7 sergeants, 2 drummers, and 80 rank and file.

On December 24th the wounded were sent to Ferozepore, and the regiment marched to Sultan Khan Wallah, and on Christmas Day a despatch was read to the regiment from the Governor General congratulating them. Sir H. Smith also addressed them, and expressed his warmest approbation of their gallant conduct.

CADET BATTALION IN CAMP.

THE 1st C.B. QUEEN'S OWN (ROYAL WEST KENT REGT.) (T.F.).

From the "Dorking Advertiser":—

The 1st Cadet Battalion of the Queen's Own (Royal West Kent Regiment) (T.F.), of which Brigadier-General the Earl of Athlone, G.C.B., G.C.V.O., D.S.O., is Hon. Colonel, Lieut.-Colonel W. J. Barrat commanding, held its fifth annual camp from August 3rd to August 11th, and for the second year in succession, in billets at 33, High Street, Dorking, by kind permission of the owners. Owing to various circumstances the strength was not so good, although the number staying the whole time was larger than in 1917. From a military point of view the work carried out during the week was varied and useful. Morning parades commencing with physical drill, rifle drill, to music supplied by drum and fife band (under Captain Goodchild), bombing (instructed by Staff-Sergeant Goodall, who has been invalided from the senior forces after two years in France), company work, field training, route marches, shooting on miniature rifle range at the Drill Hall, by kind permission of the Officer Commanding the Volunteer Battalion of the Royal West Surrey Regiment. Sports were held in the afternoon of Bank Holiday in a field kindly lent by Mr. Broom, but owing to the inclement weather they had to be curtailed. Returning to Headquarters, the N.C.O.'s and Cadets indulged in boxing competitions. On Monday and Thursday evenings two successful concerts were given in the Officers' Mess, the talent being supplied by the Officers, N.C.O.'s and Cadets of the Battalion. The orchestra consisted of Captain Britain (piano), Captain Goodchild (flute), and Lieut. Blackler (violin). The Battalion attended Church parade at the Parish Church on Sundays, August 4th and 11th. On Saturday evening the Officers held their annual mess dinner at the Red Lion Hotel, the following Officers being present: Major G. Russell Harris (in Command of Camp), Captains Goodchild, Britain, Edgar, Hayward (Quartermaster and Acting Adjutant), Lieuts. Blackler, Woolston, Underwood, 2nd Lieuts. Butcher, Burley, with Mr. H. Tidy. The Commanding Officer (Lieut.-Colonel W. J. Barrat) was unable to be present owing to illness, also Major Dixon and Mr. F. H. Arnold owing to business. After the toasts to H.M. the King and the Regiment, several speeches were made and thanks given to the Officers who had the arranging of the successful camp, not an easy undertaking for the Quartermaster under present conditions. The Officer Commanding expressed on behalf of the Officers their thanks to Mr. Tidy for the yeoman services rendered by him prior to and during the week's camp.

Since the formation of this unit in 1913 over 70 Officers and 2,000 Cadets have been transferred to the senior forces. When the unit was formed every officer and staff-sergeant had been in some branch of H.M. Forces. The following are the records of the Officers serving at the present time: Lieut.-Colonel W. J. Barrat, late V.B. Middlesex Regiment; Major Russel Harris, late London Scottish; Captain Goodchild, late R.E. and London Irish; Captain Britain, National Guard; Captain Edgar, late Middlesex Yeomanry; Captain Hayward, late Garrison Artillery; Lieut. Underwood, late Artists Rifles; 2nd Lieut. A. E. Collins, late Worcester Regiment, promoted Sergeant on the field (Mons Star); 2nd Lieut. F. C. Westacott, late 2nd Batt. Lancashire Fusiliers (Mons Star).

The Battalion paraded at 5.30 Sunday evening and returned to London after a most useful week, all ranks regretting they were unable to stay longer. The Officer Commanding desires to thank the residents for the kindness shown to all ranks during their stay in the town.

SPECIAL RESERVE BATTALION.

CRICKET.

