Phillip Fulmer's commitment to excellence in the Tennessee football program has the Vols primed for a championship run in 2006.

Much like two seasons ago when few gave the Vols a chance at better than a third-place divisional finish, Fulmer believes Tennessee can quickly climb back into contention in the competitive Southeastern Conference picture.

UT finished 7-1 in league play that year and won its sixth division crown overall. The Vols played in the SEC Championship Game for the fourth time in eight years after close victories over Florida, Georgia and Alabama paved the way.

One alteration from a challenging 2005 campaign was the hiring of David Cutcliffe as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. The former Mississippi head coach returned to the UT position he held from 1993-98 and reunites with Fulmer and defensive coordinator wizard John Chavis.

The trio has a combined 69 years of coaching in the SEC.

The dean of Southeastern Conference coaches, Fulmer has claimed a national championship, two conference titles and six divisional crowns while winning better than three-

quarters of his games. He also retains his rank atop the winning percentage list for coaches with at least 10 years experience in Division I-A.

And while the 2005 campaign was not up to usual standards, Fulmer remains confident his 15th season on Rocky Top will be measured against a sparkling resume of victories, championship banners and camaraderie inside the UT athletics department.

Eight times under Fulmer, the Vols have eclipsed the 10-win mark. The highlight came in 1998 when Tennessee capped a perfect 13-0 season with a Fiesta Bowl victory over Florida State.

That was the first season of Bowl Championship Series competition and in seven years hence, no team has won more than one championship in what has become a balanced collegiate football landscape.

The Volunteers under their native son have 128 triumphs against only 37 defeats for a winning percentage of .776. No active coach with at least a decade in Division I-A has such a lofty victory rate.

And speaking of the last 10 years, Tennessee under Fulmer is the winningest team in the SEC during that span with a 95-30 (.760) mark. Florida is next among league leaders with 93 wins, followed by Georgia at 92, LSU 85 and

There is nothing to suggest Fulmer is in any danger of letting up. He is averaging 9½ wins a season for the last decade, with five SEC Eastern Division titles during that span and two overall league crowns.

The Winchester native joined former Nebraska legend Tom Osborne as the only coaches to lead a team to a bowl game in their first 13 years of coaching.

Since Fulmer took over, nearly 9 million fans have passed through the Neyland Stadium turnstiles. In 1998, Fulmer rewarded those supporters by guiding Tennessee to its sixth national championship with a perfect 13-0 record and a Tostitos Fiesta Bowl victory over Florida State.

An accepted measure of a program's success, Tennessee's position in the national polls also has been a testimonial to Fulmer's sure hand at the helm. Under Fulmer, the Vols had a streak of 54 consecutive weeks ranked in the top 10.

UT has been in the national polls at game time for 145 of Fulmer's 165 games as head coach.

Fulmer's brilliant coaching record also includes these accomplishments:

- Selection as National and SEC coach of the year in 1998.
- The first Tennessee team to post 13 victories in a single season, a record in 1998 that included an SEC championship and Tostitos Fiesta Bowl win for the national title.
- Thirteen Tennessee players have earned first-team All-America honors, including linebacker Kevin Burnett, offensive tackle Michael Munoz and defensive tackle Jesse Mahelona in 2004.
- Thirteen first-round NFL selections since 1993 and a total of 69 players selected in the draft since 1996.
- Back-to-back SEC titles in 1997-98 and five Eastern Division crowns in the last nine years. The Vols have won or tied for the division title six times under Fulmer.
- A record of 95-30 over the last 10 years -- best mark in the SEC.
- A record of 45-5 from 1995-98, the most victories over a four-year span in school history.
- The Vols have ended the season ranked in the top 10 six times under Fulmer.

Fulmer's record becomes all the more remarkable because of the rugged gauntlet of opponents faced by the Vols. Tennessee's schedule is regularly among the toughest in the nation. In addition to the demanding SEC slate, the Vols stray far from home to meet such traditional national powerhouses as Miami, Notre Dame, Syracuse and California.

Tennessee has gone 39-27 against ranked competition under Fulmer.

Notching two straight SEC titles in 1997 and 1998 carried special meaning for Fulmer, who played in the offensive line for the Vols and then came back as an assistant coach before being promoted to head coach in 1992.

"Winning championships is always a goal when you're coaching football," Fulmer said.

The former Vol offensive lineman served 13 years as a Vols assistant beginning in 1980 before becoming the 20th head football coach at Tennessee. The decision to elevate Fulmer occurred five seasons after he was appointed assistant head coach and three seasons after he became offensive coordinator.

During Fulmer's years as offensive coordinator, the Vols consistently broke team total offense records and were ranked one or two in the SEC. Records have fallen with even greater frequency since he became head coach.

