WAKE FOREST VS. NOTRE DAME

THE MATCH UP

- Wake Forest continues its five-game homestand on Saturday, Sept. 22, as the Deacs play host to No. 8 Notre Dame in nonconference action.
- Kickoff is set for 12:00 p.m. and will be broadcast on ABC. Sean McDonough, Todd Blackledge and Holly Rowe will have the call.
- Saturday's game can also be heard on the Wake Forest Sports Network. Stan Cotten and Lary Sorensen have the call with Dave Goren reporting from the sidelines.

WAKE FOREST STORYLINES

- The Demon Deacons fell to 2-1 on the year following a 41-34 defeat to Boston College last time out.
- Cade Carney had his second consecutive 100-yard rushing game with 116 yards while Matt Colburn II joined him with a 117-yard effort against the Eagles.
- Cameron Glenn and Justin Strnad led the team with 10 tackles each, while Demetrius Kemp's punt block paired with Malik Grate's recovery resulted in a special teams touchdown for the Deacs.

THE OPPOSITION & SERIES HISTORY

- Notre Dame enters Saturday's game ranked eighth nationally in the AP and Coaches polls after a 3-0 start.
- Brian Kelly is in his ninth season at the helm of the Fighting Irish and enters Saturday's contest with a 51-33 record.
- Notre Dame leads the all-time series 4-0, but will be making just its second trip to BB&T Field. The series began at Wake Forest in 2011, with the last three meetings taking place in South Bend.

LOOKING AHEAD

- The Deacs are back in BB&T for their fourth consecutive home game on Saturday, September 29, as the Deacs face Rice.
- Saturday's game between Wake Forest and the Owls will be broadcast on RSN, with kickoff set for 3:30 p.m.

Weekly Press Conference

Wake Forest's weekly press conference, sponsored by Carrabba's, begins each Tuesday at 11 a.m. in the Rovere Room in the Miller Center on campus, beginning with selected players. Lunch will then be served and Dave Clawson will meet with the media at 12:00 p.m. in the Rovere Room followed by lunch with the print media in the Rovere Room. Any specific player requests must be made before noon on Monday. Quotes and video of the press conference will be posted on WakeForestSports.com.

ACC Weekly Teleconference

Dave Clawson participates in the ACC's weekly teleconference. The teleconference takes place each Wednesday, with Coach Clawson set to speak at 12:00 p.m. For the media access number, contact the ACC Media Relations Office or the Wake Forest Athletic Communications Office. The teleconference is archived online at theACC.com.

Covering Practice

Wake Forest typically conducts its practices on campus at the Doc Martin Practice Complex adjacent to the Pruitt Football Center. Please contact the Athletic Communications Office if you'd like to interview a coach or player at the conclusion of practice. Coach Clawson is available in person most days of the week and players are available Tuesday and Wednesday after practice.

The Dave Clawson Show

Coach Clawson's weekly radio show with the Voice of the Deacons, Stan Cotten, airs on the Wake Forest IMG Sports Network and online at WakeForestSports.com. The show will be held live on location at Bib's Downtown through Oct. 3 and held at the IMG College studios in downtown Winston-Salem for all remaining episodes.

Coach Clawson Interviews

Aside from the previously mentioned Tuesday press conference, Wednesday teleconference and radio show, Dave Clawson is available for phone interviews on Wednesday afternoons between 12:30-1 p.m. and by appointment only. Please schedule those with the Athletic Communications Office.

Player Interviews

Players are available at Tuesday's weekly press conference and after practice Tuesday and Wednesday. Phone interviews will be scheduled on an individual basis, contingent on class schedules. Please schedule those with the Athletic Communications Office.

BB&T FIELD 50TH ANNIVERSARY

- Wake Forest's BB&T Field will celebrate its 50th birthday in 2018. Opened in 1968 as Groves Stadium, the Demon Deacons have played 287 games and compiled a record of 128-156-4.
- BB&T Field has hosted two ACC Championship teams in the 1970 squad and the 2006 team.
- The first game was against NC State on Sept. 14, 1968. Wake Forest's first win at the stadium came on Oct. 26, 1968 with a 48-31 win over North Carolina.
- Wake Forest has gone undefeated at BB&T Field on two occasions, posting a 5-0 mark in 1979 and a 4-0 record in 1970. Three times Wake Forest has won five home games in a season: 1979, 2007 and 2008.
- Head coach Dave Clawson, with 13 home wins in his first four seasons, needs three victories in 2018 to become the second-winningest coach at BB&T Field.

