SECRETARY OF STATE

To My Fellow Georgians:

Under authority of Section 45-13-47 of the Georgia Laws, the Department of Archives and History is to compile every two years an Official and Statistical Register. The Register is to contain brief sketches of elected and certain appointed State officials and members of Congress from Georgia, rosters of State and county officials, lists of State institutions and official boards, State and county population and election statistics, and "miscellaneous statistics bearing upon related matters of current interest or likely to be of value to the future historian." The Secretary of State is authorized to print the Register and distribute copies to the General Assembly, State departments, Georgia high schools, and units of the University System. By a resolution of March 28, 1961 (Georgia Laws 1961, p. 238) the General Assembly approved "the preparing, editing, printing, and distributing" of the Georgia Official and Statistical Register "to be paid from the funds of the Legislative Branch as now provided by law."

This Register is an essential reference work for anyone interested in Georgia State government. It is also one of the many ways in which my office fulfills the responsibility to disseminate information on State agencies and election results.

Because of budget constraints, some information usually included had to be shortened or omitted in this volume. Improvements in the compilation of essential information, the use of newer publication techniques, and the availability of funds from the General Assembly should permit future issues of the Georgia Official and Statistical Register to be more comprehensive, timely, and economical.

CHAPTER I

STATE ELECTED OFFICERS

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

THE GOVERNOR

The Governor of the State of Georgia is a constitutional officer, recognized as such in all of the State Constitutions from the first of 1777 through the ninth of 1976. As the head of the Executive Branch he is vested with many powers and charged with duties too numerous to be listed here. He is the commander-in-chief of the National Guard and is the chief law enforcement official of the State. By law he is ex-officio a member of many boards, bureaus, commissions and committees. The Governor has the power of veto over enactments of the General Assembly with the exception of Constitutional Amendments. The General Assembly does have the authority to override a Governor's veto. The Governor has 5 days, excluding Sundays, in which to approve bills received by him from the General Assembly while it is in Session. After the General Assembly adjourns, he has 30 days, excluding Sundays, from the date of adjournment in which to approve or veto bills. If the Governor fails to approve or veto a bill within the required time, the bill automatically becomes law without his signature. The Governor makes appointments between sessions of the General Assembly to fill most appointive offices in government, but all original appointments made by him must be confirmed by the Senate. He likewise appoints to fill unexpired terms in most elective offices until the next regular or special election.

The Governor is elected on Tuesday after the first Monday in November, in each fourth year after 1946, at a General Election at which he is elected for a four year term. The Governor can succeed himself for one additional four year term, but is Constitutionally prohibited from ever seeking the office of Governor again once he has served two consecutive four year terms. Inauguration occurs during the first week of the General Assembly Session which immediately follows the General Election, and his term of office commences with inauguration. The minimum qualifications for the office of Governor are age of thirty years and citizenship in the State for six years and citizenship in the United States for fifteen years.

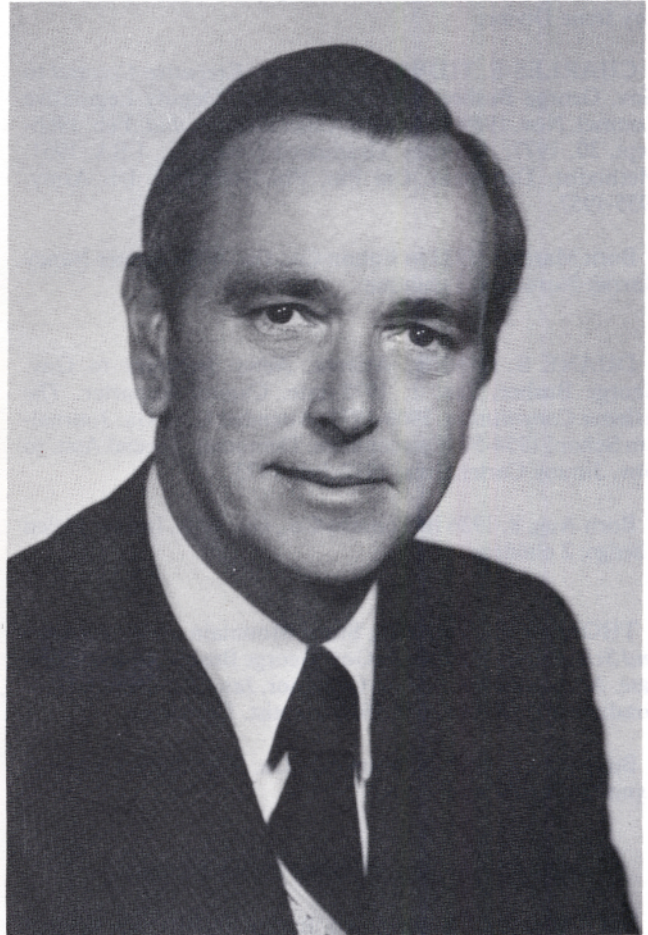
GOVERNOR'S STAFF

The Governor's staff is responsible for providing a broad variety of services to the executive branch of state government, the General Assembly, and the general public.

Staff functions are varied and diverse and include policy analysis, scheduling the Governor's appointments, answering his correspondence, writing speeches and press releases, representing the Governor at functions when he is unable to attend, preparing Executive Orders and Executive Minutes and other Executive Documents, processing criminal extraditions, processing resignations and other vacancies and appointments of judicial officials and executive officials, monitoring legislation and monitoring state programs for effectiveness and efficiency.

The Governor's staff also handles special projects and research for the Governor and must also maintain records on state licensing and examining boards, regulatory commissions,

and on other executive boards and commissions. In addition to handling the day-to-day crisis concerning budget matters, agency problems, and human needs, the Governor's staff provides information to the news media on the Governor's activities and provides liaison with state agency heads, members of the General Assembly, local governments, Georgia's Congressional and Senatorial offices, Executive Departments of other states, governments of other nations, and the general public.

OFFICE OF PLANNING AND BUDGET

The Office of Planning and Budget (OPB) was created through Reorganization in 1972 to provide professional staff services to the Governor. It was one of the nation's pioneer state agencies in combining into one operation the important functions of budget analysis and policy planning.

In the area of budget analysis, OPB has three major responsibilities—fiscal policy development, development of the annual state budget, and management of the budget and fiscal affairs for the Executive Branch.

OPB's role in policy planning involves efforts to ensure the orderly and balanced development of Georgia's human, economic and physical resources. This process includes a comprehensive assessment of the needs of the state and, working with budget analysis, an assessment of how the state can best allocate its resources to meet these needs.

In addition to policy planning, OPB's planners also are

responsible for guiding and coordinating the functional planning efforts of state agencies.

Other specialized activities of OPB are described in the following descriptions of the responsibilities of each of the divisions within OPB.

The Office of Planning and Budget is headed by a Director appointed by the Governor.

EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

This Division performs all functions relating to budget analysis and policy planning for the agencies of State Government responsible for administering State laws relating to public schools, higher education and scholarships.

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

This Division performs all functions relating to budget analysis and policy planning for the agencies of State Government responsible for delivering social, health and other human services to the citizens of Georgia.

GENERAL GOVERNMENT DIVISION

This Division performs all functions relating to budget analysis and policy planning for the agencies of State Government responsible for administering State laws relating to the protection of persons and property and for delivering services relating to general government activities.

PHYSICAL AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DIVISION

This Division performs all functions relating to budget analysis and policy planning for the agencies of State Government responsible for administering State laws relating to natural resources, transportation and economic development. This Division also is responsible for program development involving the Appalachian and Coastal Plains Regional Commissions and for Economic Development Planning and Planned Growth activities.

MANAGEMENT REVIEW DIVISION

This Division is responsible for providing a program of management review services. The Division provides technical and managerial assistance to the Governor and to state agencies for the identification and solution of specific problems and the improvement of overall operations; provides coordination and direction of special economy and efficiency studies; assists in the study, installation and utilization of data processing

systems and assists in the implementation of recommended improvements as requested or directed. This Division also supervises the State Clearinghouse and State Data Center. The Clearinghouse serves as the liaison between the Federal Government and the State and local governments regarding a wide range of federal funding projects and other programs. The Data Center prepares, maintains and furnishes demographic data for the state and coordinates and standardizes statistical information.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS DIVISION

This Division is responsible for continuous study and analysis of intergovernmental issues affecting Georgia. The Division monitors federal legislation and provides in-depth analysis of selected legislation and how it will affect Georgia.

FACILITIES MANAGEMENT DIVISION

This Division, consisting of an architect and an engineer, provides technical and engineering advice to the Governor and state agencies on matters relating to facilities management, design and maintenance; space allocation, and acquisition of major capital outlay.

GEORGIA COUNCIL FOR THE ARTS AND HUMANITIES

The Council, a budget unit within the Office of Planning and Budget, is responsible for promoting the arts in Georgia through a program of grants and through technical assistance with a goal of building and strengthening the creative resources of the state. The Council is a 24-member group appointed by the Governor. The day-to-day activities of the Council are handled by a full-time Director appointed by the OPB Director based on the Council's recommendations.

INTERNAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

This Division is responsible for providing support services to all Divisions and personnel within the Office of Planning and Budget and the Governor's Office. These services include preparation of the OPB budget, maintenance of agency fiscal records, supervision of purchases, supplies and inventory controls, preparations of all graphic materials, and performance of all personnel services. This Division also provides these same services to the Office of Consumer Affairs, the Consumers' Utility Counsel, the Georgia Office of Energy Resources and the Governor's Committee on Postsecondary Education under the "administrative purposes only" provision of Reorganization.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The Office of Lieutenant Governor of the State was created by the 1945 Constitution (Article V, Section I, Paragraph VII). The Office is listed in the Executive Branch of State Government, but the duties are both legislative and executive. The Office is budgeted through the Legislative Branch. During the incumbency of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor is the President of the Senate. By law, he also serves as ex-officio member of a number of State committees, commissions, boards and authorities.

