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An Education for 2048

The students who enrolled this fall to prepare for ministry will presumably be working for the next forty years or so. What will the world look like forty years from now? How will the changes in the world and, therefore, the methods of ministry change? And, what does all of that have to do with how we prepare these students today for a ministry of forty years from now?

Forty years ago we lived in a radically different world. We were at the height of the Viet Nam War and the civil rights struggles; a gallon of gas cost \$0.33; and the Standard and Poor's Index topped 100 for the first time. No one had heard of the Internet, World Wide Web, YouTube, Facebook, blogs, or cell phones. Only a few academicians and governmental officials had access to a computer, which was much less powerful than the most basic computer available today throughout the world.

Most church services were "traditional" (though there was no need to call them that then) with the congregation using a printed bulletin and singing hymns from a hymnbook accompanied by a piano and sometimes an organ. The preacher always wore a coat and tie in the "pulpit." In addition to the senior minister, many churches had a youth minister and a secretary and no one else on the paid staff. I don't know anyone who could have predicted the massive changes that have occurred in society and in the church over the last forty years. I'm sure that none of us is able to predict the changes that will take place over the next forty years.

The question that we face at Johnson is this: how do we prepare students to minister in such a fast changing culture?

In 1968 we offered three programs: a Bachelor of Arts degree (A.B.), described as one for students "planning for seminary study or who plan to work toward other liberal arts degrees"; a Bachelor of Science degree (B.S.), similar to the A.B. degree but without a Greek requirement; and a Bachelor of Church Music degree (B.C.M.). Each of these programs had a strong emphasis on the study of the text of the Bible. They also had an extraordinary emphasis on a study of the arts and sciences including history, literature, music, philosophy, economics, sociology, communication, psychology, and lab science. Skills courses that were required by the demands of the churches and parachurch organizations of the day rounded out the curriculum.

Today we have twenty different programs at the bachelor's and master's level. They, too, have a strong emphasis on the study of the text of the Bible. They, too, have a core of general education courses. And, these programs have evolved to meet the changing needs of the churches and parachurch organizations, offering new skills and vocational choices that open doors for ministry. We are, in fact, exploring new programs to add to these.

While we don't know what life will look like in 2048, we believe that preparation for ministry over the next forty years requires the same grounding in the Scriptures, the same focus on educating students about the world in which they live, and the same willingness to explore new avenues of ministry within the changing demands of the church and the world.



Callaway Archive

The first six chapters of the book of Joshua provide a detailed account of the famous battle at Jericho. Though less familiar, the next two chapters, Joshua 7-8, describe the fall of another important Canaanite town, a place called Ai. Both of these sites present interesting problems for students of the Bible who seek to correlate – or harmonize – archaeological evidence with the Old Testament narrative. To put the problem in simple terms, the Iron Age occupation at Ai/et-Tell and Jericho/Tell es-Sultan does not fit into the chronological era (i.e., the Late Bronze Age) that scholars normally identify as the age of the Hebrew conquest. Though scholars have proposed a wide range of solutions, no single explanation has satisfied all interested parties, and an exact "fit" remains elusive in both instances. In other words, if one is looking for a good illustration of how archaeology helps us defend the historical reliability of the Bible, there are many other better examples than Jericho and Ai! A breakthrough is still possible, of course. Meanwhile, archaeological materials from these sites can certainly help us understand the biblical world; the artifacts recovered from these – and other – sites illustrate and illuminate life from those distant places and times. Over the years, the College displayed parts of a small archaeological collection that it owned, and, as reported here, we have recently acquired more materials – mostly from Ai/et-Tell – that increase our options.



