# PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME STAFF



#### David Baker, President & CEO

Since being named the President of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in January of 2014, David Baker's leadership has transformed the Hall of Fame.

His physical stature – 6'9" and nearly 400 pounds – is overshadowed by his large vision for the Hall. He has embarked on an endeavor that has dramatically expanded the Hall of Fame's brand by focusing on the organization's powerful Mission to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values & Celebrate Excellence EVERYWHERE."

Baker came to Canton with a reputation as an experienced and passionate leader in business, politics and sports. He is dedicated to inspiring exponential growth in individuals and organizations of excellence that seek to make a difference in their communities and the world. He possesses a long record of success as a catalyst for growth.

Under his guidance and leadership, the Pro Football Hall of Fame has greatly expanded programming across the country; experienced increased television ratings; received broader exposure of the Hall's Mission, Values and Vision; and recorded the greatest financial results in the organization's 55-year history. In his first four years at the Hall, the organization's net assets more than doubled.

In 2018, the Pro Football Hall of Fame was voted the Best Attraction for Sports Fans in the USA TODAY 10Best Readers' Choice travel award contest.

He is also leading Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village, an \$899 million mixed-use project that will result in the first-ever sports and entertainment "smart city." Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village will transform the Hall's campus into "Football Heaven" for all who love the Game. The dynamic project will be completed to

coincide with the NFL's Centennial Celebration in 2020.

Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village is comprised of ten main components: the Pro Football Hall of Fame Museum; Black College Football Hall of Fame Benson Hall of Fame Stadium; Hall of Fame Hotel, a Four-Star Hotel & Conference Center; a Player Care Center that includes Legends Landing Senior Living Community; National Youth Football & Sports Complex; The Center for EXCELLENCE (Coaches University; an Academy of Corporate Excellence; the Institute for Officiating and the Center for Athletic Performance and Safety); a Performance Center with an indoor 100-yard field and convention space; Hall of Fame Promenade (restaurants and support retail that will feature the "World's Greatest Sports Bar"); and the Hall of Fame Experience (indoor amusement park and a football-themed indoor water park).

Baker's accomplishments were recognized when he was bestowed the prestigious March of Dimes Sports Leadership Award for 2017. He joined a long list of distinguished winners of the Sports Leadership Award that includes NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue, NBA Commissioner David Stern, NHL Commissioner Gary Bettman and Major League Baseball Commissioner Bud Selig.

Baker is an attorney by trade who earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English Literature and Criticism from the University of California at Irvine and his Juris Doctorate from the Pepperdine School of Law during which time he served as the Editor-in-Chief of the Pepperdine Law Review.

Baker played professional basketball in Switzerland and worldwide with a Christian basketball team that beat the best in the world. He was elected Mayor and Councilman of Irvine, Calif., the country's first master-planned city and served for 12 years as the Commissioner of the Arena Football League.

Fueled by his establishment of the first-ever Mission Statement and Fan Bill of Rights in sports, the Arena Football League brand grew dramatically as the most fan-friendly league in the world. Team values escalated from \$175,000 to \$32 million due, at least in part, to Baker's ability to negotiate television contracts and his tireless work to establish partnerships with the NFL and major sponsors.

From 2009 to 2014, he served as the Managing Partner for Union Village, the first integrated health village in the world that is located in Henderson, Nevada. The \$1.3 billion mixed-use project will provide 17,000 jobs in the community created for 1,500 seniors.

Baker is the father of two boys – Ben who is the Director of Broadcasting at NASCAR and Sam who played left tackle for the Atlanta Falcons and currently serves as a coach for Mission Viejo High School (Calif.) football team. David and his wife Colleen also have a daughter Leyla and a son, Michael; and are the proud grandparents of eight beautiful grandchildren.

With a focus on the Hall of Fame's five core values – commitment, integrity, courage, respect and excellence – Baker leads by example at the "The Most Inspiring Place on Earth!"

# THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

The Pro Football Hall of Fame opened its doors more than a half century ago. From its humble beginnings in 1963 to today, the Pro Football Hall of Fame has grown in both size and stature. Recognized worldwide as America's premier sports Hall of Fame, it is doubtful that even the most optimistic of those who led the drive to bring the Hall of Fame to Canton, Ohio could have envisioned the successes it would realize.

An exhilarating museum and attraction, the Hall of Fame pays tribute to the talents and triumphs of pro football's greatest stars. Chronicled within the walls of the Hall of Fame are the stories and circumstances of play that bring to life words such as courage, dedication, vision, fair play, integrity and excellence.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame has welcomed over 10 million fans. Each year, visitors travel from each of the 50 states in the United States and from upwards of 70 foreign countries to tour the Hall of Fame.

Today, the Hall of Fame reaches tens of millions of additional football fans each year through broad outreach such as national televised events, an in-depth website, educational and youth programs, social media, traveling exhibits, and special events held around the country.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame works collaboratively with the pro football family - the National Football League, the 32 NFL clubs, and other entities. The cooperative efforts of all of these organizations have contributed greatly to the overall success of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. In turn, the Hall strives to serve as the best possible historical showplace and repository for the sport of pro football.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame, after a stringent review process, achieved accreditation by the American Alliance of Museums (AAM), the highest national recognition afforded the nation's museums in 2017. Accreditation signifies excellence to the museum community, to governments, funders, outside agencies, and to the museum-going public. The Hall of Fame joins a list of just over 1,070 of the estimated 33,000 museums (a mere 3%) in the United States to earn AAM accreditation. The Pro Football Hall of Fame is the first major sports museum to be accredited.

The Hall of Fame is a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit educational institution guided by its Mission to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values & Celebrate Excellence EVERYWHERE!"

# **HISTORY**

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is **located in Canton, Ohio, for three primary reasons**: (1) the American Professional Football Association, later renamed the National Football League, was founded in Canton on Sept. 17, 1920; (2) the Canton Bulldogs were an early-day pro football power, even before the days of the NFL. They were also the first two-time champion of the NFL in 1922 and 1923. The great Jim Thorpe, the first big-name athlete to play pro football, played his first pro football with the Bulldogs, starting in 1915; (3) Canton citizens early in the 1960s launched a determined and well-organized campaign to earn the site designation for their city.