SETTING THE STAGE

- This is the fifth meeting between Notre Dame and Wake Forest but the first played outside of the month of November.
- In the last three meetings, all in South Bend, Notre Dame has led by 21, 21 and 31 points at halftime. In the lone previous meeting in Winston-Salem, Wake Forest held a 17-10 advantage at the half.
- Wake Forest has achieved more first downs than Notre Dame in three of the four meetings, including the last two.
- Six of Wake Forest's eight touchdowns in the series have been on the ground.
- Notre Dame has rushed for 10 of its 16 offensive touchdowns.

DEACS VS. RANKED FOES

- Notre Dame enters Saturday's game ranked No. 8 in both the AP (writers) poll and the Amway Coaches poll.
- Notre Dame will be the highest-ranked nonconference team to visit BB&T Field since Sept. 7, 1996 when the Demon Deacons hosted No. 13 Northwestern. Wake Forest also hosted No. 13 Auburn in 1979. The Demon Deacons won both of those games, defeating Auburn 42-38 and defeating Northwestern 28-27.
- All-time, Wake Forest is 23-134-1 against Top 25 opponents. In its last game against a ranked foe, the Deacons defeated No. 25/22 NC State, 30-24, on Nov. 18, 2017.
- The highest-ranked opponent that Wake Forest has ever defeated was No. 4 Tennessee in Knoxville in 1946 by a 19-6 score.
- In the last three meetings with Notre Dame, the Irish have been ranked No. 5 (2017), No. 6 (2015) and No. 3 (2012). Notre Dame was unranked in its only previous visit to BB&T Field in 2011 when the Irish won 24-17.
- Head coach Dave Clawson has two wins at Wake Forest against ranked opponents, last year's 30-24 win over No. 25 NC State and the 2016 Military Bowl win over No. 23 Temple.

NOTING THE BC GAME

- For the first time in school history, Wake Forest has posted four consecutive games of 500 or more yards of total offense. The Deacons had 512 total offense yards (298 rushing, 214 passing) against Boston College.
- The visiting team in the Wake Forest-Boston College series won for the fifth straight year. For the 11th consecutive year in the series, the team that scored first won the game.
- Wake Forest ran a school record 105 total offense plays, surpassing the previous mark of 103 set against Western Carolina in 1982.
- Wake Forest converted 6-of-7 fourth down attempts vs. BC while the Deacs' 22 third down conversion attempts were the second-most ever in a game for Wake Forest behind the 23 against BC in 2005.
- Boston College's Anthony Brown tied the Wake Forest opponent record for touchdown passes in a game. The last opponent to throw five TD passes vs. Wake Forest was Clemson's Tajh Boyd in 2012.

DEACS ON OFFENSIVE STREAK

- Wake Forest's 512 total yards of offense against Boston College on Sept. 13 marked the fourth straight game, dating back to 2017, that the Deacons have had 500 or more total offense yards.
- That streak is tied for the longest in the nation along with Texas A&M, which has four straight 500-yard games.
- The Deacons had 646 total offense yards against Texas A&M in the Belk Bowl to close the 2017 season, then opened 2018 with 532 yards at Tulane, 582 yards vs. Towson, and 512 vs. BC.

WAKE FOREST FOOTBALL

FAST-PACED ATTACK

- Wake Forest set a school record by running 105 offensive plays against Boston College.
- The Demon Deacons rushed the ball 60 times for 298 yards and attempted 45 passes for 214 yards.
- The previous high for offensive plays in a game was 103 set against Western Carolina in 1982.
- With 94 plays vs. Tulane, the 2018 Deacons have run two of the top six play totals in school history this year.

DORTCH TOPS 1,000 YARDS

- Greg Dortch went over 1,000 yards in career receiving in just his 11th career game. He became the fastest Wake Forest player to surpass 1,000 career yards.
- Dortch moved past Chris Givens (2009-11), Jason Anderson (2001-04), Todd Dixon (1990-93), and Wayne Baumgardner (1978-81), who all needed 19 games to collect 1,000 career receiving yards.
- Dortch continues to lead the nation in all-purpose yards with 224.7 per game. He also leads the nation in combined kick return yards with 334 (164 KOR, 170 PR).
- The redshirt sophomore remains the only player in FBS with two punt return touchdowns.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

- Wake Forest had a pair of 100-yard rushers against Boston College. Cade Carney carried 18 times for 116 yards while Matt Colburn II had 117 yards on 23 carries and his first touchdown of the season.
- Wake Forest is now 15-4 in games in which it has two 100-yard rushers. It marked the first loss with double 100-yard rushers since 1988. It was just the eighth time that the Deacons had a pair of 100-yard rushers against an ACC opponent and the first time since last year's Syracuse contest when Colburn II had 237 and John Wolford added 136.
- Colburn now has 1,965 career rushing yards and needs

just 35 yards to get to 2,000 rushing yards for his career. He would become the 12th player in school history to surpass 2,000 career rushing yards.

