## Studney Most Outstanding Comet Athlete In Years

Hillside High School's most

outstanding athlete in many years, who graduated last month, was Dan Studney, and he can prove it. Just before graduation he received the Joseph Dill Jr. Trophy as the top athlete of the school awarded by Davenport-Dill Jr. Post 1722, V.F.W.

Participating in three sports—track, football and wrestling—Studney clinched a brilliant track career in his senior year.

On June 13 he became Eastern States javelin champion at Ramo's Island when he hurled the spear 198 ft. 6½ inches for a new meet record, June 8 at Rutgers. Studney did even better with the javelin, arching it 207 ft. 8 inches to become State champion and crack the Union County mark. He also placed third in the shot put, scoring 3 points for Hillside, the only Comet to place in the meet.

In the Watching Conference meet May 22 Dan set a new record for the javelin with 202 ft. 2 inches. He also took the conference championship in the shot put with 52 ft. 7 inches and placed second in the discus, scoring a total of 14 points to help

Hillside to its first conference championship.

May 14 in the Union County Conference meet he won the championship in the javelin with 194 ft. 2¼ inches and the shot put with 53 ft. 7 inches. He placed second in the discus and scored 14 points, helping his team to second place.

For two years running he captured the shot put title in the Newark High School Athletic Association meet, with 51 ft. 3½ inches in 1958 and 51 ft. 5½ inches this year.

Dan has been undefeated in the javelin this year and set a new record as top point scorer for Hillside in track. He holds all the weight records at Hillside—javelin 207 ft. 8 inches, shot put 53 ft. 9 inches and discus 148 ft. 2 inches. He was awarded the track trophy the past two years.

As fullback on the Comet football team, Studney was awarded the 1958-59 football trophy as the leading scorer. In wrestling, he was district champion in the heavyweight division.

He has collected 25 medals over the past three years and 5 trophies.

### Assessment Hearings Soon Sewage Disposal Saving State Bank Application

PUBLIC HEARINGS on the new property valuations are not too far off. The Board of Assessors held an unheralded meeting last Thursday night and it is understood the purpose is to arrange a set of tentative hearing dates for the approval of the Township Committee.

The revaluation program must be well on the road to completion by the end of the Summer as the tax books must be submitted to the Union County Board of Taxation by October. On the basis of experience in other communities, taxpayers are strongly advised to attend the hearings to find out what their new assessments will be and not to wait until they get their 1960 tax bills.

TOWNSHIP COMMITTEEMAN Adolph A. Winston, Hillside's representative to the Joint Sewer Meeting, reports that at a special meeting of the group Monday in Maplewood, a new contract was negotiated for disposal of sewage for a period of four years at an annual saving of \$5,000 over the present contract.

Townsend Transportation Co. of Rutherford was awarded the contract at 449 per ton or 55 per ton less than the present price. The second bid was \$14,010 per year higher.

THE PENDING APPLICATION for a State bank in Hillside recalls the days when Hillside had two banks. In addition to the Hillside National Bank there was the Hillside Trust Company with offices on Maple avenue.

When the Hillside Trust Company closed its doors—some time in the Thirties, we believe—some of its personnel transferred to the Hillside National and may still be there.

Conditions are much different today, however. The population of the community has increased, there are many more businesses and industries and the general business climate is greatly improved.





## Theft Prevention Week Is Observed

Police Chief Paul Korlinsky, concerned about house-breaking, announced this week is being observed as Burglary Prevention Week in Hillside, as proclaimed by Mayor Max Schiefer.

This is not just another "week" emphasized the Chief. It is being held in conjunction with a statewide program inaugurated and sponsored by the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police to educate the public on how they can help reduce burglary losses.

People too often leave their homes for an evening, weekend or vacation without a thought given to the precautions recommended by their police department. Windows are left open, keys left under the door mat or in the mail box, a completely dark house or even worse, lights are left burning twenty-four hours a day—all earmarks that tell a burglar, "This place is a push-over," the chief said.

The war against burglary is "two-fold" . . . the prevention of burglaries by the homeowner before they occur and the apprehension of burglars who dare commit the crime, said the chief. Apprehension is the continuing job of the police department, but the primary responsibility for prevention must rest squarely upon the shoulders of the homeowner, he added. Only with his full cooperation can this war against the ever-increasing burglary rate be successful, he said.

EXTRA SCHOOL COSTS  
June 20, 1959

Editor, Hillside Times,  
This is not meant to be a crank letter, but on the other hand, as a taxpayer, I would like to know why our children have to pay "fines" on books they use during the school year.

I have lived in Hillside all my life and I have three children, all of school age. These fines that are imposed upon my children every year, for twelve years of school, can add up to a substantial sum and I just cannot afford it.

The teachers refuse to give them their final marks if they are on what is referred to as the "Un-Met Obligation List." I would like to know what I am paying taxes for. I was under the impression that the "rather high" taxes I am paying are partially being used to pay for my children's education. Evidently not. We still have to pay for books, because of damaged covers or marked pages, that are five and six years old and have been marked "unfit" the previous year. How many fines are paid year after year for the same pencil marks, loose bindings, torn pages and the wear and tear that must be expected after being used daily ten months out of the year?




