As Board Co-Chair of our Federation, together with my Co-Chair Allan Lehmann, CEO Bruce Landgarten, Women's Philanthropy Director Margaux Dinerman, Campaign Co-Chair Stephanie Ross and WP Campaign Chair Margie Kulp, we attended the General Assembly of the Jewish Federation of North America in Los Angeles in mid-November.

Standing on the shoulders of those who came before us, Federation volunteers and professionals from across the United States and overseas gathered to "Venture Further" (the theme of this year's GA) into the future of Jewish education, philanthropy and Jewish life. We listened to innovators and leaders, exchanged ideas, and shared our thoughts and concerns with each other.

We heard from two well-respected figures in their fields – Los Angeles Mayor Eric Garcetti, the first elected Jewish mayor of that city, who talked about his mixed heritage and the importance of "building windows" to share with the world the great things that Federation does, and Rabbi David Wolpe, who spoke about the importance of education – "if we don't learn, we don't know; if we don't know our history, how can we teach our children and carry on our heritage."

There were plenaries and sessions that dealt with the aging

populations, millennials and the changing climate of philanthropy, the Diaspora— Israel relationship and how to find the balance of Federation's mission and some of the controversial political issues of today.

We attended a briefing by

the JDC (American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee) about the work they are doing around the world to help Jews who are in need or in danger. Some elderly Jews in the FSU (former Soviet Union) receive only their meager pensions which are as low as two dollars per day with no safety net from the government. Hundreds would suffer without our assistance with food, medicine, winter relief, socialization and home care.

JAFI (Jewish Agency for Israel) related their work to ensure we remain one people – providing services and programs to help us stay connected. Israel Shlichim (emissaries) are sent to communities and universities to strengthen bonds to Israel. Youth Futures programs help childrenat-risk by providing a stable, consistent adult mentor for them.

Having attended many GA's over the years I have been part of our Federation's leadership, I can tell you that JFNA General Assemblies usually focus on Jewish education in this country and Jewish rescue work done overseas. However, as a result of the recent devastating hurricanes, there was a shift this year and we focused on the JFNA efforts here in the United States.

We heard from a Rabbi, a volunteer and a victim from Houston and how they were affected by Hurricane Harvey. Beth Yeshurun Congregation has 350 members who lost their homes. Michelle Hirsch of National Young Leadership organized an Amazon

wish list of items needed and it was filled within 12 hours and driven to Houston from Dallas. Naomi shared her story of personal loss her home was devastated and her family is still living in temporary housing. Hurricane Harvey devastated Houston's **Jewish** community. Nearly three-quarters of the city's Jewish population live in areas that were hardest hit. 2,000 families were affected. Two of the largest synagogues, one day school, the JCC and the Jewish senior home have been damaged.

JFNA has been there from the onset and has established the Hurricane Harvey Relief Fund to help meet the urgent needs. It is estimated that it will take \$30 million to meet the short and longer term needs. We, the Jewish Federations of North America, were, are and will be there.

As a participant in this Assembly, I was inspired and re-energized in Federation. Year in, year out you have heard us talk about how "we are there when needed," but these words resonated in a different way this year, because the crises were here 'at home' ... in Texas and Florida. And our efforts extended to the victims of the hurricanes in Puerto Rico and other Caribbean Islands and the earthquakes in Mexico. I am re-energized because these tangible reminders give weight to our familiar words, that "we are concerned about Jews around the world and at home." This is what Federation is all about caring for each other.

Your dollars in support of our annual campaign do so much every day. We truly are making a difference in the lives of Jews locally, in America, in Israel and around the world. We are able to do so because you support us through your contributions. The 2018 campaign is underway. If not now, when?

What Have We Accomplished?

Every once in a while I get a question that I find interesting and, in a way, very affirming. The question: What have we accomplished this year? Not a bad question, and one for which we have some good answers. What makes this question interesting is that it reflects a completely different

Israel Builds Massive Fence to Protect Aircraft in Southern Airport

Israel's Ministry of Defense has constructed a new 30-meter high (98 ft.) barrier along parts of its border with Jordan, introducing a unique solution developed for the protection of the new Ilan and Asaf Ramon Airport, situated just north of Eilat.

Placed on dozens of tall pillars, the fence was designed to protect aircraft against a range of threats, including ballistic projectiles, during take-off or landing at the airport. A 4.5 kilometer long fence and technological means are also included in its development.

The construction of the innovative barrier is part of Israel's building of the eastern fence along the Israel-Jordan border between Eilat and the sands of Samar, at a cost of some NIS 300 million. Some 30 kilometers, or two thirds, of the barrier have so far been deployed.

The new fence is being modeled after the security barriers along Israel's borders with Egypt and Syria, with adjustments for the specific terrain in the desert area. The undertaking includes the



development of road systems, observation towers, operations centers and other advanced technological measures.

