### UNA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CONSIDERS PROJECT FOR NEW HEADQUARTERS

22-STORY SKYSCRAPER IN JERSEY CITY MAY BE NEW UNA HOME

JERSEY CITY, N. J. — The Ukrainian National Association and the Svoboda Press may soon have a new home.  
The Association's Supreme Executive Committee, at its last meeting here Thursday, September 8, considered one of several projects that is by far the most attractive in terms of both accommodations and costs involved.  
No decision has been reached yet, but judging by the attention given the project by all members of the executive board, it appears to be on the way to becoming a reality by the end of next year.

#### Project in Progress

The project involves the construction of a new 22-story skyscraper in the vicinity of the present UNA headquarters on the Hudson River. Plans for redeveloping the entire section here are already underway, and it appears that the city is interested in having the UNA join in the project.

Jersey City, one of the oldest cities in the United States, is stepping up plans for total redevelopment that will see dozens of new structures rise in the downtown section, once one of the most exclusive sections in the city. Four huge apartment buildings have already been erected here. Surrounding tenements are already being razed to make way for other buildings that will house business companies, large professional concerns, shopping centers as well as dwellers who wish to remain close to their place of employment.

#### Park

A large park overlooking the Hudson River is included in the plans replacing the dilapidated houses on the fringe of the area. The view to the Statue of Liberty would be open, as it once was when Fr. Hrushtka was setting type for early Svoboda editions.  
The UNA main offices, housed in a 1926 two-story structure on the corner of Washington and Grand Streets here, would be moved

to a nearby location opposite the main post office building. The new structure would have all modern conveniences, including ample office space, facilities for Svoboda's composing and printing rooms, spacious conference rooms, banquet halls, cafeteria, as well as some 300 apartments with an indoor swimming pool, recreational rooms, a gym, ample garage facilities and parking space.

The UNA and the Svoboda Press would have a choice of offices according to its needs. And it is a fact, repeated many times at UNA conventions, that the present offices no longer satisfy the needs of the rapidly expanding Association.  
Subsidized by federal and city governments, the entire project will be known as Gregory Park. The time of redevelopment will take some 10 years, with the end result that a city within a city will rise on the banks of the Hudson opposite New York City's famed skyline.

The UNA executive committee members spent Thursday afternoon discussing the project with the contractors and examining some of the features of the new building. While not yet wholly committed to the idea, the UNA executives are studying the details most carefully, remaining in touch with city authorities and its own legal counsel. The decision will be forthcoming after a thorough and detailed study.

#### Await Decision

Taking part in the meeting were the following officers: Joseph Lesawyer, Supreme President, who chaired the day long session, Stephen Kuropas, Vice-President, Mrs. Mary Dushnyk, Vice-President, Bohdan Zorych, Vice-President and Director of UNA Canadian Office, Walter Sochan, Vice-President and head of UNA's recording department, Dr. Jaroslav Padoch, Secretary, John Kokolski, Treasurer, and Anthony Dragan, Svoboda Editor-in-Chief.

Each of the officers reported on the business of his department, after a lengthy discussion on the UNA building project.  
Mr. Kokolski stated that during his two months in office (July and August) a total of \$123,623 has been invested in bonds, while a sum of \$201,500 has been allocated in new mortgage loans. New mortgage commitments amount to \$686,500, the Treasurer reported, adding that the total invested by the UNA in mortgage loans will amount by the end of the month to nearly 9 million dollars.

#### Ahead Of Last Year

Dr. Padoch reported a gain of 243 new members in July and 279 in August, thus bringing the total of new members organized this year to 3,500. An additional 2,500 new members are needed to attain the set quota of 6,000 by the end of the year. A total of 720 new members were organized in Canada. The number organized so far exceeds last year's total by 1,000 for the same period of time. In addition, three new UNA branches

### NEW ORTHODOX CATHEDRAL IN PHILADELPHIA BLESSED BY METROPOLITAN JOHN

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — Thousands of faithful and numerous clergy of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA witnessed an impressive blessing ceremony here Sunday, September 11 as His Blessedness Metropolitan John Theodorovich officially opened the doors of the new St. Vladimir's Cathedral.  
The new Cathedral, a remarkable feat of architecture replaces the old shrine which over the years has served a large portion of the Ukrainian American community in the City of Brotherly Love.

