

ARTS-IN-EDUCATION DIVISION

The Arts-in-Education Division specifically addresses itself to designing, administering and funding arts programs and projects in the elementary and secondary schools in South Carolina. The Artists-in-the-Schools concept utilized by the S.C. Arts Commission places professional artists in the classroom to stimulate, energize and facilitate unique learning opportunities for students and teachers. Through close working association with the artists, students witness first-hand the total personal and professional commitment an artist makes to his or her art. Through funding from the state, the National Endowment for the Arts and local sources, programs are made available to schools for a fraction of the cost.

The Artist/Craftsman-in-Residence Program placed artists in residence at four sites in South Carolina. In Jasper County, a photographer/film artist was in residence for a semester. The Artistin-Residence site was then moved to Clinton second semester where a painter-printmaker was in residence. The Craftsman-in-Residence Program placed a fibers artist in Hilton Head and a potter in Dillon for a semester. Artists maintained open studios, taught classes, held teacher workshops and worked with interested area residents. Each site also had a series of visiting artists and approximately 3,500 students were actively involved in workshops throughout the year.

Arts-in-Motion (AIM) is an intensive community arts program sponsored by the South Carolina Arts Commission and funded by the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare through the Emergency School Aid Act (ESAA) grant. This project was one of fifteen Special Arts Projects in the U.S. and was implemented in Sumter and Lee County, South Carolina. Arts-in-Motion encourages more positive cross-cultural communication and understanding between people through active participation in the arts. In support of these goals, AIM employed a bi-racial staff of five professional artists-a poet, a modern dancer, a musician, an actress, and a video artist-who lived in Sumter for the nine-month school year. The artists were in-residence in public schools in Sumter and Lee County, teaching classes and leading teacher training sessions and community workshops in the arts. In addition to the full-time staff. AIM also brought numerous visiting artists to Lee County throughout the year.

Through Arts-in-Motion approximately 6,000 students actively participated in a continuing series of workshops conducted in poetry, dance, drama, and music, as well as the many workshops and performances offered for area residents.

The Designers-in-the-Schools Program placed a professional architect in residence for a full school year at College Street Elementary School in Westminster, S.C. As a research person, the resident designer worked directly with students and teachers on projects which heightened design awareness and demonstrated the design process. Emphasis was on developing visual literacy as it relates to the built environment and on helping teachers develop methods and materials for incorporating environmental education into subject areas. The resident artist also served as a community resource person who worked toward one major project during the residency period. The program provided funds for in-school coordinator training, resident designer's salary, visiting designers, equipment, supplies and program documentation.

The Filmmakers-in-the-Schools Program emphasized sustained creative filmmaking experiences in the classroom throughout the school year for teachers and students at Burke High, C.A. Brown High and Freedom Road Schools in Charleston. Short-term programs were also administered at Charleston High and Berry Elementary Schools during the school year. In addition to teacher workshops in the program schools, formal teacher workshops were also held in Charleston, Columbia and Spartanburg areas of the state. The program provided set-ups of Super-8 equipment on loan, funds for film supplies and processing, long-term school residencies by the Filmmaker-in-Residence and instruction by visiting professionals in related arts fields.

The Poets-and-Writers-in-the-Schools Program placed professional poets and writers in residence for one or more weeks in approximately 65 schools for a total of 115 weeks to vitalize language as a tool for communication and creative expression. Student work was published in a statewide anthology, STOP THE BUTTERFLY. Through this program approximately 10,000 students participated in at least five workshops with a professional poet or writer.

The Visiting Artists Program provided professional artists from any area of the visual, literary or performing arts for residencies of one or more weeks. Approximately 3,000 students in 20 schools were involved in workshops lasting at least one week.

Project TAP is a community-school arts program developed by the Arts-in-Education Division which began its fourth year of operation during 1976-77. TAP brings together many component programs of the S.C. Arts Commission into one Total Arts Program providing a variety of arts experiences for the people of Fort Mill, Chester Township and Lancaster County. During the 1976-77 school year the program was expanded to include the towns of Greenwood, Dillon and Oconee County.

TAP is designed to integrate professional resident and visiting artists into local educational, recreational and community programs with the following goals: to give students broad exposure to the arts; to provide public school teachers an opportunity to further their education in the arts; to develop support for the continuation of arts activities in schools at all levels; to create an audience for the arts in the participating communities; and to develop a model for community school involvement in the arts which can be implemented in other areas of the state.

During the 1976-77 school year, 67 schools in 12 school districts from 7 counties participated in the Total Arts Program. Approximately 20,000 students and teachers were involved in some aspect of the program.

COMMUNITY ARTS DIVISION

The Community Arts Division brings enriching arts experiences and activities to a large portion of the state's population. The division's objectives include developing new audiences for the arts, reaching special interest groups, presenting new art forms to the public and generally enhancing the average South Carolinian's artistic awareness. The division is currently composed of four major programs and provisions are made for special projects as the need arises.