The National Football League awarded the site for the Hall of Fame to Canton in 1961. Groundbreaking for the original construction took place on August 11, 1962 and the Hall opened its doors for the first time on September 7, 1963. Four expansions were completed over the years (1971, 1978, 1995, and 2012-13) that have resulted in the museum growing from its original 19,000 square feet to today's 118,000-square-foot football facility.

David Baker was named President on January 6, 2014. Previous presidents or executive directors of the Hall of Fame were: Dick McCann (1962-67), Dick Gallagher (1968-1975), Pete Elliott (1979-1996), John Bankert (1996-2005), and Steve Perry (2006-2014).

#### HOURS OF OPERATION

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is open every day of the year except for Thanksgiving and Christmas. From Memorial Day through Labor Day, it is open daily from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. The hours for the remainder of the year are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. #### INSIDE THE HALL

The Pro Football Hall of Fame is a worldrenowned museum that represents its sport in many colorful and entertaining ways. The Hall of Fame continually enhances its exhibits and displays to provide guests with an immersive and experiential visit to "The Most Inspiring Place on Earth!"

Visitors enter the museum through the grand lobby at the center of the building. This area also features a special exhibit gallery with ever-changing themed displays. Guests then begin their visit by walking through a time tunnel of images featuring players from current years spanning back to the beginning of the National Football League. The visitor experience explodes with a visually dynamic and interactive two-level exhibit area in the Hall of









Fame's original rotunda. "The NFL's First Century Gallery" opened in the spring of 2013. The center of the ground level includes a towering bronze statue of Jim Thorpe, considered a legend of pro football dating back to his days with the Canton Bulldogs beginning in 1915. The exhibits on the first level present a panoramic view using high-tech interactives and one-of-a-kind artifacts to tell the story of professional football, from its humble beginnings in the early 20th century to the worldwide phenomenon it has become today.

The second floor of "The NFL's First Century" features historical information regarding professional football in several dramatic themes. Inspirational stories of the game's pioneers, great players, coaches, and circumstances are told in vivid detail. Pro football's societal impact is also documented in "Road to Equality" and "Pop Culture." Bringing these themes to life are audio and video interactives and larger-than-life photographic murals.

Perhaps the most emotional stop during a tour of the museum is the **Hall of Fame Gallery** that houses the bronze bust of each of the Hall of Famer. Visitors also have the opportunity to learn about each member of the Hall through touch screen kiosks that include bios, photos, and videos on the inductees.



After the Hall of Fame Gallery, guests proceed to the new holographic theater "A Game for Life." This extraordinary cutting edge, multi-sensory immersive theater features holographic representations of Hall of Fame legends Joe Namath, George Halas and Vince Lombardi. The experience provides great inspiration to fans by showing them how the game of football also teaches lessons about life. The stories of numerous Hall of Famers, including Jim Kelly, Steve Largent, Alan Page, Jim Brown, Warren Moon and Curtis Martin, are shared. "A Game for Life" was produced and created by some of the leading talent in the film industry and has been receiving rave reviews since its opening in July 2016.

The "Pro Football Today Gallery" examines contemporary themes in the NFL. This area is filled with mementos from recent history-making performances including many milestone moments from the current NFL season. Artifacts are continuously placed on display as they added to the Hall's extensive collection.

The Lamar Hunt Super Bowl Gallery chronicles, in dramatic fashion, the exciting history of the game from Super Bowl I to present. The gallery uses one-of-a-kind artifacts, exciting game footage and interactive kiosks to help tell the story of how the Super Bowl has become a global phenomena. Super Bowl Theater, a turntable experience, presents the most recent NFL season and Super Bowl in spectacular fashion using the latest technology and the creative works of NFL Films.



As visitors leave the exhibit level of the Hall and return to the ground floor, they enter an interactive area that includes many exciting handson experiences including a Madden EA Sports video game suite.

# RALPH WILSON, JR. PRO FOOTBALL RESEARCH AND PRESERVATION CENTER

The Mission of the Pro Football Hall of Fame is to "Honor the Heroes of the Game, Preserve its History, Promote its Values & Celebrate Excellence EVERYWHERE!" Nowhere is this mission more evident than inside the Ralph Wilson, Jr. Pro Football Research and Preservation Center, which is named after Class of 2009 enshrinee and Buffalo Bills late founder/owner.

Here is where the documentary evidence of the history of professional football is preserved. Within this state-of-the-art, 10,000-square-foor facility, a vast archive of more than 40 million pages of documents and primary source materials are protected with a climate control system. The archives collection includes rare documents, personal papers, game programs, special collections, publications, teams and league records, and oral and video histories relating to individuals and the history of professional football. It also archives a collection of more than six million photographic images.

Additionally, the Research and Preservation Center is the repository for the Hall of Fame's artifact collections that includes more than 30,000 individual objects. Together, the archives and artifact collections serve to preserve an enduring record of the sport, its past, and the Legends who made pro football America's most popular sport.

#### **EVENT CENTER**

The program honors the support of a Hall of Famer's "Road to Canton" by their hometown. Hall of Famers return to their hometowns to present their high school, college, or community with a historic artifact, a 45-pound, 3' x 4' bronze plaque, during a ceremony in front of school assemblies or football halftimes.

The Heart of a Hall of Famer educational series provides students the opportunity to learn first-hand what it took beyond athletic ability for legendary Heroes of the Game to achieve success on and off the field. The program focuses on the Pro Football Hall of Fame's core values of commitment. integrity, courage, respect and excellence. Dozens of programs are hosted across the country and any school can connect via PC/MAC/IOS/Android device to view the program live. "Heart of a Hall of Famer" is provided free to schools courtesy of the Hall's partner Extreme Networks.

The Pro Football Hall of Fame/US Army Award for Excellence Program honors the nation's top sophomore, junior, and senior athletes who display the values, shared by the Hall and the US Army. of commitment, integrity, courage, respect and excellence. Hundreds of applications are submitted to the Hall of Fame each fall from which comes the selection of 25 finalists. These individuals are then recognized by all of their classmates, teachers, administrators, and community leaders in a school assembly during which Gold Jackets present the finalist plague to the students. The finalists and their families later attend the Pro Football Hall of Fame Enshrinement Week Powered by Johnson Controls and are honored by Gold Jackets at a luncheon at the Hall of Fame during which the winner of the Award for Excellence is revealed.