In the case of death, resignation or disability of the Governor, the Lieutenant Governor shall become Governor until the next general election for members of the General Assembly, at which time a successor to the Governor shall be elected for the unexpired term. If the Lieutenant Governor shall become a candidate for the unexpired term of the Governor, he shall thereby resign his office as Lieutenant Governor, effective upon the qualification of the Governor elected for the unexpired term, and his successor for the unexpired term shall be elected at such election.

The Lieutenant Governor is elected every four years at the General Election in which the Governor and other state officers are elected. The minimum qualifications for the office must necessarily be the same as those for the office of Governor.

THE SECRETARY OF STATE

The Secretary of State was designated as a public officer in the Constitution of 1798 (Article II, Section 12). The Secretary of State is vested with many varied duties and responsibilities which are constitutionally and legislatively defined. He also serves as a member of many boards, commissions, and authorities.

The term of office of the Secretary of State is four years. He is elected by the voters at the same General Election at which the Governor and other Executive Officers are elected. The minimum qualifications for the office are citizenship in the United States for ten years, residence in Georgia for six years, and age of twenty-five years.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE

The Office of Secretary of State maintains custody of the Great Seal of the State of Georgia and the official Georgia state flag; registers governmental lobbyists; provides state liaison with foreign consuls stationed in Georgia; and provides general governmental information to the media and public. Additionally, the Divisions of this office provide the following wide range of governmental functions:

ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES DIVISION (Frank Skrine, Director) - Compiles all rules and regulations adopted by state agencies under the Administrative Procedures Act, and produces a publication of those agency directives.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION (Gary O. Childers, Director) - Provides administrative support to all divisions in accounting, budgeting, personnel, purchasing, and records management; coordinates grants and contracts; processes mail, maintains a warehouse and inventory of supplies and equipment.

ARCHIVES AND HISTORY DEPARTMENT (Carroll Hart, Director, resigned June 30, 1982. Edward L. Weldon, Director, Aug. 1982-date) - Preserves the state's official records and historical material, and provides public access to those documents; develops and sponsors educational programs on Georgia history; and designs and helps maintain state and local government records management program.

COMMISSIONS DIVISION (Cicero Lucas, Director) - Issues commissions validating all elected and appointed congressional, state and county officers, and gubernatorial appointments. Issues incumbency certifications for the Attorney General. Prepares and publishes the Georgia Official Directory of Congressional, State and County Officers, Bond Booklet, Justice of the Peace Manual and Fee Lists. Certifies acts of the General Assembly, and provides copies to governmental officials and the public. Receives and files all records of the General Assembly.

CORPORATIONS DIVISION (Robert K. Hooks, Director) - Responsible for the general administration of the Georgia Corporate Code which includes the filing and certification of all documents of incorporation, amendment, merger, dissolution and resolution; the provision of information to the general public and legal

community about corporations; the filing and certification of all out-of-state and foreign corporations; and the maintenance of current register of service of process agents on all domestic and foreign corporations. Additionally, the Corporations Division conducts investigations on corporations as necessary, certifies copies of corporate documents on request, and provides assistance to the legal community as to procedural law in document filing.

ELECTIONS DIVISION (Frances Duncan, Director) - Administers the Georgia and municipal election codes; assists in the management of state and local elections; conducts training seminars; provides election supplies; certifies candidates and official ballots; registers campaign financial statements.

MUSEUM OF SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY (Charlie E. Fleming, Director) - Maintains the State Museum in the Capitol and accepts gifts, grants, and donations on behalf of the Museum.

NOTARY PUBLIC DIVISION (Sandra McCallum, Director) - Maintains central record of notaries commissioned by the clerks of Superior courts; receives fees, issues identification and certificates; performs administrative duties for the Claims Advisory Board.

SECURITIES DIVISION (H. Wayne Howell, Director) - Administers the Georgia Securities Act, the Corporate Take-over Act, the Out-of-State Land Sales Act, the Georgia Land Sales Act, and the laws regulating perpetual care cemeteries; registers and licenses regulated entities; audits and analyzes regulated entities; investigates violators of law under the division's jurisdiction.

SPECIAL SERVICES DIVISION (Donna Cook, Director) - Handles charters, amendments to charters, mergers and dissolutions of state banks, trust companies, credit unions, insurance companies, savings and loan associations, railroads, steamship, express and telegraph companies, and issues Certificates of Grant for corporate powers to those corporations; administers the Real Property law as it relates to filing of deeds and related documents for state-owned property.

STATISTICAL REGISTER DIVISION (Marian Holmes, Director) - Compiles and publishes the *Georgia Official and Statistical Register* and the booklet, *Members of the General Assembly of Georgia*. Maintains for record the Enrolled Acts of the General Assembly.

SURVEYOR GENERAL DIVISION (Marion Hemperley, Director) - Maintains current editions and historic maps of Georgia, and records of surveys and grants. Maintains abstracts of laws relating to county boundaries and records of boundary dispute proceedings. Interprets official maps and related documents.

TRADEMARKS-SERVICE OF PROCESS DIVISION (Sarah Baker, Director) - Registers and renews trademarks and service marks; administers the service of process filings of the Real Estate Investment Trust instruments, multilevel distribution companies, and banks acting in a fiduciary capacity; administers the filing requirements of an insurance policy or bond for outdoor amusement shows; administers the filing of bonds under the Georgia Proprietary School Act; and accepts the filings for charitable organizations and professional fund raisers and solicitors.

STATE EXAMINING BOARDS (Michael R. Fowler, Director) - Provides professional and clerical support to the State licensing and examining boards for financial matters, rulemaking, examination development and test administra-

tion, and investigates violations of rules and laws under the jurisdiction of the boards.

COMPTROLLER GENERAL

The Comptroller General was not designated as a public officer in the first three State Constitutions, but the office was created by the Constitution of 1861 (Art. III, Sec. 2, Par. 8). However, by the Act of December 5, 1799 (Marbury & Crawford, p 184), the General Assembly had provided for a Comptroller General and had defined his duties and powers, merging under him all such as had been theretofore exercised by auditors and treasurers appointed for special purposes. This office has been functioning continuously since 1799, and the office is specifically provided for in the Constitution of 1945 (Art. V, Sec. 2, Par. 1) and in the 1982 Code (Chaps. 45-14 and 45-15).

The term of office of the Comptroller General is four years to run concurrent with the terms of the Governor and other Executive Officers. The minimum qualifications for the office are citizenship for ten years, residence in Georgia for six years and age of twenty-five years.

Among the general duties of this office are the keeping of complete books (balanced every ten days) on all taxes, fees and other funds which the Department of Revenue and all other Departments and Offices pay to and deposit with the General Fund of the State, and the signing of all warrants issued to each Department, Board or Commission, with complete books thereon. The Act of August 19, 1912, (Acts 1912, p. 119) created the Insurance Department under the Comptroller General, naming him Insurance Commissioner and authorizing him to appoint a Deputy Insurance Commissioner and all necessary personnel (1982 Code, Title 33, see O.C.G.A. Title 33). The Act of February 25, 1949 (Act 1949, p. 1057) named the Insurance Commissioner as Safety Fire Commissioner with authority to appoint a State Fire Marshal who in turn appoints his Deputy and other necessary personnel, all to serve during the pleasure of the Safety Fire Commissioner (1982 Code, Chap. 25-2). The Act of February 25, 1949 (Acts 1949, p. 1128) known as the Liquefied Petroleum Safety Act named the Insurance Commissioner as a Commissioner to enforce that Act (1982 Code, Chap. 10-1). Another Act of March 4, 1955 (Acts 1955, p. 431) made the Comptroller General the Georgia Industrial Loan Commissioner (1982 Code, Chapter 7-3).

Under various Acts codified in the 1933 Code, the Comptroller General is an ex-officio member of many Boards and Committees.

JENNINGS B. GARBADE, DEPUTY COMPTROLLER GENERAL

COMPTROLLER GENERAL DIVISIONS

INSURANCE DEPARTMENT - Ralph Terry, Chief Deputy. Examines companies and agents, collects premium taxes, examines policy forms and policy rates and administers insurance related laws. The Department investigates consumer

complaints regarding insurance companies.

SAFETY FIRE DIVISION - John R. Gore, Jr., Fire Marshal. Responsible for the licensed use of hazardous substances, the inspections of buildings and blueprints for fire hazards and the supervision of domestic and foreign manufacturers of mobile homes sold in Georgia. The Division also provides instruction in fire safety.

INDUSTRIAL LOAN DEPARTMENT - Jim Young, Deputy Industrial Loan Commissioner. Supervises loan companies making loans of \$3,000 or less, examines interest rates, transactions and advertisements. The Department licenses loan companies and collects taxes on loans.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION - Furnishes accounting, personnel, reporting, research and other support services for the Department.

LAW DEPARTMENT

Georgia has had an Attorney General since early colonial times. In fact, the first lawyer authorized to practice in Georgia was her first Attorney General, William Clifton, whose service to the colony began in 1754. Presently, although the Attorney General performs a multitude of duties specified in the Constitution and statutes of Georgia, it may be stated generally that he acts as a lawyer with the State of Georgia as his client.

The office of Attorney General is an elective one with a term of four years. He is elected by the voters at the same general election at which the Governor and other executive officers are elected. The Attorney General is head of the Department of Law, and also an ex-officio member of numerous Boards, Commissions, Committees, and Authorities.