- Carney has pushed his career total to 1,121 rushing yards and enters the Notre Dame game ranked 31st in school history in career rushing yards.

SCIBA EXTENDS STREAK

- Wake Forest freshman PK Nick Sciba has made six straight field goal attempts. The freshman from Clover, S.C. missed his first attempt of the year at Tulane but has made every attempt since.
- Sciba hit his second try, from 24 yards out, to give Wake Forest a 10-7 lead against Tulane
- Sciba connected on all three attempts from 35, 27 and 27 yards in a victory over Towson before going 2-for-2 against Boston College on attempts from 27 and 23 yards.

SPECIAL TEAMS SPOTLIGHT

- Wake Forest is the only school with three punt return touchdowns on the season.
- Greg Dortch returned two punts for touchdowns against Towson on Sept. 8.
- The Deacons' Demetrius Kemp blocked a punt against Boston College on Sept. 13 that was recovered in the end zone for a touchdown by Malik Grate. The blocked punt counts statistically as a punt return for a touchdown.
- The three punt returns for touchdowns ties the school record set in 1945.

FOURTH DOWN PROFICIENCY

- Wake Forest was a remarkable 6 of 7 on fourth down conversions against Boston College, which is believed to be a modern school record for both attempts and conversions.
- The previous high for fourth-down attempts in game had been six against Rutgers in 1997 while the previous high for conversions had been four against Stanford in 2010.

NEWS & NOTES

- QB Sam Hartman has thrown two touchdown passes in each of the first three games.
- WR Steven Claude had his top game as a receiver with two catches for 32 yards vs. BC. Claude had a gorgeous over-the-shoulder 26-yard reception for the Deacons on a third-and-10 play in the third quarter. Claude also earned his first career start at WR vs. BC.
- WR Sage Surratt caught his first career touchdown on a five-yard toss from Sam Hartman.
- DT Zeek Rodney had a career-high seven tackles against Boston College.

HARTMAN IN THE RANKINGS

- QB Sam Hartman is second in the nation in total offense among freshmen with 342.3 yards per game. Texas Tech's Alan Bowman is tops at 392.7 YPG.
- Hartman is fourth nationally among freshmen in completion percentage (.553), second in completions per game (22.7), third in passing efficiency (120.2), second in passing touchdowns (6), second in passing yards (834), second in points responsible for (42),

ALL-PURPOSE DORTCH

- Redshirt Sophomore WR Greg Dortch, the national leader in all-purpose yards with 224.7 per game, became the first player in Wake Forest history with four consecutive 200-yard all-purpose games when he totaled 310 yards vs. Towson on Sept. 8. Dortch put together the third-highest all-purpose yardage game in Wake Forest

history against the Tigers with 310 yards.

- Dortch had seven receptions for 94 yards and a touchdown against Towson. He added three kickoff returns for 85 yards and three punt returns for 131 yards including two touchdowns.

- In 2017, Dortch had 258 all-purpose yards at Georgia Tech and followed that with 216 yards and four touchdowns against Louisville, the game in which he suffered a season-ending injury. Dortch started the 2018 campaign with an even 200 AP yards at Tulane on Aug. 30 before exploding for 310 against Towson on Sept. 8.

- The school record for all-purpose yards in a game is 411 set by John Leach in 1993 vs. Maryland. Leach had 329 rushing yards, 42 receiving, nine yards on punt returns and 31 on kickoff returns. The second-most AP yards in a game belongs to Chris Barclay in 2003, also against Maryland. Barclay had 243 rushing yards, 35 receiving and 38 on kickoff returns.

- Dortch is the first NCAA FBS player with 100 or more PR yards, 85 or more KOR yards and 90 receiving yards in the same game since Bernard Reedy of Toledo in 2012. Reedy, against Central Michigan, compiled 92 receiving yards, 94 on KOR and 107 on PR.

DORTCH TWICE AS NICE ON SPECIAL TEAMS

- Redshirt sophomore WR Greg Dortch continues to put the flame to the Wake Forest record book. Dortch had two punt returns for touchdowns against Towson on Sept. 8, scoring on returns of 70 and 60 yards.

- The last and only other Deacon with two punt returns for scores in a game was Johnny Cox who turned the feat against Davidson in 1927.

- Dortch became just the fourth player in ACC history with two punt return touchdowns in a game: Devin Hester (Miami) vs. Louisiana Tech in 2004; Ryan Switzer (UNC) vs. Pitt in 2013; Andre Purvis (UNC) vs. Tulane in 1993.