#### New Generation

A small parish established in 1928, it is now one of the largest and most active in the country. The parishioners are mostly first and second generation Americans of Ukrainian descent whose love of Ukrainian religious and cultural traditions spurred them on to the great deed that was the erection of the Cathedral. Led by the Very Rev. John Sawchuck, the parish's pastor from 1928 through 1963, the Ukrainian Orthodox community here has grown in size and scope of cultural activity.  
A whole new generation of Ukrainian Americans has grown up here under the dedicated tutelage of its clergy and guardians. They are deeply attached to their religious

and Ukrainian culture which they strive to impart to subsequent generations of a growing flock.  
The Very Rev. Stephen Bilak, who succeeded Rev. Sawchuck as pastor, carried through the noble deed commenced by his predecessor. Assisted by a dedicated and hard-working committee, Fr. Bilak guided the efforts that led to the erection of the beautiful Cathedral.  
Start in 1963  
It was in 1963 that the parish committee, headed by Bohdan Hryshchshyn, formed the cathedral-building committee under the chairmanship of Joseph F. Podgurski.  
Seeing that the old site is rapidly deteriorating, as is the entire section, and that the parishioners are moving out into other areas of residence, particularly to the northern suburbs, the building committee decided to look for an appropriate site in that area. Thanks to the generosity of the parishioners, the funds for the new Cathedral were secured within a year. A site was purchased in Oak Lane and the construction was started according to the architectural design of Nick J. Chimes, an architect of Greek descent.  
The new structure combines beautifully the elements of

### Brilliant Ukrainian Chemist Enjoys Sailing as Hobby

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Sometimes when you talk to Dr. Michael Kasha, it's hard to figure out whether he's a chemist turned sailor or a sailor turned chemist. He talks of both with unbounded enthusiasm.

But Kasha, director of Florida State University's Institute of Molecular Biophysics is quick to make it clear chemistry and the associated disciplines of the institute have first call on his time. Sailing is only his hobby.

Dr. Kasha, a native of Elizabeth, N.J., whose family belongs to UNA Branch 2, is a brother of Harry Kasha of Clark, N.J., a former UYL-NA officer. The story on Dr. Kasha, was carried nationally UPI.

#### Searching For Life

Right now, the institute is searching, at the molecular level, for the secrets of life. It's a complex subject, spanning several academic fields from chemistry to physics.

Sailing, which Kasha took up five or six years ago at the urging of his wife, provides the 45-year-old scientist with relaxation which he says "clears the cobwebs out of the brain."

A veteran of 15 years on the FSU chemistry faculty, Kasha skips his own 15-foot fiberglass boat. It's kept at his home on Lake Bradford near Florida's capital city ready for a weekend workout and evening sails when the wind is right.

The house is just across the lake from the university's recreational area. And several years ago, after he took up the sport, Kasha decided it would be a good thing for students. "When I enjoy something, I like to get other people interested in it," he said.

Byzantine architecture, so characteristic of Ukrainian churches, with modern innovations in the spirit of 20-century stylization. Exquisite landscaping, mosaic ornamentation plus all modern conveniences conducive to church activity make the new structure a site to behold.

#### Splendor, Emotion

The blessing and dedication ceremonies, amid religious splendor and abounding emotion, did justice to the impressive whole. Metropolitan John, who presided, over the ceremony, celebrated the first Pontifical Divine Liturgy shortly after the doors of the Cathedral were opened to the faithful. ### Archbishop Mstyslaw Upholds U.S. Effort in Viet Nam

WOONSOCKET, R.I.—The Most Rev. Mstyslaw Skrypnyk, Archbishop of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in USA and head of its Consistory, upheld United States involvement in Viet Nam and spoke out against those who oppose the war effort.

Report of the Archbishop's outspoken criticism of those who oppose U.S. policy in Viet Nam was carried by Associated Press on Sept. 11. It was reprinted in the major dailies of the nation, including the New York Times, as well as a number of smaller newspapers.

Archbishop Mstyslaw, who is also head of the Consistory of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church in the USA, spoke at St. Michael's Ukrainian Orthodox Church last Sunday.

He attended the Church's anniversary celebrations in Woonsocket, R.I., according to the AP story.