Jericho attracted a number of excavators from several countries, and the history of research there is a fascinating story in and of itself. Three major research projects have focused on the interesting site of Ai, normally identified with the archaeological ruins known in Arabic as et-Tell (located east of the ancient town of Bethel/modern Beitin). The first two major explorers of Ai/et-Tell were John Garstang (who worked there in 1928), who also excavated at Jericho/modern Tell es-Sultan, and Judith Marquet-Krause (who dug there between 1933 and 1935). Joseph A. Callaway (1920-1988), a professor of Old Testament and archaeology at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary (Louisville, Kentucky) for 24 years, organized the third major research team to dig at Ai/et-Tell. He and his team lived and worked in the West Bank during a series of intensive fieldwork seasons between 1964 and 1972.

Comes to Johnson Bible College

During that time, Callaway recovered remains at Ai that date from two periods, the Early Bronze Age (between the late fourth and middle of the third millennium B.C.) and Iron Age I (from ca. 1200-1050 B.C.). In the Early Bronze Age, this was a significant settlement that included fortifications and a sanctuary; remains from the Iron Age settlement represent a small unwallled village. Callaway also excavated three neighboring sites, two of which (Khirbet Haiyan and Khirbet Khudriya) date primarily to the Byzantine period, and one of which (Khirbet Raddanah) yielded Iron I remains, like et-Tell. Callaway completed major publications on the Early Bronze site, and he and other scholars offered interpretations of the Iron Age I remains – a process that continues to this day.

Before he launched his own project at Ai/et-Tell, Joseph Callaway worked on other major excavations – under James Kelso at Bethel, under G. Ernest Wright at Shechem, and under Kathleen Kenyon at Jerusalem. Throughout his archaeological career, Callaway

demonstrated a strong interest in excavation methodology. In his teaching and writing, he always focused on how archaeological discoveries related to the history and culture of the biblical world. In

his work as pastor, teacher, administrator, and field archaeologist, Dr. Callaway made a significant impact on the lives of everyone who had the privilege to know him, including JBC faculty who attended the Baptist seminary in Louisville. Joe Callaway directed the doctoral dissertation of the writer of this report and helped set the course of the latter's teaching and research.

Early in his tenure at Southern Seminary, Callaway established a fine museum that focused on the relation between Near Eastern archaeology and the Bible. In 1993, the Seminary relocated and renamed this collection "The Joseph A. Callaway Archaeological Museum." In the summer of 2008, the Seminary began to re-

model the building which housed these exhibits. Rather than put the part of this collection that they still owned into storage for an undetermined period, the Callaway Family offered this material to Johnson Bible College for at least three reasons. First, they know that our curriculum includes courses on Israelite history and archaeology. Second, they know that JBC hosts its own archaeology project (Karak Resources Project) and has a special interest in such things. Third, they know that



we understand and appreciate the influence and importance of Joseph

A. Callaway. In fact, the College acquired a small collection of artifacts from Callaway and Southern Seminary almost 30 years ago.

We have not decided exactly where and when the College will utilize and display materials that just arrived, but we will certainly use them in teaching and make them available to qualified researchers. The new collection fills approximately 70 cartons and includes artifacts and records. The former includes pottery and many small objects made from a variety of raw materials, and the latter includes excavation notebooks, file cards, photographs, drawings, and other documents related to Dr. Callaway's career. Most of the material relates to his work at Ai/et-Tell, but the collection contains items from several other ancient sites. The College's acquisition of the Callaway Archive reflects the school's long-term interest in the world of the Bible. We thank the Callaway Family for allowing us to share in the legacy of an important scholar and a fine Christian.

From Ancient Scribes to Megapixels



Passages like II Timothy 3:16 and II Peter 1:20-21 inform us that the Bible conveys a message from God in a very special way. While we emphasize concepts like the “revelation” and “inspiration” of Scripture, we also know that human hands played a role in transmitting those pages across the ages. The history of the Bible (its text, canon, and versions) began with primitive implements (e.g., parchment, papyrus, pen and ink), but this process changed dramatically with the invention of the printing press. Nowadays some very expensive cameras, along with patience and expertise, have helped scholars take another important step – that of preserving the ancient manuscripts for future generations.

