

HEAD COACH EHREN EARLEYWINE



After serving as the top assistant coach in the two most successful seasons in Georgia Tech softball history, Ehren Earleywine enters his first season as head coach.

A member of the U.S.A men's fastpitch softball squad, Earleywine served as the Yellow Jackets' hitting and infield coach, as well as the squad's first base coach in 2002 and 2003.

Tech made its only NCAA Tournament appearances in these two seasons and captured the team's first Atlantic Coast Conference title in 2002. Tech won 90 games in that span, including a school record 52 in 2002 where the Yellow Jackets came within one win of the College

World Series.

Under his guidance, Tech broke 16 hitting records and tied two ACC records. As the infield coach, Earleywine helped guide the Jackets to a school record .974 fielding percentage in 2002 and a final ranking of fourth in the country. Georgia Tech's defense led the ACC in both 2002 and 2003.

A standout in men's major fastpitch softball, Earleywine has been a four-time member of Team U.S.A (1998, '99, 2002, '03), including being named captain for the last two years. In 2002, Team USA captured its first-ever Gold Medal in the Pan Am Qualifier, where he hit .429. At the 2003 Pan Am Games, hosted by the Dominican Republic, Earleywine helped lead the United States to a Silver Medal. He is a six-time ASA All-American and was an All-World selection in 1999 by the International Softball Congress.



Prior to coming to Tech, Earleywine was an assistant baseball coach at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi in 2000. He guided the Islander offense to a team batting average of .322 in their inaugural season.

Before Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Earleywine was head coach at Westminster College from 1997-99. He led the Blue Jays to an overall record of 65-44 and one conference title during his tenure. He also served as an assistant coach from 1994-97, under the guidance of former Major League Baseball outfielder, Phil Bradley.

Earleywine played one year of collegiate baseball at Southwest Missouri State before transferring to Westminster College for the remainder of his collegiate career. During his three seasons for the Blue Jays, Earleywine set seven school records and became a two-time all-conference selection.

A graduate of Westminster College in 1994, Earleywine earned a bachelor's degree in business administration.

A native of Jefferson City, Mo., Ehren and his wife Lisa, reside in Atlanta with their son Connor.