The Hall of Fame Ring of Excellence is one of three iconic symbols that represent the elite status of being a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in addition to the Gold Jacket and Bronzed Bust. 












# JOHNSON CONTROLS HALL OF FAME VILLAGE

Exciting progress was made in 2017 at Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village, an \$899 million mixeduse development of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's campus, underway in Canton, Ohio. It will be the first-ever sports and entertainment "Smart City."

Two new main components of Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village were operating in 2017.

The opening of the spectacular Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium occurred with the nationally televised 2017 Hall of Fame Game. The venue received rave reviews from the National Football League, the participating teams, media and fans. The stadium is also the football home to McKinley High School, Malone University and Walsh University. In addition, the Ohio High School Athletic Association held the state football championships at Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in December.

The National Youth Football & Sports Complex added two fields in 2017 and welcomed 130,000 athletes, family members, and fans.

The world-class complex hosted the first-ever Hall of Fame World Youth Football Championships. The tournament in December drew 70 teams and 1,700 youth players from across the continental United States, Hawaii and Mexico. The finals were played in Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium and were broadcast to the country on New Year's Day 2018.

Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village is comprised of ten major components that will be integrated through technology to subtlety and seamlessly share the values from the Game – commitment, integrity, courage, respect and excellence – with guests in a way that will impact their lives.

- HALL OF FAME MUSEUM The Pro Football Hall of Fame, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit educational institution, works collaboratively with the NFL, the 32 clubs, and other entities.

- TOM BENSON HALL OF FAME STADIUM The spectacular sports and entertainment complex holds 23,000 and features an NFL caliber press box, world-class hospitality experiences, and built in an amphitheater style to serve as an elite concert yenue.
- NATIONAL YOUTH FOOTBALL & SPORTS COMPLEX - The complex will include eight stateof-the-art turf fields that will be multi-purposed, lighted and equipped with the latest technology and video capabilities.
- HALL OF FAME HOTEL The football-themed, 243-room Hall of Fame Hotel will truly be a oneof-kind upscale hotel. The property is part of Hilton's Curio Collection and will be managed by Crestline Hotels & Resorts.
- HALL OF FAME PROMENADE Centrally located at Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village, it will include: retail, restaurants including a Shula's Steakhouse, The "World's Greatest Sports Bar," office space and residential.

**BOBBY BEATHARD** Contributor – Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo ... 1966-67 Kansas City Chiefs, 1968-1971 Atlanta Falcons, 1972-77 Miami Dolphins, 1978-1988 Washington Redskins, 1990-99 San Diego Chargers



Noted for his adept eye for talent through a career that spanned more than three decades ... Served as scout for Chiefs and Falcons before being named director of player personnel for Dolphins in 1972 ... Integral part of Miami's two Super Bowl teams ... Became Redskins General Manager in 1978 ... Masterful management of Washington roster to build Super Bowl champions ... Often dealt first-round draft picks to acquire more talent ... Used team's first round draft pick just three times in 11 seasons ... The Redskins' Super Bowl XVII roster

included 27 free agents signed by Beathard ... Under his guidance, Redskins made five playoff appearances in six-season span including two Super Bowl titles (XVII and XXII) ... Bobby Beathard was a highlyregarded personnel administrator during his 33-year career which included stints with the Kansas City Chiefs (1966-67), Atlanta

Falcons (1968-1971), Miami Dolphins (1972-77), Washington Redskins (1978-1988) and San Diego Chargers (1990-99).

Beathard, a longtime general manager and personnel administrator, played an integral role in the success of each of these franchises. He began his career as a part-time scout for the Kansas City Chiefs in 1963, but left to scout for the American Football League before returning to the Chiefs in 1966 when the team played in Super Bowl I. In 1972, Beathard was named director of player personnel for the Miami Dolphins before the Washington Redskins hired him as general manager in 1978.

His visionary thinking soon became a template for the NFL where first-round draft picks were weapons to be used in trades. His keen sense for talent was apparent on each team, but especially in 1982 when the Redskins Super Bowl-winning team included 27 free agents signed by Beathard since he joined the team. In his 11 years in Washington, the Redskins had only three first-round picks. The

team went to the Super Bowl three times and won twice.

Collectively, his teams won 10 division titles, seven league/conference championships and four Super Bowls – Super Bowls VII and VIII with Miami and Super Bowls XVII and XXII with Washington.

Beathard was hired as general manager of the Chargers in 1990 and immediately brought hope to a city hungry for a winner. In just his third season in San Diego, the organization won its first AFC Western Division championship in more than a decade and by 1994, the team made its first Super Bowl appearance.

#### Bobby Beathard General Manager

Bobby Beathard is more enthusiastic than ever heading into his tenth season as the general manager of the Chargers.

"I'm looking forward to working with Mike Riley and his staff," said Beathard.



"He's a positive, upbeat person and that rubs off on everyone around him, from the players and coaches to the people in the office. Mike has the ability to make people believe in themselves. Anyone who has ever worked with him knows he's a winner."

Chargers President Dean Spanos and Beathard hired Riley, whom Bobby has known literally since he was in high school, as head coach in January 1999, to bring the excitement back to Chargers football.

Riley is one of a few new faces at the Chargers' training center these days. Beathard and the player personnel department landed a select group of key veterans during the 1999 offseason to augment the Bolts' roster.

Joining Pro Bowlers Junior Seau and Rodney Harrison, both Beathard draft selections, on the NFL's top-ranked defensive unit will be ball-hawking free safety Darren Perry (Steelers), bone-crushing middle linebacker Eric Hill (Rams and Cardinals) and steady defensive end Al Fontenot (Bears and Colts).

On the opposite side of the ball, the Chargers will be directed by 12-year NFL signal-caller Jim Harbaugh, who was acquired in a trade with Baltimore to provide Riley's new offensive system with a proven leader. Jeff Graham, an eight-year veteran, gives Harbaugh and the Chargers' receiving corps a tough, physical presence.