"We are constantly working to strengthen the security components on all borders, in the face of existing and future challenges," stated Minister of Defense Avigdor Liberman. He said the unique protective measures at the airport are "further proof of the creativity and ability of the defense establishment, and this is the foundation of the IDF's strength."

One of the complexities of the project is that the construction of the fence requires the evacuation of 13 kilometers of old minefields, which will be completed in the coming months.

With the environment in mind, hydrological solutions have been developed to enable the establishment of the Nahal Ha'Arvah route, which includes resilient waterway barriers, ecological passages for animals, as well as corrosion prevention solutions.

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Israel Hosts 7 Air Forces in Largest Drill in its History

The Israeli Air Force (IAF) is hosting air forces from seven nations, in the largest air drill in the Jewish state's history. Some 100 aircraft and several hundred pilots and support crews from the United States, Greece, Poland, France, Germany, India and Italy will arrive in Israel for Blue Flag. Officers and attaches from nearly 40 countries are also attending as observers.

Established in 2013, Blue Flag is a biennial, two-week drill aimed at improving the type of planning, targeting and coordinated command and control required by coalitions operating together. The goal of the exercise, conducted out of Uvda Airbase in the south, is to simulate extreme combat



scenarios and to fly in coalition as realistically as possible.

Israel's Blue Flag does not pit forces against one another; rather, it stresses cooperation over competition. Among the seven participants, India, France and Germany are attending Blue Flag for the first time.

"The 'Blue-Flag' exercise is a significant quantum leap in our ability to hold an exercise and provide our multi-national

participants with a quality training experience as performed in Israel," said Lt. Col. Nadav, Commander of the 133rd Squadron ("Knights of the Twin Tail"), which operates "Baz" (F-15) fighter jets and is leading the exercise.

"This is a significant milestone in our relationship with the international air forces, some of which are arriving in Israel to train for the first time. This exercise will allow us to continue cooperating with these forces in the future as well," he added.

"The IAF has two main goals in the exercise: the first is to improve the operational readiness of all air forces involved via a quality mutual training experience, while creating a fertile ground for mutual learning. The second is to show the world that the IAF is an advanced, strong and leading force and improve Israel's international status as a result. We see each participant as an ambassador," Lt. Col. Guy, Head of the Training Branch in the IAF Air Division, explained.

Israel Has World's Highest Percentage of Teenage EMTs Sixty percent of the volunteer staff of Magen David Adom, Israel's national emergency-response network, are teenagers.

When the dispatcher alerted them about a two-week-old baby who'd stopped breathing, 16-year-old Ori Cohen and his Magen David Adom crewmates were right nearby with their ambulance. Working quickly under the guidance of the crew's senior emergency medical technician, Cohen and his fellow volunteers restored the infant's breathing and whisked her off to the hospital. The doctors said she'll be fine.

Cohen is one of 11,000 Israeli teenagers working voluntary shifts on MDA ambulances throughout Israel – making up a remarkable 60 percent of the volunteer staff.

"We have the biggest youth corps by percentage in the world, as far as I know," says Eli Yaffe, MDA deputy director for general training and culture. He adds that in some other countries, youth volunteers are only allowed to do tasks such as patient transport rather than responding to emergencies as youth volunteers do

The 50-year-old national emergency response network always accepted teen volunteers but it started a formal youth program in 1993 for 15- to 18-year-olds as an option for fulfilling the Education Ministry's mandatory 60 hours of volunteering for highschool students.

"We offer a 60-hour training course, so if they just pass the course they've completed the requirement. It's optional to volunteer beyond that," says Yaffe. About 3,000 teenagers each year do opt to interview for spots on ambulance crews – more, in fact, than there are spots available. "MDA is an organization where you can really help people, and that's very exciting," Cohen tells ISRAEL21c.

Tzippy Winter, 18, averages three shifts a month during the school year, more during vacations. "It gives you expertise basic handling medical emergencies and you really learn importance helping other people. Even sitting in the back of the ambulance with an old person or with someone about to give birth makes you feel

you're doing something amazing," she tells ISRAEL21c.

Dina Abu Toameh of Jerusalem, a 17-year-old Muslim, says the calls she finds most gratifying are those where her Arabic translation abilities are critical. "In our shifts we can have both Arabs and Jews, but sometimes I'm the only one in the crew who knows Arabic," she says. "One time we had an old lady in an Arab neighborhood with a stomach ache and the other three on the crew were Jewish. It was me who helped her communicate with our shift manager."

Abu Toameh is majoring in medicine in high school and hopes to become a paramedic. She took the MDA youth volunteer course in Hebrew although it is also offered in Arabic. She says her family is very proud of her. "Since I started volunteering it was the first time my mother wasn't angry when I came home late," she says with a laugh.

