At this time we would like to present you with some very important information about the upcoming convention and next year for the Alliance.

You should all realize by now that this is late. Due to changes in guests (further info below) and problems of personal time available to do these newsletters we have decided to make a change for next year. Beginning with the first issue for next year we will go to 6 issues a year instead of 7 and we will be bi-monthly in the following months: Sept. , Nov. , Jan. , March, May, and July.

Some good (?) news. Barry Morse has landed the key role of Menachem Begin in the four-hour mini-series "Sadat". The BAD News is that they put off again and again the time they would start filming until 1 week ago when they announced they would begin the week of July 10. This means that Barry will NOT be able to be with us. He is sorry that he will not be able to make it but this is something he could not turn down. Prentis is in a play and it will not close until the 16th of July. Prentis might have been able to fly in for Sunday but it would be difficult so Prentis will NOT be with us either. Anton also received some good(?) news. After not working for much of the time since the beginning of the year, he has been offered a British telefilm and a play in London. He will have to begin rehearsal for the play almost before the film has finished shooting. Having not done a play in London for some time, he is looking forward to this opportunity. He is trying to contact the director to see if he can have the time off, but as of this time we have not heard back from him. We can not say he is definately not coming, but the chances are not good. WHERE DOES THAT LEAVE US? A A A A A A A H H H H H!!!!!!! There has been a mad scramble by Rosie and everyone else involved here in getting replacements. At this time we can not give you further information on the guests. If we waited until we were sure about the guests, we might not have been able to get this MC with all the other IMPORTANT INFORMATION (below) to you before the convention. We're sorry, but you'll just have to wait until the convention and be surprised.

IMPORTANT HOTEL NEWS - - - It seems there has been some problem with reservations being made at the hotel.

The Alliance reserved 3 blocks of rooms for your use at the convention. For some reason(unknown) people have been told that either there are no rooms left or that there are no 2-double bed rooms left. As of 6-18-83 this was not the case. The hotel showed only 14 of the 150 rooms we had held open were reserved. This is bad for everyone invólved. We can not ask the hotel to hold the rooms open much longer, but we feel many of you have reserved rooms which have not been credited to the Alliance convention. If you were informed that there were no rooms left or that a certain type of room was not available, please check again. If you already have a room, you should check now or at the latest the day you arrive to be sure they know you are there to attend the Alliance convention. If you don't confirm that you are there for the purpose of attending the Space: 1999 convention, you may be charged the regular room rates instead of the lower convention rates. When you book your rooms or check on a reservation you have already made, please state that you are reserving a room in order to attend the Space: 1999 convention on July 15-17 and that you would like to be in one of the room blocks reserved by the International Space: 1999 Alliance for this purpose and that you would like the appropriate convention rates.

FLYING TO THE CON ? IMPORTANT INFORMATION

ATTENTION!!! To everyone flying to the Con. The Holiday Inn Eastgate shuttle service is \$20.00 per person!!! one way from the Cincinnati airport. The taxi is \$24 which can be spread over the number of people in the taxi. We feel this is too high for many people so we are going to try to provide rides from the airport to the hotel in personal cars. Several volunteers from the con committee will be at the airport in rotating shifts to pick up and return arrivals during the week before the Con and on Friday. If you arrive on Saturday, PLEASE, DEFINATELY notify one of the persons below so we can try to work something out.





OTHER IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Since the con is being held basically on the border of the states of Kentucky and Ohio, we thought we'd fill you in on some of the laws of both states as well as some interesting tidbits. PLEASE KNOW THESE TO PREVENT MISHAPS.