The Chargers feel the 1999 offseason was even more fruitful than 1998 when the team cemented its lineup by grabbing running back Natrone Means, offensive linemen John Jackson, Aaron Taylor and Roman Portin, cornerback Charles Dimry and linebacker Gerald Dixon via free agency.

In addition to acquiring new players, the Chargers have continued to sign their top players to long-term deals. In 1997, Seau was re-signed through the 2002 season to a contract that made him the highest paid linebacker in NFL history at the time. Several other key players also have inked multi-year deals, including Harrison, Dwayne Harper, Lew Bush, Raylee Johnson, Terrell Fletcher and Vaughn Parker.

When Alex Spanos named Beathard general manager of the Chargers January 3, 1990, it brought hope to a city thirsting for a winner. He turned the NFL's oldest team of the 1970s the Washington Redskins into one of the most successful franchises of the 1980s. In just his third season in San Diego, the organization won its first AFC Western Division championship in more than a decade and, after five years, appeared in its first Super Bowl.

When the 1994 San Diego Chargers earned a trip to Super Bowl XXIX in Miami, Florida, it marked the seventh time a Beathard team has journeyed to the world championship. Four times his team has produced a Super Bowl victory.

The 1966 Kansas City Chiefs the 1972 and '73 Miami Dolphins...the 1982, '83 and '87 Washington Redskins and the 1994 San Diego Chargers were all products of Beathard's handiwork. Though success has followed him through every step of his NFL career, Beathard remains one of the league's most low-key personalities.

Upon taking over as general manager in 1990, he immediately set out to bring top athletes with a winning attitude to San Diego. Acting with the same vitality and decisiveness that has highlighted his 37 years as an NFL talent evaluator, his judgment was on the mark in 1990 when seven players from his first draft in San Diego ended up in the starting lineup, including Seau, a perennial Pro Bowl selection.

Leveraging tomorrow to help today also is a Beathard trademark. Since coming to San Diego in 1990, he has traded a future number-one draft choice six limes in 10 drafts. He did it twice in 1998.











first to get Ryan Leaf, the Chargers' quarterback of the future, with the second overall pick before sending the team's first-round choice in 2000 to Tampa Bay to select 6-5, 237-pound receiver Mikhael Ricks from Stephen F. Austin with the 59th overall choice. Ricks ranked fourth on the team with 30 catches for 450 yards and two touchdowns while starting eight games and playing in all 16 as a rookie.

Beathard has demonstrated a keen eye for talent

since becoming a part-time scout with the Kansas City Chiefs in 1963. He left the Chiefs briefly to scout for the American Football League and returned to Kansas City full-time after the AFL-NFL merger in 1966. He earned his first championship ring as a member of the 1966 Chiefs organization. Beathard then served as a scout for the Falcons, 1968-71.

In 1972, Beathard was named director of player personnel for the Miami Dolphins. The Dolphins won the following two Super Bowls. Then on February 24, 1978, the Redskins made Bobby their general manager and he

ultimately showed the league that first-round draft picks were weapons to be used in trades. In his 11 years at Washington, the Redskins had only three first-round picks. They went to the Super Bowl three times and won twice.

Beathard's handiwork was apparent on all three Super Bowl teams, including the World Champion Redskins of 1982 whose roster included astounding 27 free agents signed by Beathard since he joined the team in 1978. The 1983 squad, which finished 14-2, also made it to the Super Bowl. The Super Bowl XXII team defeated Denver 42-10, in San Diego.

Beathard left the Redskins to serve as a commentator for the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) on its weekly "NFL '89" show during the 1989 season.

In addition to his role as general manager of the Chargers, Beathard is on the NFL's College Relations

Committee and the Working Group on NFL Europe Football Operations.

When Beathard joined the Chargers, he returned to the Southern California lifestyle in which he was raised. Born in Zanesville, Ohio, January 24, 1937, Robert Beathard, Jr., grew up in the Los Angeles area and attended El Segundo High. He moved on to Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo where he played quarterback, 1956-58, and helped lead the 1957 and '58 teams to consecutive 9-1 records.

Bobby and his wife, Christine, reside in Leucadia, California. Beathard is an avid runner, surfer and cyclist. He has run

in dozens of marathons, including several Boston Marathons. Beathard has four children: sons Kurt (Jan. 4, 1963), currently the offensive coordinator at Western Carolina; Jeff (June 9, 1964), a twelfthround choice of the Rams in 1988 who is a scout for the Chargers; and Casey (Dec. 2, 1965), a songwriter and singer in Nashville, Tennessee, who also scouts part-time for the Chargers; and daughter Jaime (Sept. 25, 1968). Bobby also has 12 grandchildren.





Robert Brazile was a preeminent linebacker in the NFL during a career that spanned from 1975 to 1984 with the Houston Oilers. A consensus All-American at Jackson State, he was

drafted by the Oilers in the first round (sixth player overall) of the 1975 NFL Draft. He lived up to the high expectations and was named to multiple All-Rookie teams and earned Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year honors.

Noted for his size (6-4, 241 pounds) and speed (4.6 in the 40), Brazile had a reputation as a tremendous hitter and earned the nickname "Dr. Doom" by his peers.

He continued to dominate at the linebacker position and was a leading force on an Oilers defense that helped the team to three consecutive 10-win seasons (10-6 in 1978, 11-5 in 1979, 11-5 in 1980). Houston advanced to back-to-back AFC title game appearances in 1978 and 1979. Leading the way was Brazile who finished second on the team in tackles and was named by the NFLPA as the top linebacker in the AFC in each of those seasons. He recorded a career-best 185 tackles (95 solo, 98 assisted) during the 1978 season and had nine tackles and one fumble recovery in 1978 AFC Championship Game.

Brazile started every game of his 10-year career with the Oilers and his 147 consecutive games were the most in Oilers history at the time of his retirement in 1984. He had 13 career interceptions

for 201 yards and made 14 fumble recoveries. He amassed 11 sacks during the last three years of his career (1982-84), once sacks became an official statistic in 1982.

Brazile was named first-team All-Pro five times (1976, 1977, 1978, 1979 and 1980) and was elected to seven consecutive Pro Bowls (1977-1983). He is a member of the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1970s.



