As a tall, stylish, all-round wing-half, he captained Queens Park Rangers to a unique double of Football League Division 3 championship and Football League Cup in 1966/67, which they followed immediately with further promotion. Mike Keen retired as a player half-way through his incumbency as Watford manager, when the club dropped into the Fourth Division after a career of 664 Football League appearances in which he is believed never to have been booked. He did introduce a pleasing football style at Vicarage Road, but without the discipline, drive and ambition which were soon to sweep the club into fantasy-land. His sacking was followed by one more crack at Football League management, which came to grief with Northampton Town languishing in the lower reaches of Division 4, but in 1982/83 he led Wycombe Wanderers to the Isthmian League championship. His son Kevin enjoyed a long Football League career which straddled the 1990s.







Signed by Colin Lee, but out of favour after Steve Perryman took over less than six months later, Andy Kennedy was available for transfer for some time before a buyer was found. An athletically-built striker with talent but a questionable level of commitment whose most productive spell was his two seasons with Blackburn Rovers, he eventually left Vicarage Road for £10,000. An Old Etonian under whose 22-year headmastership the number of pupils at Aldenham School rose from 47 to 175, the Reverend John Kennedy was the very essence of the Victorian public-school ethos of muscular Christianity. His son (who died aged 97, 162 years after his father was born) described him as "unafraid to have a physical confrontation with his opponents – the kind that nowadays would warrant a red card". After making his Watford début on Christmas Day 1913, Jim Kennedy settled into the centre-half position, impressing with intelligence and good distribution. He went on to lead the club to the 1914/15 Southern League championship after skipper Alex Stewart (who continued in the side, but not as captain) enlisted for military service in mid-season. Kennedy was well-known to manager Harry Kent, whom he had understudied as Brighton & Hove Albion's centre-half nearly a decade earlier. He established his credentials in Northern Ireland, winning a string of club and personal honours, including Ulster Footballer of the Year when his club, Portadown, won the Irish League and two cups, before moving to Notts County. Peter Kennedy, a former sheet-metal worker, played a significant part in Watford's two successive promotions in 1997/98 and 1998/99 as a left-sided midfielder or wing-back, with powerful forward runs and countless driven left-foot crosses and shots. This galloping, hard-shooting winger's entire Watford career coincided with a dire sequence of results which brought the club to within a whisker of successive relegations. Guiding the club to the Southern League championship, and a record term as manager in often fraught financial circumstances, testify to the astuteness of this taciturn, dignified and somewhat strait-laced man. Harry Kent continued as the first-team centre-half for his first season of management, and his 16-year reign was broken only by absence on munitions work during the Great War. The 1914/15 Southern League title was won only twelve months after relegation had been avoided by a final-day victory, and in 1919/20 only goal-average prevented a second successive triumph. Kent's incumbency was characterized by repeated close-season raids on the non-League clubs of the East Midlands to recruit replacements for players released on free transfers. He received £239.19s.9d from his benefit match in 1921, and in his last two seasons carried out the extra duties of secretary without any addition to his salary. His resignation in 1926 marked a complete departure from the game, and from July 1922 he spent the rest of his life as landlord of *The Wellington Arms* in Woodford Road. "A good man and a sportsman all his life", runs his epitaph in the Vicarage Road cemetery. (See under 'Managers' for details of Kent's record in that role.)



Marlon King's first season as a professional was alongside Ken Charlery for Barnet. Later he became a major contributor to Watford's rise to the Premier League in 2006, forming a potent strike partnership with Darius Henderson. King's tally of 22 Football League goals in that promotion season was the club's highest for 23 years. There was a harmless amount of swagger on the field, but a great deal too much off it: incidents within the game, such as banishment (twice) from the Jamaica national squad for disciplinary transgressions, paled into insignificance by the time he was gaoled (for the second time) for 18 months in October 2009 for an unprovoked physical attack on a young woman in a Soho nightclub. It was his 13th criminal conviction. Then three months after the cancellation of his Sheffield United contract he was sentenced to 18 months' imprisonment for dangerous driving, the offence having been committed on his 33rd birthday.