- His 43.7 yards per punt return in a game set an ACC record for PR average (min. 3 returns), breaking the mark of 41.8 by Don Kelly of Clemson vs. Maryland in 1970.

PENALTY FREE

- For the first time in over 50 years, Wake Forest was not called for a penalty against Towson on Sept. 8.

- The last time that happened was in 1964 when the Deacons played at Memphis.

- The only other recorded instance happened in 1960 at South Carolina.

QUARTERBACK LONGEVITY

- Since 2010, only one school in the nation has had fewer starting quarterbacks in the season-opener than Wake Forest. Sam Hartman became just the fourth opening day starter over the past nine seasons for the Deacs.

- Ted Stachitas started the opener in 2010 for the Demon Deacons before yielding to Tanner Price who started in 2011, 2012 and 2013.

- John Wolford started the season-opener for four straight years from 2014-17.

- Only Troy, with three different opening day starters, has fewer than Wake Forest.

- Wake Forest is tied with Duke, Missouri, Nebraska, Penn State, Syracuse and Western Kentucky for the second-fewest.

BREAK IT UP, BASSEY

- Wake Forest corner Essang Bassey had quite the sophomore campaign in 2017. Bassey tied the school record with 19 passes defensed, including three interceptions and 16 pass break-ups.

- An honorable mention All-ACC pick last year, Bassey was second in the league in passes defensed.

- After starting all 13 games, Bassey had three PBUs in the Belk Bowl and was named to ESPN's All-ACC Bowl team.

- He has been named a third team preseason All-ACC pick by Athlon in 2018 and began the year with three breakups against Tulane before adding one breakup and an interception vs. Towson.

- His 1.67 passes defensed per game ranks 18th in all of FBS and tied for second in the ACC.

ARBY'S, WE HAVE THE BEEF (BOYS)

- Wake Forest is one of 18 schools in FBS to return all five offensive line starters from 2017. Boston College is the only other ACC school with all five starters returning.

- Wake Forest had 131 career starts entering the start of the season, ranking third nationally behind Wisconsin (150 career O-line starts) and Boston College (139).

- The Deacons are led by LG Phil Haynes (37 career starts), C Ryan Anderson (33), RT Jake Benzinger (17) and RG Patrick Osterhage (14).

- Nate Gilliam (6 career starts) has also seen extensive action on the offensive line.

- In 2017, the Beef Boys cut their sacks allowed by 49 percent, having allowed just 20 after yielding 39 in 2016.

- Justin Herron started his 38th game against Tulane on Aug. 30 but suffered a season-ending knee injury.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR SERVICE

- Grad transfer Eric Osteen graduated from West Point in 2013 and fulfilled his five-year commitment to the Army.

- Osteen filled a variety of roles including serving as a platoon leader, company executive officer and company logistics officer. Because he only played two years of football for the Black Knights, Osteen has a year of eligibility remaining. His last game was the 2012 Army-Navy game.

- At age 28, Osteen is the fourth-oldest player in the FBS this season. Colorado sophomore PK James Stefanou is 31; Maryland junior punter Wade Lees is 30, Houston junior punter Dane Roy is 29 and Osteen is fourth at 28.

- Osteen and his wife, Erin, live in Winston-Salem where she is an anesthesiology resident at Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center.

- Osteen registered two touchbacks against Tulane and added three more against Towson for four on the year.

SUSTAINED DRIVES

- Wake Forest is tied with San Diego State for the national lead for most sustained drives this year.

- Both the Demon Deacons and Aztecs have eight scoring drives of 10 or more plays.

- This is a modern era record for non-Saturday games for the Deacons. In 1946, Wake Forest played three Friday games and a Thursday contest.

WAKE FOREST FOOTBALL

HINTON RETURNS TO ACTION

- Quarterback Kendall Hinton will be eligible for the Demon Deacons beginning this Saturday against Notre Dame.
- Wake Forest's starting quarterback coming out of spring, Hinton was suspended for the first three games of the season for a violation of team rules.
- After spending the first two weeks of fall camp at QB, Hinton also worked some at WR.

BOWL TEAMS

- In 2017, Wake Forest set a school record by defeating six teams bowl eligible teams.
- The Deacons defeated Boston College, which earned a spot in the Pinstripe Bowl where it lost to Iowa, 27-20.
- Wake Forest downed Utah State 46-10 before the Aggies went on to lose to New Mexico State in the Arizona Bowl.
- The Deacons edged Appalachian State before the Mountaineers shut out Toledo 34-0.
- Louisville, which lost to Wake Forest at BB&T Field on Oct. 28, advanced to the TaxSlayer Bowl where the Cardinals lost to Mississippi State 31-27.
- After NC State fell to Wake Forest 30-24, the Wolfpack advanced to the Sun Bowl where they defeated Arizona State 52-31.
- In the season finale, Wake Forest defeated Texas A&M 55-52 in the Belk Bowl in Charlotte.

