Rescue training for Walpole VMR

The presentation of a Western Australian Police course on initial response to incidents on the water and, subsequently, methods of searching for missing vessels and/or persons in the water, was held last weekend.

There were participants from both Government Services and Volunteer Marine Rescue. The biggest contingent was from Windy Harbour VMR.

Aside from classroom activities which included desktop searches, the most notable part of the activities for the public would have been the flotilla of vessels on the inlets on Sunday morning.

These vessels were engaged in various searches with the course participants rotating the role of On-Scene Coordinators to ensure the vessels kept their assigned positions and the search area was fully covered.

The Police mannequin was first located by some

people from the work camp who were theoretically engaged in a shoreline search.

The course was very successful, with all the participants obtaining their certificate of completion.

Thanks again to Sergeant Wall of the Walpole Police for arranging this course to be delivered outside a major regional centre. Also a special thanks to the Officers from the Peel Water Police who presented the course and thanks to the Volunteers on the course and in support roles for giving up another three days of their lives.

As mentioned in last week's edition of the *Walpole Weekly*, this course was followed with an open forum with Fisheries to answer any questions or concerns members of the boating and fishing community may have with regard Fisheries activities in the Walpole area. I will leave it to others to report the finer detail of this meeting. The meeting was, disappointingly, poorly attended, however some research by Louise provided a list of questions.

From a Marine Rescue perspective the major question was to ask if Fisheries monitored marine VHF channels to gather intelligence. The reason for this was to quell a rumour that this was the case and as a result of this, fishers were suggesting they would no longer log on. The answer to the question was: Fisheries do not monitor marine radio channels as a means of surveillance.

With regard to an apparent greater presence of Fisheries Officers in Walpole, this is because of certain arrangements between government agencies.

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Flowering Wild in Walpole

Beaufortia or Swamp Bottlebrush is breaking into colour around the district at the moment.

Beaufortia sparsa is by far the most commonly cultivated variety. The leaves are roughly diamond shaped, light green and upward facing. The bright orange / red flower spikes make a handsome addition to any garden, and this is one native that doesn't mind having its feet wet.

Once established, it makes a good waterside plant and you can see fields of it around the district at various times during the flowering season, usually in swampy areas and 100kms or so either side of Walpole.

It is quite easy to grow from cuttings if you have one in your garden.

Linkwest opposes funding cut of the CRC program

Linkwest, the Peak Body for Community Resource Centres (CRCs) and Neighbourhood Centres (NCs) in Western Australia, notes that Minister Alannah MacTiernan stated on 2nd February that the long awaited review of the Community Resource Centre program will now take place and be completed by mid-year. This review was announced by the Minister in July 2017 after cutting short the CRC contracts.

The review is being conducted prior to a forecast budget cut of 40% to the CRC network in 2019/20, dropping funding to this program from \$13m to \$8m. To date, the review's terms of reference have not been finalised.

While we welcome the review, Linkwest is very concerned about the short time left to conduct a comprehensive assessment of a program that provides – along with a range of programs and services tailored to the needs of the local community – vital access to State and Federal Government agencies. In many of these towns, the local CRC is the only service available within a population where many either have no computer, limited Internet access or limited digital literacy. With more and more State and Federal Government services being made available exclusively online, these local points of access, and the support of CRC staff for those with low digital literacy, is becoming increasingly vital.

Linkwest has written to Minister MacTiernan with recommendations for the terms of reference. Most notably, we believe the review should:

- be undertaken by an independent party,
- build on Curtin University's extensive research into the network
- be based on community need
- be made public
- consult with the community, and
- where CRCs are defunded or have funding cut, identify how access to government services will be provided in the local community.

Therefore enabling the public sector to deliver better services to regional Western Australian at a lower cost.

Linkwest believes a comprehensive review will reveal that the network of 105 regional and remote CRCs provides the McGowan government the opportunity to help their reform agenda, most notably priority one of the Service Priority Review, 'Building a public sector focused on community needs', particularly in regional and remote WA.

The CRC network is also ideally positioned to support the Sustainable Health Review in delivering better primary and allied health services into regional WA, through the use of video conferencing technology and

Proposed Budget Amendment - North Walpole Road, Walpole

As part of the adopted 2017/18 Budget, Council allocated \$450,000 for the road re-construction of North Walpole Road. The works included upgrades drainage, vegetation clearing and road pavement sealing works. The \$450,000 budget was for a section of the road starting 100m north of the South Western Highway intersection up to Straight Line Kilometre (SLK) 1.3.