Taken on the whole we have enjoyed a most successful season. Unfortunately we lost Fulcher, our energetic secretary and brilliant all-round cricketer. He went overseas after the Queen's match, but am glad to see he has been teaching them how to play cricket on the other side. Lewin left us after our match with the Tine Brigade to take part in the greatest of games, and as the writer knows that the two above-mentioned are together "somewhere in France," he can imagine them sitting in a shell-hole discussing the past season's cricket. Lewin is a very steady, sound bat, at times brilliant; he is also a most useful wicket-keeper and did good work behind the stumps; a great loss to the team. R. F. Knight (who is the Northampton cricketer) has been a tower of strength to the side. He is a delightful cricketer, who quickly settles down and scores freely all round the wicket. We lost his services for a month, but he was able to assist us in our last two matches. Harris, Hyland and Howlett have batted consistently well all through the season, the latter having come on wonderfully with the bat. Harris played two fine innings of 65 (not out) and 74; the former score against the A.S.C. and the latter against the Queen's Regiment. Kent, who could not get going earlier in the season, but found his form in the Tunbridge Wells match, has since played several useful innings. He is a fine bat to watch, as all his strokes are made with no effort, a supple pair of wrists being the secret. Simes has been quite useful to us, and although he has not made any high scores, his batting was consistent. Captain Drayson, who has plenty of cricket in him, could not find his form; an injury to the shoulder handicapping him. A great addition to the side in the last three matches was Captain Sewell. Tall, loosely built, he reminds one of the Frank Woolley type. He was most useful to us both with bat and ball; his fine bowling against the R.A.F. won the match. Steeds and Foster joined us rather late in the season, but the former proved his worth in the side by making a magnificent 94 in the last match of the season. Foster did not get a chance of batting in matches, but was a fine field and pulled off some really good catches.

Our bowling has been as strong as the batting. Howlett (late Sandhurst fast bowler) has bowled splendidly all through the season. He bowls a very fast ball and keeps an excellent length. It should here be mentioned that all the inter-Battalion matches were played on matting wickets, and as we are out to kill Huns and not our opposing team he had to slacken his pace. Fulcher's bowling, like his batting, was brilliant. Smith, who was our slow bowler, has done exceptionally well. He bowls a lovely ball to hit, and behold the wicket hit instead (R.K.D.). Owing to our bowling strength we did not avail ourselves of Knight's services until the last two matches, in which he proved himself invaluable. Owing to bad weather three matches were abandoned.

At the time of writing this article all the original cricketers, with the exception of Kent and Smith, have gone overseas. Good luck to them, and may we all meet in England again to carry on the cricket for the good old Regiment. In conclusion, congratulations to our Skipper Kent, who has captained the team right through the season.

VICTORIA CROSS.

The King has been pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the following:—

NO. 358 SERGT. THOMAS JAMES HARRIS, M.M., ROYAL WEST KENT REGIMENT (LOWER HALLING, KENT).

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in attack when the advance was much impeded by hostile machine-guns concealed in crops and shell-holes. Sergt. Harris led his section against one of these, capturing it, and killing seven of the enemy.

Later, on two successive occasions he attacked single-handed two enemy machine-guns which were causing heavy casualties and holding up the advance. He captured the first gun and killed the crew, but was himself killed when attacking the second one.

It was largely due to the great courage and initiative of this gallant N.C.O. that the advance of the battalion was continued without delay and undue casualties. Throughout the operations he showed a total disregard for his own personal safety, and set a magnificent example to all ranks.

LIEUT. CECIL HAROLD SEWELL, ROYAL WEST KENT REGIMENT, ATTACHED TANKS CORPS.

When in command of a section of Whippet Light Tanks in action this officer displayed most conspicuous bravery and initiative in getting out of his own Tank and crossing open ground under heavy shell and machine-gun fire to rescue the crew of another Whippet of his section which had side-slipped into a large shell-hole, overturned, and taken fire. The door of the Tank having become jammed against the side of the shell-hole, Lieut. Sewell, by his own unaided efforts, dug away the entrance to the door and released the crew. In so doing he undoubtedly saved the lives of the officer and men inside the Tank, as they could not have got out without his assistance. After having extricated the crew, seeing one of his own crew lying wounded behind his Tank, he again dashed across the open ground to his assistance. He was hit in doing so, but succeeded in reaching the Tank, when a few minutes later he was again hit, fatally, in the act of dressing his wounded driver. During the whole of this period he was within full view and short range of the enemy machine-guns and rifle-pits, and throughout, by his prompt and heroic action, showed an utter disregard for his own personal safety.

REWARDS FOR SERVICES THE IN FIELD.

The King has been pleased to approve of the following awards to the undermentioned Officers, W.O.'s, N.C.O.'s and Men of the Regiment in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the field:—

D.S.O.

CAPTAIN (ACTING MAJOR) J. K. KAY.

He was commanding the Battalion previous to and during an important attack by our troops, and the skill and ability with which he made the preparatory arrangements were no less marked than his gallantry and soldierly bearing during the engagement. When the objectives had been gained, hearing that the two senior officers and a large number of men of his Left Company had become casualties, he immediately went to the spot, and by his coolness and cheerful example of courage inspired the men with his own resolution.

BAR TO M.C.

SECOND LIEUT. (ACTING CAPTAIN) R. BROWN, M.C.

During an important engagement when his Battalion headquarters were being heavily shelled and there were many casualties, he showed a fine example of coolness and gallantry as he moved about directing the removal of the wounded to places which offered more protection. On two occasions he went forward under heavy fire to check the Battalion advanced dump, bringing back valuable information as to the situation on each occasion. His courage and devotion to duty were a conspicuous example during the whole action. M.C. gazetted June 3rd, 1916, published in "Q.O.G." June, 1916.