The Law Department is the counsel for the executive branch of Government. It is vested with complete and exclusive authority and jurisdiction in all matters of law relating to all the executive departments of the State. Since the Executive Reorganization Act of 1972, the State Library has also been a part of the Law Department.

DIVISION I

Division I represents the Department of Human Resources; the Department of Medical Assistance; the Department of Administrative Services; the State Health Planning and Development Agency; the Department of Community Affairs; and the State Indemnification Commission.

DIVISION II

Division II represents the Department of Natural Resources; the Department of Agriculture; the Department of Industry and Trade; the State Forestry Commission; the Soil and Water Conservation Committee; the Office of Energy Resources; the Council for Energy Resources; the State Department of Veterans Service; the State Department of Defense; and the Area Planning and Development Advisory Committee.

DIVISION III

Division III is responsible for representing the interests of the

State in capital felony appeals, the defense of collateral attacks on criminal convictions where the prisoner involved is in the custody of a state-employed warden and the representation of the interests of the requesting state is in extradition matters before the Governor.

DIVISION IV

Division IV has as its major responsibility the handling of all legal affairs for the Department of Transportation. The division is also legal counsel to all state departments and authorities on matters related to construction activities, including the preparation and examination of contracts for architectural and engineering services and the negotiation or litigation of disputes arising out of construction contracts.

DIVISION V

Division V represents the Department of Revenue; the Georgia State Financing and Investment Commission; the Department of Banking and Finance; Office of Planning and Budget; State Auditor; and the Fiscal Division of the Department of Administrative Services. The division is also responsible for legal services which are related to investments made by the Teachers and Employees Retirement Systems of Georgia.

DIVISION VI

Division VI represents the State of Georgia and all of its agencies, authorities, boards, commissions, departments and retirement systems in all licenses, leases, rental agreements and loan instruments. The division also provides general legal services and representation to the State Properties Commission and to most of the State authorities.

DIVISION VII

Division VII represents the Department of Labor; the Board of Workers' Compensation; the Workers' Compensation Trust Fund (DOAS); the Subsequent Injury Trust Fund; the State Personnel Board; State Merit System (including the State Employees' Health Insurance Plan); the Georgia Office of Fair Employment Practices; the Employees' Retirement System; the Teachers' Retirement System; various other State retirement systems; and the Campaign and Financial Disclosure Commission. Division VII further provides legal assistance and representation to all State agencies in resolving matters involving employment discrimination.

DIVISION VIII

Division VIII represents the Board of Regents; the Comptroller General; the Department of Education; the Elections Division of the Secretary of State; the Public Service Commission; and several other smaller State governmental entities.

DIVISION IX

Division IX represents the Office of the Secretary of State and all of its departments, except elections; the Office of Consumer Affairs; and the Office of Bar Admissions.

DIVISION X

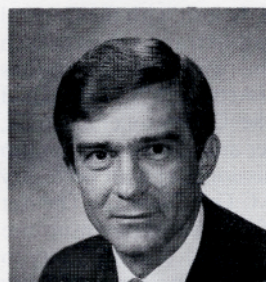
Division X represents the Department of Offender Rehabilitation; the State Board of Pardons and Paroles; the Department of Public Safety; and the Georgia Bureau of Investigation.

Computer Services Division has the responsibility to manage all automated services for the Law Department, including word processing.

STATE LIBRARY

The State Library is designated as an official depository for State and selected federal publications. The library is maintained for use not only by the bench, bar, and those in government, but also for use by the public generally.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

and

THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The Board of Education was recognized by the Constitution of 1945 (Art. VIII, Sec. 2) but it had been created by the Act of February 10, 1937 (Ga. L. 1937, p. 864) and the Act of January 25, 1943 (Ga. L. 1943, p. 636). This Board exercises jurisdiction over all public schools, both graded and high, and those for blind and deaf children, and, in its discretion, defines and regulates the curriculum and courses of study therein. It classifies and certifies for employment all teachers in the public school system and administers all funds appropriated by the State for the maintenance and operation of the public schools, including transportation (1933 Code, Ch. 32-4 and 1975 Code Ch. 32-6A). All phases of vocational education and training are within its jurisdiction. For all such purposes, it has authority to make and enforce its rules and regulations and to employ supervisors and other necessary personnel.

The Board of Education consists of ten members who have resided in the State for five years, one from each congressional district, all of whom are appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. Vacancies on the Board are filled temporarily by the Board until the next session of the General Assembly. The terms of office are for seven years each, staggered so that two vacancies occur in one year, four in the second following year and four in the fourth following year. The appointment of certain specified classes of persons is prohibited by law (1933 Code, Sec. 32-404).

The Superintendent of Schools is the Executive and Administrative Officer of the Board of Education (1975 Code Sec. 32-660a) charged with the duties of enforcing all of the Board's rules and regulations governing the public schools and vocational schools, and of making recommendations to the Board for the improvement of the efficiency of the school system. He renders annually to the General Assembly a full and comprehensive report covering every phase of the activities of the Board of Education and of his own administrative office. He is administrative officer of the State Department of Education.

The Superintendent of Schools was made a Constitutional Officer of the State by Art. VIII, Sec. 3, Par. 1 of the 1945 Constitution. His term of office is four years. He is elected by the voters at the same general election at which the Governor and other Executive Officers are elected. Under the 1976 Constitution and the 1933 Code, the minimum requirements for the office are citizenship for ten years, residence in Georgia for six years, age of twenty-five years, and certain specified professional education and experience (1933 Code, Sec. 32-502).

He is Executive Officer of the Board of Vocational Education, which is the Board of Education operating in a dual role. He is also a member of the State School Building Authority

(1933 Code, Sec. 32-1402a).

OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES. Cal Adamson, Associate State Superintendent of Schools. Supervises allotments and payments of education funds to local systems under APEG law and some federal programs. The Office administers standards for schools and systems, Cooperative Education Service Agencies, the school building, food and textbook programs, public library services, food distribution and the school transportation programs.

OFFICE OF INSTRUCTIONAL SERVICES. Lucille Jordan, Associate State Superintendent of Schools. Responsible for development and implementation of curriculum for Georgia schools from kindergarten through twelfth grade. The Office also administers compensatory programs, the Department-owned educational television service, and early childhood and special education.

OFFICE OF PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT. Werner Rogers, Associate State Superintendent of Schools. Manages the competency-based graduation program, pupil personnel services, Standards, student assessment, teacher education and certification, staff development, educational improvement, research and evaluation.

OFFICE OF STATE SCHOOLS AND SPECIAL SERVICES. Peyton Williams, Jr., Associate State Superintendent of Schools. Supervises the operation and services of schools for the State Board of Education: The Atlanta Area School for the Deaf, the Georgia School for the Deaf, the Georgia Academy for the Blind and the North Georgia and South Georgia Vocational-Technical Schools. The Office also administers programs under Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972.

OFFICE OF VOCATIONAL EDUCATION. William P. Johnson, Associate State Superintendent of Schools. Coordinates vocational education planning and budgeting, research development, evaluation, special programs, management infor-

mation, staff development, consultative services, postsecondary area schools, CETA, job preparation, consumer and homemaking, cooperative training, youth clubs and comprehensive high schools.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

The Department of Agriculture and the Office of Commissioner of Agriculture were created by Ga. Laws 1874, p. 5. The Commissioner of Agriculture was made an Executive Officer of the State by the 1945 Constitution (Art. V, Sec. 2, Par. 1).

The term of the Commissioner is for four years. He is elected by the voters at the same general election at which the Governor and other Executive Officers are elected. The minimum qualifications for the office are citizenship for ten years, residence in Georgia for six years, age of twenty-five years and experience as a practical farmer.

In addition to the authority given to the Commissioner of Agriculture by certain Acts dealing with human foods, such as eggs, fish, dairy products and grains, he has full and general powers of making regulations, conducting inspections, confiscation of all foods for humans and feeds for animals and poultry. He can enforce all laws and make further regulations with respect to fertilizers, insecticides, fungicides, poultry and livestock diseases, dealers in livestock and seeds of all kinds.

The Department of Agriculture is organized along functional lines; the Commissioner has nine Assistant Commissioners to plan and supervise operations of the Department.

Administration. Responsible for Accounting, Budgeting, Statistical Reporting, Personnel, Special Services, Information and Education, Training, Computer Services, Purchasing, Safety, Civil Defense, Records Management, Property Control. Administers the Georgia Grade A Milk Laws.

DR. JOHN A COBB, JR. Assistant Commissioner for Animal Industry and State Veterinarian. Responsible for enforcing all laws and regulations pertaining to livestock and poultry disease control and eradication, and meat slaughter and processing. Principal assistants are seven Assistant State Veterinarians who exercise supervision over Animal Health, and the Director of Meat Inspection operations. Responsible for collecting and disseminating information from the poultry industry used in establishing daily markets; cooperating with all equine breeds in programming horse programs, shows and encouraging 4-H members participation in the Equine program; assuring quality milk through cooperating with owners and operators of problem herds; responsible for the administrative operations of two veterinary diagnostic laboratories located in Tifton and Athens; seven poultry and diagnostic laboratories located in Oakwood, Dalton, Canton, Royston, Douglas, Tifton, and Statesboro.

GEORGE E. SEATON, Assistant Commissioner for Consumer Protection Field Forces. Is responsible for enforcing the Georgia Food Act, Georgia Bottling Act, Wholesale Fish Dealer's Act and Georgia Egg Law. Supervises inspection of retail and wholesale food stores, food processing plants, food warehouses, bakeries, confectioners, soft drinks bottlers and seafood processing plants. Reviews all food labels. Enforces bedding regulations. Supervises field operations through five District Offices.