The past and present meet in a remarkable way in the library of St. Catherine’s Monastery in Egypt’s Sinai peninsula. In this enchanting place, built at the foot of the traditional Mount Sinai, Emperor Justinian constructed a monastic complex in the sixth century A.D. The monks began collecting manuscripts for their library from the very beginning. Today the St. Catherine’s collection includes several thousand manuscripts and early books, which were written in many ancient languages – including Greek, Hebrew, Coptic, Syriac, Georgian, Armenian, and Arabic. One of the most important copies of the Greek Bible, Codex Sinaiticus, was part of this ancient collection. Through an interesting turn of events, this remarkable text, which dates to the fourth century A.D., came into the possession of London’s British Library.

Father Justin Sinaites, librarian at St. Catherine’s Monastery (one of the few Americans who has lived in this Greek Orthodox community), leads a project to digitize 1.8 million pages in the monastery’s library. On November 18, 19, and 20, he will visit Johnson Bible College, the University of Tennessee, and St. George Greek Orthodox Church. We are fortunate to have this opportunity and to help support such a worthy cause.





Restoration Begins

In 1890, Ashley Johnson constructed a beautiful white farm house before Emma would consent to move onto the 175-acre



Johnson family farm located southeast of Knoxville, Tennessee. Emma moved to the farm, and together she and Ashley founded the School of the Evangelists (now Johnson Bible College). Throughout the centuries to follow, their white farm house, now affectionately known as "The White House," has been the private residence of every president and first lady and the centerpiece of campus hospitality.

Recently, the trustees, recognizing the historical and sentimental value of the house to alumni and friends, decided to renovate "The White House" and return her to an 1890 condition. The original structure is sound and worthy of renovation. The project will include improvements such as: removing the 1970's aluminum siding, original shiplap siding, glass enclosed porch, and three small additions (closest to the garage). New installations and upgrades include: insulating all exterior walls, installing new wooden shiplap siding, constructing two new porches, reinstalling the original windows with stained glass edges, adding updated plumbing and electrical throughout, remodeling the kitchen and the bathrooms, and, for the first time in 118 years, installing central air-conditioning in the entire house.

The estimated time for completion is fall 2010. Upon completion, the historic home will become a guest house. A new house in which all future first families will reside is designed and should be occupied prior to completion of the 1890 structure. A dining room seating 40 guests connects "The White House" to the new presidential residence. In the interim, Dr. and Mrs. Weedman are living in a white house located next to Myrtle Hall Counseling Center. An Archeological Update

To Ancient Greece and back again in 4 weeks

This summer Dr. Gerald Mattingly, professor of Bible, and I participated in an archaeological survey in the East Lokris region of Greece. The survey was conducted in connection with the Mitrou Archaeological Project (<http://www.mitrou.org>), a joint project of the Fourteenth Ephoreia of Classical and Prehistorical Antiquities at Lamia, the University of Tennessee, and Cornell University. This project is excavating an islet called Mitrou, located on the Aegean coast that contains the remains of Bronze-Age dwellings. The project focuses on the Late Helladic Period of Greek history, which is the time during which the Trojan War took place. This summer was the fifth and final year of excavation. For the next five years the project will analyze and publish the results of the excavation.



of the sites contained no ruins above ground, but we know from the presence of pottery shards that people once settled in those areas. A few sites had significant remains, such as Kynos, a tell located on the shore of the Aegean Sea. We discovered that many of these sites are covered by olive groves, grape vineyards, and other dense vegetation, which made the task of surveying more difficult. The sites included cities, villages, and farming settlements.

During our travels around the countryside, we also enjoyed beautiful views of Greece's mountains and plains, and we were able to meet many local people who provided much assistance to us in locating ancient ruins (We also encountered wildlife such as snakes and bats).