CLAWSON YEAR 5

- Dave Clawson has assembled a remarkable record in his fourth year in his four head coaching positions.
- In previous Year 4's, Clawson posted a 36-16 record and a 23-9 conference mark and has led his team to a postseason victory in each of those years.
- Clawson is entering just his third Year 5 in 2018. In his two previous Year 5's, his teams have won at least nine games.
- Fordham, in 2003, went 9-3 while Bowling Green, in 2013, was 10-3 overall, 7-1 in the Mid-American Conference, won the MAC title and earned a bowl bid.
- Coach Clawson is off to a 2-1 start in Year 5 at Wake Forest following the first three weeks of the season.

HOME COOKIN'

- Wake Forest is at home for five-straight weeks in September and early October.
- The Deacons open at BB&T Field on Sept. 8 against Towson. The next four weeks, Wake Forest hosts Boston College (Sept. 13), Notre Dame (Sept. 22), Rice (Sept. 29) and Clemson (Oct. 6).
- After an open date on Oct. 13, Wake Forest will play four of its final six games on the road.
- Wake Forest has played as many as four consecutive home games, most recently in 2004.
- Wake Forest's seven home games are the most since also playing seven in 2016.

ACL INJURIES

- Wake Forest has suffered eight season-ending injuries since the end of the 2017 regular season.
- LB Chase Monroe and OL Spencer Clapp suffered torn ACLs during practice leading up to the 2017 Belk Bowl.
- LB Jeff Burley and RB Tyler Bell suffered torn ACLs in the spring. CB Arkeem Byrd suffered a dislocated knee which included a torn ACL during spring practice.
- LT Justin Herron and S Coby Davis tore their ACLs in the season-opener at Tulane on Aug. 30.
- DT Elontae Bateman has been medically disqualified, thus ending his collegiate playing career.

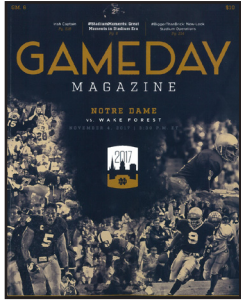
2012: Wake Forest chalked up 517 yards of total offense, with 296 of them coming on the ground, to run past Army 49-37 in an offensive shootout at BB&T Field. Michael Campanaro had three touchdowns while Josh Harris and Deandre Martin each rushed for a pair of touchdowns. Campanaro had 12 receptions for 153 yards and two touchdowns while adding a four-yard rushing score.

2007: In one of the greatest comebacks in BB&T Field history, Wake Forest overcame a 24-3 deficit late in the third quarter to post a 31-24 overtime win over Maryland. Down by 21, Alphonso Smith intercepted a Jordan Steffy pass and returned it 100 yards for a score to jump start the Demon Deacons. QB Riley Skinner threw a 6-yard touchdown pass to TE John Tereshinski with three seconds left in regulation to tie the game. Josh Adams plugged in from the six yards out in overtime to give the Deacons the win.

1984: The Deacons made their first regional TV appearance since 1980 a successful one, combining a solid running attack with a brilliant defensive performance in defeating NC State 24-15 at Carter-Finley Stadium. Michael Ramseur accounted for 149 of Wake Forest's 266 rushing yards en route to being named the ACC Back of the Week.

NOTRE DAME, IND. -- Wake Forest closed out its nonconference schedule by dropping a 48-37 contest to No. 3 Notre Dame on Nov. 4 at Notre Dame Stadium. The teams combined for 85 points and over 1,300 yards of total offense as the Fighting Irish improved to 8-1 and the Demon Deacons fall to 5-4.

Wake Forest's 587 yards of total offense tied the most in program history against a ranked opponent, matching the output against No. 13 Auburn in 1979. It is tied for the seventh-most total offense in school history as three of the top 10 offensive outputs have come this season (625 vs. Louisville, 588 vs. Utah State).

The 37 points were the most for the Demon Deacons against a ranked opponent since 38-24 win over No. 11 NC State in 2003. The 37 points were also the most allowed by Notre Dame that season, who entered the game as the only team in the nation to not allow over 20 points in a game.

Cameron Glenn and Grant Dawson led the Wake Forest defense with 13 and 10 stops, respectively.