The Philadelphia Eagles selected Brian Dawkins out of Clemson in the second round, 61st overall, of the 1996 NFL Draft. Over the next 16 seasons, Dawkins exuded excellence

on the field as he quickly became one of the most accomplished safeties in the league.

Dawkins started 13 of the 14 games he played in during his rookie season as he became a vital member of the Eagles defense. In his first professional season, he earned 74 tackles (53 solo), three interceptions, one sack, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble. He went on to lead Philadelphia in interceptions the following two years (1997-98) and earned a team tackle title in 2002.

From 2001-04, Dawkins led the Eagles defensive that was vital to four NFC championship game appearances. The Eagles fell short each year until 2004 when they blazed through the playoffs and beat the Atlanta Falcons 27-10 in the NFC championship. Philadelphia then faced the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XXXIX as Dawkins made his only Super Bowl appearance.

After 13 seasons with the Eagles and five team Defensive MVP Awards, Dawkins was signed by Denver as an unrestricted free agent shortly after the conclusion of the 2008 season. Dawkins still holds several Eagles team records, including being tied for the most career interceptions (34).

His success continued in Denver. Dawkins posted remarkable stats on the field and he also received the Denver Broncos Ed Block Courage Award in 2009.

In all, Dawkins played 224 career games with the Eagles (1996-2008) and the Broncos (2009-2011). He amassed a total of 1,131 tackles (895 solo), intercepted 37 passes which he returned for 513 yards and two touchdowns, recorded 26 sacks, and made 19 fumble recoveries.

A nine-time Pro Bowler, Dawkins was named All-Pro and All-NFC five times. In addition to being named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s, Dawkins is a member of the Eagles 75th Anniversary Team and the Exclusive NFL Defensive Club (players with at least 35 career interceptions and 20 career

Jerry Kramer overcame a series of childhood injuries to become an excellent football ball player at the University of Idaho. The guard was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in

the fourth round (39th player overall) of the 1958 NFL Draft. He starred for the Green Bay Packers from 1958 to 1968 playing most of his 11-season career under the direction of Hall of Fame Coach Vince Lombardi.

Upon his entry into the NFL, he soon was hailed as one of the best blockers in the game and earned his first All-NFL acclaim in 1960, the same year the Packers lost to the Philadelphia Eagles in the NFL championship game. That game ended up as Kramer's only career postseason loss.

He continued his high level of play all while overcoming several debilitating injuries. In 1961, he missed several games due to a broken ankle that required a permanent pin to heal. Then, in 1964, he missed most of the season due to intestinal infections from wood splinters in his abdomen that required eight surgeries to rectify. In each instance, he returned to All-NFL form.

Kramer played 130 games as the Packers guard and served as the team's placekicker for several seasons. His leadership and talents helped the franchise capture five NFL championships and victories in Super Bowls I and II.

At the time of his retirement in 1968, he held the NFL Championship Game record for most field goal attempts in a single game (five against the New York Giants in 1962) and the Packers' team record for most PATs in a season (43 in 1963).

He earned All-NFL acclaim five times (1960, 1962-63, 1966-67) and was voted to three Pro Bowls. Kramer was also named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s, the NFL's 50th Anniversary Team in 1969 and the Super Bowl Silver Anniversary Team.

University of Miami (FL) linebacker Ray Lewis entered the NFL as the Baltimore Ravens first round pick, 26th overall, in the 1996 NFL Draft. Lewis, the franchise's second-ever draft

choice (Hall of Fame tackle Jonathan Ogden was the first), played his entire 17-year career with the team (1996-2012).

Lewis immediately became a leader on defense and led the team in tackles as a rookie. That marked the first of 14 times in his 17 seasons that he led the team in that category. At the time of his retirement in 2012. Lewis held three records with the Ravens most seasons played (17), most career games (228) and most career opponent fumbles recovered (20). He posted a franchise record 2,643 career tackles, including a single season team-best 225 stops in 2003.

In 2000, Lewis led a staunch Ravens defense which established a 16-game single-season record for the fewest points allowed (165), the fewest rushing yards allowed (970) and recorded four shutouts. The season was capped with a 34-7 victory over the New York Giants in Super Bowl XXXV where Lewis' three tackles, two assists and four passes defensed earned him Most Valuable Player honors.

Lewis's career ended in storybook fashion after the 2012 season when he recovered from a torn triceps muscle in midseason to participate in the team's postseason run. In his final game, he had three tackles, two assists and four passes defensed to help Baltimore defeat the San Francisco 49ers 34-31 in Super Bowl XLVII.

A 12-time Pro Bowl selection, Lewis received first-team All-Pro honors eight times during his career. He was recognized as the AP Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and 2003, and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s.

Lewis is the only player in the NFL history with at least 40 career sacks and 30 career interceptions (41.5 sacks and 31 interceptions). He is second only to Hall of Famer Jack Ham (53) in take-aways by a linebacker since the 1970 merger with 50 - 31 interceptions and 19 opponents' fumble recoveries.



Randy Moss was drafted in the first round, 21st player overall, of the 1998 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings. A dynamic wide receiver out of Marshall University where he was twice a

consensus All-American (1996-97), Moss played 14 seasons in the NFL. His career included stints with the Vikings (1998-2004, 2010), Oakland Raiders (2005-06), New England Patriots (2007-2010), Tennessee Titans (2010), and the San Francisco 49ers (2012).

In his NFL debut against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, Moss recorded four catches for 95 yards and two touchdowns. That year he set a then-NFL record for the most touchdown receptions by a rookie with 17, tops in the NFL that season. He would lead the league in that category five times during his career. Moss received numerous accolades his rookie season, including AP Offensive Rookie of the Year.

He continued to be the focal point of the Vikings' offense for several years and ranked second in the team's record book for receptions (587), receiving yards (9,316), and touchdowns (93) trailing only Hall

of Famer Cris Carter after his final season with the team in 2010.

In 2007, Moss set the NFL single-season record for touchdown receptions in a season with 23 to help the New England Patriots become the only team to finish a regular season with perfect 16-0 record. Moss made two Super Bowl appearances – Super Bowl XLII with the New England Patriots and XLVII with the San Francisco 49ers.