Year after year with Fulmer as head coach, Tennessee continues to stand in the top ranks of college football for graduating players who go on to careers in the professional game. Since 1996, Tennessee ranks first in the SEC and third nationally with 69 total players drafted, and the Vols have had 13 NFL first-round selections since 1993.

The 2006 NFL Draft saw five UT players drafted - standout defensive back Jason Allen was a first-round selection of the Miami Dolphins with the 16th overall pick.

Fulmer also is an avid civic booster and was named 2002 Outstanding Volunteer Fundraiser by the Smoky Mountain Chapter of the Association of Fundraising Professionals. He is the national spokesperson for the Jason Foundation Inc., and considers such experiences essential to the education process of UT football players. He also serves on such boards of directors as Boys and Girls Clubs, American Football Coaches Association and Child and Family Services.

Fulmer is married to the former Vicky Morey and has four children: Phillip Jr., Courtney, Brittany and Allison.

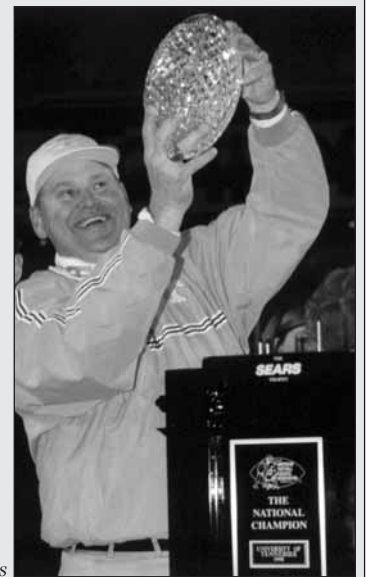

- John Chavis' 2005 promotion to associate head coach was no surprise. His tenure in Big Orange Country has evolved into the elite atmosphere reserved for the top achievers in his profession.
- Named defensive coordinator at UT in 1995.
- Has gained recognition as a defensive guru the old-fashioned way -- by building hard-nosed teams that rank Tennessee among the stingiest in college football.
- Vols finished 2005 first in the Southeastern Conference and second nationally with a rushing defense that allowed just 82.5 yards per game.
- Defense permitted only four rushing plays of 20 yards or longer. UT's opponents combined to score just four second-half TDs in 2005.
- Since Chavis assumed the role of Vols defensive coordinator in 1995, UT has held its opponents below a 100-yard rushing average in six seasons (1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001 and 2005).
- Eight times during that span the Vols have ranked among the top three in the SEC in total defense, with five of those seasons producing top-three finishes in scoring defense.
- Following the national championship season of 1998, Chavis was named the SEC's outstanding linebacker coach.
- Tennessee's defense has ranked among the SEC's top

three six of the past eight years.

- Named assistant head coach in 1999.
- Chavis has divided his responsibilities between the defensive line and linebacker corps since returning to his alma mater 17 years ago.
- Before returning to Tennessee, Chavis had been defensive coordinator at Alabama A&M, leading the Division II school to the best defensive record in the nation. The Bulldogs ranked first in total defense in 1987 and 1988.
- Chavis came to UT as a walk-on defensive lineman and later was granted a scholarship on the basis of his scrappy play at middle guard and tackle. He lettered in 1977 and 1978 and received his degree from the College of Education in 1979.
- Chavis coached as a graduate assistant at Tennessee in 1979, as defensive line coach in an earlier stint at Alabama A&M from 1980-83 and then as defensive line coach and defensive coordinator at Alabama State in 1984-85.
- Originally hails from Dillon, S.C.
- He and his wife, Diane Crisp Chavis, are the parents of two sons, John and Jason.

- David Cutcliffe is back on the Big Orange football staff.
- The Birmingham, Ala., native returned in spring to the place he resided for 17 years, including six as offensive coordinator.

ed Alabama and received his degree in health, physical education and recreation in 1976.

- He returned to his roots at Banks (Ala.) High School as an assistant for four years before being named head coach in 1980. His teams reached the state playoffs three times as an assistant and in both his seasons as head coach.

- His first collegiate coaching position at Tennessee saw Cutcliffe serve as quarterbacks coach, offensive coordinator and assistant head coach.

- In the position of quarterbacks coach, Cutcliffe supervised the development of future NFL first-round draft picks Heath Shuler and Peyton Manning as they rewrote the Tennessee records book. Before them, Cutcliffe mentored Andy Kelly, who has gone on to a long and noteworthy career in arena football.

- Cutcliffe is married to the former Karen Oran of Harriman and they are the parents of three children -- Chris, Katie, Emily and Marcus Hilliard, adopted family member.

- He left Tennessee after the 1998 season to become head coach at Mississippi.

- Cutcliffe compiled a 44-29 record with the Rebels from 1999-2004 and coached Ole Miss to four bowl victories against one loss. He was the only Rebels coach in history to win at least seven games in each of his first five seasons.

- He was named assistant head coach (offense)/quarterbacks coach at Notre Dame early in 2005.