The Communications Center, a Charleston based media operation, employs videotape artists and folklorists to increase community awareness of the rich cultural heritage of the folklore, folk music, dance, art and architecture of the South Carolina Low Country. The Center lends its facilities to community members and provides instruction to individuals and groups who wish to make their own videotape and photo essays. The Center also maintains a videotape library and exchanges tapes with similar programs throughout the country. In FY'77 the Center presented a number of photography exhibits throughout the state, documenting the cultural traditions of the Low Country. In addition, the program developed and toured the state with a series of presentations of Low Country Folk Arts and produced two radio shows for the South Carolina Educational Radio Network series, "Folkways."

The Community/Neighborhood Arts Program is a response program to the continual needs of the many community and neighborhood groups that request services, assistance and consultation from the Commission. This service promotes and supplements arts programs provided by the Arts Commission to local organizations, provides information about arts activities sponsored by the local groups themselves and provides an information interchange between these groups. The goals are accomplished through extensive and individualized public information campaigns, the development of a short informational film on the Commission programs and two publications, arts resources directory and a bimonthly newsletter.

There are three projects currently under the auspices of the *Community/Neighborhood Arts Program*. They are the Arts and Crafts Trucks, the Manning Avenue Free Studio and the Tour Event/Foothills Festival.

The Arts Truck, a fully equipped artist-studio, travels to communities in the state and is in-residence for two weeks or longer. Equipped with complete art facilities, equipment and supplies, the Truck is staffed by four artists who teach painting, printmaking, drawing, photography and filmmaking to community residents. The artists arrange several arts activities for people of all ages and provide instruction and materials without charge.

The *Crafts Truck*, a mobile arts studio outfitted with supplies and equipment to provide workshops and demonstrations in textiles, pottery and other crafts, began its first residency in February, 1976. Since that time a staff of professional craftspersons has conducted workshops and provided instruction in communities throughout the state.

The Foothills Festival/Tour Event is a cooperative program between the South Carolina Arts Commission, the Foothills Festival Committee and the National Endowment for the Arts, which funded visual and performing artists who participated in the eighth annual Foothills Festival in Easley, S.C. The Festival has continued to succeed in its efforts to discover, encourage and showcase authentic local folk artists and craftspersons. In evidence, the 1977 Festival attracted over 25,000 people in a two-day period.

The Manning Avenue Free Studio, established in 1970 in Sumter, is a community-oriented arts project situated near the downtown area and supervised by a local professional sculptor. In a community where residents have few opportunities to be exposed to the arts, the Studio is designed to present an atmosphere of creativity through informal instruction. It offers positive reinforcement and creative outlets to the neighborhood residents. A variety of instruction in such areas as printmaking, painting, weaving, pottery, metal sculpture and wood sculpture are offered to visitors to the Studio. The products of the Studio and art work from friends of the Studio have been exhibited in Columbia, Greenville and Detroit.

The new statewide *Crafts Development Program*, primarily funded through the Governor's Manpower Services Council with funds from the Department of Labor, was initiated in FY'77. The staff is comprised of a coordinator, a writer/researcher, a crafts marketing specialist and an administrative assistant. The Program provides supportive services to those citizens of South Carolina seeking economic self-sufficiency through the production of handcrafted items. Although it provides general services to all identified South Carolina craftspeople, the program focuses specifically on target populations such as those who are unemployed or live in rural areas. Such groups include the Catawba Potters in York County, the Sweetgrass Coil Basketweavers in the Low Country area, and the quilting co-operative in Bamberg and on John's Island. Examples of services provided are: the compilation of a S.C. Directory of Craftspersons; preparation of labeling tags; marketing seminars; liaison with other supportive agencies; and public presentation and exposure of the craftspeople's work.

The Special Constituencies Program schedules professional artists to provide workshops and classes in their various art forms for individuals out of the cultural mainstream. Three programs now in operation under the Special Constituencies Program are Arts-for-Elders, Arts-in-Prisons and Arts-for-Teens.

The Arts-for-Elders Program brings artists and instructors to any South Carolina organization operating a facility where older people congregate. Workshops in painting, pottery, textiles, printmaking and a variety of other disciplines provide top quality first-hand experience in the arts to older people throughout South Carolina. The performing arts are included in the Program's effort also. In FY'77 a folklorist/musician entertained and demonstrated unusual traditional musical instruments; and the Elders Repertory Acting group, a unique short-term touring company of senior citizens led by a professional director, was formed.