HENRIETTA M. CANTY, Assistant Commissioner for Consumer Services. Responsible for educating Georgia producers, processors, retailers and consumers concerning Georgia laws enforced by the Department of Agriculture. Handles all consumer complaints and questions. Disseminates information and literature on Georgia consumer protection programs such as food, meat, grocery stores, pest control, fuel and weights and measures, plant identification and disease control. Operates Speakers Bureau.

OLIN D. MULLINAX, Assistant Commissioner for Fuels and Measures. Maintains a Weights and Measures Laboratory and supervises a field force of Weights and Measures inspectors in the program of heavy scale inspection, light scale inspection, liquid petroleum (LP) gas meter inspection and milk tank calibration. Operates a State Oil Laboratory and manages a field force of Fuel Oil inspectors. Duties involve calibration of large tank trucks, various chemical analyses to insure that the petroleum products and antifreeze sold are in compliance with state and federal specifications, and enforces correct advertising of gasoline prices.

JACK A. LEARD, SR., Assistant Commissioner, General Field Inspection Forces. Supervises five District Supervisors, and ten Assistant Supervisors who inspect approximately eighty weekly Livestock Auction Markets. Inspectors tag all eligible animals that are sold to slaughter. Assist in disease control of animals and poultry. Audits and enforces bonding and licensing of all livestock auction markets including Prompt Pay Bill. Also issue licenses and enforces bird laws. Pull fertilizer and feed samples during peak season.

JIMMY C. BRIDGES, Assistant Commissioner of Marketing. Is responsible for establishing and maintaining State

Farmers' Markets; promoting the State's major crops and developing programs to improve marketing, handling and storage of agricultural products through commodities promotion; administering Warehouse Inspection to control the storage of grain, cotton, tobacco and other commodities; and for promoting and developing export markets in foreign countries through International Trade.

E. ELMO WINSTEAD, Assistant Commissioner, Plant Industry. Is responsible for enforcing of Georgia seed laws to insure purity, germination and correct labeling; in coordination with Experiment Stations, develop and produce high quality seed for Georgia farmers; furnishes official grain grading service to farmers and to the feed and grain industry; registers each brand of feed, fertilizer and pesticide sold in the State; works to eradicate and control agricultural pests and protect consumers from purchasing diseased plants; conducts tests of food, feed, fertilizer, seed, pesticides, lime and other agricultural products to determine that they meet State standards; provides agricultural advice to state-owned institutions. Supervises a Field Force of inspectors who pull samples of seed, feed, fertilizer, pesticides, lime and grain.

DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

The Department of Labor, which was created by the Act of March 25, 1937 (Ga. L. 1937, p. 230), is the successor to the former Department of Industrial Relations and its predecessor, the Department of Commerce and Labor.

The Act of March 25, 1937 also created the office of Commissioner of Labor and placed the Department of Labor under his supervision and jurisdiction. His duties include the enforcement of all laws pertaining to labor (other than workmen's compensation) as enumerated in Sec. 54-122 of the 1933 Code. One important duty is the enforcement of the provisions of the Unemployment Compensation Act of March 29, 1937 (Ga. L. 1937, p. 806). To accomplish this, that Act authorized the Commissioner of Labor to set up, in the Department of Labor, a Bureau of Unemployment Compensation, divided into an Employment Service Division and an Unemployment Compensation Division. The Act of March 8, 1945 (Ga. L. 1945, p. 331) changed the name of the Bureau to Employment Security Agency, but left the subordinate Divisions unchanged.

Yet, on the other hand, the same Act of March 25, 1937 placed within and under the Department of Labor an Industrial Board which succeeded to all of the powers and duties of the former Department of Industrial Relations, and which was specially charged with the duty of administering the Workmen's Compensation Act of August 17, 1920. The Act of

February 8, 1943 (Ga. L. 1943, p. 167) abolished that Board but created the Board of Workmen's Compensation to enforce the Workmen's Compensation Act, as amended. Both Acts of 1937 and 1943 provided that the said named Boards, although within the Department of Labor, be outside of the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Labor; and the Act of January 26, 1950 (Ga. L. 1950, p. 9) made the Commissioner's connection with the Board advisory only.

Under the Executive Reorganization Act of 1972 the Department of Labor continues to carry out Federal labor programs and enforce Georgia's Labor Laws. It was affected by only one change. The State Board of Workmen's Compensation, which operates independently but is attached to the Department of Labor, was affected by creation of a position of Director of Administration who is responsible for handling administrative functions of the agency. The Director will be both appointed and removed by the Board subject to approval of the Governor.

THE COMMISSIONER OF LABOR

The term of office of the Commissioner of Labor is for four years. He is elected by the voters at the same general election in which the Governor and other Executive Officers are elected. The minimum qualifications for the office are citizenship for ten years, residence in Georgia for six years and age of twenty-five years (Art. V, Sec. 2, Par. 4 of 1945 Constitution).

Under Secs. 54-119 and 54-628 of the 1933 Code, the Commissioner of labor has authority to appoint a secretary, a director of the Employment Security Agency, the heads of all divisions and bureaus and all other necessary personnel in the Department, except those under the Board of Workmen's Compensation. He is the custodian and administrator of the "unemployment compensation fund", which is a special fund, separate and apart from all public monies or funds of the State.

PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

After operating for sixty-six years under various Acts of the General Assembly, the Public Service Commission was re-created as a constitutional commission and its members were made constitutional officers by the Constitution of 1945 (Art. IV, Sec. 4, Par. 3). Among other powers, the Commission has powers of supervision and control, insofar as the public is in any way affected, over the intrastate operations of common and contract carriers of freight and passengers, public utilities (electric, gas, telephone and telegraph companies and radio common carriers). It fixes all rates and charges to be made by all of such corporations, evaluates the property of the same, determines what physical improvements can be made or curtailments allowed and approves all issues of bonds and stocks (Chap. 99-3 of 1933 Code).

The Public Service Commission consists of five members who are elected in the same general election in which other executive officers are elected. The terms of office are for six years each, staggered so that one vacancy occurs in one year, two in the second following year and two in the fourth following year. The minimum requirements for the office are that the member be at least thirty years of age, and without any interest of any kind in any company or business supervised by the Commission. The Commissioners elect one of their number as Chairman, to serve as such for two years. Vacancies in the Commission are filled by the Governor by appointments extending until the next general election. The Commission has authority to appoint the personnel necessary to conduct its manifold examination and investigations, and to enforce its rules and regulations. The Chairman of the Commission is, ex-officio, a member of the State Properties Commission, the Jekyll Island State Park Authority and the Stone Mountain Memorial Association.

CHAPTER II

STATE AGENCIES

DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

The Department of Administrative Services was created under the Executive Reorganization Act of 1972. The purpose of the Department is to provide administrative services to all State Departments, which include fiscal affairs, purchasing, printing, electronic data processing, communications, motor pools and other general services. A Commissioner, heading the Department, is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Governor, with confirmation by the Senate.

All functions previously performed by the State Purchasing Department and most functions of the State Treasurer were transferred into this Department. The Office of State Treasurer was abolished by Constitutional Amendment No. 5 (Act No. 250, SB 313) adopted in 1972. Also transferred to the Department were the functions of the State Communications Committee, the Advisory Council on Georgia Government Documents and self-insurance workmen's compensation from the State Highway Department. In addition, the Department assumed the functions of the Secretary of State relating to the inventory of real property.

The State Properties Commission and the State Depository Board were assigned to the Department for administrative purposes. Assigned for administrative purposes on an elective basis were: Georgia Education Authority (Schools); Georgia Building Authority; Georgia Building Authority (Hospitals); Georgia Building Authority (Markets) and Georgia Building Authority (Penal).

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES DIVISIONS:

OFFICE OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS — Larry L. Clark, Director. This division is responsible for coordinating all the activities and information programs of the Department with outside agencies. It contains the Small and Minority Business Program, the Department's legal unit, public relations and management analysis functions.

OFFICE OF INTERNAL ADMINISTRATION — Robert L. Mathis, Director. The Internal Administration Division provides centralized administrative support service for the Department. These services include accounting, payroll, budgeting, procurement, operations analysis, and contracts administration. Also, this office provides accounting, budgeting, and payroll services for the Superior Courts of Georgia.

OFFICE OF PERSONNEL SERVICES — Martha Drum Hazelton, Director. This office administers the comprehensive personnel program for the employees of the Department of Administrative Services. The program includes selection procedures, classification and compensation, career development, promotions, transfers, performance appraisal, employee relations activities, Merit System liaison, and Equal Employment Opportunity and Affirmative Action.

FISCAL DIVISION — Claude L. Vickers, Director. Fiscal Division responsibilities include accounting for the receipt and disbursement of public funds, investment of State funds, administration of the workmen's compensation program and the State's self-insurance program, administration of the retirement program and investment of funds for superior court judges and district attorneys, and investment of State employee insurance funds. The Fiscal Division is also responsible for the maintenance and development of all Statewide accounting and accounting related systems.

GENERAL SERVICES DIVISION — Richard J. Weiskittel, C.P.M., Director. The Division is a cluster of four support services necessary for the routine operation of the agencies of State government. **PRINTING SERVICES** provides general printing, binding, graphic design and typesetting, and quick turnaround rapid copy services. **MOTOR VEHICLE SERVICES** operates a vehicle rental service for state employees, a motor vehicle repair facility for state vehicles, and provides gasoline and oil services to state vehicles. They also develop policies for motor vehicle management and provide technical assistance concerning motor vehicle specifications and maintenance. **MAIL AND COURIER SERVICES** provides for the delivery of interoffice mail to agencies in the Capitol Hill area. Delivery services by courier are provided to agencies in the metro Atlanta area by contractual arrangement. **CENTRAL SUPPLY** purchases centrally, office, EDP, and paper supplies and sells them to State agencies, local governments, and local school systems at a cost savings.