LAST MEETING

Wake Forest lost at Notre Dame on Nov. 4, 2017 by a score of 48-37, becoming the first team to score more than 20 points against Notre Dame in 2017. Notre Dame had been the last team in the nation to have not given up more than 20 points in a game in 2017.

The 85 combined points tied for the eighth-most ever in a Wake Forest game. It marked the most combined points in a game by the Deacons since a 49-37 win over Army West Point in 2012.

The Deacons posted 587 total offense yards, marking their third 500-yard total offense game of the season. It was the first time since 1986 that Wake Forest had three 500-yard total offense games in the same season.

Wake Forest's 587 total offense yards were the most in a loss since gaining 552 in a 42-34 loss to North Carolina in 2003.

The Deacons allowed 710 yards of total offense to the Fighting Irish, the third-most ever allowed.

Wake Forest gained 34 first downs in the Notre Dame game, the third-most ever and the most since picking up 37 vs. Georgia Tech in 1998.

Wake Forest's 20 first downs by passing were the ninth-most in a game in school history.

Wake Forest's 37 points scored were the most in a loss since a 42-41 loss to Northern Illinois in 2002.

WF - ND CONNECTIONS

Notre Dame defensive coordinator Clark Lea was a member of Wake Forest's coaching staff in 2016 and part of Dave Clawson's Bowling Green staff in 2012.

Bill Rees, Notre Dame's director of scouting, served in a similar role at Wake Forest in 2015 and 2016.

Wake Forest defensive coordinator Jay Sawvel was a graduate assistant coach at Notre Dame in 1997 and 1998.

Wake Forest redshirt sophomore OL Taleni Suhren and Notre Dame junior DL Julian Okwara were classmates at Ardrey Kell High in Charlotte and teammates on the 2015 N.C. Shrine Bowl roster.

Wake Forest redshirt sophomore S Luke Masterson and Notre Dame freshman TE George Takacs both attended Gulf Coast High School in Naples, Fla.

Wake Forest redshirt freshman LB Jack Rielly and Notre Dame sophomore DL Kurt Hinish were teammates at Pittsburgh Central Catholic in 2016.

AN OLD WF-ND CONNECTION

Stanley Cofall was Wake Forest's head football coach in 1928, posting a 2-6-2 record.

As a freshman playing for the Irish in 1914, Cofall scored nine touchdowns and led Notre Dame in scoring with 82 points.

In 1916, he earned All-America honors and then went on to play professionally with the Massillon Tigers.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Cofall founded the Stanco Oil Company in 1935.

He was instrumental in moving the Notre Dame-Navy football game in 1942 to Cleveland.

FUTURE IRISH GAMES

Wake Forest and Notre Dame have three games scheduled through the next five years.

Notre Dame will visit BB&T Field on Sept. 22, 2018. The two will then meet at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium on Sept. 26, 2020. Finally, the Deacons will return to South Bend for a game on Oct. 28, 2023.

Wake Forest will host Notre Dame in 2027 and 2037 while the Deacons return to South Bend in 2029 and 2032.

Four may not be Dave Clawson's lucky number but perhaps it should be. Having recently completed his fourth season at Wake Forest, his fourth head coaching stop, Clawson seems to always strike gold in Year Four.

Clawson, who started his head coaching career at Fordham in 1999, took the Rams to a 10-3 record in his fourth year in The Bronx and a berth in the Football Championship Subdivision playoffs. Clawson started at Richmond in 2004 and had the Spiders at 11-3 and in the FCS semifinals in Year Four. At Bowling Green, Clawson's fourth season produced an 8-5 record and a berth in the Military Bowl. And Year Four at Wake Forest as no less magical with the Deacons sitting at 8-5 following a thrilling 55-52 win over Texas A&M in the Belk Bowl in December.

For four seasons with the Demon Deacons, Clawson has preached strong defense and patience on offense. Year Four brought an avalanche of offense as his group of attackers, thrown into the fire in 2014 as youngsters, matured into a tenacious group that set school records for scoring and total offense.

The Demon Deacons set 105 records in 2017, tied another 15 marks, and became one of the nation's most efficient and productive offenses. Wake Forest set major records for points scored in a season, obliterating the record by 97 points. The offense set new marks for total offense yards in a game and in a season, yards per carry, most touchdowns scored and most touchdown passes in a season. The defense set a record with 106 tackles for loss.

But two records stand out: Wake Forest had 11 players selected for 12 All-ACC positions, and as a team, the Deacons beat six bowl teams in 2017.

The 2016 season marked year three in a career that has steadily shown vast improvement in year three. During his time at Fordham, Richmond and Bowling Green, Clawson's year three teams averaged six wins. He exceeded that mark with seven victories in 2016.