The Arts-in-the-Prisons Program places professional artists in correctional institutions throughout South Carolina to provide inmates with instruction in the visual, literary and performing arts. The Program provides for intensive workshops and continuing classes, sponsors concerts in several institutions, as well as an annual arts festival in a target institution. Program activities stress audience participation and allow interaction between inmates and professional artists. Participating inmates are given the opportunity to publicly display their work; this allows community members to view and evaluate the inmates' work. Business community support through provision of exhibit space increased the visibility of the inmates' work throughout the state. Skills acquired as a result of participation in the program can be utilized in the event of their release. The Program is evaluated through questionnaires completed by students, artists and institution administrators. The Arts-for-Teens Program provides arts activities for teenagers in institutions and half-way houses throughout the state. Over the past two years the format has changed and grown to provide increasingly comprehensive workshops and classes lasting from four to twelve weeks in duration. This extensive series of workshops offers instruction and the opportunity for participation in creative writing, pottery, macrame, folk music, woodworking, textiles, architecture/design and others.

Special Projects—The Assistant for Special Projects works on projects which need unique and individual assistance and which could possibly develop into programs or grants with the Arts Commission. The Assistant kept up-to-date detailed files, corresponded with and assisted approximately fifty special projects. Included in these projects were such things as local community festivals, arts organizations, special interest groups, individuals and contacts with federal agencies. The Assistant also handled in-house coordination of projects which had site directors or local coordinators but were not located in Columbia, such as the Manning Avenue Free Studio, the Communications Center, the Foothills Festival/Tour Event, the Mary McLeod Bethune Portrait Exhibit, the Art-in-Public Places events, the Governor's Intern Program and the Folk Arts Exhibits.

PROFESSIONAL ARTS DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

The Professional Arts Development Division's activities cross all art disciplines but are primarily concerned with professional artists and arts organizations—their development and stability and the professional development of community groups.

The Art of the Short Film Festival is a series of six 90-minute programs of short animation, documentary and dramatic films that are available at minimal cost to any interested school or community group. Films included in the program range from Academy Award winners to "film classics". Local program sponsors must furnish their own projection facilities and are encouraged to use the project's prepared Program Guides to introduce each screening.

The Dance Touring Program, sponsored jointly by the South Carolina Arts Commission, the National Endowment for the Arts and the Southern Federation of State Arts Agencies, brings major dance companies into communities for residency periods of onehalf to one week each. Local communities pay one-third of the price of this program, the Commission and Endowment each pay a third and the Federation provides administrative services.

The Ensemble Residency Program brings to South Carolina music groups of national reputation to give concerts, conduct workshops, classes, clinics and other in-school activities. Each group is inresidence for two weeks in a minimum of five communities.

The South Carolina Film Experience provides promotion for film events and this year helped finance the production of "It's Grits" by the Commission's Filmmaker-in-Residence.

The Individual Artist Fellowship Program makes possible the awarding of funds to professional South Carolina artists working in all disciplines. Criteria for selection of these awards is artistic excellence. Panels of out-of-state judges choose the recipients.

The Jazz Residency Program brings a well-known Jazz ensemble to South Carolina for a one-week residency in schools and communities. The groups, which have included Clark Terry and His Band, Dizzy Gillespie and His Band and the National Jazz Ensemble, spend two days in each location giving concerts and conducting workshops.

The Regional Film Editing Studio provides low-cost, post-production editing facilities to professional independent filmmakers in the Southeast. The Studio, which is equipped with one of the most sophisticated 16mm editing machines in the region, is available to filmmakers for \$15 a day. Housed at the Arts Commission, the Studio includes sleeping and cooking facilities for round-the-clock work.

Stage South (formerly SCORE) is the State Theatre of South Carolina. The company also conducts workshops and offers classes in the theatre arts. Their work is varied, including improvisational material, original works, and full length plays. Stage South is available for performances and other services in communities throughout the state. This past year, in addition to touring South Carolina, Stage South performed in Colombia, South America and Spoleto Festival, U.S.A.

The State Art Collection consists of over 120 pieces of visual art from contemporary artists in South Carolina. Groupings of sculpture, paintings, prints and photographs are exhibited in public facilities and state offices. New works for the collection are chosen from the Arts Commission's Annual Exhibition, held this year in Columbia at the University of South Carolina.

The Ticket Subsidy Program provides grants for free tickets to arts events for people not in a position to afford to purchase tickets. Grants are awarded to nonprofit organizations. An organization is eligible for one grant in each half-year (July-December; January-June).

The Visual Arts in the Performing Arts Program makes possible high quality graphic designs which are used in the promotion of the Ensemble Residency and Jazz Residency Programs as well as Stage South (see above).

The Young Filmmakers' Festival is an opportunity for young filmmakers who have completed films in the past year to show their work to audiences throughout the state. The program gives young filmmakers in South Carolina a chance to come together and share the excitement of learning about filmmaking.

Youth Film Production Grants are nonmatching grants that are available to young people who wish to explore the creative possibilities of Super-8 filmmaking. Recipients of the grant complete short (20 minutes or less) Super-8 films.
