

Although the meeting was to focus on the CRC and the need to retain CRCs in WA, and that was addressed early on, it seems that the equally important issue is to allow the town to grow through means other than just tourism.

There was a lot of discussion about what direction Walpole needs to take to remain a viable community since the average age is now 57 and there is no industry to attract younger families.

Tourism is all very well, but a sustainable industry would allow for more growth in the area as opposed to offering services to the passing trade.

If changes to the State Planning Policy go ahead allowing smaller holdings, this may encourage small farm production that is available to a greater number of producers - self-sufficiency with an opportunity to sell excess.

Trials in growing green tea began in Manjimup more than ten years ago and now it is grown commercially in Northcliffe. Walpole has the ideal climate for this crop and perhaps it is another avenue to explore.

Opportunities in the providing of services to the elderly was mentioned, especially with a view to aging in place and attracting younger professionals or other workers in the field.

It's the age-old problem - affordable/available housing, attracting doctors, attracting families with children to populate the school.

The meeting resulted in Diane Evers MLC deciding to take the concerns about the funding issue for CRCs to parliament; she sees it as a serious question.

Save our Camp Schools

Many thanks to the hundreds of people who wrote to the Minister for Education (cc'd to me) regarding the announced cuts to education, particularly the School of the Air, residential colleges, programs for the gifted and talented, and school camps.

It has been an outstanding response and the Government backflip shows the power of communities pulling together and fighting for what is right. Whilst the School of the Air has been saved, we still need to fight for the regional school camps—particularly Bridgetown and Pemberton in the Warren-Blackwood.

Not only do these camps provide strong educational outcomes for approximately 1800-2000 students each year, they also create employment and support local businesses through the purchase of food, products and other services.

Hands off Agricultural Trust funds

The McGowan Labor Government is still intent on annually raiding 20 percent of funds from the Agricultural Education Farm Provisions Trust. These funds, generated by the Agricultural Colleges are used to purchase farm machinery, pay for licensing, fencing and other farm developments.

This action will impact the operations of the Denmark Agricultural College and limit support for agricultural education programs at Mt Barker, Manjimup and Margaret River.

Country people have had a partial win, but we need to sustain the pressure to ensure quality educational opportunities remain in our regional areas.

Changes to HACC

I have had a few people contact my office concerned about HACC (Home and Community Care) finishing in mid 2018.

Initial enquiries have ascertained there will not be a reduction in services, as over the next 2 years HACC is transitioned from State to Federal responsibility and will be known as Commonwealth Home Support Program for people over the age of 65 years. Adding to the confusion is the rolling out of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) which will cater for younger people.

I have been assured that more information will be provided over the next few months, and there will be no change to the level of care provided to existing clients. I will continue to monitor this issue to ensure our seniors are able to safely and comfortably remain in their own homes for as long as possible.

Walpole Playground replacement

As the Shire of Manjimup owns and maintains the playgrounds throughout the Shire, Shire Officers conduct regular inspections every 6 to 8 weeks which includes recording the condition and undertaking repairs, helping to maintain play equipment to a safe standard.

One of the recent audits highlighted a number of faults on the infrastructure at the Walpole Recreation Ground playground and following this audit Shire Officers carried out repairs to the playground.

The current Walpole playground is over 20 years old and during that time has had a number of repairs. Further, due to its age and the inability to replace parts, recent repairs have involved the removal of some of the components. The audits and ongoing inspections have identified faults that Officers believed, at the time, could either be repaired or would last until the Shire's normal budget process consider the playground replacement. Unfortunately, the Shire is now aware that the playground has deteriorated beyond repair and requires a total replacement.

The playground at Walpole recreation ground is the only playground infrastructure in the Town of Walpole. The equipment consists of steel and plastic components and because of the location of the playground it is susceptible to quite harsh conditions due to salt air which leads to the deterioration of the components.

Given the extent of deterioration of this asset it was identified outside of the Shire's normal budgeting time frame and process and to a large degree, was not expected. Council is requested to approve a budget amendment. Officers have sought quotes for supply and installation of the new equipment, based on 'like for like', and are requesting \$39,000 ex GST. As such, it is recommended that \$39,000 ex GST from the 2017/18 Walpole Main Street carry forward budget be transferred to fund the Walpole Playground replacement. As the Walpole Main Street budget has a current surplus of \$49,806 it would be appropriate to spend part of this balance in Walpole.



Protect your best friend in an emergency situation

An estimated 63% of households in Australia have at least one pet, one of the highest rates of pet ownership in the world!

It is vital that you include your pets in your emergency plans.

Plan to leave early

- Stay informed! Evacuating with animals can take time, especially if you need to make multiple journeys with different animals.
- Have your pet's emergency kit and carrier ready to go. Make sure it includes a lead, medications and important documents.

Plan where you'll go

- Emergency services can't help evacuate your pets or larger animals in emergency situations, and not all evacuation centres will accept them.
- Your animals may need to go to different places this could be with friends, family, boarding kennels or catteries.
- Animals will require a constant source of water and food, shade and safe place to shelter.

Have a Plan B

- Plan for what will happen if it is unsafe to return home
- Speak to neighbours or nearby friends about what you would like them to do if you're not home (and offer them your support if they're away)
- Include the following phone numbers in your emergency plan
 - Your veterinarian
 - RSPCA WA or other local animal welfare agencies
 - Help number for injured and trapped wildlife, ranger and animal rescue services
 - Neighbours, family or friends who may be of assistance