- Reluctantly resigned that position with the Fighting Irish a few months later after undergoing triple heart bypass surgery.

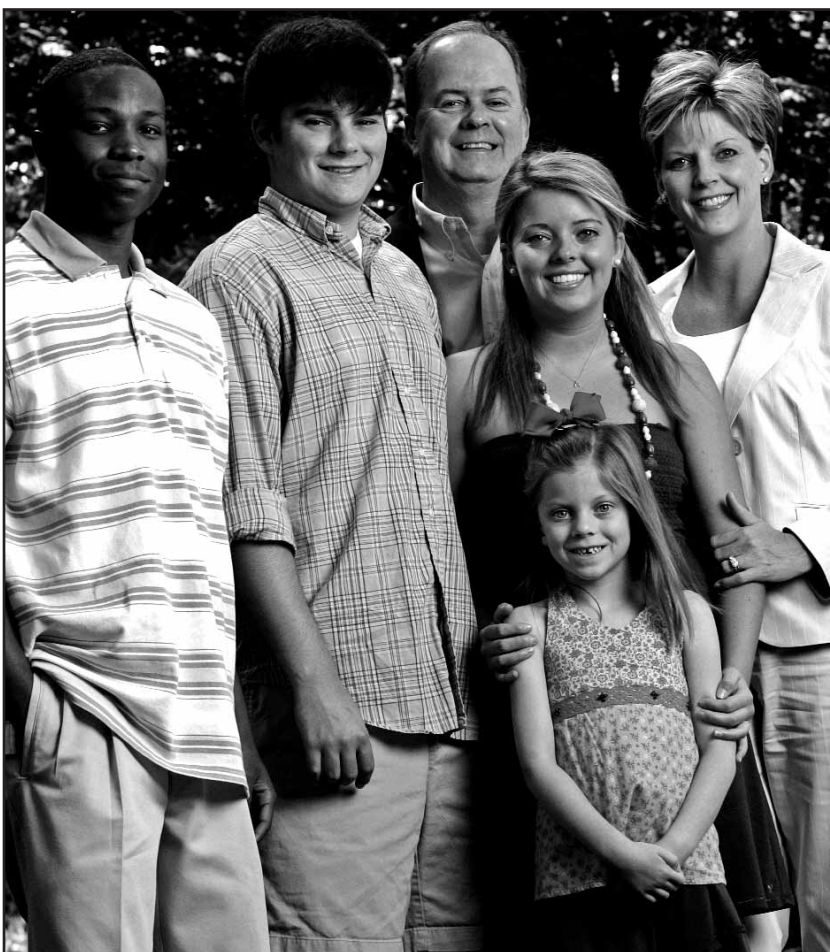
- Under Cutcliffe's tutelage as offensive coordinator from 1993-99, Tennessee twice led the SEC in total offense and three times was the league's rushing leader. The Vols led the SEC in scoring in 1993 and placed second nationally with an average of 42.8 points per game.

- The Vols were 63-11 during that span with three East Division crowns, two league championships and the 1998 national title.

- Cutcliffe, 51, received the Frank Broyles Award in 1998 as the nation's top assistant coach and was a finalist for the honor in 1997.

- Coaching awards continued Cutcliffe's way during his Ole Miss tenure. He was selected SEC Coach of the Year in 2003 by his fellow league coaches while leading the Rebels to a share of the SEC Western Division crown.