With the 2016 addition of McCreary Field House, Wake Forest's state-of-the-art indoor practice facility, and the construction of the Sutton Sports Performance Center, which will mark yet another technologically advanced facility, Clawson and the Deacons are clearly on a roll.

On December 10, 2013, Clawson became the 32nd head football coach in Wake Forest University history. The head coach at Bowling Green State University from 2009 through 2013, Clawson led the Falcons to the 2013 Mid-American Conference championship with a 47-27 win over No. 16 Northern Illinois.

Clawson joined the Demon Deacons after five seasons as the head coach at BGSU in Bowling Green, Ohio. He built the Falcons to be explosive both offensively and defensively. The 2013 Bowling Green team ranked 29th in the nation in total offense and tenth in total defense. In 2012, BGSU was ranked sixth in the nation in total defense and 10th nationally in scoring defense, yielding just 16.8 points per game. The Falcons were one of only two non-power conference teams to rank in the top 30 statistically in both total offense and total defense in 2013.

Bowling Green's 2013 team went 10-3 overall under Clawson and won the MAC East title with a 7-1 record. The Falcons received a bid to the Little Caesar's Bowl in Detroit. It marked the third bowl appearance in five seasons for Clawson's team.

In his 18 years as a head coach, Clawson delivered a conference championship at each of his first three stops. Prior to the 2013 Mid-American Conference title at Bowling Green, Clawson helped Richmond to a pair of Colonial Athletic Association titles in 2005 and 2007. His first championship as a head coach came in 2002 when he led Fordham to the Patriot League title.

He has also earned numerous Coach of the Year awards.

He was the Patriot League Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2002 and was awarded the 2005 Atlantic 10 Coach of the Year award in just his second year in the league. The 2007 CAA Coach of the Year award marked his fourth conference Coach of the Year honor in his first nine years as a head coach.

In 2002, Clawson was the Schutt Sports/American Football Monthly I-AA Coach of the Year and a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award. In 2005, Clawson earned National Coach of the Year from I-AA.org and was again a finalist for the Eddie Robinson Award.

A 1989 graduate of Williams College in Massachusetts, Clawson earned a degree in political economy. A native of Youngstown, N.Y., Clawson was a defensive back for Williams and went on to serve as a graduate assistant coach at Albany in 1989 and 1990. He moved to Buffalo for the 1991 and 1992 seasons, tutoring the secondary his first year and the quarterbacks and running backs his second.

In 1993, Clawson was named the running backs coach at Lehigh and helped the Mountain Hawks to a 7-4 record and the Patriot League championship. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 1994 and spent two years in that role, adding another Patriot League title in 1995. Lehigh won a pair of Patriot League titles in his three years and his offense led the league in scoring, total offense and pass offense in each of his final two seasons.

Villanova hired Clawson as offensive coordinator in 1996 and his offense helped the Wildcats to NCAA FCS appearances in 1996 and 1997. During his tenure at Villanova, Clawson's offense established 70 program records, held the No. 1 ranking in the nation for six weeks in 1997 and won the 1997 Atlantic 10 championship. He tutored Brian Westbrook who became the first player in college football history to gain 1,000 yards both rushing and receiving.

Following the 1998 season, Clawson became the nation's youngest Division I head coach when he was named head coach at Fordham. Inheriting a team that had won just 22 games in the previous 10 years, Clawson turned the Rams into the Patriot League champions in his fourth season. He was the Patriot League Coach of the Year in both 2001 and 2002. Clawson helped the Rams 2002 FCS Playoffs where they defeated fourth seed Northeastern in the opening round before falling to Villanova.

Clawson was named the head coach at Richmond prior to the 2004 season. He guided the Spiders to the biggest two-year turnaround in school history, improving from 3-8 in 2004 to 9-4 in 2005. In 2007, his final year with the Spiders, Clawson guided Richmond to an 11-3 record, the Colonial South title and the FCS national semifinals.

He left Richmond in 2008 to replace David Cutcliffe as the offensive coordinator under Phillip Fulmer at Tennessee. Following that season, Clawson was named the head coach at Bowling Green in time for the 2009 season.

Clawson and his wife, Catherine, are the parents of two children, Courtney and Eric.

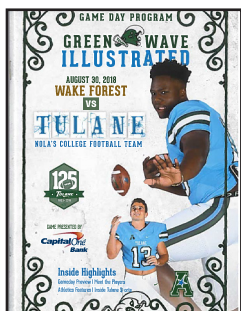

NEW ORLEANS, La. – Wake Forest opened the 2018 season with a 23-17 overtime victory at Tulane August 30th at Yulman Stadium. Cade Carney's 1-yard touchdown run in overtime gave the Demon Deacons (1-0) a season-opening victory for the fourth straight season.