INFORMATION AND COMPUTER SERVICES DIVISION — Robert L. Allen, Director. The responsibility for utilization of electronic data processing was assigned to the Department of Administrative Services. The Division was organized with the transfer of 570 personnel positions and all State-owned computer hardware except that owned by the Department of Labor and the University System. This Division performs services related to application systems design and development, computer operations and EDP Equipment acquisition.

PURCHASING AND SURPLUS PROPERTY DIVISION — Thomas M. Bostick, Director. The Division assumed all the duties and responsibilities of the Department of Purchasing and Supply. The Division directs and manages the State procurement program, an activity with an annual purchasing volume of goods and services exceeding three hundred million dollars. This Division is also responsible for the collection and disposal of all State-owned surplus property and distribution of federal surplus items to eligible State and Local Government units, private non-profit health, and educational agencies.

SPACE MANAGEMENT DIVISION — William D. Proctor, Director. This Division was established to manage the assignment, design and utilization of administrative space used

by State Agencies, and to acquire such space through a lease arrangement on an as-needed basis.

TELECOMMUNICATIONS DIVISION — George A. Christenberry, Jr. Director. The 1972 Reorganization Act transferred all of the functions of the State Communications Committee created in 1969 to the Department of Administrative Services. Under legislation established in 1973, the Department's Telecommunications Division has the full responsibility of designing, implementing and administering all telecommunication services used by State Government.

In 1975 and 1977 additional legislation was enacted broadening the area of the Division's responsibility. Now included are those of radio frequency planning and coordination for State and Local Governments and planning, reviewing, and coordinating the use of a Statewide emergency telephone number "911" system for all Governmental levels.

DEPARTMENT OF AUDITS

AUDITOR

The title and position of State Auditor, as head of the Department of Audits and Accounts, was first created by the Act of December 6, 1923 (GA. L. 1923, Ex. Sess., p. 7) and that Act and amending Acts are codified as Chapter 40-18 of the 1933 Code. The Auditor is elected by the vote of the House of Representatives and confirmed by the vote of the State Senate, and the issuance of his commission is a required ministerial duty of the Governor. His term of office continues until his successor is elected in like manner. A vacancy in the office when Legislature is not in session can be filled by appointment of the Governor until a successor is duly elected. The incumbent of the office must have had at least five years experience in this or similar governmental office, or as a certified public accountant. He is authorized to appoint an Assistant Auditor and other personnel necessary to the Department.

His duties are of high importance to the State and are very exacting. He must audit, at least once a year, the books and accounts of every State officer, department, agency, authority, board, commission and institution, and every local school system and official, and to that end he is given the power to conduct investigations and subpoena witnesses. He not only examines the cash accounts of those receiving money from the State, but also protects all physical properties purchased with State money. His audits and examinations, together with opinions and recommendations, are reported annually to the General Assembly and the Governor, as is also a detailed and comprehensive report of the salaries paid to and expenses incurred by every person on the payroll of the State.

Under various Acts of the General Assembly the Auditor is a member of the Governor's Mansion Committee, Highway Claims Committee, State Depository Board, Tax Settlement Board, Employees Retirement System, Board of Trustees, Committee to Plan General Assembly Committee Rooms, State Properties Control Commission, Georgia Building Authority, Georgia Education Authority (Schools), Georgia Education Authority (University), Georgia Building Authority (Hospital), Georgia Building Authority (Markets), State Financing and Investment Commission, Teachers' Retirement System Board of Trustees.

DEPARTMENT OF BANKING AND FINANCE

The Department of Banking and Finance was created by the Executive Reorganization Act of 1972. The chief officer of the Department is the Commissioner. The Department was assigned all of the duties and responsibilities formerly held by the Superintendent of Banks, the Department of Banking and the Georgia Building and Loan Commissioner. In this capacity the Department and the Commissioner have full and exclusive jurisdiction and supervision over all state chartered banks, bank holding companies, credit unions, holding companies, state savings and loan associations, and building and loan associations, as well as all money order companies, fiduciary investment companies and international banking agencies licensed to do business in Georgia. The Department is further responsible for supervising the activities of any business development corporations chartered pursuant to the Business Development Corporation Act of 1972.

The Department performs annual examinations of the books and records of all financial institutions within its jurisdiction and such institutions are required to file other reports throughout their business year. The Department has the authority to take possession of, close and liquidate any such financial institution which has been found to be insolvent, operating in an unsafe and unsound manner, or violating the provisions of its charter or the laws of Georgia. Every application for charter or other license to do business by such financial institutions is investigated carefully by the Department before the institution is permitted to engage in business. No change of the legal status or class of such institutions may be made without the prior consent of the Department.

The Commissioner is appointed by the Governor by and with the advice of the Senate for a four-year term of office. The minimum qualifications for the office include at least five years' experience in an executive position in bank management or bank supervision, and that the Commissioner be between 30 and 70 years of age. The Commissioner has the authority to appoint the Deputy Commissioner and to employ examiners and other necessary personnel as he may need to discharge the duties imposed on him by law.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

Created in 1977, the Department of Community Affairs is the successor agency to the Bureau of Community Affairs in the Department of Community Development. The Department was created in recognition of the needs local government had for an advocate within State government. The Department is charged with program planning and technical assistance to insure that cities and counties are prepared for physical and economic growth and development.

The Department also administers, on behalf of the state, several federal grant programs of primary benefit to local government better enabling the Department to provide a complete assistance program.

The Board of Community Affairs establishes policy and direction concerning the activities of the Department. The Commissioner is the chief executive and administrative head of the Department.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE

The Department of Defense was created by the Act of February 2, 1955 (Ga. L. 1955, p. 10). It consists of a Military Division and a Civil Defense Division. The Adjutant General is the executive head of the Military Division and is the Director of Civil Defense. The tenure of office of the Adjutant General is at the pleasure of the Governor.

Since the Constitution of 1777 (Art. XXXIII) the Governor has been Commander-in-Chief over all the militia and other military and naval forces of the State; the first enactment creating and regulating the militia was the Act of November 15, 1778. The only change throughout the years has been the evolution of the organized militia to the present National Guard. The title of The Adjutant General of the militia was created by the Act of December 24, 1792 and it has continued throughout all changes in the military and militia laws to the present. The latest law relating to the military establishments is the Act of February 2, 1955 (Ga. L. 1955, p. 10) which places under the Military Division of the Department of Defense the National Guard, the State Guard, the Naval Militia and the unorganized militia, of which only the National Guard is presently active. The executive head of the Department and the Military Division, subordinate only to the Commander-in-Chief, is The Adjutant General, who holds during his term of office the grade of Major General in the National Guard (Sec. 86-204 of the 1933 Ga. Code Ann.).

The Adjutant General is Chief of Staff to the Governor and is subordinate only to the Governor in matters pertaining to the Department of Defense and the Military and Naval affairs of the State. Upon appointment the Adjutant General must be between the age of 30 and 65 years, must have attained at least field grade or equivalent in the National Guard of the State or in the Armed Forces of the United States or a Reserve Component thereof and must have served not less than five years in one or more services.

The Governor shall appoint an Assistant Adjutant General for Army and an Assistant Adjutant General for Air, to assist The Adjutant General in the discharge and performance of his duties. Each shall, upon appointment, be a federally recognized officer with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel or higher, with not less than five years of continuous service in the Army or Air National Guard of Georgia. An officer who has retired or resigned from the National Guard shall be eligible for appointment as Assistant Adjutant General for Army or Air, as appropriate, provided that said officer shall have served not less than five years in a federally recognized status in the active Army or Air National Guard, as appropriate, and attained the rank of Lieutenant Colonel or higher, and provided further the appointment of said officer shall be within five years of the date of his retirement or resignation and prior to his attaining age 60. Each of the said Assistant Adjutants General shall have the rank of Brigadier General. Assistant Adjutants General shall hold no other State office and they shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor.

The Civil Defense Division was created by the Civil Defense Act of 1951. The mission of Civil Defense as defined in the Civil Defense Act of 1951, as amended, means the preparation for the carrying out of all emergency functions, other than functions for which military forces are primarily responsible to prevent, minimize, and repair injury and damage resulting

from emergencies, energy emergencies, or disasters, or the imminent threat thereof, of man-made or natural origin, caused by enemy attack, sabotage, civil disturbance, fire, flood, earthquake, wind, storm, wave action, oil spill, or other water contamination requiring emergency action to avert danger or damage, epidemic, air contamination, blight, drought, infestation, explosion, riot, or other hostile action, or other causes. These functions include, without limitation, fire fighting services, police services, medical and health services, rescue, engineering, warning services, communications, defense from radiological, chemical and other special weapons, evacuation of persons from stricken areas, emergency welfare services, emergency transportation, plant protection, temporary restoration of public utility services, and other functions related to civilian protection, together with all other activities necessary or incidental to the preparation for and carrying out of the foregoing functions. The Governor shall appoint a Deputy Directory of Civil Defense to assist the Director in the Discharge and performance of his duties. He shall hold office during the pleasure of the Governor and shall hold no other State office.

An internal reorganization of the Department of Defense establishing a separate division designated the Administrative Services Division, was made effective 1 October 1974 by The Adjutant General/Civil Defense Director. The Administrative Services Division was established to assure the proper placement of responsibility and accountability for the administrative staff functions of the Department, and to consolidate vital staff services for more effective and efficient administration. A classified position designated the Director of Administrative Services (DoD) was established concurrent with the organization of this separate division.