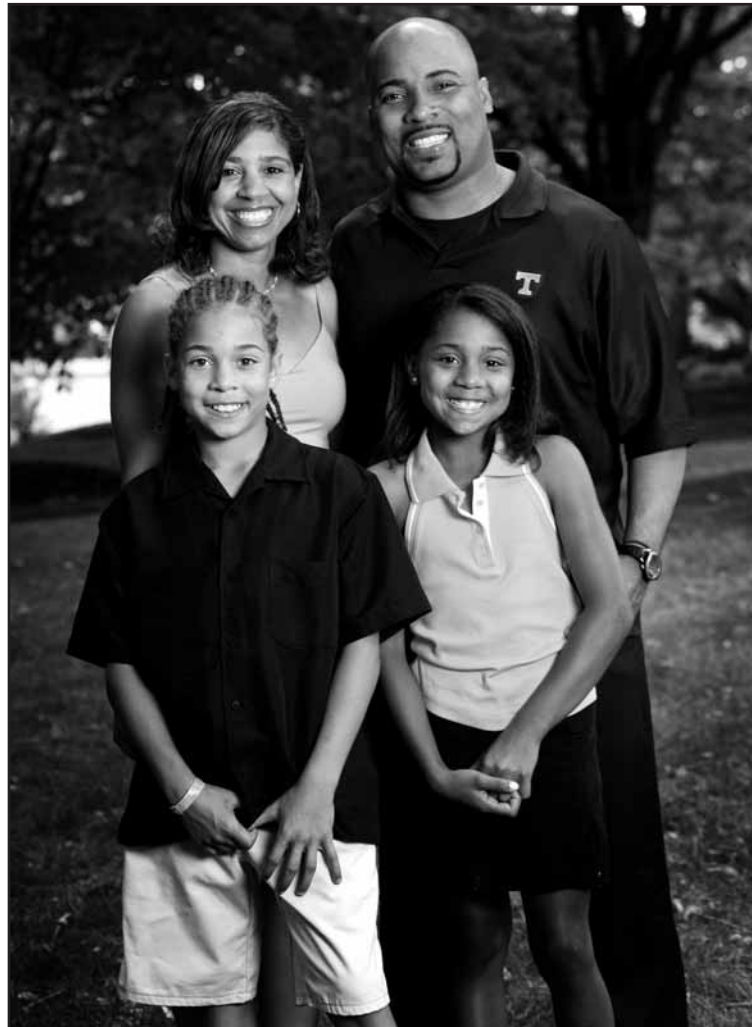
- Trooper Taylor returns to a familiar assignment in 2006, taking over the wide receiver position for the first time at Tennessee.
- The Cuero, Texas, native is coming off two successful seasons as running backs coach.
- He first led Cedric Houston and Gerald Riggs Jr. to become Tennessee's only pair of 1,000-yard rushers in the same season, then coached Arian Foster to one of the best freshman campaigns in UT history last year.
- Taylor accepted the appointment to assistant head coach for player development in 2005.
- The 36-year-old manages the academic and social direction and development of student-athletes in conjunc-

tion with their position coaches and the coordinators.

- Foster returns for 2006 after gaining 879 yards and earning consensus Freshman All-SEC honors. David Yancey, is back, joining Montario Hardesty and LaMarcus Coker as additional tailback candidates. Senior Cory Anderson and junior David Holbert are slated for fullback duty.

- Taylor came to Knoxville after a five-year stint coaching receivers at Tulane.

- He coached four wideouts into the NFL during his tenure in New Orleans, including the nation's top receiving trio in 2001 of Adrian Burnette, Kerwin Cook and Terrell Harris. They combined to lead the country with 2,384 receiving yards on 185 catches.

- "For me, being able to coach and recruit in the SEC obviously is a coach's dream," Taylor said. "You want to be at the highest level. Everybody talks about it being the No. 1 conference in the country and you want to be a part of that."

- A 1992 Baylor University graduate, Taylor finished his playing career as the school's leader in kickoff returns (53) and return yardage (1,063).

- After helping the Bears to the 1991 Copper Bowl and completing his degree, Taylor joined the coaching staff at his alma mater for the 1992 season.

- He spent two years as a graduate assistant before being named wide receivers coach in 1994. He then coached Baylor's secondary for two years before returning to the wide receivers for one year.

- Prior to signing on at Tulane, Taylor spent the 1998 season as running backs coach at New Mexico.

- Taylor is married to the former Evi Crosby of Harbor City, Calif. He and his wife, who was a track and field scholarship athlete at Baylor, were wed in 1992 on the football playing field at Floyd Casey Stadium.

- They have a son, Blaise, and a daughter, Starr.

• After a three-year supportive role, Greg Adkins moves squarely back into command of a position with which he is most familiar -- offensive line.

• Adkins spent the last three years at UT as the assistant offensive line coach, with primary responsibilities for tight ends. He also coordinated the Vols' national recruiting reputation as Director of Recruiting.

• During his first three seasons in Knoxville, Tennessee signed players from 21 states and the District of Columbia.

• The 38-year-old came to the Vols in 2003 from Troy University, where he held similar duties. Adkins' work with the offensive line helped the Trojans make the transition from Division I-AA.

• Before coaching at Troy, Adkins spent five years as an assistant at Georgia under Jim Donnan. He coached the Bulldogs' defensive line in 1996 and oversaw tight ends and the offensive line from 1997-2000. During his tenure in Athens, the Bulldogs posted a 40-19 record in five seasons and appeared in four bowl games.

• Adkins coached a pair of NFL draftees on the Bulldogs defensive line -- Jason Ferguson and Jermaine Smith -- and

All-SEC tight end Larry Brown.

• A native of Cross Lanes, W.Va., Adkins arrived at Georgia with Donnan in 1996 after spending 10 seasons at Marshall as a player and coach. Adkins was a part of 97 Thundering Herd victories during his decade. He was a four-year letterman on the offensive line from 1986-89 and served as team captain during his senior season.

• Adkins coached a variety of positions at Marshall, including offensive line, defensive tackles and tight ends. In 1990, he helped with the transition of future two-time All-America selection Phil Ratliff from defensive line to offensive line. He also was part of the Marshall coaching staff when the Herd led the Southern Conference in rushing defense in 1992 and scoring offense from 1993-95.

