A Note from the Dean

Welcome to the Cathedral. A special welcome if you are joining us for the first time. Please, complete a Welcome Card if you would like to give us your contact details.

A day for welcoming visitors and new members of the Cathedral Community

Today is no ordinary Sunday at the Cathedral, but then few are!

This morning we host the Battle of Britain Service, an annual commemoration of the efforts and sacrifices of a relatively few airmen for the well-being and freedom of the whole nation. I am pleased to welcome the Revd Richard Clement, Chaplain of RAF Leeming as the preacher at that service. Richard is the brother of Peter who used to be Associate Priest of Sharow and a Minor Canon of the Cathedral.

This afternoon, of course, we welcome the Revd Barry Pyke as our new residentiary canon. Barry will be installed as Canon with responsibility for Rural Engagement and Education. This is a significant role that not only involves Barry in the Cathedral's governance, leading of worship and pastoral care, but also in developing some of our strategic priorities in the region. *Growing God's Kingdom*, our Cathedral vision, explains how we aim to develop our ministry to the rural communities and churches of the diocese and also to military communities. Education, of course, remains a priority. This involves work with schools and providing appropriate learning opportunities for people of all ages from beyond the Cathedral's congregations. Please, pray for Barry as he begins to take the lead in these areas. Also, pray for his wife Sheila and their children Hannah and Philip as they settle into life in Ripon.

Dan Sladden also joins us this afternoon as Minor Canon Succentor. Dan's main focus, in addition to pastoral care, will be working with Canon Ruth and Canon Paul to develop new services designed to meet the needs of people who have not yet been attracted by the Cathedral's usual offer of liturgies. Please, pray for Dan, his wife Ruth, who is one of our Lay Clerks (adult members of the choir), and their five children – Archie, Elizabeth, Barnaby, Evie and Ned.

The Revd John Chambers, Rector and Area Dean of Richmond, also joins the Cathedral Foundation at this afternoon's service. John, who has a valued ministry in Swaledale, will be installed as an Honorary Canon.

We are pleased to see the choir return after the summer. I was encouraged by a meeting of the music department staff that I attended on Thursday evening. There was great enthusiasm for the developing plans for music outreach and strengthening the singing and music tuition that our choristers receive. What is offered to young people through the Cathedral Choir is outstanding. And, of course, it is in giving this wonderful opportunity to our choristers that we receive the blessings of such a great choir.

Celebrating and Protecting God's gift of Creation

Across many Christian denominations there is a developing tradition of celebrating God's gift of creation through the month of September and into early October. This season of 'Creationtide' takes in Harvest and all the age-old themes through which gratitude for God's gifts is encouraged.

In a recent article in the magazine *Inspire*, there was an account of how many churches are turning to green energy as a way of celebrating God's gift of creation

and fulfilling the human responsibility to exercise stewardship of the earth and its resources:

"More than 3,500 UK churches have either switched their electricity from fossil fuels to renewables or registered to do so, according to figures released by charities today. The announcement coincides with the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation on September 1, the beginning of a global ecumenical time of contemplation during which Christians are encouraged to pray and work for the protection of the environment."

The article explains that many of these churches have signed up through the bigchurchswitch.org.uk website promoted by the charities Christian Aid and Tearfund. It goes on to quote the Rt Revd Nicholas Holtam, Bishop of Salisbury and the Church of England's lead bishop on the environment.

"Celebrating Creationtide marks a shift in the Christian understanding of our relationship to creation under God. The consequences of teaching over recent centuries that humanity has been given domination over creation are clear in the complex environmental crisis we now face.

"It is important that Christians rediscover older traditions of a godly relationship of humanity to the wider created order. One simple thing we can do in response to such a crisis is to switch to using clean energy in our homes, communities, schools and places of worship".

You may wonder how we at the Cathedral are responding to this challenge. Well, we are planning to hold a Harvest Thanksgiving at the beginning of October, including a Harvest Celidh on Saturday 1st October. This encourages a spirit of gratitude and celebration which should not be underestimated. Significantly, as you can read in the Growing God's Kingdom summary report, our vision strategy includes the following key priorities for 2016-2017: "To reduce our carbon footprint through more efficient energy use and increased levels of recycling. To initiate an Eco congregation award scheme." Early in 2017 a sub-group will be established under the chairmanship of Julia Barker, the Cathedral's Director of Operations, to implement some early developments.