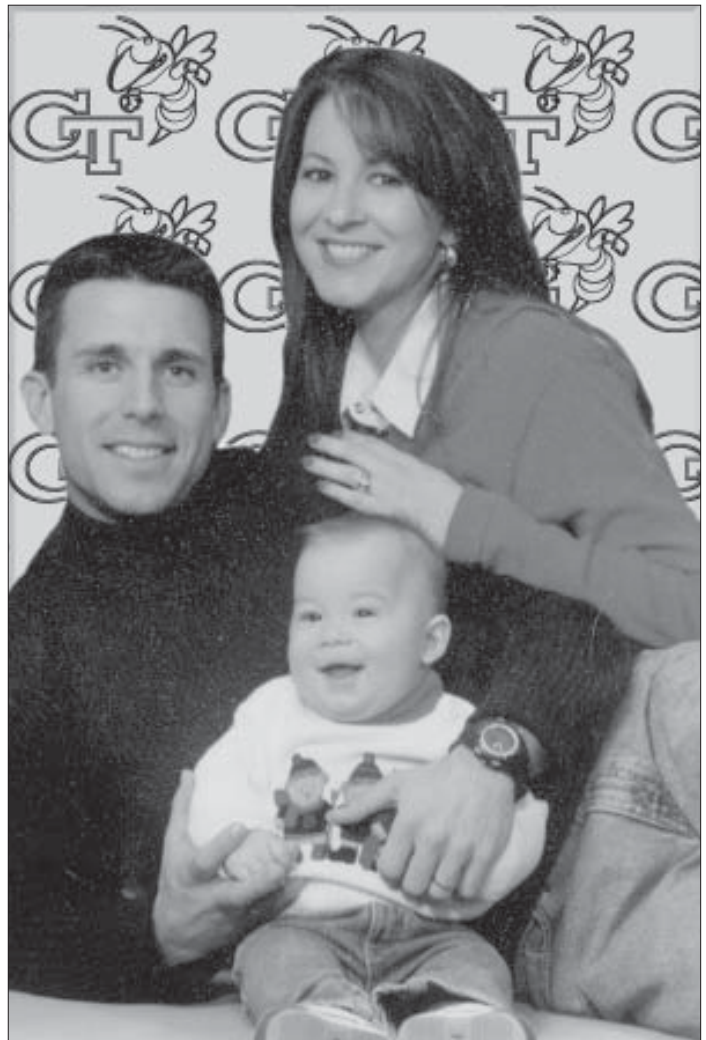

COACHING STAFF



John Bargfeldt enters his first season as assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Bargfeldt will handle the pitchers and catchers for the Yellow Jackets.

Bargfeldt has taught in a baseball/softball academy over the last three years in Indianapolis, Ind. The camps emphasized pitching, catching, hitting and fielding.

Before getting into softball, Bargfeldt was an assistant baseball coach at Anderson College in 1981. He worked with the pitchers and helped guide the team to its best winning percentage in school history.

As a collegian, Bargfeldt was a three-year letterwinner in baseball and football at Anderson University. He was named most valuable player in baseball in 1976 and football in 1977. He has since been inducted into the school's Hall of Fame.

Bargfeldt was drafted in the 31st round by the Chicago Cubs in 1977 as a pitcher/outfielder and played minor league baseball for three seasons.

Bargfeldt recently served on the ASA Men's National Selection Committee and helped select the team that won the first ever Gold Medal at the 2002 Pan AM Games Qualifier. He has also served on the ASA Board of Directors from 2000-02 and was an ASA National Player Representative for that same two-year span.

Bargfeldt participated in men's fastpitch for 17 years and was an ASA All-American five times. He helped lead his major fastpitch team to an ASA National Championship in 1999 and a World title in 2000.

A 1981 graduate of Anderson University, Bargfeldt earned a bachelor's degree in physical education. The Fishers, Ind., native resides in Kennesaw, Ga., with his wife, Barbara, daughter Alexya (14) and son Jeb (8). His oldest son, Kenny (19), is on a baseball scholarship at Ball State University.



Serita Brooks enters her first season as assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Brooks works with the outfielders and assists with hitting and recruiting.

Before coming to Tech, Brooks worked at Champions Fastpitch Academy for the past year as an instructor for hitting and fielding.

The former All-American played for two seasons at Florida State and ranks among the school's all-time leaders in career stolen bases and batting average. She led the Seminoles to two straight NCAA Regional finals and final rankings of 15 and 17, in 2001 and 2000, respectively.

Brooks helped the Seminoles win the 2000 Atlantic Coast Conference Championship en route to garnering All-America (2nd team), all-region, All-ACC and All-ACC Tournament honors. Brooks was a two-time All-ACC, all-region and All-NCAA Tournament performer for the Seminoles from 2000-01.

In 2000, Brooks led the ACC in batting average (.401), hits (99), triples (8) and stolen bases (42). She also led the league in runs scored (58), triples (5) and stolen bases (55) in 2001. Brooks ranks fourth in Seminole history with 97 career stolen bases and a lifetime batting average of .351. She stands fifth in the ACC in career stolen bases.

Prior to attending Florida State, Brooks lettered for two seasons at North Florida C.C., earning all-conference honors in both seasons.

A native of Tuscaloosa, Ala., Brooks graduated from Florida State University with a bachelor's degree in sports management in 2002. She received an associate's degree from North Florida Community College in Art in 1999.



Felicia Coursey enters her first season as volunteer assistant coach at Georgia Tech. Coursey will work with the infielders and assist with hitting and on-campus recruiting.

Coursey was a two-year letterwinner for the Yellow Jackets from 2002-03. She ended her career with a lifetime batting average of .245 and a .982 fielding percentage at second base. Coursey hit 13 doubles, eight triples, four home runs and drove in 29 runs over the course of two seasons.