Difficult cases

While the majority of emergency calls don't involve trauma, youth volunteers are trained to handle serious scenarios. Those who have volunteered for at least a year are eligible to take on more responsibility such supervising younger volunteers. About 35 percent of youth volunteers also continue to volunteer after serving in the Israel Defense

During the summer of 2017, approximately 700 MDA youth volunteers chose to take a course for dealing with mass-casualty disasters. About 230 youth volunteers took a first-aid trainers' course so they can teach peers.

"Sometimes you see hard things like suicides or terror attacks," says Cohen, "but you are always surrounded by people who love you and if you have a hard case they're talking to you constantly to make sure you're allright."


Follow-up questionnaires have revealed that not only do young MDA volunteers feel supported after a severe incident, but they actually feel badly if the incident occurred on someone else's shift, Yaffe adds.

Youth volunteers from abroad

Not only Israeli youth are clamoring to volunteer with MDA. Over the past 25 years, 6,500 teens have come to Israel for six weeks of training and volunteering with MDA squads across the country. "We run 10 courses a year, working with Jewish youth movements in 20 countries," says Uriel Goldberg, 25, coordinator of MDA's Yochai Porat Overseas Program. The courses are also offered to foreign teens in Israel on gap-year programs and to 18- to 29-year-olds who come independently.

In 2016, a total of 427 overseas MDA youth volunteers came from Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, China, England, France, Germany, Hungary, Ireland, Italy, Mexico, Morocco, Netherlands, New Zealand, Panama, Spain, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand and the United States.

"As well as the practical skills, these volunteers learn leadership, teamwork and self-confidence. Quite a few make aliyah, as I did after the program," says Goldberg. "I came as a shy 18-yearold and it changed me completely."

Court Demands Answers on Failure to Protect Women of the Wall

Police, Western Wall Rabbi and Western Wall Heritage Foundation have 30 days to explain why they don't remove violent protesters

On November 13, 2017, Israel's High Court of Justice gave police and Western Wall officials 30 days to explain why they are failing to protect female worshipers from harassment at the Jewish holy site in Jerusalem.

The move came in response to a petition filed by the Women of the Wall group that claimed the Israel Police, Western Wall rabbi and Western Wall Heritage Foundation routinely fail to protect female worshipers from "disruptive"

elements." The officials must explain why they do not provide security for women praying at the

Western Wall plaza and why they do not "take every necessary step" against those attempting to disrupt their prayers.

The group, which holds monthly services at the Western Wall that feature women reading from Torah scrolls, have long complained of harassment and discrimination by the Orthodox bodies governing the site.

"I hope that the message being delivered to the state is that it needs to remove all disturbing elements from Women of the Wall prayers and ensure Women of the Wall's constitutional right of ritual at the Western Wall as early as Rosh Hodesh Kislev, this coming Sunday, and Women of the Wall can pray peacefully," said Riki Shapira Rosenberg, lawyer for Women of the Wall.

The court order came months after Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's cabinet voted to freeze the implementation of a permanent pluralistic prayer section at the Western Wall, which was approved by government ministers in January 2016. That decision by the cabinet was met with widespread dismay from liberal groups and Diaspora Jews.

Frankfurt District Court Rules in Favor of Kuwait Airways' Anti-Israeli Discrimination

On November 16th the Frankfurt District Court ruled in favor of Kuwait Airways in a lawsuit against the airline. The case was brought by an Israeli passenger, represented by The Lawfare Project's German counsel, Nathan Gelbart, who bought a ticket from Frankfurt to Bangkok last summer but, on attempting to board his flight, was barred from doing so because of his nationality.

Kuwait bans all its citizens and companies from doing any business with the Jewish State or its citizens. Kuwait Airways enforces this policy strictly, banning Israelis from its flights. It has faced similar actions in Switzerland and the United States, where legal pressure led to the airline cancelling its popular NYC-London flights, and all its inter-European flights, rather than compromise its racist policy.

The Mayor and City Treasurer of Frankfurt, Uwe Becker, has expressed his disapproval of the ruling in the following statement:

"To my mind, an airline that practices discrimination and anti-Semitism by refusing to fly Israeli passengers should not be allowed to takeoff or land in Frankfurt, or at any other airport in Germany. This Kuwaiti law, that is deeply anti-Semitic and that forbids the transport of Israelis cannot be legal grounds for the violation of international standards."

The Judge's explanation for the decision has not yet been made public. Counsel for the Israeli passenger who brought the case have said that correspondence from the judge make it seem likely that Kuwait Airways was able to get away with their systematic, institutional racism towards Israelis because it offered to purchase a flight for the Israeli on a different



airline.

Brooke Goldstein, the Executive Director of The Lawfare Project, which provided counsel to the litigant, commented: "If a restaurant refused to provide service to someone because they were black, we would rightly be outraged and appalled. We wouldn't stop being appalled if, upon kicking him out, the restaurant offered him a voucher for the restaurant next door. That is the legal reasoning the judge seems to have used in this case."