The funding is provided by State Government / Main Roads Regional Road Group (RRG) \$300,000 and the compulsory Shire contribution of \$150,000 provided through utilisation of Roads to Recovery (R2R) funding.


Following completion of detailed design, the preliminary works undertaken to date include installation of new culverts, sourcing gravel and other road construction materials and application for vegetation clearing works with Department of Water and Environmental Regulation (DWER). During this process there has been an objection by the public to DWER regarding the proposed vegetation clearing. The Shire has appealed this objection, with the Office of Appeals Convenor unable to provide a response until April/May 2018. This delay in process has rendered any further works on this project unviable for the remaining financial year.

Under the RRG funding agreement, funds that cannot be acquitted by 30th June 2018 are to be either reallocated to another project within the RRG program, carried forward to next financial year or entirely relinquished back into the RRG funding body.

The Shire requested that RRG carry forward the remaining Shire allocation for North Walpole Road to 2018/19. Main Roads WA decided to offer those funds to the RRG members for their consideration. The result of this process was RRG determined to reallocate the funds to another Shire's project that was eligible under the funding agreement.

As a result of this process Council is requested to approve amendment to the 2017/18 Works Infrastructure Budget accordingly.

the coordination of primary health professionals hiring rooms in the CRC.

The funding cut will go against the government's drive for better social outcomes and job creation in the WA economy.

A 40% funding cut for a CRC equates to a reduction in funding from approximately \$100,000 per annum to \$60,000 per annum. This will have a profound impact on the ability for CRCs to cover their staff and operational costs, resulting in job losses and significantly reduced hours and wages for many who work part-time in these Centres. Already, we are seeing experienced and dedicated staff reluctantly leave their CRC roles for a guaranteed income elsewhere.

Skilling and reskilling of those in the regions will also suffer. Currently, CRCs offer local traineeships in the regions, and to date 497 trainees have benefitted from the scheme. There are currently 40 trainees across the network. As CRCS close or reduce their hours, the ability to provide traineeships will be largely diminished.

Linkwest CEO Jane Chilcott states that 'Linkwest acknowledges the government's difficult position of balancing the state budget. However, a comprehensive review provides the opportunity to look at how the Community Resource Centre network can provide the government with a real opportunity to co-design the delivery of multiple government services in regional WA in a cost effective and efficient way'.

Background: Community Resource Centres

Located in 105 regional and remote communities throughout Western Australia, Community Resource Centres (CRCs) are friendly, locally owned and operated service and information centres. The centres are not-for-profit organisations that are independently managed and governed by their local community.

CRCs undertake community, business and economic development activities, and are a central point for locals, visitors and businesses, providing access to government and community services and information. As more and more government services go online, this access point is an increasingly critical function of the CRCs, particularly for those without access to computers and / or reliable Internet services, or poor digital literacy.

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Karen's Story (part 2)

That was over two years ago now and since then our lives have changed dramatically. Long term care isn't a walk in the park; it has its challenges. It requires patience and resilience. But it teaches you to manage your own feelings, what love is and how exciting it is to see changes in children. It has taken two years but we now have on our hands a confident, funny and loving teenager and we cannot imagine life without him. Long term care gives you the opportunity to see the long term results.

Over the two years we have made every effort to build a proper family around this young man. He is ours not only physically but emotionally as well. We do not mean to minimise his birth family, in fact we make sure they are always in his frame of reference and he is encouraged in his contact with them and to speak about them. But what I mean is that for him to feel he is truly part of our family and for his placement with us to be as successful as it has, we had to step into the placement with the mindset that he was as important a player in our family as any other.

Our view is that children in care deserve the same opportunities as all children and this is a commitment we asked not only of ourselves but also our extended family. When he joined our family he became a son, brother, nephew, cousin and grandson. My husband once said to him that even if the day comes where he returns to live with his birth family he would be supported to do this, but that he will always be part of our family and be in our hearts as well, regardless of where he lives. But what is most rewarding is knowing that he does truly feel loved and part of our family.