As a senior, Coursey started in all 62 games for the Jackets at second base. She hit .245 and led the team with 11 stolen bases. Posted a .985 fielding percentage in the middle of the infield. Ranked second on the team with 10 doubles, while driving in 18 runs, hitting two triples and two home runs. Tallied 13 multi-hit games for the Jackets.

In the classroom, Coursey garnered ACC Academic Honor Roll honors in both seasons she played at Tech.

The Conyers, Ga., native is majoring in science, technology and culture at Tech.

Scott MacDonald enters his first year as Assistant Sports Information Director at Georgia Tech. MacDonald serves as the primary contact for softball, men's and women's swimming and diving and men's and women's track and field.

Before coming to Tech, MacDonald served as an intern at the University of North Carolina in 2002-03. At Carolina, he was the primary contact for men's and women's cross country, softball and wrestling.

Prior to Carolina, MacDonald was a graduate assistant at Oakland University in the sports information office from 1999-2002. There he worked with men's and women's basketball, baseball, women's soccer, softball and swimming and diving, along with serving as a part-time pitching coach for the baseball team. MacDonald graduated from Oakland with a master's degree in Public Administration in 2002.

As a collegiate athlete, MacDonald was a four-year letterwinner in baseball at Henry Ford C.C. (1994-96) and St. Andrews Presbyterian College (1996-98). He earned all-region and all-conference honors at Henry Ford after going 8-3 in 1996, leading the Hawks to two straight conference titles and a regional final in 1996, falling to eventual NJCAA II national champion Grand Rapids C.C.

At St. Andrews, MacDonald finished 16-8 as the No. 1 starter and ranked nationally in strikeouts and ERA.

The Bloomfield Hills, Mich., native, also lettered in golf for two seasons at St. Andrews (1998-99). He graduated from SAPC in 1999 with a degree in sports management.

ADMINISTRATION



DR. G. WAYNE CLOUGH PRESIDENT

The chief engineer of Georgia Tech's determined effort to provide technological leadership in a changing world is Dr. G. Wayne Clough, the Institute's tenth president and the first alumnus to serve in that capacity.

His leadership has made undergraduate education more dynamic. He implemented a required computer initiative for all students, and oversaw the revision of the curriculum to include web-based enhancements. The next step was a broad initiative to engage students more fully with faculty in the classroom and research lab, and to create more student leadership opportunities. The positive impact is reflected in higher quality students and higher retention rates.

Sponsored research has also increased every year since Clough became president. Research expenditures now exceed \$340 million a year as Tech moves into exciting interdisciplinary fields like bioengineering, sustainable technology, and nanoscience.

Clough's skills as a civil engineer are evident in reshaping the campus to meet the needs of Tech's world-class programs and students. He has overseen the construction of more than a dozen academic and research buildings, with several more on the drawing board. The campus is fully wired with 1,700 miles of fiber-optic cable and offers a comprehensive wireless environment as well.

To provide the additional resources required to reach this goal, Clough engineered the Campaign for Georgia Tech, which raised a record \$712 million in five years for 54 endowed faculty chairs, 233 endowed scholarships, eleven new buildings, and a host of academic, research and athletic programs.

Beyond campus, he gives Georgia Tech a face and voice in Washington, D.C., as a member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology and the executive committee of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and as chair of the National Academy of Engineering committee on the Engineer of 2020.

Since Septemger, 2001, he has represented the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) on the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I Board of Directors.

A native of Douglas, Georgia, Wayne Clough received his bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech in 1964 and 1965. He earned a Ph.D. in civil engineering from the University of California, Berkeley in 1969.

He was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Washington in Seattle when he answered the call to return to his alma mater as president in September of 1994. Prior to that, he had spent a decade at Virginia Tech as head of the Department of Civil Engineering, then as Dean of the College of Engineering. He also served on the faculties of Duke and Stanford universities.