Goldstein continued, "This is a clear-cut case of bigoted, anti-Semitic discrimination. To see a Jewish person banned from exercising his freedoms in Germany in 2017 is chilling enough. To see that discrimination whitewashed and legitimized by a German judge is grotesque. By any measure, this verdict is ludicrous and we will be appealing."

Nathan Gelbart, the Lawfare Project's German counsel, said: "I am deeply shocked that a German Court has so obviously allowed a totalitarian regime's discriminatory legislation to overrule both German National Law and Germany's democratic values. The statement by the court that my client was supposed to accept transportation on other airlines is nothing more than capitulating to anti-Semitic discrimination by Kuwait Airways. This is a shameful verdict for

democracy and for Germany in general. It must be corrected."

Outside of the courts, Kuwait Airways has come under political pressure to cease its discriminatory commercial practice. Last month, the German Federal Minister of Transport and Digital Infrastructure, Alexander Dobrindt, ordered a Federal Transport Ministry investigation into whether the airline's current policy of refusing service to Israeli nationals violates existing air traffic laws. The investigation is ongoing, and is independent of the lawsuit and this troubling decision.

Volker Beck, a former Bundestag member of the Green Party, made clear the choice facing Kuwait Airways. "Stop the discrimination or stop doing business in Germany," he said in comments to the Frankfurter Rundschau newspaper.

Mayor and Treasurer of Frankfurt, Uwe Becker, has added to the pressure against Kuwait Airways in Germany. That pressure is expected to increase as a result of the litigant signaling his intention to appeal the judge's decision.

Rivlin Tells US Jews He's Pained Western Wall Now 'A Symbol of Division'

Amid rift with Diaspora, president assures Jewish Federations summit Israel 'will always be the home of every Jew,' regardless of denomination

President Reuven Rivlin lamented the Western Wall's transformation into "a symbol of division and disagreement" between Israel and the Diaspora, and expressed hope that understandings would soon be reached on egalitarian prayer at the holy site.

Addressing the General Assembly of the Jewish Federations of North America in Los Angeles, Rivlin said, "It causes such pain that the symbol of unity, the Wall of our Tears and Joy, has become a symbol of division and disagreement.

"I hope that in the future we can return to the table together, and reach an understanding on this important issue."

He added that it was important to "respect Israel's democratic process, the decision-making process. Whether we like it or not,

in the only Jewish democratic state, 'religion and state' is a political issue — maybe the most explosive one."

The government earlier this year suspended an agreement that would have upgraded the egalitarian prayer platform adjacent to the main plaza at the holy site, and set it up as a permanent prayer site. The decision led to widespread anger in the Jewish world, and faith leaders have warned of a growing rift between Israel and the Diaspora over Israel's treatment of the non-ultra-Orthodox streams of Judaism.

Rivlin said Israel "was, and will always be, the home of every Jew: Orthodox, Reform, Conservative, secular, traditional, Ashkenazi, Sephardi. Jews. We are all one people, and Israel is dear to all of us.

"The Jews of the Diaspora, especially in North America, are full partners," he said. "You are true stakeholders in this wonder called Israel. You stand beside us at times of crisis and joy. You dream with us. You challenge us. You help keep us strong." That support, he said, "cannot be taken for granted."

Rivlin said Jews should stand together "against anti-Semitism in

all its forms, from the vandalism of Jewish cemeteries, to terror attacks against our brothers and sisters around the world, from BDS on campuses, to attacking Israel's legitimacy in the United Nations. There is no room for hesitation, we must continue the fight against it as one united front."

He also spoke of a need to preserve Jewish identity "and to pass it from one generation to the next," as well as an imperative of safeguarding Israel — facing the Iranian threat to Israel and the region and ending the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

"The lives of Palestinians and Israelis, Arabs and Jews, are bound together," he said. "We live side by side, and with each other. We share the same land, the same holy places, the same water and the same sky. There will be no peace, until we all understand that we are not doomed to live together, it is our destiny to live together"

IDF Deploys Iron Dome, Raises Alert Amid Gaza Terror Threat

Deployment of missile defenses comes 2 weeks after IDF destroyed an Islamic Jihad attack tunnel, leading to death of at least 12 of the group's operatives

A number of Iron Dome missile defense batteries were deployed in central Israel amid heightened tensions with the Palestinian Islamic Jihad since the army demolished the terrorist group's border-crossing attack tunnel last month.

On October 30th the Israel Defense Forces blew up the tunnel, which originated in the Gazan city of Khan Younis and crossed into Israeli territory near Kibbutz Kissufim in the northwestern Negev. According to the army, the tunnel had been under surveillance the entire time that it was inside Israeli territory and did not pose a threat to civilians. The army said later that killing the terrorists was not the primary objective of the tunnel demolition. The bodies of five terrorists who were working on the tunnel inside Israeli territory were recovered by the IDF, the army said.