M.C.

SECOND LIEUT. A. E. J. BURDEN.

In an assault on the final objective he personally killed several of the enemy, and when his Company Commander had been killed and all the other officers had become casualties, he took command, organising the defence with great ability, and encouraging his men under the heavy fire to which they were subjected.

LIEUT. (ACTING CAPTAIN) W. C. CLIFFORD.

For conspicuous gallantry and determination during operations. He led his Company in an attack, gaining all objectives, and rapidly organised defence, maintaining all his positions in spite of a heavy counter-attack, when the enemy penetrated between his right post and that of the company on his right. Later, he organised and led a counter-attack, which had a fine moral effect on his men.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. J. R. GARBUTT.

He led his platoon forward from the reserve company through heavy shell fire with great gallantry and ability, reaching the forward companies with ammunition and entrenching tools immediately after the objective had been gained, thereby greatly assisting the consolidation. When he found that one of the forward companies had lost nearly all its officers, he sent his platoon back, remaining himself to assist in the organisation and consolidation of the position, which was successfully carried out, in spite of heavy shell and machine-gun fire. He displayed throughout great coolness and complete disregard of danger.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. W. J. C. OUZMAN.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When his Company Commander was killed and all the other officers of his Company had become casualties, he took command of his Company and handled it with conspicuous courage and ability. When his trenches were being heavily shelled he walked about on the top, regardless of his own safety, keeping up the spirits of his men by his cheerfulness and unperturbed demeanour.

SECOND LIEUT. E. B. TROTTER, D.C.M.

He was in charge of the parties on the flank of an important raid, and led his men with great energy and determination, capturing an enemy post with a machine gun, and accounting for the garrison, being badly wounded himself in the shoulder. In spite of exhaustion from loss of blood, he pushed on, inspiring his men by his example of gallantry and endurance, till he reached the enemy second line, where he was wounded a second time, and became unconscious.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. R. B. WALTHER.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon to the attack of the furthest objective, where he killed three of the enemy who were holding up one of his sections. Later he attacked a machine gun post with great courage, but, being wounded, was unable to take it.

SECOND LIEUT. W. F. WHITFIELD.

He led his platoon, carrying ammunition and entrenching tools for the forward companies, through heavy shell fire, with great gallantry, reaching them immediately after the objective had been gained, thereby greatly assisting the consolidation. Finding one of the forward companies was short of officers, he remained with them to help in the consolidation, which was being carried on under heavy fire. Hearing later that the other Company Commander had been killed, he went over to its trenches and helped to organise the position, which was successfully accomplished in spite of heavy fire of every description.

IN MEMORIAM.

We regret to announce the death of Brigade Surgeon Owen Owen on Sept. 28th at Cheltenham, aged 81. He received his first commission as Assistant Surgeon in 1860, and was posted to the 50th in Ceylon, serving with it in the New Zealand War (Medal). He was present at the action of Putahi and other engagements. In 1875, after serving with the 50th for 15 years, he was promoted Surgeon Major, and in 1876, when in medical charge of the 8th King's Regiment, received the thanks of the Government of India and the Director General A.M.D. for the care and precaution he exercised during an epidemic of cholera at Peshawur in 1876. He also received the personal thanks of the Commander-in-Chief in India. He served in the Afghan War of 1879-80 and was mentioned in despatches (medal and clasp for Ali Musjid), acted as S.M.O. at Lundi Kotal during the evacuation of the Khyber Pass. Subsequently he was S.M.O. Cyprus, and of the 23rd Regimental District. He retired in 1896. He will be remembered with affection by all who served with him.

ALIWAL.

At the battle of Ferozeshah the Sikh Army retreated to their entrenched camp on the river Sutlej beyond Aliwal, and thither Sir H. Smith prepared to follow them. His force consisted of some 3,000 Cavalry and Artillery, and 7,200 Infantry. After marching about nine miles on January 28th, 1846, the enemy were seen drawn up in order of battle, and preparations were at once made for an attack. The 50th, which was on the right of the 2nd Brigade, occupied the centre of the line (with heavy guns on each flank of the Brigade) and deploying, moved to their right till they found themselves exactly opposite the centre of the enemy's position, which they at once advanced against.

The enemy's batteries being on a curve with the flanks thrown back, the 2nd Brigade, in the centre, were more exposed to the enemy's fire than the other Brigades. They were therefore twice ordered to lie down, to permit the Brigades on each flank to advance in line with them. In this position the Regiment was exposed to a very heavy artillery fire, as well as to that of the matchlock men; but they advanced rapidly, and when within musket shot they fired a volley, which caused the retreat of the enemy opposed to them, the artillery along remaining fast. The 50th then charged and took the guns opposite to them, while the 16th Lancers on our left made gallant charges into the enemy's squares. There were soon in full retreat.