Moss caught 10 or more touchdown passes in nine seasons and had 10 seasons with 1,000 yards receiving. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Moss received first-team All-Pro honors four times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s. He finished his career with 982 receptions for 15,292 yards and 156 touchdowns. His career receiving yards and career touchdowns ranked third and fourth respectively in the NFL record book at the time of his retirement.

Terrell Owens was drafted out of little-known Tennessee-Chattanooga in the third round of the 1996 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers.

A prolific receiver with great hands and a knack for making big plays, his career totals were 1,078 catches for 15,934 yards, 14.8 yards per catch and 153 TDs. The yardage total ranked second all-time and his touchdown reception total was third most in NFL history at the time of his retirement.

Owens made his mark playing next to Hall of Famer Jerry Rice for most of his eight seasons in San Francisco. He set a then-record for catches in a single game with 20 receptions against Chicago Bears on Dec. 17, 2000. He recorded a remarkable three-year span from 2000-02 during which he caught 290 passes for 4,163 yards and 42 TDs. He set his careerhighs with 1,451 yards in 2000 and 100 catches in 2002.

Owens led the 49ers in receptions five times and remains second in the 49ers' record book in receptions (592), yards (8,572), and TDs (81).

His career also included several productive stints as a free agent (Philadelphia Eagles – 2004-05; Dallas Cowboys – 2006-08; Buffalo Bills – 2009; Cincinnati Bengals – 2010). Owens was a key weapon in the Eagles' drive to Super Bowl XXXIX and recorded 9

receptions for 122 yards in a narrow loss to the New England Patriots.

Owens recorded 60 or more catches in all but three of his 15 seasons. He eclipsed the 1,000-yard mark nine times over an 11-year span and had eight seasons with double-digit TD receptions.

Named All-Pro five times (2000-02, 2004, 2007) and an All-NFC choice four times, Owens was selected to six Pro Bowls. He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of 2000s.





Brian Urlacher played his entire 13-year career with the Chicago Bears. The versatile linebacker was selected by the team out of New Mexico in the first round, ninth player overall, of the

2000 NFL Draft.

Urlacher was named the AP's Defensive Rookie of the Year after he logged a career-high eight sacks and led the team in tackles. In 2005, he received Defensive Player of the Year honors (AP) becoming just the second Bears player to receive the award – the only other being Pro Football Hall of Famer Mike Singletary (1985, 1988). Urlacher was just the fifth player in NFL history to win both Defensive Rookie of the Year and Player of the Year honors.

One of the greatest defensive players in Bears history, Urlacher became the first player in franchise history to have a 90-plus yard fumble return for a touchdown (90 yards against the Atlanta Falcons on Oct. 7, 2001) and an 80-plus yard interception returned for a score (85 yards against the Green Bay Packers on Dec. 23, 2007). He led the team in sacks in 2000, interceptions in 2007, and in tackles eight of his 13 seasons in the league.

Urlacher made one Super Bowl appearance starting as middle linebacker in Super Bowl XLI against the Indianapolis Colts. The Bears were defeated 29-17 by the Colts, but Urlacher finished the game with seven tackles, four assists and a pass defensed.


An eight-time Pro Bowl selection, Urlacher received first-team All-Pro honors five times and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 2000s.

In his 182 career games, Urlacher had 41.5 sacks, 22 interceptions for 324 yards and two touchdowns as well as 90 passes defensed, 12 forced fumbles and 16 fumble recoveries. Additionally, he made 1,358 tackles, including 44 games with 10 or more tackles.







#### SELECTION PROCESS

Charged with the vital task of continuing to be certain that new enshrinees are the finest the game has produced is the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-person Selection Committee.

The Committee consists of one media representative from each pro football city with two from New York, inasmuch as that city has two teams in the National Football League. A 33rd member is a representative of the Pro Football Writers of America and there are 15 at-large delegates.

With the exception of the PFWA representative who is appointed for a two-year term, all appointments are of the open-end variety and can be terminated only by retirement or resignation, as long as the member continues to attend meetings regularly.

The Selection Committee meets annually at the time of the Super Bowl to elect new members. There is no set number for any class of enshrinees but, the Committee's current ground rules do stipulate that between four and eight new members will be selected each year. The 1973 and 1976 classes of three were the smallest ever named.

Every candidate is carefully scrutinized and must receive at least 80 percent approval of the Committee at the annual meeting before he can be elected. A scale of negative votes for elimination that will vary depending on the number of Selectors in attendance is used.

When the Selectors meet in February to name the Class of 2019, they will have before them a roster of 18 final candidates, along with detailed biographies on each. To assure that older players will be considered along with the more recently retired, the Seniors Committee - made up of nine veteran members of the overall Selection Committee - will name two nominees from the pre-1994 era to be included on the final list.

A bylaws change to the selection process was approved by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Board of Trustees in August 2014 by which a Contributor – defined as an individual who has "made outstanding contributions to professional football in capacities other than playing or coaching" – will automatically be included among the annual list of finalists for election. The

Contributor finalist will also be voted on for election independent of all other finalists.

The Board, in an effort to address the backlog of deserving Contributor candidates, also approved a temporary measure allowing for two Contributor finalists in years one (starting with the Class of 2015), three and five, of the next five years. In years two and four of that same period, there will be just one Contributor finalist. At the end of the five-year period (2019), the number of Contributor finalists going forward will be one per year.

To keep the maximum number of nominees elected at no more than eight per year, the Senior finalists will be reduced from two to one per year in years one, three and five of the same five-year period. In years two and four and each year thereafter, there will be two Senior finalists, as is now the practice

The Contributor finalists will be selected annually, by five members, on a rotational basis, of a nine-member subcommittee of the Selection Committee.

The other finalists will be the survivors from a preliminary list of Modern-Era candidates that the Committee will have screened by mail ballot. That original list will have been in part provided by the fans themselves.

Any fan may nominate any qualified person who has been connected with pro football in any capacity simply by writing to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The only restriction is that a player and coach must have last played or coached at least five seasons before he can be considered. For example, a candidate for the 2019 class must have concluded his career no later than the 2013 season.