The IDF confirmed the anti-missile systems were installed in "central Israel," but would not elaborate on their exact location, citing army policy.

The Iron Dome system, which is designed to shoot down short-range rockets and, in some cases, mortars, was deployed to counter the threats made by Islamic Jihad, which has vowed to avenge its members killed in the tunnel blast and its aftermath. Israeli officials have tried to dissuade the terror group, warning of a harsh retaliation by the IDF.

Maj. Gen. Yoav Mordechai, who runs the Defense Ministry's chief liaison office with the Palestinians, publicly warned Islamic Jihad in a video posted to YouTube. He addressed by name the terror group's leader, Ramadan Shalah, and his deputy, Ziad Nakhaleh, who run the Gaza-based group from Damascus, and said they would be "held responsible" should Islamic Jihad attack Israel.

In the video, Mordechai said that Israel is "aware of the plot that the Palestinian Islamic Jihad is planning

against Israel," and warned that "any attack by the Islamic Jihad will be met with a powerful and determined Israeli response, not only against the Jihad, but also against Hamas."

Islamic Jihad responded Mordechai's video, saying the Israeli threats against its leaders constituted "an act of war," and vowing to continue in its plans to carry out a revenge attack against Israel.

The "threats to target the movement's leadership is a declaration of war, which we will confront," Islamic Jihad said, according to a statement carried by its media affiliate Palestine Today News Agency.

The group said it would not back down on its "right" to retaliate against Israel for the tunnel explosion, which led to the deaths of 12 of its members, including two commanders, as well as two members of Hamas's military wing.

"We reaffirm our right to respond to any aggression, including our right to respond to the crime of aggression on the resistance tunnel," its statement said.

According to Palestinian media, Hamas encouraged Islamic Jihad to abstain from retaliating both in order to prevent further escalation with Israel and to prevent the reconciliation talks it has been conducting with the Palestinian Authority from falling apart.

In his YouTube message, Mordechai referred to those reconciliation efforts, saying Islamic Jihad was "playing with fire" and potentially threatening the talks, as well as the safety of Gaza Strip residents.

Early in November, a senior officer in the IDF's Southern Command warned that the military suspected the terror group may retaliate for the tunnel demolition with attacks on soldiers serving near the border, rocket fire at southern Israeli communities or terror attacks in the West Bank.

"The Islamic Jihad will have a hard time holding back," said the unnamed senior official.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu added his own warning addressed to those contemplating an attack. "These days, there are still those who toy with trying renewed attacks on Israel. We will take a very strong hand against anyone who tries to attack us or attacks us from any theater. I say this to every entity, rogue faction, organization everyone. In any case, we see Hamas as responsible for every attack that emanates from, or is planned against us in, the Gaza Strip."



Eight Advances Transforming the Lives of Diabetics WorldwideFrom an oral insulin capsule to a noninvasive glucose monitor, Israeli entrepreneurs and researchers are making life easier for diabetics.

While there is not yet a cure for diabetes, many Israeli researchers and companies offer improved approaches for avoiding, managing and treating the condition. Diabetes is a chronic disease that occurs when the pancreas cannot make insulin - the hormone that regulates blood sugar — or when the body cannot make good use of the insulin it makes.

As of 2015, approximately 415 million adults in the world have diabetes and that number is expected to rise to 642 million by 2040. At least 90 percent of cases are type 2 diabetes, characterized by insulin resistance and/or deficiency. In addition, more than 542,000 children in the world live with type 1 diabetes, an autoimmune condition where the body attacks its own insulin-making cells.

Diabetes is the leading cause of heart disease, stroke, kidney failure, non-traumatic lower-limb amputations and new cases of blindness among adults. Those with diabetes have twice the normal risk of death; in 2014, diabetes was listed as the seventh leading cause of death in the United States.

Here are some significant diabetes developments reported in Israel in recent years.

Oramed Pharmaceuticals

Oramed Pharmaceuticals hopes to revolutionize the treatment of type 1 and type 2 diabetes through its proprietary oral insulin capsule developed through research at Jerusalem's Hadassah Medical Center. Currently, insulin must be injected.

The company has completed multiple Phase II clinical trials under an Investigational New Drug application with the US Food and Drug Administration. Oramed CEO Nadav Kidron participated in the

2017 Disruptive Growth Company Showcase NYC Conference in September in New York City.

DarioHealth

Dario makes a personalized, pocket-sized, all-in-one glucose meter coupled with a real-time mobile app to track, monitor and manage diabetes from a smartphone.

Last month, this Caesarea-based digital health company received the CE Mark for its Lightningenabled Dario Blood Glucose Monitoring System, which will enable European consumers to use the metering device on the latest Apple devices. The regulatory process is now starting in the US, Canada and Australia. The company's new B2B2C platform, Dario Engage, helps healthcare providers in all aspects of user engagement for diabetic patients, including enrollment, coaching and ongoing communication.