- Season after season, Vols assistant coach Dan Brooks sets the standard for quality defensive line play with his Tennessee charges.
- His remarkable run of success as mentor of the UT defensive line continues into a 13th season in Big Orange Country. And although Brooks is highly regarded in coaching circles at the national level, he also considers himself a player's coach who has the full confidence of those performing around him.
- Such notables as John Henderson, Albert Haynesworth, Jesse Mahelona, Rashad Moore, Demetris Veal and Aubrayo Franklin, just to name a few, are among those to have benefited from Brooks' coaching expertise.
- A measure of Phillip Fulmer's confidence in Brooks came after the 1998 season when he designated Dan to take on additional duties as the Vols' recruiting coordinator. Brooks has since passed along those responsibilities, but during his stint the Vols annually ranked among the nation's elite in the recruiting wars.
- His previous experience as a coach included stops at Florida and North Carolina. Now at age 55, the North Carolina native still has the zest for football he experienced when he was given his first job at Western Carolina in 1975.

- A Western Carolina graduate, Brooks received his master's from Florida. He coached at Western Carolina, Kings Mountain (N.C.) High School and Florida before taking a job with Mack Brown at North Carolina in 1988.
 - In 1990, the North Carolina defense set a school record by registering 45 sacks, of which 19 were by the defensive line. In Brooks' final season before coming to UT, the Tar Heels led the Atlantic Coast Conference in sacks with 38.
 - The 2000 Vols recorded an SEC-leading 50 sacks, a school record, and the 2001 unit again led the league in sacks with 34. The 1996 Big Orange posted another school mark, 83 tackles for lost yardage.
 - Last year, Tennessee led the SEC in rushing defense and ranked second in Division I-A.
- Brooks, after the 1998 national championship season at UT, was awarded recognition as the Southeastern Conference's outstanding defensive line coach.
- Married to the former Kathy Whitaker, Brooks has two children, Tara and Rhett.

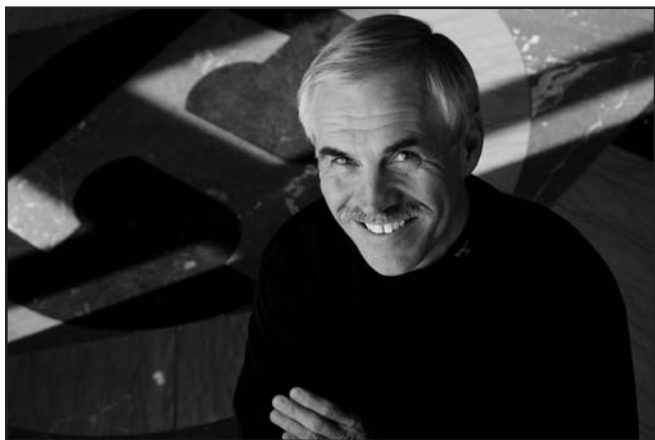

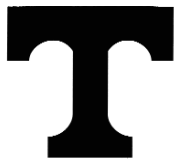

• Steve Caldwell begins his 12th season on Phillip Fulmer's staff, intent on maintaining his standard of excellence at the defensive end position.

• Tennessee's defensive line had another banner season in 2005, sparking the Vols defense to the best rushing yardage average (82.5) in the Southeastern Conference and second-best showing nationally.

• Such stalwarts as Leonard Little, Jonathan Brown, Shaun Ellis and the just-departed Parys Haralson have played an integral part in Caldwell's tenure.

• Among Caldwell's most accomplished pupils was Will Overstreet, who not only finished his UT career with 19 sacks to tie for eighth on the all-time school list, but also mirrored the coach's emphasis on studies by being named to the 2001 Academic All-America second team. After retiring from professional football, Overstreet returned to campus and completed his undergraduate degree in May 2005.

• A dean's list student himself at Arkansas State, Caldwell played four years of football for the Indians as a defensive end and linebacker.

• Fulmer, who had worked with Caldwell from the latter's term as a graduate assistant coach on the Tennessee

staff in 1990, brought Caldwell back to UT before the 1995 season.