There is no mandatory retirement period for a contributor. Every nomination received will be processed and forwarded to the Selection Committee.

It is important to emphasize that the Hall of Fame itself has no say whatsoever as to who is or is not elected to membership. The only function of the staff is to process the nominations as they arrive and to coordinate all reduction voting and Committee Meetings, including the annual meeting.

#### FAO ABOUT THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME'S SELECTION PROCESS

## Does the Hall of Fame Nominate individuals?

The Hall of Fame receives nominations but does not make them. Any person, including the 48 elite members of the Selection Committee may place in nomination any eligible players, coaches or contributors.

# What Happens After Someone is Nominated as a Modern-Era Nominee?

A nomination is NOT a vote for election. The Hall of Fame's selection process includes multiple steps in which the nominees are scrutinized. The Hall facilitates the procedure of three successive reviews of increasing scrutiny with its 48 selectors. The first is a vote to reduce the long list of Modern-Era nominees (typically around 100) to 25 semifinalists, followed by a later vote to reduce to 15 finalists. At the annual "Selection Saturday" Meeting, the finalists are scrutinized even further by the Selectors, who after a thorough discussion of each nominee reduce the list from 15 to 10 and then 10 to 5. At that point, the five remaining nominees are voted on for membership on a yes or no basis. A minimum positive vote of 80 percent is necessary for election.

#### Who Selects New Hall of Fame Members

The Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-person Selection Committee is charged with the vital task of continuing to be sure that new enshrinees are the finest the game has produced.

The Committee consists of one media representative from each pro football city with two from New York, inasmuch as that city has two teams in the National Football League. There are 16 at-large selectors, all of whom are also active members of the media including one representative of the Pro Football Writers of America, and two members of the Hall of Fame.

The Selection Committee meets annually on "Selection Saturday," the day before the Super Bowl in the host city to elect new members to the Hall of Fame. There is no set number of new enshrinees, but the Committee's current ground rules do stipulate that between four and eight new members will be selected each year. Every candidate is carefully scrutinized and must receive at least 80 percent approval of the Committee at the annual meeting before he can be elected.

#### How Are New Enshrinees Selected?

Any fan may nominate any player, coach or contributor who has been connected with pro football simply by writing to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The only restriction is that a player and coach must have been retired at least five years before he can be considered. There is no mandatory retirement period for a contributor before he may be considered. Every nomination of an eligible candidate received will be processed and forwarded to the Hall of Fame's Selection Committee.

Each year, the Selection Committee will be polled three times before the Final List of Modern-Era Preliminary Nominees is determined. The Initial Preliminary List of nominations is compiled and sent to the Hall of Fame's Selection Committee by March 1. The list is provided so that the selectors can study the nominees and then request the addition of any other candidates that may have been overlooked. Included on this list are firsttime eligible candidates who have strong enough credentials to give them even a remote chance of eventual Hall of Fame election. Also included are all other eligible candidates nominated by any person. Additionally, those Modern-Era nominees from the previous year's final preliminary list who received at least four votes in the balloting to determine the modern-era finalists are automatically included on this preliminary list.

The Second Preliminary List is sent to the selectors during the month of July and includes all the nominees named on the initial list plus any additional nominations received from any source since the first list was compiled.

The Third Preliminary List of eligible candidates is sent to the Selection Committee during the month of September for the purpose of the selection of the Modern-Era Semifinalists for election. From the Third Preliminary List the Selection Committee is asked to vote for 25 Modern Era Nominees who become Semifinalists for election.

The Final Preliminary List of 25 Modern-Era nominees plus all ties (if any) for the twenty fifth position shall be distributed to the Selection Committee during the month of November for the purpose of the selection of 15 Modern-Era Nominees. The 16th, 17th, and 18th finalists are the recommended candidates of the Seniors and Contributors Committees, that on alternating years present one or two nominees to the Selection Committee.









In advance of the Hall of Fame Selection Meeting in February, the selectors are provided detailed biographies on each of the 18 finalists. At the annual meeting on "Selection Saturday," each finalist is thoroughly discussed by the committee before a series of reduction votes are taken. First, the senior candidate(s) and Contributor candidate(s) are discussed and voted on for election. They must receive the same 80 percent affirmative vote as the Modern-Era candidates. Next, there is a vote that reduces the Modern-Era finalists list from 15 to 10. Following that, a vote is taken to reduce the list from 10 to 5 names. The five remaining candidates for Hall of Fame election are then voted on individually (yes or no) for membership.

In order to be elected a finalist must receive a minimum of 80% of the vote. All ballots are collected and counted by the firm Deloitte & Touche. No vote totals are announced – only the winners of the various reduction ballots are revealed to the selectors and the Hall's representatives.

## How Are Senior and Contributor Candidates Chosen?

To assure that older players, whose active careers have been completed at least 25 years, as well as those individuals who contributed to the game in ways other than playing and coaching will be considered along with the Modern-Era players and coaches, a Seniors Committee and a Contributors Committee, have been established. Each of these committees are made up of nine veteran members of the overall Selection Committee.

Like the full Committee, the members of the Seniors Committee and the Contributors Committee are provided a preliminary list of eligible nominees. The list, which is compiled and mailed to the selectors, includes carry-over nominations from the previous year, first-time eligible candidates, and nominations from any outside source.

By way of a mail ballot, the Senior Committee members reduce the list to 15 Senior Nominee finalists. The Contributors Committee reduces their list to 10 Contributor Nominee finalists. Five members of the nine-man Seniors Committee, selected on a rotating basis, are designated to attend the annual Seniors Committee meeting held in Canton, where they are charged with the responsibility of nominating candidate(s) from that list to be among the 18 finalists for Hall of Fame election. The same procedure is followed by the Contributors Committee who also meet annually in Canton.

In advance of both meetings, each selector is provided with detailed biographical information on the candidates.

Seniors Committee members are assisted during their annual meeting by two Hall of Fame consultants, chosen by the Hall's President, who were contemporaries of the majority of the nominees. The consultants offer only their opinions and are not entitled to vote. After each candidate is discussed thoroughly, the consultants are excused from the meeting. Additional discussion is conducted followed by a series of reduction votes that results in the naming of the Senior Nominee(s).