To support this project, members of the Karak Resources Project (KRP), under the direction of Dr. Mattingly, conducted a regional surface survey in the summers of 2007 and 2008. KRP normally conducts archaeological work in central Jordan, but that work has been put on hold since 2001. Since KRP has not been able to continue its work in Jordan in recent years, some of its members decided to participate in the Mitrou Project. Dr. Mattingly worked with six others in 2007, and I joined him and two colleagues from other institutions in 2008. The team reexamined ancient sites in the region that were identified by the archaeologist John Fossey in the 1960s and 1980s. The group studied twenty-two ancient sites identified by Fossey and four sites that were not mentioned in his report.

The sites that we studied represent most of the prehistoric and historical periods of Greece. Some

Dr. Mattingly and I enjoyed the rich and extensive history of Greece by visiting numerous historical sites. Some of these places were important religious centers: the oracle of Delphi; Eleusina, where the Eleusinian mysteries were practiced; Mt. Ptoos, another important oracle of Apollo; and the Monastery of Osios Loukas, which was built in A.D. 1011. Some of the places were important battlefields: Thermopylae, where the Persians defeated the Spartans and Thespians in 480 B.C.; Plataiai, where the Athenians and Spartans defeated the Persians and their Theban allies in 479 B.C.; Leuctra, where the Thebans defeated the Spartans in 371 B.C.; and Chaironeia, where Philip of Macedon and his son Alexander defeated the Thebans and Athenians in



338 B.C. Some of the places we visited were important city-states or fortresses in ancient Greece: Thebes, Orchomenos, Gla, and Eleutherai.

At the end of our trip, we spent a couple of days in Athens touring the Acropolis and the Agora, places where Paul himself would have walked. I also took a tour to the ruins of Corinth, which will prove valuable when I teach classes on 1 and 2 Corinthians.

Dr. Mattingly and I benefited from this trip in many ways. We were able to contribute to the archaeological study of ancient Greece by reexamining these previously identified sites. We deepened our knowledge of Greek history by visiting many of the locations of importance. We experienced the current culture and customs of Greece by living in the small village of Tragana, which is located on the Aegean coast. We obtained background knowledge that will increase our understanding of the New Testament by visiting first-century sites such as Athens, Corinth, and Eleusis. And we benefited personally and socially by strengthening friendships and making new acquaintances.



On September 5 2008, at 1:30 p.m., Dr. Chris Templar ascended the steps to the Knoxville City-County building and entered the chambers of the Honorable C. Dr. Templar started Johnson’s exceptional undergraduate and graduate teacher education programs. She now serves as coordinator, Graduate Teacher Education and professor. She has served the College with distinction over the last twenty-nine years.



We Asked. They Replied.

Ninety-two percent of alumni rate the Johnson Bible College faculty very favorably - this according to a recent online survey. This confirms a long-held belief that JBC professors are interested in and available to students, and students recognize and take advantage of opportunities this provides. When asked if, while students, our alumni had a significant and positive connection with at least one professor, 60% of respondents strongly agreed and 33% agreed (92%). Furthermore, half of our alumni currently maintain contact with a professor and 36% maintain contact with an administrator.

This data results from a three-part electronic survey the alumni relations staff delivered to 1,878 Johnson Bible College alumni in 2008. An extraordinary 848 alumni responded—a 45% return. Part One elicited demographic data; Part Two requested a look back to the respondents' JBC experiences; and Part Three focused on alumni experiences. The Office of Institutional Effectiveness, under the direction of Dr. Mark Pierce, tabulated the responses.

Students, faculty and staff all speak of a sense of community that exists on campus, often referred to as a "family feel." This sense of community does not end as graduates move off campus. Alumni maintain connections with friends and classmates (77%) and other graduates (59%).

A most pleasant surprise was the percentage of respondents under 35 years of age (33%). Alumni between 25-30 years of age (15%) responded more than did 51-55 year olds (12%) and those less than 25 years old (10%).

Other encouraging results are: 81% of alumni surveyed always read the entire *Blue & White* magazine; 57% have promoted the College to the missions or education committee in the church they attend or serve; and 60% have contributed to the College financially in the last three years. Perhaps an explanation for the great response to the survey is that 95% continue to believe in the mission of Johnson Bible College.

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