The Administrative Services Division is charged by The Adjutant General/Civil Defense Director to provide support services in the areas of accounting, budgeting, auditing, inventory management, finance, personnel, management analysis, Federal funding programs and procedures, and planning, operation, and control of the broad, complex activities of the Department.

EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM

The Employees' Retirement System was created by the Act of February 3, 1949 (Ga. L. 1949, p. 138) which Act has been amended at each subsequent session of the General Assembly. As stated in the Act, the Employees' Retirement System was "established and placed under a board of Trustees, for the purpose of providing retirement allowances and other benefits for employees of the State of Georgia and political subdivisions thereof" (Chap. 40-25, 1933 Code.).

The System is named as the State Agency to administer the Social Security Program extending to employees of the State and its political subdivisions the basic protection accorded by the Old Age and Survivors Insurance System embodied in the Federal Social Security Act (Ga. L. 1953, Nov.-Dec. Sess., p. 294).

The System also administers the program of Group Term Life Insurance to its members through a contract with State Employees Assurance Department (Ga. Laws 1953, Jan.-Feb. Sess., p. 323).

Ga. L. 1967, p. 259; Ga. L. 1971, p. 107-11; Ga. L. 1980, p. 611, designate the Board of Trustees of the Employees' Retirement System as the Board of Trustees of the Legislative Retirement System. The Board also serves as the Board of Trustees for the Trial Judges and Solicitors Retirement Fund, as well as Board of Trustees of the Public School Employees' Retirement System (Ga. L. 1968, p. 259).

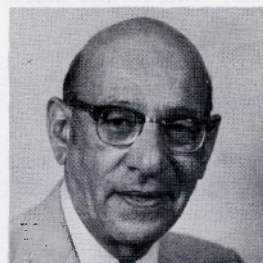
The Board of Trustees has authority to employ an Executive Secretary, an actuary, a medical board and all other necessary personnel. The Attorney General acts as its legal advisor.

STATE FORESTRY COMMISSION

The Forestry Commission was created by the Act of February 25, 1949 (Ga. L. 1949, p. 1079) which specified that the Commission, by and with the advice of the Governor, should appoint a Director as its executive secretary and administrative officer. The powers and duties of the Forestry Commission are largely the same as those set up for the former Division of Forestry by the Act of March 5, 1937 (Ga. L. 1937, p. 264). The Commission is required to promote and aid forest farming and nursery work, planting, management and protection of forests, and marketing of farm products. It is charged with the duty of administering and enforcing the "Forest Fire Protection" Act of February 23, 1949 (Chap. 43-2 of the 1933 Code). In the furtherance of its work it is authorized to receive and expend all Federal and State appropriations and allotments made for those purposes.

The Commission is composed of five non-salaried members, three being owners of forest land and two being connected with the lumber industry, all appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.

The creating Act provided that the Director have all of the powers of the Commission when the latter is not in session, and administer its policies as well as make the rules and regulations to enforce the same. He has authority to appoint assistants, foresters and other necessary personnel, subject to the approval of the Commission.

GEORGIA BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

The Georgia Bureau of Investigation was first created as a part of the Department of Public Safety, Ga. Laws 1937, p. 322. Ga. Laws 1974, p. 109, Code Chapter 92A-301 et seq, recreated the Georgia Bureau of Investigation as a separated department and agency of state government. The Bureau includes the Investigative Division, the Georgia Crime Information Center and the State Crime Laboratory.

The Bureau is governed by the Board of Public Safety which is composed of nine members who are: Ex-officio, the Governor (Chairman), the Attorney General and the Commissioner of the Department of Offender Rehabilitation; one member of the Georgia Sheriffs' Association; one member of the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police; one member of the District Attorneys' Association; and three members at large. The Director, who is the chief administrative officer is both appointed and removed by the Board of Public Safety with the approval of the Governor.

INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

Provides special criminal investigative support services to local law enforcement agencies throughout the state of Georgia. With thirteen regional offices located strategically throughout the state and special statewide squads headquartered in Atlanta, the Investigative Division responds to requests from sheriffs, municipal law enforcement agencies and judicial officials.

Among the special support services provided are: polygraph examiner services, identi-kit operator services, criminal intelligence services, crime prevention staff services, liaison with law enforcement agencies outside the state, police training and coordination of criminal investigations of particular interest to local law enforcement agencies when those investigations transcend county lines.

GEORGIA CRIME INFORMATION CENTER

A statewide technical and information service to Georgia's criminal justice community. As the focal point for the Georgia Criminal Justice Information System, GCIC collects, stores and disseminates computerized information about crime and criminals. GCIC is the central state repository for fingerprint processing, computerized criminal history, uniform crime reports, and case disposition reports. In addition, GCIC provides the services of its Data Communications System to over 300 Georgia criminal justice agencies through computer terminals. This provides these agencies with the means to be linked to the National Crime Information Center (NCIC); to other states; to GCIC's files on stolen vehicles, articles, guns and wanted/missing persons; and to the state's Vehicle Registration Files.

GEORGIA CRIME LABORATORY

Larimore B. Howard, Director

This is one of the largest and oldest Crime Labs in the United States. The Laboratory offers total scientific backup to the Criminal Justice System in all areas of forensic science through its facilities in Atlanta, Augusta, Columbus, Moultrie and Savannah. Major Crime Lab divisions include Criminalistics, Drug Identification, Handwriting, Latent Prints, Pathology, Photography, Serology and Toxicology.

DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES

The Georgia Department of Human Resources is the agency of state government which has primary responsibility for the delivery of health and social services. It is estimated that the Department serves more than one million people through its various direct service and financial assistance programs. When the various public health and disease prevention programs are considered, Georgia's five and one-half million citizens benefit from the services of the department.

The various programs which are administered by the department are organized in five divisions. These include the divisions of Public Health, Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Rehabilitation Services, Family and Children's Services and Youth Services. An Office of Aging and an Office of Children and Youth exist to coordinate departmental planning and service delivery to these groups. With more than 28,000 state and county employees who work in 100 human services programs, in 1500 locations and in all 159 counties, the department is the largest and most complex of the departments which comprise Georgia's state government.

DHR was created by the Georgia General Assembly in an act entitled the Governmental Reorganization Act of 1972. The Act consolidated the Departments of Public Health and Public Welfare in addition to many other state human services programs in a single umbrella agency. The intent of this action was realized in July, 1972, when the Board of Human Resources directed the establishment of a policy for achieving an integrated services delivery system. Through this policy, Georgians have the opportunity to receive services which are efficiently and effectively administered in communities where they live.

DHR recognizes the complexity of the services it offers and the resulting need to provide opportunities for citizens to advise and participate in planning and service delivery. Among the

many citizen advisory councils which are established for these purposes are those which relate to aging services, developmental disabilities, family planning, maternal and infant health, child care and development, and mental health and mental retardation. The department routinely conducts annual budget hearings and community meetings for the additional expression of citizens' needs and concerns. Hundreds of citizens volunteer their time in various service activities across the state. More than 4000 citizens took advantage of the opportunity to express their concerns to department staff in fifteen community forums across the state in the fall of 1982.

DHR is responsible for maintaining high standards of quality in the services which it delivers directly and also for supporting the efforts of private health and social services agencies to develop and sustain the quality of their efforts. DHR's numerous and diverse licensing and regulatory responsibilities relate to child caring centers and institutions, hospitals, nursing homes, home health agencies, ambulatory surgical centers, eye banks, renal dialysis clinics, rural health clinics, rehabilitation centers, laboratories and blood banks.

DHR's chief executive officer, the Commissioner of Human Resources, is appointed by and accountable to the State Board of Human Resources. This 15 member board is appointed by the Governor to provide general oversight of the agency's activities. This responsibility is carried out primarily through the establishment of policy, approval of agency goals and objectives, and other appropriate activities.

DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRY AND TRADE

The Department of Industry and Trade is the State economic development agency responsible for the development of new and expanded industry; the promotion of international trade and the sale of Georgia products overseas; and the administration of Georgia's tourism advertising and development program. The department operates 10 Georgia Welcome Centers which promote Georgia's tourist attractions to travelers. In addition, the department also promotes Georgia as a location for film making and television productions.

The Department is administered by a Board of Industry and Trade which is the policy determining body and has such duties, powers, authority and jurisdiction as provided by law. The Board appoints the commissioner who serves as the executive officer and administrative head of the Department.

The Department of Industry and Trade is the successor to the former Department of Commerce. It was changed in 1972 to a bureau within the Department of Community Development, then back to a separate department in 1976.

DEPARTMENT OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE

The Department of Medical Assistance was known as the Bureau of Medical Assistance within the Department of Human Resources until it was made a separate Department by the Georgia Medical Assistance Act of 1977-Executive Reorganization Act of 1972 Amended, Ga. Laws 1977, p. 384, et. seq. The Department is authorized to adopt and administer a State Plan for Medical Assistance in accordance with Title XIX of the Federal Social Security Act of 1973, as amended (Act of July 30, 1965, Pub. Law 89-97, 79 Stat. 343, as amended), provided such State Plan is administered within the appropriations made available to the Department. The Department is authorized to establish the amount, duration, scope, and terms and conditions of eligibility for and receipt of such medical assistance as it may elect to authorize pursuant to this Act.

The Act created a Board of Medical Assistance which is empowered to establish the general policy to be followed by the Department.

The Act created the position of Commissioner of Medical Assistance. The Commissioner is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the Governor.

Commissioner's Office

The Commissioner of Medical Assistance, subject to the general policy established by the Board, supervises, directs, accounts for, organizes, plans, administers and executes the functions vested in the Department. All legal responsibility for the Title XIX Program falls on this office, as well as administrative support to the Board. Of the functions under the direct supervision of the Commissioner's Office are: (a) Investigation and Compliance Unit that investigates fraud and abuse as related to the Medical Assistance Program, along with being responsible for internal security; (b) Quality Control Unit which monitors the administration of the Program by reviewing the eligibility status of sample cases, reviewing paid claims, and third party recovery efforts; (c) Benefits Recovery Unit that maximizes the use of program funds through cost containment measures and post-payment review.

Program Operations

The functions of this Section are: (a) to prepare and adjudicate claims for payment in an efficient and timely manner; (b) to maintain the provider, recipient and reference subsystem of the Medical Management Information System (MMIS) which are essential to processing and payment of claims (Payment must be made within complex Federal and State regulations, as well as Program policies.); (c) to maintain a close relation with the Department of Administrative Services which provides data processing services necessary for data entry, production control/scheduling, programming, etc.; (d) to expedite the payment/rejection of claims which are placed in "suspense" due to program edits which ensure proper payment; (e) to identify system and programming problems which cause backlogs or erroneous payments and to recommend solutions to these problems; (f) enrollment and recipient policy; and (g) provider claims inquiry.

Program Administration

This Section is responsible for all the financial and support functions to the Program Operations and Program Management Sections. Services include overall section direction, budgeting, financial analysis, and cost-related reimbursement policy development; planning, evaluation and research; staff development and training; computer support; and Surveillance and Utilization Review.

Program Management

The functions of this Section are: (a) the formulation of the policies that govern the reimbursement for services rendered by Medicaid providers; (b) policy development; (c) policy planning; (d) interpretation of Federal regulations; (e) determination of the scope of services; and (f) coordination with provider associations and professional organizations for each of the fourteen (14) program areas within the Medical Assistance Program.

MERIT SYSTEM OF PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATION

PERSONNEL BOARD

STATE MERIT SYSTEM OF

PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATION

The Act of February 4, 1943 (Ga. L. 1943, p. 171) established the State Merit System of Personnel Administration under a three member Merit System Council appointed by the Governor for five year terms. The Merit System Council was responsible for the administration of the Merit System law covering employees in the State and County Departments of Welfare, the State and local departments of Health and The State Employment Security Agency of the State Department of Labor. The Merit System Council adopted a classification and pay plan and established rules and regulations covering all phases of personnel administration, including the appointment of a Director and other necessary personnel.

The 1945 Constitution (Art. XIV, Sec. 1, Par. 1) established a State Personnel Board to administer the Merit System of Personnel Administration under which State personnel shall be selected on a basis of merit, fitness and efficiency according to law. The Personnel Board is composed of three members appointed by the Governor with the advice of the Senate for seven-year terms.

Although it might appear that the Council and the Board are both functioning, the Attorney General furnished the Governor with an opinion on October 24, 1945 to the effect that (1) the Merit System Council had been supplanted by the state Personnel Board; (2) the latter had the powers and duties originally vested in the former; (3) the latter was authorized and empowered to administer the Merit System; (4) the official transfer of powers and duties could be accomplished by executive order. Upon such an executive order being issued, the State Personnel Board, in November, 1945, adopted all rules and regulations and ratified all appointments and other official Acts of the former Merit System Council.

Act 12 (Ga. Laws 1971, pp. 45-55) completely revised and consolidated the laws relating to the State Personnel Board and the State Merit System. The Reorganization Act (Ga. Laws 1972, p. 1015) reduced the number of departments to 25. Act 81 (Ga. Laws 1975, pp. 79-94) completely revised and consolidated the laws relating to the State Personnel Board and State Merit System. The Board was increased from 3 to 5 members by the Constitution of 1976 (Art. IV, Sec. VI, Par. 1). The system has grown from a coverage in 1943 of 1,609 employees in three agencies to a coverage of approximately 49,000 employees in 31 agencies.

The Board, through the Commissioner of Personnel Administration and adoption of Merit System Rules and Regulations, governs all phases of personnel administration including such things as recruitment, appointments, promotions, transfers, demotions, separations, job classification, salary and wage administration, leave of absence, training, prohibition of political activity, employee appeals, affirmative action, job counseling, coordinates programs available under the Intergovernmental Personnel Act of 1970 and establishes a career development and manpower planning program. The Board, through the Commissioner of Personnel Administration, also administers an employees health insurance program covering essentially all state officials and employees, members of the General Assembly, employees of the County Boards of Health and County Departments of Family and Children Services, and public

school teachers.

TRAINING & ORGANIZATION DEVELOPMENT, L. Douglas Wilson, Director. Division administers Management Development Programs, Employee Training Programs and Employee Management Relations Program including Employee/Management Counselling, Technical Assistance, Faithful Service Awards, Employee Suggestions and Public Information.

DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES

The Department of Natural Resources was created by the Executive Reorganization Act of 1972 (Ga. L. 1972, p. 1015-1075). The Act consolidated 33 separate agencies into one department with four major divisions. The divisions exercise stewardship over the State's natural resources, with their major functions, briefly stated, being to protect and guide the development of the State's natural, historic and recreational resources.

The Board of Natural Resources is charged with all the policy-making functions which were previously granted by law to those agencies whose functions were transferred to the Department of Natural Resources.

The Commissioner of the Department of Natural Resources is appointed and removed by the Board of Natural Resources, subject to the approval of the Governor. The Commissioner administers the many and varied activities of the Department and carries out Departmental policies established by the Board of Natural Resources.

The Environmental Protection Division is a regulatory agency responsible for maintaining and improving environmental quality as it pertains to air, land and water quality standards. The Game and Fish Division is charged with maintenance and protection of the State's wildlife resources through the application of sound wildlife management principles. The Parks, Recreation and Historic Sites Division of the Department preserves and protects natural areas of unique or exceptional scenic value, protects and maintains historic sites of Statewide significance and operates state parks to provide recreational use.

The Coastal Resources Division is responsible for managing the state's renewable and non-renewable resources on the seacoast, such as marine and estuarine fisheries and shore, beach, and tidal wetlands protection.

Internal Administration of the department is the direct responsibility of the Deputy Commissioner for Administration. Support is provided for the line divisions by this office in the areas of accounting, audits, general services and personnel. Included is the development, through coordination, of the department's budget package. The Office of Public Information, including the motion picture film unit which distributes information about the department's programs, plans and activities is also the responsibility of the Deputy Commissioner.

The Directors of the Divisions and Offices are appointed and removed by the Commissioner of the Department. The only exception is the Director of the Environmental Protection Division, who is appointed and removed by the Board, with the approval of the Governor. The Directors are immediately responsible to the Commissioner for the activities and functions of their Divisions.

DEPARTMENT OF OFFENDER REHABILITATION

The Department of Offender Rehabilitation is responsible for securely housing the incarcerated male and female offender committed to the Board of Offender Rehabilitation and the provision of effective rehabilitation programs designed to prepare offenders for eventual release to free society. The department is also charged with providing supervision and rehabilitation services to state probationers and oversees the development and management of a network of diversion and transitional centers within the community for both male and female offenders.

The Board of Offender Rehabilitation is composed of nine members appointed by the Governor and approved by the Senate, who serve staggered terms of four years.

STATE BOARD OF PARDONS AND PAROLES

The State Board of Pardons and Paroles is composed of five members appointed by the Governor for seven-year terms subject to confirmation by the State Senate. Each year the Board elects one of its members to serve as Chairman.

The Board was established in 1943 with its authority founded in the Georgia Constitution. Its existence ensures that the executive branch of government, in addition to the legislative and judicial, has a discretionary role in criminal justice. Thus in Georgia's justice system the Board provides a vital part of the checks and balances deemed so important by the framers of the State Constitution and reflecting the genius of the Constitution of the United States.

The Board has Constitutional authority to grant paroles, pardons, and reprieves, to commute and remit sentences, and to remove disabilities imposed by law. It has authority and staff to investigate cases and to supervise persons granted conditional clemency.



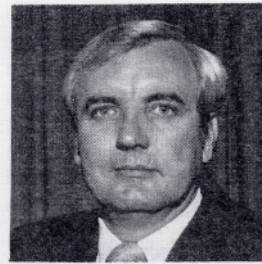

GEORGIA PORTS AUTHORITY

The Georgia Ports Authority was created as a public corporation, with perpetual existence, by the act of March 9, 1945 (Ga. L. 1945, p. 464) as amended by the Act of Feb. 1, 1955 (Ga. L. 1955, p. 120; Chap. 98-2 of the 1933 Code.) It is an instrumentality of the State, but without power to bind the State for any debt or obligation which it may incur. The primary purposes for which the Georgia Ports Authority was created are the development and expansion of shipping and commerce through the harbors and seaports of the State. Thus, it has power to acquire, build and operate wharves, docks, warehouses, ships, elevators and all other types of plants needed to round out its program; and it may sell or rent any of such projects when it is advantageous to do so. To finance any or all of its projects, it can raise its capital subject to the approval of the Georgia State Financing & Investment Commission, and, in general, function just as does any private corporation.

The Georgia Ports Authority operates deepwater facilities at the Ports of Savannah and Brunswick and inland barge terminals at Augusta, Bainbridge and Columbus, with solicitation

offices in Atlanta; New York; Chicago; Geneva, Switzerland; Tokyo, Japan and Athens, Greece.