Freshmen headlined the win for Wake Forest, who saw several memorable debuts. Sam Hartman became the first Demon Deacon true freshman quarterback to win his first start, throwing for a school freshman record 378 yards, the 10th most passing yards in program history overall. His 31 completions, 51 attempts and two touchdowns were all school records for a true freshman in his first start. Hartman also had a team-high 64 yards rushing.

Redshirt freshman wide receiver Sage Surratt had 11 catches for 150 yards, both school records for a freshman in his first career game.

Greg Dortch grabbed a career-high 12 receptions for 149 yards, his fourth career 100-yard game. He ended with 200 all-purpose yards, the seventh time in nine career games he has been over 100 all-purpose yards.

Defensively, Chris Calhoun led the team with a career-high 12 tackles. Essang Bassey tied a career high with three pass break-ups, in addition to seven tackles.

GAME 2 WAKE FOREST 51, TOWSON 20 SEPTEMBER 8, 2018 BB&T FIELD (23,619)

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. – Wide receiver Greg Dortch had three touchdowns, including two from punt returns, and 310 total yards of offense on Saturday as Wake Forest defeated Towson 51-20.

Wake Forest (2-0) used a balanced attack behind Dortch, freshman quarterback Sam Hartman, and running back Cade Carney in the win over Towson (1-1).

Dortch became just the fourth player in ACC history with two punt return touchdowns in a game and totaled the

third most all-purpose yards in a single game in school history. He also added an acrobatic touchdown grab in the first quarter.

The Deacons jumped on the board early with a quick drive that resulted in a highlight-reel catch from Alex Bachman. Wake Forest then made it 14-7 with a 7-yard touchdown pass from Hartman to Dortch. The drive spanned 62 yards in just 1:01 and three plays.

At the start of the second quarter, Hartman rushed for his first career touchdown, scoring on a 14-yard run to break the stalemate. Essang Bassey intercepted Tom Flacco on the next drive, putting the Deacons back on offense. Nick Sciba drilled a 35-yard field goal as Wake Forest led 24-14 early in the second frame.

Minutes later, Dortch torched the special teams of Towson with a 70-yard punt return touchdown. The touchdown put Dortch over 200 all-purpose yards for the fourth-straight game, the first Wake Forest player ever to hit that mark.

Dortch returned a 60-yard punt for a touchdown in the waning minutes of the first half to continue his historic pace. Towson scored a touchdown shortly before halftime and missed the two-point conversion as Wake Forest took a 38-20 lead into the locker room.

Sciba added a 27-yard field goal in the third quarter followed by a 1-yard touchdown run by Carney in the fourth quarter as Wake Forest led 48-20. Sciba tacked on another 27-yarder in the fourth quarter.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. – Boston College outlasted a Wake Forest rally as the Demon Deacons fell 41-34 on September 13 at BB&T Field.

Wake Forest (2-1, 0-1 ACC) and Boston College (3-0, 1-0 ACC) each had over 500 yards of offense in a back-and-forth contest that saw the Eagles pull away in the fourth quarter.

Quarterback Sam Hartman was 20-for-45 with 214 yards and two touchdowns. Cade Carney and Matt Colburn each rushed for over 100 yards while Colburn recorded a first-half touchdown. Cameron Glenn led the Deacons with 10 total tackles, three solo stops and one pass breakup.

With under five minutes left in the first quarter, Colburn punched in a 2-yard touchdown to tie the game up. Prior to the score, Wake Forest benefitted from a fumble recovery by Cade Carney on a punt, putting the Deacons on the BC 13-yard line. After an 11-yard rush from Hartman, Colburn powered his way into the end zone.

Later in the frame, Demetrius Kemp blocked a Boston College punt which was recovered in the end zone by Malik Grate as the Deacons tied the game up at 14-14.

Tied at 21-all at the break, the Deacons scored on their first drive of the third quarter with a 27-yard field goal from Nick Sciba making it 24-21. BC responded with a 29-yard touchdown pass to Tommy Sweeney as the Eagles took a 28-24 lead.

Boston College extended its lead to 34-24 in the fourth quarter after a 71-yard touchdown pass to Smith.

Sciba kicked a 23-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter as Wake Forest pulled within seven however a BC 40-yard touchdown pass to Ben Glines soon gave the Eagles a 41-27 lead.

Wake Forest rallied late with a 5-yard touchdown pass to tight end Jack Freudenthal as the Deacs came within a touchdown with 1:33 left in the contest. Boston College recovered the onside kick from Wake Forest to seal the victory.