Teenagers don't use the 'L' word a lot but his questions tell me he knows and feels he is part of our family: "Who is going to teach me to drive?" "When I get married will you help organise my wedding?" and "When I have kids do you want to be Nana or Grandma?" These simple statements make everything worthwhile and let you know that you have the capacity to love unconditionally and that someone is pretty fond of you too.

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Every day (even the more difficult ones, because let's face it he is a teenager!) I am grateful for my husband's bravery. I consider it a privilege to care for this young man. My heart swells and practically bursts with pride every time he achieves a new level of confidence and independence.

But what I encourage others to think is what my husband was trying to communicate when he said hasn't he had enough already. My husband was saying this shouldn't be about us, this is about children and what they need. We had pigeon holed ourselves into one type of care and expected that children's needs should fit into ours. But in fact really shouldn't we as carers fit ourselves around the needs of these very vulnerable children where ever we can?

If you have the chance to give a different type of caring a go, I highly recommend it; it may challenge you but there is a good chance it will reward you too.

The CRCs also provide high quality videoconferencing services, enabling communities to directly access services that are otherwise unavailable in the regions. These include parenting programs, women's health services, interviews and support for job seekers, and even court appearances.

Background: Linkwest

Nedlands-based Linkwest is a small not-for-profit organisation that is largely funded by the State Government's Department of Communities and the Department for Primary Industry and Regional Development. Linkwest is the peak body for community resource centres and neighbourhood centres in Western Australia. It offers targeted and relevant training, resources, advocacy and support to those working in small community-managed not-for-profit organisations.

Linkwest, with a staff of seven, offers crucial support to more than 150 member organisations, including over 100 regional and remote Centres. More than 27,000 Western Australians currently use these centres each week. The centres provide a friendly, welcoming place where local people can meet to learn, gain new skills, make friends and feel part of their community. They also provide a safe, affordable space for playgroups, community and support groups to gather.

Former Premier of Western Australia, Professor Carmen Lawrence, is Linkwest's official patron. She has been a patron for the past eight years.

The history behind the organisation goes back to 1978 – for many years it was known as Learning Centre Link, until it was renamed Linkwest in 2011.





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


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

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Boat in distress

The past couple of weeks have seen me performing duties between Walpole and Denmark. On occasions, I've had Denmark officers come over here to assist me with a few incidents and have had to return the favour by helping them out.

Last Wednesday was no exception. I had Denmark Police helping me with an incident when I received a phone call from Albany. "Are you aware of the job in Walpole", I was asked. I told them I was actually there with the Denmark guys and was told, "No – the capsized boat that's just come in." I asked the Denmark officers to keep on with what they were doing as I had to get a rescue mobilised and with that tried to make a phone call.

Unfortunately some phones were out and I couldn't get through. A quick call over the marine radio channel allowed me to ask the Volunteer Marine Rescue Group to get a crew together for a rescue.

Further information came to hand that a boat had rolled over at the mouth of the inlet and two people were in the water.

Within about 15 minutes the rescue boat "Harlequin" had been launched with a four person crew on board and were given permission to exceed the 5 knot limit to get to the scene.

When they arrived at the mouth they could see an upturned boat with two men in the surf area, along with two local identities surfing. Two of the rescue crew jumped in with some ropes and using a four wheel drive on the beach and muscle power, they eventually managed to get the boat right side up. It was drawn alongside the rescue boat and the two men and crew returned to the flat water of the inlet system.

The two men on board were extremely lucky. Neither of them suffered any major injury. One of them sustained minor grazing on one leg but apart from that they were okay, just wet. The boat sustained a fair bit of damage with the windscreen smashed off, the bimini cover missing and the engine cowling disappeared. Amazingly, their catch wasn't lost.

They were two very lucky men.



I spoke with them on their return to dry land and they told me they had not 'logged on' with our Marine Rescue Group as they have fished in the area before and as it was a pretty good day, they didn't bother.

Our Volunteer Marine Rescue Group provides radio coverage for all recreational boating in the area. You can book on with them 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. They provide a great service. In other, arguably more popular areas to go fishing, I was only able to log on with the local VMR group on a Saturday or Sunday between 8.00am and 4.00pm!

As a skipper and responsible boat owner I urge you to log on every time you go boating.