"The Queen's Own" continued the pursuit until they approached the bed of the river, No. 6 and the Light Company being sent forward to the bank, to prevent the enemy taking away a gun.

Sir H. Smith in his despatch, says:—"I occasionally observed Brigadier-General Wheeler's Brigade, charging and carrying guns and everything before it, again collecting his line, and moving on, in a manner which ably displayed the coolness of the Brigadier, and the gallantry of his irresistible Brigade—H.M. 50th Foot—48th Native Infantry and the Sirmoor Battalion, although the loss was, I regret to say, somewhat severe in the 50th."

The enemy suffered very severely in this engagement, besides losing all their camp equipment, and all their artillery, except two guns, which alone escaped capture. One of these must have been the one opposite to No. 6 and the Light Company of the 50th, concerning which Lieut. Bellars says:—

"No. 6 and the Light Company were sent to the bank of the river to prevent a gun from being taken away from the opposite side. The Sikhs tried several times to take it away, crawling on their hands and knees, but a volley always drove them away. The men were partially undressed to go over by the ford to bring it over, but Sir Harry would not allow them to go. They were relieved by a Company of Native Infantry who were left to prevent its being taken away during the night, but in the morning it was gone."

The loss of the Regiment in the above action was but slight, one officer and eight rank and file killed, and nine officers, four sergeants and 55 rank and file wounded, out of a total strength of 494.

Loodiana being now safe Sir H. Smith rejoined the main army, leaving the 50th to watch the fords of that place. On February 3rd they encamped about a mile from their former cantonment at Loodiana, which had been left in charge of a small force of invalids quite inadequate to protect it; and it was found that some of the men's barracks, and the thatched houses of the officers were burnt. The mess property of the Regiment, to the value of £3,000, was destroyed.

On February 4th the 50th rejoined the rest of the Division after a fatiguing march of 26 miles.

The whole force marched the following day, and joined the army under Sir Hugh Gough, in front of Sobraon, on the 7th. Sir Hugh Gough rode out to meet the division, when he complimented the 50th very highly on their conduct at Aliwal.

REWARDS FOR SERVICES IN THE FIELD.

VICTORIA CROSS.

The King has been pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officer of the Regiment:—

TEMP. LIEUT. DONALD JOHN DEAN, 8th BATT.

For most conspicuous bravery, skilful command, and devotion to duty during the period September 24th to 26th, 1918, when holding, with his platoon, an advance post established in a newly-captured enemy trench north-west of Lens. The left flank of the position was insecure, and the post, when taken over on the night of September 24th, was ill-prepared for defence. Shortly after the post was occupied the enemy attempted, without success, to recapture it. Under heavy machine-gun fire consolidation was continued, and shortly after midnight another determined enemy attack was driven off. Throughout the night Lieut. Dean worked unceasingly with his men, and about 6 a.m. on September 25th a resolute enemy attack, supported by heavy shell and trench mortar fire, developed. Again, owing to the materly handling of his command, Lieut. Dean repulsed the attack, causing heavy enemy casualties. Throughout the 25th and the night of September 25th-26th consolidation was continued under heavy fire, which culminated in intense artillery fire on the morning of the 26th, when the enemy again attacked and was finally repulsed with loss. Five times in all (thrice heavily) was this post attacked, and on each occasion the attack was driven back. Throughout the period Lieut. Dean inspired his command with his own contempt of danger, and all fought with the greatest bravery. He set an example of valour, leadership, and devotion to duty of the very highest order.

The King has been pleased to approve of the following awards to the undermentioned Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of the Regiment in recognition of gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

D.F.C.

CAPTAIN (Temp. Lieut. Colonel) W. F. MACNEECE, D.S.O.

An exceptionally brave and efficient officer. From July 2nd to August 9th he was in command of a Balloon Wing, and by his energy and personal example inspired all ranks with a spirit of emulation difficult to surpass. During this period he carried out numerous shoots in co-operation with our artillery, and obtained much valuable information for our Intelligence Department. On August 9th his balloon was attacked by an aeroplane and shot down in flames. Lieut.-Colonel MacNeece parachuted, but received severe injuries when landing.

BAR TO M.C.

TEMP. LIEUT. H. J. M. HARRIS, M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and determined leadership during an attack. When ordered to clear a communication trench forming a flank, he carried out the work in a most successful and skilful manner, with very small losses. He did splendidly. (M.C. gazetted August 25th, 1916, published in "Queen's Own Gazette" September, 1916).

LIEUT. (Temp. Captain) A. V. McDONALD, M.C.

Through fog and very heavy fire he led his company with the greatest determination to the final objective, an advance of some 4,000 yards, with comparatively few casualties. He maintained his position until ordered to withdraw, and then carried out the withdrawal most skilfully. He displayed exceptionally bold and able leadership. (M.C. gazetted June 4th, 1917, published in "Queen's Own Gazette" July, 1917).