Betalin Therapeutics

Betalin is developing an implantable engineered micropancreas (EMP) using a natural micro-scaffold and all the cellular components present in a natural pancreas. These cells reconstruct the body's internal insulin-producing capability in accordance with the blood-sugar levels. Type 1 and severe type 2 diabetes patients implanted with the micro-pancreas would no longer need to monitor their blood-sugar levels.


In preclinical studies in a mouse model of diabetes, approximately 70% of the mice in which the Betalin EMP was implanted did not need further insulin injections even for the longest period tested of 90 days after implantation.

This early-stage company, the Hebrew spun of

University of Jerusalem, won in the pharmaceuticals category at the Biomed Startup of the Year competition held by the Israel Innovation Authority at MIXii Biomed 2017 in Tel Aviv last May.

GlucoTrack

GlucoTrack users test glucose levels with an ear clip attached to a handheld control



decade into developing GlucoTrack, a revolutionary noninvasive system for self-monitoring glucose levels, available so far in several European countries, South Korea and Israel.

The GlucoTrack sensor clips onto your earlobe. A patented combination of ultrasonic, electromagnetic and thermal technologies works with proprietary algorithm to measure physiological parameters correlated with glucose level. Results are displayed within about a minute on a USB-connected handheld control unit, which also stores and compares previous readings. The number is announced verbally, facilitating use by elderly and vision-impaired people with type 2 diabetes or pre-diabetes.

Cnoga Medical's Prick Free Glucometer



Cnoga Medical's noninvasive glucometer. Another Israeli company, Cnoga Medical, offers a prick-free glucometer that uses a camera to observe changing color shades of

the user's finger to give accurate results comparable to those of a fingerprick, following a short "training" period in which the device learns to correlate the user's optical skin-tone characteristics with camera readings. The COG device is certified in Israel, Europe, New Zealand, Turkey, India, Philippines, Thailand, Brazil and China. A new clinical study is starting in Sao Paolo.

Insulog

Many diabetics manually log their insulin injections to avoid overor under-dosing. Insulog is a small device that snaps onto all major brands of disposable insulin pens to display the user's most recent data. Insulog's smartphone app uses Bluetooth technology to store injection history, including number of units administered, and bloodglucose level. Users can share this history with their physician.

The company was founded in 2014 in Ramat Gan by Menash Michael, who has type 1 diabetes. He is developing the device for delivery in 2018 following a successful Indiegogo campaign earlier this year. It needs only Class 1 FDA approval with no required clinical trials. "We will market Insulog first in Israel and then on an ecommerce platform," he tells ISRAEL21c.

DreaMed Diabetes

Based in Petah Tikva, DreaMed has two products: Advisor decisionsupport technology to optimize and fine-tune patient-specific insulin treatment plans (FDA and CE approval pending); and Glucositter, the first artificial pancreas system to receive the CE Mark for sales in Europe. When integrated with an insulin pump, Glucositter provides round-the-clock monitoring of glucose levels and precise, real-time adjustment of insulin levels.

DayTwo

DayTwo, based on groundbreaking research at Israel's Weizmann Institute of Science, aims to help people avoid developing diabetes by predicting individualized bloodglucose response to thousands of different foods and meals based on

gut microbiome analysis and other personal parameters.

This year, DayTwo and the Weizmann Institute scientists collaborated with Johnson & Johnson's Janssen Research & Development Company to evaluate DayTwo's platform for the effective interception of gestational diabetes,

type 2 diabetes and metabolic syndrome-associated disorders. This resulted in a Series A investment of \$12 million led by J&J.

DayTwo currently is running trials with the Mayo Clinic and other institutions, while the product is fully commercial in Israel and US. International Chief Commercial

Officer Amir Golan tells ISRAEL21c that the UK and Canada are the next potential markets. Meanwhile, the company is working with professional athletes to control blood-sugar levels and is partnering with two diabetes medical centers in Israel as well as dieticians in Israel and the US.

Indonesian Museum Removes Nazi-themed Exhibit After International Outrage

An Indonesian museum that allowed visitors to take selfies with a life-size wax sculpture of Hitler against a backdrop of the gates into Auschwitz concentration camp has removed the exhibit following international outrage, the manager said November 11th.

De Arca Statue Art Museum in the Javanese city of Jogjakarta drew swift condemnation from rights groups after details of the controversial display were published in foreign media. The exhibit features a sure-footed Hitler standing in front of a huge photo of the gates of Auschwitz, the largest Nazi concentration camp where more than 1.1 million people were killed.

The museum's operations manager, Jamie Misbah, said the wax sculpture was removed after the building was alerted to criticism from the prominent

Jewish human rights organization, Simon Wiesenthal Center. "We don't want to attract outrage," Misbah told AFP. "Our purpose to display the Hitler figure in the museum is to educate."