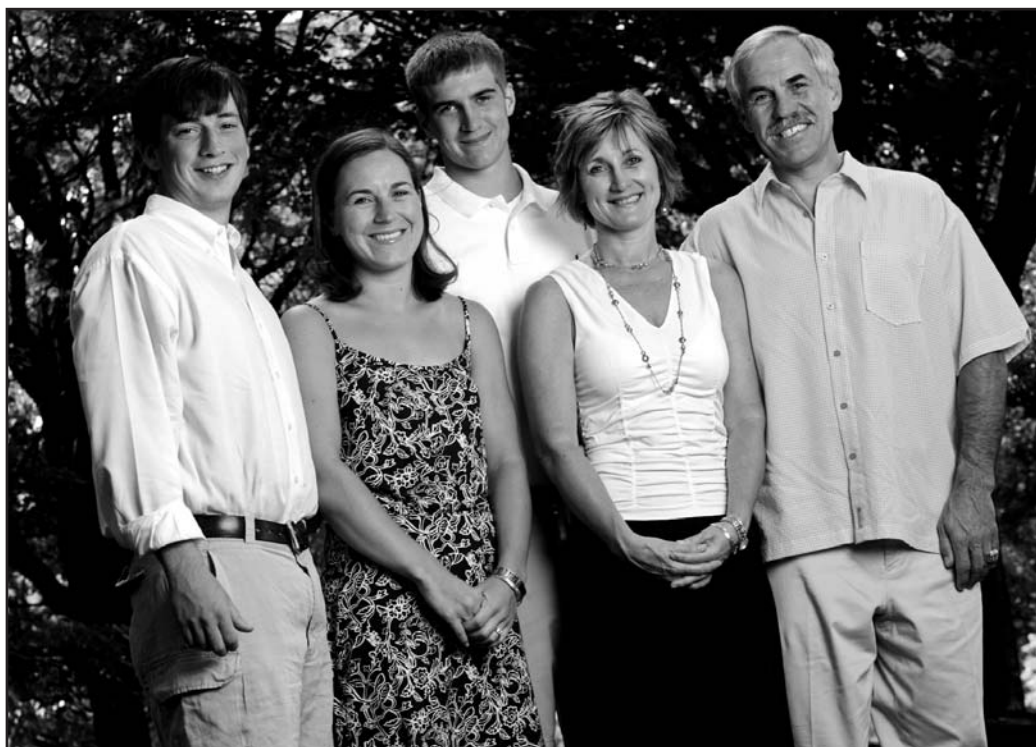
• His first taste of coaching came over three seasons at his alma mater, from 1978 through 1980. From Jonesboro, Caldwell moved on to Northwest Mississippi Community College, where he coached the offensive line for four seasons and was part of a national championship team in 1982.

• He then came back to Arkansas State, coaching linebackers under head coach and former UT defensive coordinator Larry Lacewell during a notable period of success for the Indians.

• Subsequent jobs took him to Tennessee, Pacific and Nevada, the latter school as co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 Big West Conference champions. Caldwell coached briefly at Mississippi before accepting Fulmer's entreaty to join the Vols.

• Caldwell also has received deserved credit of late for his work on the recruiting front, helping Tennessee sign what many observers call on an annual basis some of the nation's top recruiting classes.

• Tennessee head coach Phillip Fulmer completed his coaching staff for the 2006 football season by naming Kurt Roper an assistant coach for running backs.

• Roper, 34, has a history with Tennessee football as both he and his father served on previous UT coaching staffs. Roper returns to Knoxville having spent the 1996-98 seasons as a graduate assistant coach for the Vols.

• His father, Bobby, coached linebackers under Johnny Majors from 1977-79.

• "Kurt's experience here with defense and special teams and at Mississippi with Coach Cutcliffe makes for an easy transition," Fulmer said.

• Roper comes to the Vols from Kentucky, where he spent one season as quarterbacks coach under Rich Brooks.

• Prior to that, he served seven years at Ole Miss on Cutcliffe's staff and helped lead the Rebels to five bowl games. His duties in Oxford were with quarterbacks for the entire tenure along with the added responsibility of passing game coordinator from 2002-04.

• Among those under his tutelage was Eli Manning, who was the No. 1 overall pick in the 2004 NFL Draft.

• "It helps to know what kind of player it takes to play at this level, to win championships at this level and what kind of coaching you go up against," Roper said. "It's about knowing how much it takes to prepare to win a football game."

• Roper's time at Tennessee was with the defense -- primarily defensive backs -- and special teams.

• He helped the Vols to two bowl games and was headed for the BCS national championship contest when the opportunity called to join Mississippi's staff.

• "I've known from an early age that I wanted to be a football coach," he said. "Following in my dad's footsteps always has been a dream.