M.C.

CAPTAIN C. G. HENDERSON-ROE, D.S.O.

For conspicuous gallantry during an attack. He went forward with his company, although his left arm was shattered early in the action, and remained until the newly-captured position was consolidated. His courage and leadership were of the highest order and inspired confidence in all.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. J. H. TURNER.

For conspicuous gallantry with his company in an attack. Machine guns and small parties of the enemy were concealed in low-lying ground by the river and were causing many casualties. This officer manoeuvred his company with great courage and skill and, taking the enemy on the flank and rear, cleared the position, and thus enabled the advance to be continued.

TEMP. SECOND LIEUT. S. J. UPFOLD.

For conspicuous gallantry during an attack. He handled his platoon with great courage and skill on two occasions, when held up by machine-gun nests. Engaging the enemy's attention in front, he led small parties to a flank and rushed the positions, capturing the guns and their detachments.

LIEUT.-COLONEL W. R. A. DAWSON, D.S.O.

The Regiment has sustained a very grievous loss in the death on December 4th of Lieut.-Colonel W. R. A. Dawson, D.S.O., Commanding 6th Battalion (Captain and Brevet Major 1st Battalion), as a result of wounds received in action on October 22nd. He received his first commission in June, 1914, in the 1st Battalion, but being a recruit when the war broke out, he did not embark with the Battalion the following August, but was sent to the 3rd Battalion. He was, however, posted to the 6th Battalion directly it was raised, and served with it ever since. He was promoted Temp. Captain 6th Battalion in March, 1915, and Substantive Captain 1st Battalion in December, 1916; Temp. Major (Second in Command) 6th Battalion in August, 1916; and Temp. Lieut. Colonel 6th Battalion in December, 1916, thus obtaining the Command of a Battalion after 2½ years' service. He was three times mentioned in despatches, and promoted Brevet Major in June, 1918. He was also awarded the D.S.O. in April, 1916, to which a First Bar was added in August, 1917, and a Second Bar in July, 1918, for his gallantry and devotion to duty on all three occasions.

D.S.O.—"For conspicuous gallantry. Though severely wounded, Captain Dawson rejoined his Company as soon as his wounds had been dressed, remaining at his post until an attack had been repulsed, and was again wounded later. His example of courage, endurance and devotion to duty was one of a very high order."

First Bar.—"When the situation was somewhat critical he displayed conspicuous bravery in organising the defence. Although his troops were exhausted from long exposure, he completely re-organised the line under heavy shell fire. His total disregard for personal danger was most marked."

Second Bar.—"When a party of the enemy had broken through the Brigade front he led the *personnel* of his Headquarters as a fighting formation, and, co-operating with the counter-attacking battalion, inflicted heavy losses on the enemy, and captured two machine guns and some prisoners. On the following day, when the enemy attacked in force, he organised and led a counter-attack with two companies. He repulsed the enemy and re-established and advanced the line. Later, when the enemy attacked some advanced posts, he counter-attacked and drove the enemy off with loss. By his capable leadership, promptness of action, and courageous example he was largely responsible for the position held by his Battalion being maintained intact."

Such a record needs little comment. His gallantry, fine leadership, endurance, power of organisation, and disregard of personal danger is apparent even to those who did not have the privilege of serving with him. All who served with him describe him as a magnificent soldier, and as fine a type of officer as one could wish to meet. Strict in the performance of his duty, he was at the same time ever gentle and courteous. Loved, admired, and respected by his men, his memory will always be cherished. He was a gentleman in the truest sense of the word, possessed of a charming personality, with a wide horizon, exceptionally gifted in the ideals of Regimental honour and chivalry, and imbued with the keenest *esprit de corps*, he carried out the traditions of "The Queen's Own" to their fullest extent.

Severely wounded 6 times previously, he was ever anxious on each occasion to rejoin the Battalion which he loved, and for which he had done so much, and it is especially sad that within three weeks of the termination of fighting the wounds sustained by him on this, the seventh occasion, should have proved fatal. It may truly be said that he deserved well of his Regiment, and the Regiment is proud of him.

Amongst the men of this, and indeed of all the other Battalions of the Regiment, his name has become one to conjure with, and his fame is widely known. We could have had no greater loss. He has been awarded a Third Bar to his D.S.O."