A specialist in geotechnical and earthquake engineering, he is the author of more than 120 papers and reports, six book chapters, and several widely used geotechnical computer codes. He is presently a consultant to the San Francisco Bay Area Rapid Transit System for ongoing major seismic retrofitting. His other interests include technology and higher education policy, economic development, diversity in higher education, and technology in a global setting.

Closer to home, he serves on the Board of Advisors for Noro-Moseley Partners, the Southeast's largest venture capital fund, and on the Board of Directors of Total System Services of Columbus, Ga. He is a member of the executive committees for the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce and Central Atlanta Progress, and a trustee of the Georgia Research Alliance. Georgia Trend magazine routinely includes Clough on its list of the 100 most influential Georgians.

Among his many national awards for teaching and research, Clough holds seven from the American Society of Civil Engineers and is one of a select few to have been twice awarded the Norman Medal, civil engineering's oldest honor. In 2001 he received the National Engineering Award from the American Association of Engineering Societies. He has been a member of the National Academy of Engineering for more than a decade.

Wayne and Anne Robinson Clough have been married for more than 30 years and have two grown children.



DAVE BRAINE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

A national leader in his field, Georgia Tech Director of Athletics Dave Braine has made a career out of building successful programs. As he enters his seventh year at Tech, he has overseen tremendous growth in the Yellow Jackets' overall athletics program while positioning Georgia Tech for the future with ambitious building projects.

Braine, 60, has steered the Georgia Tech Rambling Wreck into the new millennium in successful fashion, using the Yellow Jackets' rich tradition as a guiding light along the way. He follows in the footsteps of four Tech greats of the past—John Heisman, William Alexander, Bobby Dodd and Dr. Homer Rice.

The centerpiece of Tech's current building campaign is the expansion of the historic football facility, Bobby Dodd Stadium at Grant Field, which will be complete this fall. The \$70 million project that raises capacity to 55,000 while adding numerous other amenities and improvements was completed in less than two years.

Also part of the project is the new Russ Chandler Baseball Stadium, a \$9.1 million facility completed in 2002 that seats 4,157 and is one of the nation's finest baseball parks.

This fall, Tech's men's and women's swimming and diving programs will move into one of the nation's most impressive aquatics venues. The Georgia Tech Aquatics Center will feature the competition pool from the 1996 Olympic Games in an enclosed, 1900-seat arena capable of hosting major national events.

Georgia Tech's overall athletics program has enjoyed unprecedented success during Braine's tenure, highlighted by a school-record bowl streak for the football program as well as remarkable growth in women's athletics and continued excellence in sports such as baseball and golf.

Other athletics highlights during Braine's tenure include six Top 10 national team finishes, No. 1 national rankings in baseball and golf, and nine Atlantic Coast Conference team titles in six different sports. Individual accomplishments range from Troy Matteson's 2002 NCAA title in golf to four NCAA runner-up finishes in women's track and cross country to Angelo Taylor's gold medal in track at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.

The addition of women's swimming and diving in 2001-02 is further evidence of Georgia Tech's commitment to women's athletics under Braine. In U.S. News & World Report's inaugural ranking of collegiate athletics programs in 2002, Tech was rated number two in the nation in gender equity.

Braine began his administrative career in 1978 when he was named an assistant director of athletics at Virginia. He then took a similar post at Fresno State in 1983 and was promoted to associate athletics director a year later. In 1985, Braine became Director of Athletics at Marshall University, where he remained until he was named Director of Athletics at Virginia Tech on January 1, 1988.

Braine's career as an assistant football coach included a two-year stint as the secondary coach at Georgia Tech in 1974-75 under Pepper Rodgers and also featured stops at Virginia (1976-77), VMI (1969-70) and Richmond (1971-73).

The Grove City, Pa., native earned both his bachelor's (1965) and master's (1966) degrees from the University of North Carolina, where he was a three-time football letterman. Braine is married to the former Carole Bowles of Richmond, Va., and the couple has four children and five grandchildren.

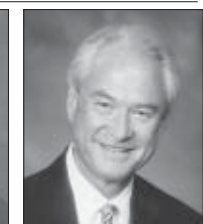
