

### Public Opinion Research Ontario Election: May Polling Wave 4

#### Vote, Leadership and Final Debate

Field Dates: May 27th (immediately following the final debate) to May 29th, 2018

Sample Size: n=800

#### Methodology

- These are the findings of a special Innovative Research Group (INNOVATIVE) online poll conducted from May 27<sup>th</sup> (immediately following the final debate) to May 29<sup>th</sup>, 2018 with tracking drawn from our monthly Canada This Month surveys.
- This online survey of 958 adult Ontarians was conducted on INNOVATIVE's Canada 20/20 national research panel with additional respondents from Léger, a leading provider of online sample. The sample is weighted to n=800 based on Census data from Statistics Canada.
- The panels are recruited from a wide variety of sources to reflect the age, gender, region and language characteristics of the country as a whole. Each survey is administered to a series of randomly selected samples from the panel and weighted to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual Canadian population according to Census data to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample.
- INNOVATIVE provides each panellist with a unique URL via an email invitation so that only invited panel members are able to complete the survey, and panel members can only complete a particular survey once.
- This is a representative sample. However, since the online survey was not a random probability based sample, a
  margin of error can not be calculated. The Marketing Research and Intelligence Association prohibits statements
  about margins of sampling error or population estimates with regard to most online panels.
- **NOTE:** References to May 2018 Wave 1 refer to our May 2018 Canada this Month survey in field from May 7<sup>th</sup> to May 9<sup>th</sup>, with a weighted sample of n=915 respondents. References to May 2018 Wave 2 refer to our first special online poll in field from May 9<sup>th</sup> to May 12<sup>th</sup>, with a weighted sample of n=1,500 respondents. References to May 2018 Wave 3 refer to our online poll from May 18<sup>th</sup> to May 23<sup>rd</sup> with a weighted sample of n=1,050. The current wave of results is referred to as May 2018 Wave 4.

**Note**: Graphs and tables may not always total 100% due to rounding values rather than any error in data. Sums are added before rounding numbers.




#### Ontario Weights: Age, gender, and region

Results for Ontario are weighted by age, gender, and region to ensure that the overall sample's composition reflects that of the actual population according to Census data; in order to provide results that are intended to approximate a probability sample. Weighted and unweighted frequencies are reported below.



Thinking about politics in Ontario, generally speaking, do you usually think of yourself as a... [asked of all respondents; n=800]




### **Combined Vote Tracking:** NDP now have an edge over PCs, while Liberal vote continues to decline




### **Decided Vote Tracking:** NDP vote continues to grow, while PC and Liberal support declines post-debate




### **2<sup>nd</sup> Choice:** Liberals neck-and-neck with NDP as second choice party




### **Voting for Second Choice:** Almost two-thirds (64%) say it is unlikely they will vote for their second choice














#### Battleground Segments (May 2018 Wave 4)

[Based on respondents' vote choice, second choice, and whether or not they say they have heard all they need or would like to heard more before making up their minds]










Do you agree or disagree with the following statements?




### **Economic Alienation Segmentation:** 4-in-10 (40%) are either ambivalent or alienated

Based on the two economic alienation questions – Agree/Disagree "Here in Ontario, you can be anything if you are willing to work for it" and "No matter how hard I work, every year it seems more difficult to get by" – we group respondents who share common sets of values to better understand the motivations and needs of voters.




### **Economic Alienation Segmentation:** Marginal shift between<sup>22</sup> Dream Achievers and Hopefuls


















#### Value Clusters: Tracking clusters over time














Have you read, seen or heard anything about the Ontario leader's TV debate that was held on Sunday, May 27<sup>th</sup>?




Did you happen to watch the leader's debate yourself? [asked of those who RSH; n=459]






### Who Won the Debate? Wynne and Horwath bested Ford, but one-in-five (21%) not sure who won



In your opinion, which leader did the best in that debate? [asked of those who RSH; n=459]






### Winner by Attention: Those who watched the entire debate<sup>32</sup> favoured Wynne's performance over the other leaders



In your opinion, which leader did the best in that debate? By RSH about debate






### **Debate Performance:** Wynne did better than expected, while Ford underperformed