The following notice appeared in "The Times":

"To all who knew Bob Dawson, more especially, perhaps, to those who have soldiered with him and seen and known his work in France, the news of his death, from wounds received in action, will bring a deep sense of personal loss. Wounded many times, 'mentioned' many times, with three bars to his D.S.O., he was marked down for further distinction and promotion, and would doubtless have got a brigade had he not been put out of action on so many occasions through his gallantry and fearlessness. It is no exaggeration to say that he was personally beloved by every officer and man of his regiment. Scorning all thought of personal danger or risk, it was his invariable practice to accompany his men, whose welfare and comfort were his chief thought, when the chance of fighting existed, never failing to display the highest quality of skill and leadership. To know him was to love him, his marked ability as a soldier being combined with a charm of character which brought him a host of friends, who will mourn deeply but never forget. Truly a very perfect gentleman, whose loss to his parents, his friends, and his country creates a blank which can never be filled."

SUCCESSFUL MATINEE AT THE EMPIRE.

The Empire Theatre, Chatham, has been the scene of many great gatherings in the sacred cause of Charity, but it is doubtful whether any of them appealed to the hearts of the patrons more than Wednesday's matinee in aid of the Queen's Own (Royal West Kent Regiment) Prisoners of War Fund. Captain Davis, the local managing director of the Empire, has always shown his sympathy in such a worthy cause by lending the vast building and its resources entirely free of charge. This was the case on Wednesday afternoon, when a packed audience assembled for the double purpose of aiding the object the Regiment had at heart, and in listening to the entertainment provided by the "Kentish Kobs," otherwise the Entertainment Company of the 3rd Batt. of the West Kents, which is stationed in this district.

The audience included Major-General Sir Herbert Mullaly, K.C.M.G., C.B., C.S.I., the General Officer Commanding the Thames and Medway Garrison, Colonel E. V. O. Hewitt, C.M.G., D.S.O., of the West Kents, many officers from the Regiment and from the Garrison and Royal Navy, a crowd of khaki men, and prominent civilians.

Colonel Hewett appeared on the stage, and voiced the Regiment's thanks to all who had in any way assisted in that very successful event—the managing directors of the Empire, those who had "rolled up" in such numbers in support of the cause, the lady programme sellers, and, in fact, everybody who had lent a hand. They would all be pleased, he felt sure, to learn that the net result was a sum of £250 for the fund (loud applause).

Pressure upon our space compels us to omit the details of the remaining items in the lengthy programme, but all were remarkably good. A highly meritorious entertainment concluded with the Regimental March and the National Anthem.

The programmes (which sold at sixpence each) were kindly provided by Messrs. F. and H. Newcomb, and provided £25 towards the fund. The general arrangements for the entertainment were in the hands of Captain Knight.

The following address was made by Major-General Sir H. Mulla, K.C.M.G., C.B., C.S.I., Garrison Commander, Thames and Medway, Chatham, on the occasion of Presentation of Decorations at Fort Dard, Chatham, on 15th November, 1918:

"Colonel Hewett, Officers and Men of the 3rd Battalion, Royal West Kent Regiment.—It is a considerable time now since I last had the opportunity of talking to you all, and I am very glad to have been given the great pleasure to-day of presenting these decorations to your gallant comrades—not only so as to be able to add my tribute of honour and congratulations for all they have done; but also because it enables me to a few words to you at this time when this great war is coming to an end, and to thank you all for what you have done.

"It has been a long uphill fight, and we have only to look back through the past six months to realise the wonderful change in the situation that has taken place.

"We all know how the Hun, after collecting a large superiority of force, made his first great attack on the 21st of March, which was rapidly followed by others, which were not altogether unsuccessful.

"It was a time of great stress and anxiety—more than most people realised—and it was known only four months ago that they were preparing for a great final onslaught, which they openly boasted would finish the war.

"Well! They made it; and their boast came true—though not quite in the way they expected. For, as is generally the case with arrogant bullies, they once again miscalculated, and the boot, so to speak, got on the other foot.

"Less than four months ago they were across the Marne for the second time. But a few days later Marshal Foch made his first great counter-attack; and from then onwards there has been a constant succession of our attacks and our victories, which, in this short space of time, has ended in the complete defeat and collapse and practical surrender of all the enemy Powers.

"That is a historical fact, for which the whole Country and Empire thanks God, and owes, under Him, to the splendid courage and grit and tenacity of our nation and troops—amongst whom the Royal West Kents have always held a foremost place for valour and all that is best in British manhood.

"Ypres, Menin, Messines, Arras, Neuve Chapelle, The Somme, Gallipoli, Italy, Mesopotamia, and all the later series of great battles have all added to your fame; and I have only to mention the splendid incident of Trones Wood, amidst crowds of others, to show how your famous Regiment had added to its great reputation and roll of fame, and the honour of the fair County of Kent.

"We have been together here for over four years—and I know full well all the difficulties you have had to face; and I know equally well, how splendidly you have surmounted them all, and how every Officer and man has done his utmost and best throughout.

