





Born in a small, poverty-ridden town in Appalachia ("I grew up 200 years ago for all practical purposes; we had no electricity, no running water and no money and everyone had to work to eat"), she dropped out of school and got her first full-time job at age 13, working a 12-hour day in a bakery for \$12 a week. Eventually she went back to high school and to college where she majored in journalism and got a job as a newspaper reporter.

After spending about 12 years at home caring for young children, doing all the housewifely things that "I did well but didn't like much" and being active in the League of Women Voters. she got a part-time job as an assistant to Warren Jackson, a consultant and a columnist for Westchester Rockland Newspapers.

About the same time she began to work with a number of other women on founding a Westchester NOW chapter. The jobs and her interests coalesced to women's affairs and communications problems.

She speaks with admiration of the success she has observed among Westchester friends who have followed similar desultory paths to job success.

"It is the most satisfying thing in my life to see women who deserve it and who have worked hard for it get ahead." Although the concerns may seem

rather far removed from the world of clothes and caring about one's looks, Gonnie Siegel doesn't think so.

"If anybody doubts the importance of clothing, let them go over to a company like IBM, for example, and see what happens if a top executive comes to work in blue jeans," she said. BARBARA MAYER is a staff writer