The Archbishop said that the U.S. effort in Viet Nam is vital to the maintenance of freedom in that part of Southeast Asia and elsewhere in the world.

es were established this year. The success in the organizational field, said Dr. Padoch, should be attributed to the stepped efforts in the pre-convention period.

Mr. Sochan stated that a number of UNA convention resolutions regarding the work in the main offices have been put into effect since his assumption of office in July. The monthly statements to branch secretaries are being mailed out on time. Influx of new applications is being closed with the first of each month. Applications received after that date are added to the next month's total. Mr. Sochan also listed the main causes of membership losses and suggested ways of remedying the situation.

#### Trip to the West

Mr. Zorych outlined the details of his planned journey through the northwestern region of Canada to invigorate UNA activity there. He also reported on the reorganization of the Canadian office and the work accomplished in the field.

Mr. Kuropas reported on the unfinished business relating to the UNA convention in Chicago. Mr. Kuropas was chairman of the convention committee and thus responsible for the organizing phase of the week-long gathering.

Mrs. Dushnyk reported on her activity during the first two months in office, stating that most her functions so far have been representative in character.

An overall picture of UNA activity since the last meeting was given by Mr. Lesawyer, who went over every phase and every department. ### Sitch Starts Season with a Bang

Newark Ukrainian Sitch opened its 1966-67 American Soccer League season with a bang last Sunday downing arch-rival Philadelphia Ukrainian Nationals at Newark's Ironbound Stadium before 1,000 spectators.

The star of the match turned out to be a new player who was obtained by Sitch from Toronto Italia of the Eastern Canada Professional Soccer League. Center forward Peter Short scored three goals to give his new team an impressive victory over the U.S. champion.

#### Two Others

With Short, Sitch acquired two other players to bolster their lineup. They are half-back Roy Turner from Montreal Italia and Orest Lalka from Rochester, New York. Philadelphia Nats, on the other hand, were playing the match without their star defenseman John Borodiak and forward Jorge Benitez. Borodiak and Benitez have reportedly failed to agree on the price with their former club.

Sitch scored its first goal midway in the first half when short blasted the ball from short range after a melee in front of Nats' goal. Walter Czynowych scored the second marker seven minutes after the start of the second stanza. The inside left's hard drive from 20 yards out resulted in an injury to Nats' defender Wolodymyr Tarnawski.

Tarnawski made a dive for the ball but it was deflected and he tried desperately to change direction of his jump. The change in maneuver caused him to land hard on his side, injuring his back and shoulder.

It was Short again who pounced on a pass from winger Chayka and sent the sphere into the net past the outstretched hands of substitute goalie Litynsky.

#### Avoid Shut-Out

Nats broke through for their first goal late in the match when Carlos Yakovino put the ball into the net from a scramble near the Sitch goal. Sitch put the match on ice when Short scored from eight yards out on a running dash.

In the preliminary game at the stadium, Newark Portuguese defeated New Britain Olympics, 3-2. In other matches New Brunswick Hungarians had a field day scoring 11 goals and allowing only 3 into their own net to beat Newark Falcons.

Lack of organization and seriousness is becoming evident again in the league. A scheduled match between Paterson Roma and Hartford S.C. was postponed because of "unavailability of the field." The question is why schedule a game for two teams of the so-called only professional league and then come up with an excuse as flimsy as that?

#### USSFA Warns

The United States Soccer Football Association sent a notice to the Southern New York State Soccer Association saying that any official, player or club cooperating with an unaffiliated league would be facing suspension.

The reference was obviously to the newly created National Professional Soccer League which didn't get the approval of the USSFA. The league seems to be going ahead with its plans to start play early next year despite the official body's warning. The Southern New York Association took note of the warning and advised its member leagues of the situation.

#### World Cup Aftermath

World Cup games in London had a great effect on future soccer fans in the United States. This conclusion has been drawn by many observers. They point to the great volumes of material printed in American newspapers and magazines and also much of the so-called "electronic journalism" (radio, TV) took note of the competition. One of the largest articles to appear on the subject on this side of the ocean was printed in the September 10 issue of "The New Yorker" magazine. The publication is regarded as one of the most sophisticated magazines here.

Life magazine also devoted several pages to pictures and a lengthy story on the games in London. These are only the major magazines that came across the desk of this reporter but no doubt there were many others that had written up on the sport. This interest cannot but help the sport here.

#### Banach Saves Game
