Early Hong Kong Members of Lincoln's Inn

Wu Ting-fang 1842-1922

Also known as Ng Achoy and Ng Choy, Wu Ting-fang was the first Chinese to be called to the English bar and to be admitted to practise in Hong Kong.

Diplomat and Politician

1880-2 appointed as Hong Kong's first Chinese legislative councillor.

1882 joined the Chinese service as a legal advisor.

- 1896-1910 Minister of Imperial China to the United States, Spain, Cuba, Mexico, Peru and Japan.
- 1910 appointed Minister of Law Reform in Imperial China.
- 1912-22 prominent posts held in the government of the Republic of China, notably Minister of Justice and Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Ho Kai 1859-1914

Ho Kai was one of the main supporters of Sun Yat-sen, first president of the Republic of China.

Ho Kai was also a qualified physician. His sister, Ho Miu-ling, was the wife of Wu Ting-fang.

1890-1914 member of the Legislative Council of Hong Kong, Ho Kai played a key role in the relationship between the Hong Kong community and the British colonial government. 1912 knighted.

Wu Chao Chu (Ng Chiu She) 1887-1934

Son of Wu Ting-fang. Admitted 14th October 1908, "of London University and of Canton, China (21), son of Wu Ting-fang of Canton aforesaid, barrister at law": Admissions Register B1a29, f.148; printed *Admissions Register* Volume III, p.82.

Called 27th June 1911 : Bar Book B2a9, f.131; printed *Black Books* Volume 5, p.438.

Diplomat and Politician

1918-23 Republic of China Vice-Minister of Foreign Affairs.1923-7 Foreign Affairs Minister and Foreign Minister.1928-31 Minister of the Republic of China to the United States.1929-30 Representative to the League of Nations.