"And this I can tell you unhesitatingly: From first to last, in every respect, by your excellent conduct, discipline and high standard of training, and efficiency in every way, you have thoroughly upheld and maintained the great fame and honour of your famous Regiment and beautiful county. And this I also know, with the most absolute confidence: That, though this war is now drawing to its close, in the days to come, whenever storms may again threaten our Old Country, you Men of Kent and Kentish Men, and your sons and sons' sons, will again rally to the call and will again emulate the deeds of our gallant comrades here and add still more honour and renown to the historic name of the Royal West Kents.

"It has been the greatest pleasure, and the greatest honour, to have you in my command.

"I thank you most heartily for all that you have done, and wish every one of you, wherever you may be, the very best of luck always."

The following are the names of the men to whom decorations were awarded:—

7033 SERGT. NICHOLSON, 1st BATT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in charge of his Platoon in an attack, when his Platoon Officer and Sergeant had become casualties. He accounted for 12 of the enemy. Later, as senior N.C.O., he took over the duties of Co. Sergeant-Major, and finally, when his Company Commander was killed, he took over the Company and brought it out of action.

7311 C.S.M. F. TAYLOR, 1st BATT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at the Menin Road on October 28th, 1917. During a counter-attack, when his Platoon Officer had been killed, he re-organised and took charge of his Platoon and re-established the line for an attack next morning. During this engagement all Officers of his Company became casualties. He took command, captured the objective and held on until relieved.

D.C.M. & BAR.

6884 C.S.M. J. COOPER, 10th BATT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during an attack at Messines on June 7th, 1917, when all his Company Officers had been either killed or wounded. He took charge of the Company and carried the objective, which he consolidated, shewing great coolness under a very heavy machine gun fire.

10352 SERGEANT F. HART, 1st BATT.

For gallantry and devotion to duty at Menin Road on 4th October, 1918. He displayed great courage in bombing and capturing an enemy machine gun emplacement.

9995 SERGEANT F. JUPP, 1st BATT.

For gallantry and devotion to duty at Vimy on 2nd May, 1917, when, with a few men, he held on to a captured position for 24 hours until relieved.

18829 CORPORAL T. HARRIS, 11th BATT.

For gallantry and devotion to duty at Menin Road on September 22nd, 1917. He voluntarily went out with a small patrol to get into touch with an isolated party 500 yards beyond the front line. He then went back and returned with rations for the men, under a heavy machine gun fire.

D.C.M. & RUSSIAN ORDER OF ST. GEORGE.

1650 SERGT. J. EDWARDS, 2nd BATT.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability in Nasiriyah on the 24th July, 1915, in leading his men under heavy fire at a critical period of the attack on Tower "M," thereby greatly facilitating the capture of the place.

16554 CORPORAL C. WOODROW, 8th BATT.

For gallantry and devotion to duty on the Somme during April, 1917. He tended wounded, bringing them back to the British lines under heavy shell and machine gun fire. Later, when counter-attacked, and when his Platoon Officer and N.C.O.'s had become casualties, he took charge of the Platoon.

BELGIAN CROIX DE GUERRE.

11695 CORPL. W. DAVIS, 10th BATT.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in going forward with a machine gun and covering the work of consolidation by his Company in the attack on Messines Ridge on February 10th, 1918. This N.C.O. was also mentioned for conspicuous good service and devotion to duty on the Belgian Front.

ATHLETICS.

The Relay Team (Lieut. Godfrey, 220 yards; Sergt. English, 880 yards; Sergt. Stiff, 220 yards; and Sergt. Croft, 440 yards) have recently won the open mile races at the sports given by the Royal Sussex Regiment, the Home Counties Reserve Brigade, and our own.

Individual successes were achieved in the Brigade sports as follows: 100 Yards, 1st Lieut. Godfrey, time 11 1-5th secs. 220 Yards, 1st Lieut. Godfrey, 2nd Sergt. Staff, time 23 1-5th secs. 400 Yards, 1st Sergt. Croft, time 52 3-5th secs. 880 Yards, 1st Sergt. English, time 2mins. 11secs.

These wins brought to this Unit the Champion Cup, to be held by the Battalion gaining most points.

SOBRAON.

At 6 a.m. on February 10th, 1846, our heavy guns opened on the Sikh entrenched camps at Sobraon. Sir H. Smith's Division, consisting of two Brigades, the 31st and 47th Native Infantry in the First, and the 50th, 42nd Native Infantry, and the Mysore Battalion in the Second, were on the extreme right of the line. About 11 a.m. the troops in the centre advanced against the enemy's centre, but so severe was the hostile fire that they were unable to force the entrenchments. A simultaneous attack, however, made by the Left Division succeeded in forcing the enemy's line. At this moment Sir H. Smith received orders to attack with his Division. The First Brigade immediately advanced in line, the Second Brigade following in support 100 yards in rear.