Contributors Committee members are also assisted during their annual meeting by two consultants and follow the same guidelines as described above for the Seniors Committee consultants.

Although the Senior Nominee(s) and Contributor Nominee(s) will be presented to the full Selection Committee as finalists, their election to the Hall of Fame is not automatic. The Senior Nominee(s) and Contributor Nominee(s) must receive the same minimum 80% of the vote as a Modern-Era candidate to be elected.

## Is a New Hall of Fame Member Enshrined as a Member of a Team?

Obviously, teams take great pride in the accomplishments of individuals who have been a part of their organization. Often individual teams and even the Hall of Fame will list enshrinees according to the team or teams on which they spent a significant period of time. An enshrinee, however, is not asked to "declare," nor does the Hall of Fame "choose" a team under which a new member is enshrined. When elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, an individual is recognized for accomplishments as a player, coach, or contributor.









#### **ELIGIBILITY CHART**

A player or coach must not have played or coached for five full seasons before he is eligible for election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The chart below can be used as a quick reference to determine when a player or coach will be, was, or is first eligible for the Hall of Fame. For instance, 2014 enshrinee Andre Reed last played in 2000. Therefore, he was first eligible for the Class of 2006. Counting upward from 2006, one can determine that he was elected in his ninth year of eligibility.



Included with this list are the reduction votes that took place under the rules at the time. In the past, the finalists numbered 15 that included 13 Modern-Era candidates and the two senior nominees and the senior nominees were included in the reduction vote. Twenty-two members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame have earned Most Valuable Player honors in a Super Bowl. Three of them - Bart Starr (2), Terry Bradshaw (2), and Joe Montana (3) - have earned the award more than once.

#### BART STARR - QB - Green Bay Packers - MVP of Super Bowls I and II

I: Completed 16 of 23 passes for 250 yards and 2 TDs (37 yards and 13 yards - both to Max McGee) II: Completed 13 of 24 passes for 202 yards and 1 TD (62 yards to Boyd Dowler). Also rushed one time for 14 yards.

JOE NAMATH - QB - New York Jets - MVP of Super Bowl III Completed 17 of 28 passes for 206 yards.

LEN DAWSON - QB - Kansas City Chiefs - MVP of Super Bowl IV Completed 12 of 17 passes for 142 yards and 1 TD (46 yards to Otis Taylor). Also rushed 3 times for 11 yards.

ROGER STAUBACH - QB - Dallas Cowboys - MVP of Super Bowl VI Completed 12 of 19 passes for 119 yards and 2 TDs (7 yards to Lance Alworth and 7 yards to Mike Ditka). Also rushed 5 times for 18 yards.

LARRY CSONKA - RB - Miami Dolphins - MVP of Super Bowl VIII Rushed 33 times for 145 yards and 2 TDs (5, 2).

#### JOE MONTANA - QB - San Francisco 49ers -MVP of Super Bowls XVI, XIX, and XXIV



# TOM BENSON HALL OF FAME STADIUM

In the Beginning The original stadium was built from 1937-1939 at an estimated cost of \$500,000. The federal government in the form of man power, the WPA, paid for \$400,000 while a school board bond issue paid for the materials. The stadium originally seated 15,000 and was the largest high school stadium in the country at that time. Formerly known as Fawcett Stadium after John A. Fawcett, a community leader, member of the Canton City school board, and a gifted athlete, the stadium was renamed Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in 2014.

The Future A key component of Johnson Controls Hall of Fame Village project is Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium. The venue is a world-class sports and entertainment sports complex that includes a permanent stage built into the stands at the 50-yard line. The stadium is designed by HKS, a world renowned architectural firm that previously developed AT&T Stadium for the Dallas Cowboys and U.S. Bank Stadium for the Minnesota Vikings.

Enshrinement Ceremony The Pro Football Hall of Fame's enshrinement ceremony is one of the great events in sports. In 2002, the annual enshrinement was moved from the Hall's front steps back to the stadium, where it had been held from 1963 to 1965.

Hall of Fame Game The Hall of Fame Game series began in 1962, one year before the museum opened. A National Football League preseason game has been played in Canton each year except three since that inaugural game. No game was played in 1966 as the preseason schedule was not set in time to include Canton for a neutral site game. The game was canceled in 2011 due to a lockout and in 2016 due to respect for player safety based on the condition of the field

Beginning in 1971, following the AFL-NFL merger, an AFC vs. NFC format was adopted for the Hall of Fame series. Preset schedules were created that called for each team to make a visit to Canton over 14- and 15-year periods through 1994. In 1995, the Hall of Fame Game showcased



the debut of the league's newest expansion teams - the Carolina Panthers and Jacksonville Jaguars. Since that time, the teams for the Hall of Fame Game normally includes teams with significant milestones (such as the return of the Cleveland Browns in 1999 and the Houston Texans inaugural game in 2002) or a connection to the Hall's class of enshrinees.

The inaugural game (1962) and those from 1967 through 1997 were played on Saturday afternoons. The Hall of Fame games were played on Sunday afternoons from 1963 to 1965. In 1998, the Hall of Fame game was switched to primetime with kickoff moved to Saturday evening. One year later, the game moved to Monday night. From 2006 to 2016, the Hall of Fame Game was played on Sunday night. In 2017, the game was switched to Thursday night.

The Hall of Fame Game was televised nationally by ABC from 1971-2005. In 2006, NBC broadcast the game followed by the NFL Network in 2007. The game returned to NBC in 2008. The game was broadcast by NFL Network in 2012 and was scheduled for ESPN in 2016.

The Cincinnati Bengals, who beat the Los Angeles Rams in 1988, became the first team to play in the Hall of Fame Game and advance to the Super Bowl in the same season. The 2001 St. Louis Rams are the only other team to play in Canton to start a run to the Super Bowl.

\*\*\*

Teams that have won or tied the Hall of Fame Game have qualified for the playoffs that same season 24 times. Included in the number are 14 teams that claimed division titles after leaving Canton without a loss.

During one particular 14-year stretch from 1980-1993, all but two of the teams that won or tied the Hall of Fame game advanced to the postseason that year.