The Hitler sculpture is one of about 80 figures, including world leaders and celebrities, at the wax and visual effects center. The Nazithemed exhibit was a popular attraction for visitors to take selfies, and photos circulating on social media show customers — including children — posing with Hitler and in some cases using the Nazi salute. Misbah said he thought it was "normal" for visitors to take photos in front of displays, but said the museum respected the exhibit had upset people from

around the world.

Historians have blamed poor schooling for the lack of awareness and sensitivity about the Holocaust in Indonesia, which is home to the world's biggest Muslim population and a small number of Jews.


In January 2017, a controversial Nazi-themed cafe in the western Javanese city of Bandung closed. The venue, which featured swastika-bearing walls and photos of Hitler, sparked global uproar when reports about the unusual venue surfaced several years ago.



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
Israeli, Arab, European Firemen Share Cross-Border Drill

Firefighting and search-and-rescue teams from Jordan, Israel, Palestinian Authority, Italy, France and Spain had a joint disaster exercise in Israel. By Abigail Klein Leichman Israel 21c

As forest fires and other major catastrophes engulf many parts of the world with greater frequency, the European Commission and the Israeli government organized an international exercise in Israel this week for firefighters from Jordan, Israel, the Palestinian Authority, Italy, France and Spain.

The Middle East Forest Fires drill on October 24 and 25 had more than 400 participants from the various countries — including 250 firefighters, pilots, ground crews and logistics personnel — learning to improve skills and share knowledge in large-scale cooperative firefighting management, evacuation of residents, humanitarian assistance and preservation of nature.

"In recent years, we have witnessed large-scale disasters

take the lives of tens of thousands of victims, such as earthquakes, floods, fires and incidents involving hazardous materials. These are disasters that countries cannot always deal with on their own, and for which they need assistance," said Israeli Fire Commissioner Lt. Gen. Dedi Simhi.

The exercise scenario — a large forest fire that spread across borders — included the controlled setting of small fires in two Negev forests, one northeast of Beersheva and the other southeast of Kiryat Gat.

The Israeli contingent included representatives of the Foreign and

Public Security ministries, the Israel Police, the Firefighting and Rescue Authority, Magen David Adom, the Home Front Command, the National Security Agency and Keren Kayemeth LeIsrael-Jewish National Fund.

Months of planning sessions preceded the Middle East Forest Fires drill. There were lots of logistics to coordinate as firefighting planes from Jordan, France, Italy and Spain also were sent to Israel for the simulation.

While Israeli firefighters have worked with counterparts from the Palestinian Authority and several Mediterranean countries in the past, it was the first time all of these countries came together for a joint exercise. The content of the sessions had to be translated into several languages though English was the dominant language.

Separately, at an army base in southern Israel, search-and-rescue teams from the Israel Defense

Forces, Palestinian Authority, Jordan and Spain practiced how to respond cooperatively to a simulated massive earthquake that trapped "victims" underneath the rubble of a collapsed building constructed for the exercise by soldiers on the base.

The joint exercise ended with a ceremony for all participants before they departed back to their home countries. At the ceremony, Simhi said that since its inception in 1948, the state of Israel has been guided by the Talmudic axiom "One who saves a single life is as if he has saved the entire world." ... "We sent rescue forces from the Home Front Command to assist during earthquakes in Turkey, Nepal, Haiti, and most recently, Mexico. Our aerial firefighting unit provided assistance last year to Cyprus, and this year to Montenegro and Macedonia," Simhi said.

"And we too, needed assistance in two recent events. Last November, during an unprecedented number of fires, we requested and received assistance from our Palestinian and Egyptian neighbors, from Cyprus and from many other countries. And such was the case during the Mount Carmel fire in 2010. "Therefore, there is great operational importance to an exercise involving international cooperation, so that in the event of an emergency, we will be familiar with one another and know how to work in collaboration," he continued.

"I also believe that a personal relationship between commanders from different countries can be of great value during a large-scale disaster."

Princeton's Center for Jewish Life Cancels Event with Israel's Deputy Foreign Minister

In the latest attack on free speech by pro-Palestinian activists on American campuses, an address by an Israeli diplomat was canceled. The Center for Jewish Life (CJL) at Princeton University has canceled a campus lecture by Israeli Deputy Foreign Minister Tzipi Hotovely at the last minute, caving in to pressure from the Alliance of Jewish Progressives and Allies, which takes a pro-Palestinian stand.

The lecture was scheduled at Princeton's Hillel House. She was notified just a day earlier. In a letter published in the Daily Princetonian, the group stated that to date, the CJL "has indefinitely postponed" Hotovely's talk "until it is vetted through the CJL's Israel Advisory Committee."

"Hotovely's work causes irreparable damage to the prospects of a peaceful solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict," the letter claims, referring to her policy statements as "racist." The pro-Palestinian group objects to her support for construction of Jewish communities in Judea and Samaria, including her Zionist proclamation that "This land is ours. All of it is ours. We did not come here to apologize for that."