Both Brigades soon got under a heavy fire, and the 2nd Brigade were ordered to take ground to their left till clear of the left flank of the leading Brigade, after which they steadily advanced under a most galling fire of shell, grape, and musketry. After passing a nullah, they were exposed to the fire of the Sikh batteries at musket range, but the 50th pressed on, gallantly led by its Commanding Officers—Lieut.-Colonel Ryan, who was in command of the Brigade, and Lieut.-Colonel Petit, who was in command of the Regiment, both of whom fell dangerously wounded within a few yards of one another; the former subsequently died of his wounds.

The 1st Brigade, after three most gallant attempts to force the enemy's entrenchments, were unable to do so, and retreated in confusion on the 50th, who formed fours deep with the steadiness of a parade movement, and allowed the retreating troops to pass through their ranks. After this they re-formed line, and with a splendid cheer rushed forward with the bayonet against the entrenchment, where they were gallantly met by the enemy, and a hand-to-hand struggle took place, but the 50th, proud of their former laurels, were not to be denied, and after a fierce and bloody struggle they succeeded in forcing their way into the enemy's camp. In the meantime a large body of the enemy, driven back by the successful attack on the left, came up behind, and turned the guns of the battery, which the Regiment had just taken from them.

It was first thought that our own Artillery had made a mistake, but directly it was ascertained where the fire came from, the 50th turned about and re-took the battery. The enemy now retreated at all points, and the attacking division having concentrated, the bridge of boats was partially destroyed and a heavy musketry fire opened upon it. When the 50th was formed up after the action, during the latter part of which it was commanded by Lieut. Wiley, the senior subaltern, it presented but a skeleton, more than half the Regiment having been put "hors de combat." Their strength in the morning was 417 all ranks, and the casualties 12 officers, the sergeant-major, 9 sergeants, 1 drummer, and 220 rank and file—total 243.

An officer of experience, present at the battle, speaks thus of the action of the 50th:

"The thing that impressed me most in the whole campaign was the steadiness with which the 50th, at Sobraon, formed fours under a tremendous fire, to allow the 31st, who were retreating in disorder, to pass through their ranks, and then formed up, as if on parade, and advanced, charging into the battery. We know how catching a panic is, and it struck me as a most trying ordeal."

This is reported without detriment to the 31st, who were mentioned in despatches for their gallantry on that occasion.

They bore the heaviest part of the fire, which it was almost impossible to advance against.

Sergeant-Major Cantwell was killed just as the Regiment had succeeded in forcing the enemy's entrenchment, and just after he had captured a colour from the enemy.

On the 50th leaving India for home early in 1848, Lord Gough, Commander-in-Chief in India, issued the following General Order: "In directing the 50th Regiment to be struck off the Indian Establishment, consequent upon their embarkation for England, the Right Honourable the Commander-in-Chief in India takes the opportunity of congratulating the Regiment upon the satisfactory termination of its foreign service, and at the same time of recording the high opinion he entertains of its conduct whilst under his command.

"The 50th has been, as heretofore, most fortunate in being actively employed; highly distinguished in the wars of its country in Egypt and through the Peninsula Campaign, 'The Queen's Own' have added to the numerous trophies already borne on its colours, the following glorious victories as records of its Indian service: 'Punniar,' 'Moodkee,' 'Ferozeshah,' 'Aliwal,' and 'Sobraon.'

"In the late eventful campaign the 50th bore a very prominent part; engaged in every battle that was fought, and conspicuous for its bravery amidst so many gallant regiments, nobly did it sustain on the banks of the Sutlej the reputation it gained at Corunna, under its old Commander, Sir Charles Napier. Every expression of Lord Gough's praise is justly due to this noble regiment, and that every happiness and success may attend all its members is his Lordship's most hearty desire."

A monument was placed in Canterbury Cathedral to those who fell in this campaign, which bears the following inscription:

"Erected by the Officers of 'The 50th The Queen's Own Regiment' to the memory of the Officers and men who fell under the Colours of the Regiment during the campaign on the Sutlej in 1845 and 1846 in the actions of Moodkee, Ferozeshah, Aliwal, and Sobraon."

The names then follow: Lieut.-Col. T. Ryan, C.B., K.H., 6 other Officers, and 192 other ranks.

The following order, issued by Colonel Anderson, K.H., on resuming command of the Regiment after this campaign deserves to be preserved:

"They died as brave men like to die, and their memory and their names must, for the future, form a proud and conspicuous part of the records and history of the Regiment."

Colonel Anderson, having been severely wounded at Punniar, whilst commanding a Brigade, was not present with the Regiment during the Sutlej Campaign.

In April, 1850, Major-General Lord FitzClarence presented to the Regiment a gold plate, to be attached to the Queen's Colours, on which is inscribed the names of the Officers who fell in this campaign, and a crystal containing a piece of the silk of the colours. This plate is transferred to the staff of the King's Colour whenever the Battalion receives new colours.

The total casualties incurred during the Campaign which lasted from December 16th, 1845, to February 10th, 1846—57 days—were as follows:
