# Interview with Lieutenant Colonel Lucy Giles

When we first met Lucy Giles, she was very warm and welcoming. Once we had been introduced we sat down and began the interview. We asked her 10 different questions about her life and her career. Our first question to Lucy was;

## **“What got you into the Army?”**

“I joined the University Officer Training Core when I was studying Biology and I liked the idea of the challenges that the military environment gave me, so that was the start of my career in the military. I didn’t think I would join the Army but I ended up applying for it a year later after I finished University”.

We then asked a few more questions and found out that she has been in the Army for 25 years and obtained an injury to her knee (whilst playing rugby). She has also been through a wide range of different ranks and positions and has now hit her peak. When we asked her what countries she had visited she came up with practically the whole world.

## **“How did King Arthur’s help you throughout your journey?”**

“Yes, it helped me on my journey because of the amazing teaching staff and friends that gave me confidence. They gave me inspiration to be able to do the things I have done. Absolutely, King Arthur’s has helped me”.

She showed great admiration for King Arthur’s as she couldn’t stop telling us how much she appreciated the support she received. Mr Jarvis was my favourite teacher and my favourite subject was biology. Miss Dunitz was very inspirational as well.”

## **“What is the best and worst part of being in the Army?”**

The best part is all the opportunities you can have, coupled with the tangible affect you can have on people. The worst part is seeing the effects of man and human and the effects of conflict. People do nasty things and that’s not very nice”.



## **“What would you say to people who want to be in the Army?”**

“Do your homework and find out what you’re in for. Look for the websites online and look at the key areas you are interested in. The key to being in the Army is to keep fit and seize opportunities when they come”.

Lucy finds it a real honour to become the first female Commander in 110 years. She hopes that one day she will be able to come back and visit our school. We will look forward to that day.



weekly basis students are battling it out to earn much needed points for their houses. Key highlights being the Tag Rugby and Tug of War competitions!




# Mathematics

## Revision Materials

There are many resources that can support students with their learning, I would like to highlight the ones that, as a department, we feel are the best.

- **MathsWatch CD:** These are CD Roms (Windows only). It is a set of resources of videos and worksheets that guide students through topics. If you want to have a preview you can look at their website - <http://www.mathswatch.co.uk>. These cost £5 and include all work at both Foundation and Higher Tiers and have been proven to support students with their personal learning topics. Students are familiar with them as they are used in mathematics lessons frequently. The CD can be purchased from Mr Dalzell.
- **Mymaths: [www.mymaths.co.uk](http://www.mymaths.co.uk):** mymaths is an online learning platform for schools worldwide, which students use in class and independently in the computer rooms. This is great for students to concentrate on particular areas of weakness and exam practice. The best section for revision is the Booster Packs which select the key areas to work on to move students onto the next grade. Due to the changes to the GCSE specification it is important to change from Classic mymaths to GCSE exams 2017, 2018 using the menu on the left hand side. Students have been shown how to use this.
- **Homework and Grade Booklets:** All GCSE students either have a pink or blue homework book. On each page there are codes that can be used within the search box of [mymaths.co.uk](http://mymaths.co.uk). They also have **Review** sections for all the chapters. Each student in Year 11 has been given at least one booklet that covers all the topics for each particular grade. These will be used in class and for homework. Homework will still be set every lesson to be reviewed the next day.



## ICCAMS Mathematics

### Increasing Competence and Confidence in Algebra and Multiplicative Structures

ICCAMS is a project that is going to investigate ways of raising students' attainment and engagement by using formative assessment to inform teaching and learning of mathematics in secondary school. Led by Professor Jeremy Hodgen and funded by the Education Endowment Foundation, and in collaboration with The University of Nottingham, Durham University and the University of Manchester.

The main focus is a particular attention on addressing the mathematical learning needs of low-attaining students and those experiencing particular difficulties in algebra and multiplicative reasoning. The idea is to develop 40 lessons and starters that help the teachers use different forms of assessment to support students learning. We are very pleased to be part of this National project as there are only just over 100 schools involved which will run for two years and will involve our current Year 7 only to start with. The first was to guess the weight of a very colourful cake with a smarties surprise inside to win a scientific calculator and of course the cake. The second challenge was to guess the percentage of green sweets in a jar to win a mathematical equipment set and of course the sweets. 
## New GCSEs and Resources

This September saw the start of the Mathematics department teaching the new GCSE to Year 9. The new qualification has been reformed to ensure it is rigorous and robust and give students access to high quality qualifications which match expectations in the highest performing countries. It will ensure students with a pass at GCSE have the numerical skills required to progress to employment. It will stretch the most able students and prepare them more thoroughly for the study of A level mathematics and embed problem solving more rigorously in teaching, learning and assessment.

All of the Year 9 students received a new homework book to supplement their studies. This book will last for either two or three years, with homework being set during the majority of lessons. To support with the homework students can use the mymaths [www.mymaths.co.uk](http://www.mymaths.co.uk) website and the codes at the bottom of each page which will direct them to online lessons.

On this trip we went to the Bath and West Railway. The trains are miniature steam power designs of real size versions. The people showing us around and giving us information were called Roy and Robin. In the group I was in we were shown the workshop and the signal box. In the signal box there were lots of wires and levers. In there was a map so they would know where the trains are. 




## Trends on the Periodic Table



# Focus Days

Focus days throughout the year aim to provide students learning in areas of Citizenship, Personal and Economic Wellbeing. In October Year 9 chose a charity to research and raise money for, whilst organising and partaking in a sponsored event.

Year 11 had the valuable experience of undergoing 'mock interviews' to prepare them for the challenges ahead, and ensuring they were able to draw on their strengths and experiences in order to promote themselves.





# Our Belgium Adventure



 “We also enjoyed working and socialising with students from other schools.”




## Le Calendrier Français
