John T. Platts, *A dictionary of Urdu, classical Hindi, and English.* London, 1884. 1259 pp.

The original edition was issued successively by two or three publishers. Numerous reprints in Britain (Oxford: Oxford University Press. 0-19-864309-8) and in India.

Headwords are given in Arabic, Devanagari and Latin scripts (sub-headings and phrases in Latin only); they are in the Arabic alphabetical order, appropriate to Urdu. A Hindi user will take a little time to get to know it. A rich collection from oral and printed sources of the vocabulary and usage of the nineteenth-century language, and in some ways still the best concise dictionary today. Etymologies are given in square brackets. Some ethnographical information, but no quotations from literature. Taxonomic names are supplied for flora and fauna.