According to the letter, "Hotovely's

alarming vision for the future of the region is coupled with a complete rejection of Palestinian history and connection to key sites such as the Haram al-Sharif. In a recent speech in the Israeli Parliament, Hotovely spoke directly to Palestinian Members of Knesset, saying, 'You are thieves of history. Your history books are empty, and you are trying to co-opt Jewish history and Islamicize it.'"

Haram al-Sharif, the Arabic name for the Temple Mount in the Old City of Jerusalem, is the holiest site in Judaism and Islam's third holiest. The Jewish ties to the site, where the two Jewish temples stood, date back thousands of years. When UNESCO last year denied the Jewish claim to the Mount, siding with the Palestinians, the organization was condemned by Israeli politicians across the board.

Ambassador Carmel Shama HaCohen, Israel's permanent delegate to UNESCO, said at the time that "Israel and the Jewish people do not require UNESCO's or any other country's confirmation of the special connection between the Jewish people and the State of Israel and Jerusalem in general, and the holy sites such as the Western Wall and the Temple Mount in particular."


"There is no connection of another people to another place in the world that comes close to the strength and depth of our connection to Jerusalem from a religious, historical and national perspective, a connection that has stood the test of 2,000 years," he said.

Hotovely arrived in the US to speak at a number of campuses, including New York and Columbia Universities, in an effort to help pro-Israel students defend the Jewish state in an atmosphere of intense hostility.

"The attempt to cancel my lecture at Princeton University, another station on my campus journey, is indicative of a severe and profound crisis. Although there are those who will not allow me to speak, the lecture will take place in front of anyone interested. I will continue to fight for the truth of Israel everywhere," a defiant Hotovely posted on her Facebook page.

Princeton's Chabad House hosted her lecture.

Have A Nosh With Miriam

I hope you are as excited as I am for this terrific dessert sweet potato latke recipe that I found two years ago and intended to include in my column last year ... and then forgot! It



has such delicious ingredients and, being parve, would be a great ending to any Chanukah supper. A second sweet potato recipe is flavored by fresh ginger, another of my favorites. The Romanian latke recipe is made from fine noodles instead of potatoes, and is also a great dessert during Chanukah, sort of a kugel morfed into latkes! Happy Chanukah! MHB

DESSERT SWEET POTATO LATKES

2 medium sweet potatoes, peeled and finely grated

3 eggs

1 teaspoon granulated sugar

4-6 tablespoons ground almonds

2 tablespoons golden raisins

2 tablespoons chopped dates 1/4 cup chopped pecans

Salt to taste

1/8 to 1/4 cup olive oil

Powdered sugar

In a large bowl, combine sweet potatoes, eggs, granulated sugar and enough ground almonds to make a thick batter. Mix well. Fold in raisins, dates and pecans. Add salt.

In a large skillet, heat oil. Spoon heaping tablespoonful of potato mixture into oil, flattening with back of a wet spoon. Brown on both sides, about 3 minutes per side. Drain on paper towels. Just before serving, sprinkle with powdered sugar.

SWEET POTATO/GINGER LATKES

1 lb. sweet potatoes, peeled

1 2" x 1" piece fresh ginger

2 eggs

½ cup apple juice ½ cup all-purpose flour 1 Tablespoon sugar

1 teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt Vegetable oil

Grate sweet potatoes with grating disk of food processor or by hand. Place in large bowl. Cut ginger into small chunks. Put in food processor with steel blade and mince. Measure two tablespoons of the ginger and add to potatoes. Combine remaining ingredients (except oil) then add to potatoes and toss together until mixed. Heat ½ inch vegetable oil in large skillet over medium-high heat to 356 degrees. Drop ¼ cup batter into hot oil. Cook for 3-4 minutes per side, until crisp. Drain on paper toweling before serving. Can be frozen. To reheat, do not defrost, but put in 400 degree oven for 10 minutes, or until hot and crisp. Makes about 15 latkes.

ROMANIAN NOODLE LATKES

1 8-oz. package fine egg noodles

2 Tablespoons margarine

3 eggs, lightly beaten 1/4 teaspoon salt

1 small apple, peeled and finely diced

1/2 cup golden raisins, plumped in a little apple juice

Oil for frying

½ cup sugar and ½ teaspoon cinnamon, combined in a bowl

Cook noodles according to package directions. Drain well and transfer to large bowl, add margarine or butter and mix well. Cool, slightly. Blend in eggs, salt, apple and raisins.

In large, heavy skillet heat ¼ inch oil over medium heat. Drop noodle mixture by tablespoon into hot oil, flattening each spoonful with back of spoon to form thin latke. Fry on both sides until golden brown and crisp, about 3 minutes on each side. Do not turn latkes until first side is golden and top is set. Drain on paper towels. Coat latkes in cinnamon sugar mixture. Makes about 30 latkes.

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