- 1. The greater Cincinnati airport is <u>not</u> in Cincinnati nor is it in Ohio. It is in Florence, Ky.. So don't freak out when the sign says "Welcome to Kentucky".
- 2. A right turn on red is permitted(except when indicated) in both states.(Greater Cincinnati Area)
- 3. When on a one way street turning onto another one way street, a left turn on red is allowed(" " ")
- 4. Handicapped Parking Spaces are watched carefully. Ticketing or imprisonment are possible penalties for violation.
- 5. The legal drinking age in Kentucky is 21-it is strictly enforced.
- 6. The legal drinking age in Ohio is 19 for beer and 20 for liquor-strictly enforced.
- 7. And while we're on that subject. It is <u>illegal</u>-because of difference in state taxes-to carry liqour <u>or</u> tobaco products thru the Ohio border into Kentucky or from Kentucky into Ohio. Sorry folks.
- 8. For those of you coming from the South via I-75 to I-275. Do \underline{NOT} take I-471 to Cincinnati, stay on I-275. The speed limit is also watched very closely on I-275. One spot to watch closely is from the Alexandria exit until the Ohio border.
- 9. For those of you who plan on journeying into Downtown Cincinnati, be warned-there is a fair amount of new building going on-there may be some detours. Plan to stop and ask directions.





DIRECTIONS: When you get to the Cincinnati area, take I-275 to the Route 32 exit (Exit 63 B). The Holiday Inn and and the Mall are visible on the left side of the road when you reach the bottom of the off ramp. At the stop light make a left turn. You will go past the hotel. Be carefull when turn into the hotel drive, you will have to make a left turn and another immediate left turn against traffic leaving the mall.

Should the hotel run out of rooms , please check at the registration table for directions to other hotels.

CREATION IS BETTER ...

This month we have several entries and there are glimpses of things for next months issue.

From Tom Cicirelli, Wickliffe, Ohio--Tom is in charge of our amateur film fest at the convention this year but it appears he is not limiting his efforts to our convention. He is also directing a one act play at his school entitled "The Last Voyage of the Starship Enterprise" straight from the Starlog #14 script.

From Manuel Rui Pereira de Carvalho, Cascais, Portugal--Space:1999 is being shown in Portugal again. Manuel plans to video tape all the episodes, and when he has all 24 on tape, he says he will prepare the meals he will need, and then watch the first 24 hours of Space:1999 in the order the Tech Manual Timeline states. He intends to write the station in hopes of getting them to show year 2 when they finish year 1. (eds.--watching 24 hours of Space: 1999 in order could cause a lot of food to go unnoticed) Manuel also states that one of their magazines had this to say about Space--"On Saturdays, at 7 PM, Space:1999 will return to occupy the vacant hour left by Battlestar Galactica. Space:1999 is perhaps the best science fiction series of all the others that RTP (Portuguese TV) has transmitted. With Martin Landau, Barbara Bain and Barry Morse in the main roles, it was filmed in England by ITC. Maybe this would explain the superior quality in contrast with other series of the same kind. The series are a true paradigm of SF-TV. Those that already know it will like to watch again. Those that don't, will be thrilled."

Manuel also suggested some questions which we might like to use as a sort of opinion poll. We like the idea and the questions are listed below. We will also ask the questions at the convention and tabulate the results in a future Main Computer.

What would you like to see in a new Space: 1999 episode or feature film when (if) it happens?

Of the series directors, who would you choose to direct it?

Of the series writers, who would you choose to write it?

Two of our California members have also been quite busy. Judy Moore, Anaheim, Ca attended Costume Con One in San Diego and Terry Shewmaker attended a Street Faire in her home city of Visalia, Ca. More on both these in next MC.

John Drake of Sharon, Mass attended Omnicon IV Feb. 83 in Florida and sent us the following report.

From just outside Boston, I traveled around fourteen hundred miles to Ft. Lauderdale, Florida for my very first Omnicon. The big attraction at these is always Doctor Who and this year was certainly no exception.

There were twenty-one episodes of the Doctor's exploits shown, ten starring Jon Pertwee. Mr. Pertwee's Mr. Pertwee's doctor can some time getting used to for those who've only seen Tom Baker episodes. Doctor Jon is a bit more stiff and proper than Doctor "Tom" but he is more mature and therefore is more willing to admit his lack of knowledge or answer when faced with a problem.

Because there were so many episodes, I couldn't see them all. One that I did see was called "Planet of the Spiders" which starred Jon Pertwee. It concerned a planet(in another dimension) inhabited by large intelligent spiders with amazing psychic abilities. They planned to inhabit the bodies of humans there by taking over this planet. At the end of this episode, to escape death, The Doctor is forced to regenerate, giving the original audience their first glimpse of Tom Baker, but still wearing Mr. Pertwee's costume.