He had an 18-month wait for first-team action after crossing the border, but eventually got his chance in goal when Ted Bennett's long continuous tenancy was ended by a broken finger. He was conspicuous as an aggressive midfield opponent both before and after his brief stint at Vicarage Road, where his impact was minimal. In the last of his four outings he was torn to shreds in midfield by Paul Gascoigne and substituted before half-time. He nevertheless went on to captain both Portsmouth and Derby County, but after being sent off in his second game on loan to Notts County was promptly returned to Derby on the orders of the Notts chairman. Martin Kuhl's combative approach was never more apparent than in the rugged Birmingham City side beaten at home by Watford in the 1983/84 FA Cup Quarter-finals. He left his Wycombe Wanderers post while the subject of an internal disciplinary investigation.



Those many moves as a player, featuring some significant clubs on both sides of the border, were very obviously at least partly attributable to the disciplinary problems to which he was prone. Signed as an outside-right, a problem position for Watford during the previous season, Bobby Laing started with six goals in his first eight games in that role, but later showed his versatility by playing everywhere in the forward line except in the centre. He had only intermittent experience in the top two divisions, but after dropping into Division 3 (South) became for several seasons a prolific goalscorer in any of the three inside-forward positions. His Watford tally included what was reported as a three-minute hat-trick in a 6-0 home win against Clapton Orient, witnessed by the club's lowest-ever Football League attendance. During Billy Lane's decade in the manager's chair at Brighton & Hove Albion he led the Sussex club into the Second Division for the first time in its history, promotion being clinched when Watford were beaten 1-0 (controversially) and 6-0 in the final two games of the 1957/58 season. His surname was originally Lohn, but the family, like many others with such names, changed it at a time when anti-German feelings were prevalent.



Loaned to Watford for virtually the whole of the 2009/10 season, Henri Lansbury reached Vicarage Road with an Arsenal pedigree and international experience at Youth level. From a fairly modest start he improved as the campaign went on as an athletic and creative element in the Watford midfield. The previous season he'd been a member of Arsenal's FA Youth Cupwinning side and played at Wembley Stadium in the Associate Members Cup final for Scunthorpe United, as did David Mirfin. Lansbury captained England's Under-16 and Under-19 sides, and also appeared at Under-17 and Under-21 levels. For the Under-21s against Germany in November 2010, after Scott Loach had been substituted and the replacement went off injured, Lansbury became England's third goalkeeper of the match and was immediately beaten from the penalty spot, but otherwise kept a clean sheet in his stint lasting more than half an hour. And in February 2012 he had another spell as emergency 'keeper, this time for most of the second half for West Ham United, and remained unbeaten to the end. The French spelling of his first name is misleading – it's pronounced 'Henry'.

Equally at home in midfield or as a full-back, he made his Football League début as a trainee, but earlier than that he successfully converted four penalty-kicks in a Watford Under-16 game. During Nigel Gibbs's long absence owing to injury, Gerard Lavin became a first-team fixture at right-back and was ever-present in 1993/94, as well as winning international caps at Under-19 and Under-21 level, for which he qualified through his Scottish father. Towards the end of his career he was sent off in the first half of his Bristol City début, two days after joining the club, for kicking the ball at spectators, one of whom claimed to have suffered a broken wrist. The player later apologized, but not before being heavily punished financially by the club and (for "common assault through recklessness") a criminal court. His career was ended by injury.



The automatic choice at outside-left for most of his two years at Cassio Road, he was fast and clever, got the ball across well, and had a decent shot. Billy Law had earlier joined West Bromwich Albion when his club, Doncaster Rovers, finished bottom of Division 2 (having lost all 17 away games) and failed to win re-election. In his time at The Hawthorns he had a single run of ten Football League outings; not one of them was lost, but he wasn't picked again.

He scored the club's last peacetime Football League goal for seven years – but it counted for nothing, because the three rounds of matches which had taken place became null and void when the League season was abandoned, war having been declared the day after Law's goal.