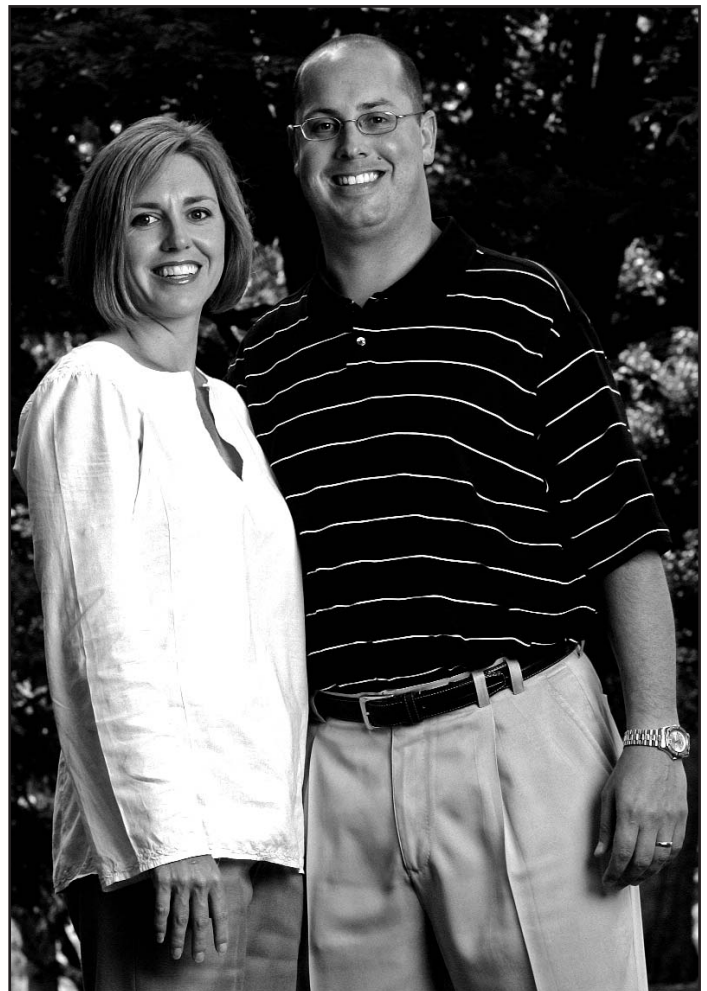
• "This was one of his favorite stops, coaching here at Tennessee. This is such a highly successful pro-

- Larry Slade continues to meet and exceed the expectations for outstanding service set forth by Phillip Fulmer.
- This year, Slade's veteran defensive secondary may be the strength of the Big Orange defense. Despite the loss of first-round draft pick Jason Allen, the Vols return four starters in the defensive backfield.
- Antwan Stewart, Jonathan Wade, Jonathan Hefney and Inquoris Johnson are joined by former Freshman All-America Roshawn Fellows to provide comfort at a make-or-break position.
- Slade enters his eighth season on the UT coaching staff and continues turning out some of the nation's best defensive secondary units.
- Over the course of the last three seasons, Tennessee's defensive unit has produced such NFL signees as Rashad Baker, Jabari Greer and Gibril Wilson, in addition to Allen's selection by the Miami Dolphins.
- Slade's 2000 and 2001 secondary units, aided and abetted by the rest of the defense, established school season records with 64 and 72 passes broken up, respectively. It continues a pattern of success that Slade has enjoyed in his 33 years in the coaching profession.
- Slade, 55, is a native of Pelham, N.C., who twice was named All-West Virginia while playing guard at Shepherd in the early 1970s.
- He was named Little All-America honorable mention in 1971 and later inducted into the Shepherd College Hall of Fame.
- He received his degree in biology with a minor in English.
- His coaching career began at his alma mater with a nine-year stay before subsequent stops at Richmond, Howard, Southern Illinois, Washington and Maryland.
- His six-year tenure as secondary coach at Washington was highlighted by a national championship season in 1991, during which the Huskies ranked first in NCAA statistics for pass efficiency defense.
- Slade left Washington in 1992 for Maryland to serve as defensive coordinator, a post he held for two seasons before moving to Texas A&M.
- His 1997 Aggies secondary allowed only three passing touchdowns, fewest in the nation. Slade's first unit at Tennessee also sparkled by allowing 214.9 yards per game through the air and making 21 interceptions against only 15 touchdown passes.
- Married to the former Izetta Willingham, Slade has three children, Herbie, Roshawn and Lyndsey.

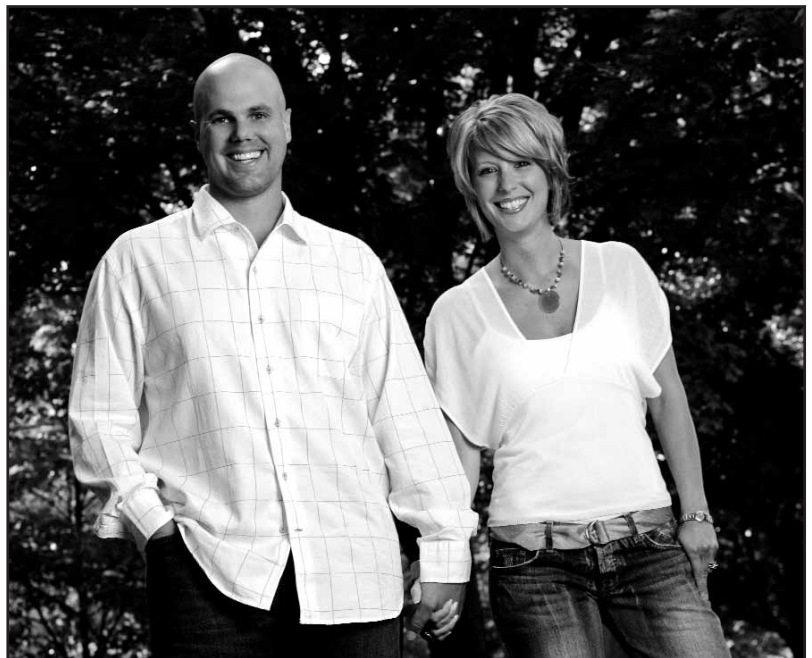

VOL Notebook . . .