Also played was "Logopolis" followed immediately by Castrovalva. As we all know, "Logopolis" is the last

Also played was "Logopolis" followed immediately by Castrovalva. As we all know, "Logopolis" is the last episode to feature Tom Baker. "Castrovalva" is the first to feature Peter Davison. This regeneration does not "take" as well as the others have and for half the episode the Doctor walks around in a daze spouting phrases made famous by previous incarnations and asking for companions not seen in years (and calling the present ones by some of these names.)

I also had the pleasure of viewing "Earthshock", which Mr. Davison has named as his favorite episode.(At least of the ones he has done) This is an extremely well written episode which features the Cybermen(with much nicer costumes this time) Rather than continue with accolades for this episode, I'll just say that I'm most

anxious to see this episode again.

Of course their were in person guests. On Saturday we were treated to the presence of Judson Scott, star of the "Phoenix" and "Star Trek II". He claimed to have seen several, and I believe unrelated, scripts for "Star" Trek III". He gave no hints except to say, "Do you want to see Mr. Spock with a grey beard and a bald head?" I'm not sure if he was kidding or not.

As for "The Phoenix", Mr. Scott revealed that Home Box Office was interested in a limited series version of the show but the producers decided to give commercial television one more chance to pick up the series. There is also a possibility of a feature film of "The Phoenix". Also, Signet books has purchased rights to print a series of Phoenix paperbacks.

Later, Mr. Scott was joined by Bjo Trimble(self-proclaimed world's number one Star Trek fan), who has just published a new book "On the Good Ship Enterprise" (available at B. Dalton and Walden book stores). Mr. Scott and Ms. Trimble related some rather interesting news about Star Trek II. Paramount demanded about 14 different changes in the editing of the film. Producer, Harve Bennet and others fought Paramount but were forced to compromise. Some people at Paramount thought that the film contained too many relationships and that the audience (meaning us, the SF fans) couldn't keep all those relationships straight.

One of these relationships concerned the young crewman Potter(I've seen the film six times and I can never remember his title), played by Ike Eisenmann. Originally, Potter was Mr. Scott's nephew. After he died, Mr. Scott broke down and cried, a scene which Ms. Trimble describes as "heartrending". Another relationship concerned Judson Scott. Near the end of the film, Mr. Scott's character was killed in the last attack. Khan becomes very upset saying, "I shall avenge you, Joachim!" Khan was more upset about Joachim than the other members of his crew because Joachim was Khan's son!

Of course Ms. Trimble spoke about her Write NOW! campaign. For those who don't understand or don't believe

the importance of writing, she gave an example concerning "Mission:Impossible". When Martin Landau left the show, the producers had two people in mind as a replacement: Leonard Nimoy and Ross Martin. Because Mr. Nimoy's fanclub mounted a letter writing campaign, and Mr. Martin had no fan club to do the same, Mr. Nimoy was chosen for the part.

Everyone's favorite guests at the convention though were John Nathan-Turner, Sandra Dickinson and Peter Davison (in order: producer of "Doctor Who", Trillian in TV's Hitchhikers Guide to the Galaxy" and the fifth Doctor). These three participants were featured together in one panel on Saturday and another on Sunday. These guests sat in this order from the audience's left to right, answering questions only in this order, insuring the same number of questions for everyone. They related a lot of neat-o information and I'll pass it along in no particular order.

If anyone has seen the fifth Tom Baker season (the key to time series) and wondered whatever happened to the Black Guardian, according to John Nathan-Turner, the Black Guardian will be re-introduced in the current (second)


Peter Davison season.


possible cast members (such as the cast of the television series).

Doctor no. 5 will, naturally, be helped by his two latest companions. To oppose this formidable troupe, we promised three or more villains apart from the Master. The BBC is now searching for co-production money for, hopefully, making a four part-all on film-episode of Dr. Who in America! Lionheart Productions, which now distributes the program in the U.S. is considering putting up the necessary funding. All who care should write!


