## OF THE REVENUE.

## Cause of Increase or Decrease

} Due chiefly to improved trade conditions and to the presence of a large fleet.

} Due mainly to increased receipts under Stamp duty attributable to the computation of proportionate receipts from sale of postage and revenue stamps on the basis of postal statistics for specified periods and to larger revenue from Entertainments duty.

Heavy fees on certain judgments delivered by the Superior Courts.

} Mainly due to increased receipts from Prison Bakery and from Abattoir fees.

Mainly due to an abnormal quantity of stamps sold to collectors for philatelic purposes and also to larger sale of stamps for postage purposes especially to the Navy.

Increased number of house services laid and heavier consumption of water.

Increased number of installations and a corresponding heavier consumption of current.

Due chiefly to increases in rent and to collection of arrears.

Due to the new mode of accounting adopted in 1925-26 whereby the dividend on certain investments was passed to the credit of the fund to which the investment belonged instead of to general revenue as heretofore, and also to the refund in 1924-25 of income-tax for four years on dividends on Consols.

Increased sale of tickets.

## OF EXPENDITURE FOR 1924-25 AND 1925-26.

## Principal reason of increase and decrease.

Non-payment of the allowances to the Speaker, Deputy Speaker and members during a portion of 1924-25 owing to the dissolution of the Legislative Assembly.

Due to employment of an additional fatiguesman and to additional expenditure consequent on the transfer of the Office to the Auberge d'Aragon.

Due to periodical increments.

Mainly due to purchase of linotype machine in 1924-25.

Mainly due to increase of personnel, transfer of clerks, periodical increments, and salary of Minister partly unappropriated in 1924-5.

Due mainly to the grant of new pensions and gratuities.

Due chiefly to the payment in 1925-26 of the Mail Subsidy, Malta-Tunis.

Transfer of clerks.

Due to appointment of 2 medical referees and to a larger number of exceptions of passport fees.

Due to expenditure incurred in 1924-25 in connection with the general election held in that year.

Periodical increments and additional expenditure on fees of expert witnesses.

Non-recurrent expenditure incurred in 1925-26, and larger expenditure on imports.

Periodical increments and supply of furniture.

Due chiefly to electric lighting in Stations, and increased expenditure on forage.

Due chiefly to a larger production of bread and consequent increased expenditure on purchase of flour.

Due mainly to purchase of hand instruments, appointments to new situations and periodical increments.

Grants to students of academical course falling due in 1925-26 and periodical increments.

Non-recurrent expenditure and provision for scholarships formerly borne under Elementary Schools.

Holding of competitions for appointments, and consequent new appointments during 1925-26.

Periodical increments, appointments to new situations, training of teachers in England and increase in number of subsidized institutions.

Increased expenditure on Circulating Libraries, periodical increments and non-recurrent expenditure.

Completion of new Museum.

Prevalence of small-pox and foot-and-mouth disease and compulsory vaccination.

Chiefly due to non-recurrent expenditure in 1924-25 for relief to marines alured during the war, and subsidy towards the establishment of an orphan asylum in Giza, partly counterbalanced by appointments to new situations, increased expenditure on provisions and purchase of 2 motor ambulances.

Non-recurrent expenditure incurred in 1924-25 in connection with the British Empire Exhibition.

Appointment of 2 Gate Keepers and a temporary hired clerk, construction of a new motor boat, electric installation on Patrol Boat and additional dredging works.

Rates due to continental countries in 1925-26 for transit of mails remained unclaimed.

Greater expenditure in 1924-25 under non-recurrent services.

Periodical increments and increased permanent expenditure owing to the new scheme for Account Keepers.

Increase in personnel and periodical increments.

Mainly due to the purchase of a new boiler and electric motor and accessories, also materials for renewals and maintenance of rolling stock.

Larger expenditure on current repairs and minor alterations in Public Buildings, and on maintenance of roads and streets.

More new works carried out.