At least one former Tennessee Volunteer has played in each of the last 15 Super Bowls and 18 of the last 19. Cedrick Wilson helped the Pittsburgh Steelers win Super Bowl XL last year in Detroit.

Tennessee is the winningest program in the SEC and fifth nationally over the past 10 years. The Vols are 95-30 with five division titles, two league championships and one national championship during that span.

Tennessee has led the Southeastern Conference in football attendance every year since 1974. That makes 32 straight seasons the Vols have been the league's top-drawing team.

The Vols own the best interdivision record among SEC teams, going 31-10-1 (.750) against Western Division foes since the league split in 1992. UT was 2-1 a year ago against the West.

An SEC-leading 30 Tennessee football student-athletes qualified for the Fall 2005 Academic Honor Roll. Last year's total marks the highest in program history for the third consecutive season, topping the 22 who were selected a year ago and the 20 who made the list in 2003. Under head coach Phillip Fulmer, Tennessee has had 214 SEC Academic Honor Roll qualifiers with no fewer than 10 each year.

UT has eight 10-win seasons in the last 13 years under head coach Phillip Fulmer and 19 overall. Fulmer has the most 10-win seasons at Tennessee.

Tennessee's rushing defense led the SEC in 2005 and finished second in Division I-A. The Vols allowed just 82.5 yards per game and only 2.5 yards per attempt. In addition, John Chavis' unit allowed just four rushing plays of 20 yards or longer.

Tennessee's current 21-game winning streak against Kentucky is the second-longest active winning streak over a major opponent in Division I-A.

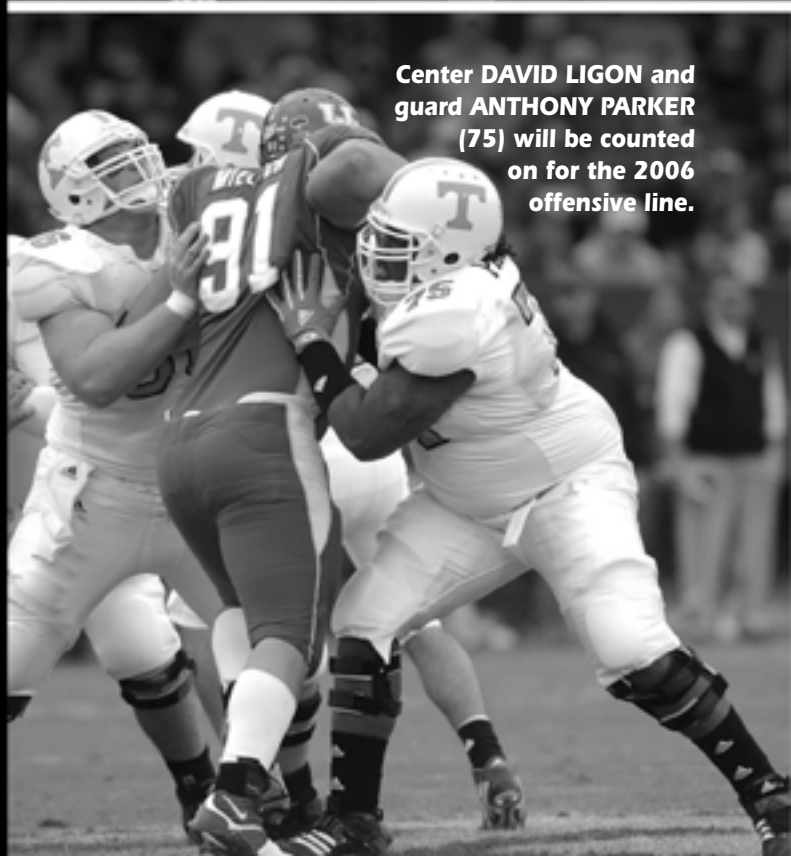
Since conference expansion in 1992, Tennessee has the best road record in SEC games with a 43-13 (.768) mark away from home. The Vols have not had a losing road record (including neutral sites) since 1982.

UT's seven 2006 home opponents combined for a 49-33 (.598) record last season. The Vols are away to five teams this fall that combined to go 33-26 (.559) a year ago.