The Authority consists of seven non-salary members, all appointed by the Governor for four-year terms, which are staggered. The members perform the functions of officers of a private corporation, and any 5 can constitute a quorum for doing business. They elect their own chairman and they employ and regulate the salaries and pay of all employees.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Department of Public Safety was created by the Act of March 19, 1937 (Ga. L. 1937, p. 322) but the Act has been amended several times since its passage. The Department includes the following Divisions: Fiscal, Driver Support, Personnel and Training, and Georgia State Patrol, the members of which are uniformed and designated by grades and ranks similar to the military.

The Department of Public Safety has primary responsibility for the patrol of all public roads and highways in Georgia to enforce the traffic laws of the state and to prevent, detect, and

investigate criminal acts performed on these highways or on state-owned property, including the arrest of those charged with committing such criminal acts. Additionally, the Department is empowered to enforce statutory laws of the state as to length, size, and weight of motor vehicles and trailers on public highways.

The Department is also responsible for administering the Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law and the No-Fault Insurance Law, which requires that the operator of every motor vehicle involved in an accident within Georgia in which any person is killed or injured or in which property damage exceeds \$250 must report to the Department, which will then determine adequate security and financial responsibility unless evidence of automobile liability insurance is present.

The Department is responsible for formulating rules and regulations under which drivers' licenses shall be granted, suspended, revoked or canceled, under classes and guidelines set forth by statute. The Department additionally administers these rules and regulations, and is the issuing agency for drivers' licenses to operate vehicles on the public highways of Georgia.

All persons, firms and companies engaged in the sale of pistols, revolvers, or short barreled firearms must be licensed by the Department.

A 24-hour communication network is maintained by the Department providing communication to and from all law enforcement agencies within the state as well as a nationwide communication system to and from law enforcement agencies of each state.

The Board of Public Safety shall establish the general policy to be followed by the Department of Public Safety. The Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of Offender Rehabilitation serve as ex-officio members. Other members include representatives of the Georgia Sheriffs' Association, the Georgia Association of Chiefs of Police and the District Attorneys' Association of Georgia, plus three members from the state at large.

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

and

REVENUE COMMISSIONER

The Department of Revenue and the office of Revenue Commissioner, as its head, were created by the Act of Jan. 3, 1938 (Ga. L. 1937-38 Ex. Sess., p. 77, Chap. 92-84 of 1933 Code) but throughout the Act all provisions refer to the Commissioner rather than to the Department. The Department is the tax-collecting agency for the State and among the principal taxes collected are those on sales, motor fuel, income, alcoholic beverages, cigars, and cigarettes, property, motor vehicle licenses and estates. It is the Commissioner's duty to administer all tax laws and he is empowered to make all rules and regulations necessary to the enforcement of those laws, including inspections and investigations when he deems them to be in the interest of the State. He also has authority to employ all personnel necessary for the functioning of the Department. He is empowered and it is made his duty to enforce all laws and regulations pertaining to the control of alcoholic beverages within the State. In addition to other duties assigned to the Commissioner, it is specifically provided that he shall direct that appropriate legal action be taken to enforce the revenue laws of Georgia; shall request the Attorney general to command the services of county attorney or solicitor general or to supply legal assistance from the Department of Law; shall supervise all administration throughout the State, subject, however, to the sovereign rights of the counties to regulate their own affairs, shall make thorough study of taxation in Georgia and elsewhere with a view to improvement of administration and legislation affecting the people of Georgia; shall make an annual report to the Governor and a biennial report to each regular session of the General Assembly; shall publish such regulations, statistics and other reports as he may deem wise within the limitations of his appropriation; shall assist local tax officials in every feasible manner when so requested by such official; and shall, as responsible revenue official of the State, advise the governor on all matters relating to revenue.

The Revenue Commissioner is appointed by the Governor and serves at the pleasure of the Governor. The Act of February 21, 1951 provided that the Commissioner can appoint a Deputy Revenue Commissioner to whom he may delegate such duties and powers as he sees fit.

The Revenue Commissioner is an ex-officio member of the State Depository Board and is chairman and administrative officer of the State Tax Settlement and Compromise Board and of the State Board of Equalization. He also serves as an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid Transit Authority.

STATE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

The purpose of the board is to settle and compromise any tax assessment where the collection of the tax is questionable and the settlement or compromise is in the best interest of the State; to approve property tax assessments for taxpayers who return property to the State Revenue Commissioner, and to hear all appeals by those taxpayers from said assessments. Members include: Attorney General; State Revenue Commissioner; Chairman, House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee; Chairman, Senate Finance Committee; State Auditor.

ORGANIZATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

In addition to the offices of State Revenue Commissioner and Deputy Revenue Commissioner, the principal organizational unit of the Department of Revenue is the "division." The Department is currently organized into nine divisions with the following functions:

ADMINISTRATIVE, H. Randall Jones, Administrative Deputy Commissioner

Provides support services which include special investigations, accounting services, personnel and training, fiscal operations, research and planning, public information, internal audit and management review for the Department of Revenue.

CENTRAL AUDIT, Ben McLaughlin, Director

Utilizes a staff of professional tax specialists to audit tax accounts (Income, Sales, Motor Fuel and Alcohol). Audits are performed both within the state and throughout the nation.

FIELD SERVICES, John S. Smith, Director

Provides taxpayer information and assistance at nine regional office locations. Continuously examines taxpayer registrations, compliance with filing deadlines, and collects all delinquent accounts. The Field Services Division also includes the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Unit, which enforces all laws and regulations pertaining to the manufacture, possession, transportation, and sale of alcoholic beverages within the State. The Unit is charged with licensing the sale of distilled spirits, malt beverages, wine, cigars, and cigarettes. The Unit has the responsibility for enforcing Motor Fuel Tax laws.

INCOME TAX, John Carter, Director

Administers the Income Tax laws imposed on net income of individuals, fiduciaries and corporations; administers the Corporation Occupation or License Tax. Maintains liaison with the Legislative Branch of State Government. Issues regulations pertaining to Income Tax and manages all taxpayer protests and hearings.

INTERNAL ADMINISTRATION, Robert L. Wilkes, Director

Provides supporting services to other Divisions of the Department. Included are centralized processing, cashiering,

and accounting activities, procurement and records management, mail handling, supplies, and other support functions.

MOTOR VEHICLE, Neal Dettmering, Director

Provides supporting services to other Divisions of the Department. Included are centralized processing, cashiering and accounting activities, procurement and records management, management analysis and coordination of Revenue computer and printing activities. Issues license tags and certificates of title and records liens and security information on all vehicles registered in the State of Georgia. Provides information on all vehicles for local and state enforcement agencies.

MOTOR FUEL TAX, Curtis Modling, Director

Administers all laws for Motor Fuel Tax, Motor Carrier Fuel Tax, and Highway Use Tax and maintains liaison with the Legislative Branch of State Government. The Division is charged with licensing Motor Fuel distributors and permitting motor carriers. Also, the Division issues regulations and manages all taxpayer protests and hearings pertaining to Motor Fuel laws.

PROPERTY TAX, C. Hart Pearson, Director

Administers all laws and regulations with respect to Property Tax. This Division is charged with the overall supervision of the Ad Valorem tax including the approval of all county tax digests, the assessment of all public utility property, the preparation of the assessment manual for motor vehicle property and the administration of county property revaluation programs. This Division also administers the Intangible Tax, and the Real Estate Transfer Tax. Also, this Division administers laws and regulations as set forth in the Unclaimed Property Act.

SALES AND USE TAX, Chandler Hewell, Director

Administers all laws for Sales and Use Tax, and maintains liaison with the Legislative Branch of State Government. Issues regulations pertaining to Sales and Use Tax and manages all taxpayer protests, exemptions and hearings. The Sales and Use Tax Division administers and collects the local option sales tax for participating counties and cities and the rapid transit sales tax for DeKalb and Fulton counties. The Division also separately accounts for the three percent sales and use tax on motor fuel purchases.

GEORGIA STUDENT FINANCE COMMISSION

The Georgia Student Finance Commission is the successor to the Georgia State Scholarship Commission that was created by an Act approved March 12, 1965 (Ga. Laws 1965, p. 210) and was designated a state department of government by the Reorganization Act of 1972. The name was changed by Ga. Laws 1980, p. 835.

The Commission and its two companion agencies, the Georgia Higher Education Assistance Corporation (created by an Act approved March 12, 1965, Ga. Laws 1965, p. 217) and the Georgia Student Finance Authority (Ga. Laws 1969, p. 683) administer programs of student financial assistance for Georgia residents who are pursuing education beyond the high school

level. The Commission coordinates the administration of six student aid programs:

1. Student Incentive Grants for residents of the state who demonstrate substantial financial need. Since 1977, all undergraduate classification students at colleges and vocational schools in Georgia are eligible to apply.
2. Direct loans to Georgia residents. Recipients of direct loans through the Georgia Student Finance Authority may repay the state in service if they complete an educational program in an occupational area designated by the Commission as critically short of manpower. Other recipients repay in cash at eight percent interest.
3. Tuition Equalization Grants for Georgia residents attending Georgia private colleges and universities. Residents of the state enrolled as full-time students at approved and accredited private colleges and universities in Georgia may be eligible to receive annual grants which require no repayment to the state.
4. Law Enforcement Personnel Dependents Scholarships. Dependents of killed or permanently disabled policemen, firemen, prison personnel and other law enforcement personnel may be eligible to receive non-repayable student aid through the Commission.
5. Guaranteed Student Loans from commercial lenders. The Georgia Higher Education Assistance Corporation guarantees loans made to Georgia students by banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions participating in the loan program.
6. North Georgia College ROTC Grants. Students enrolled at North Georgia College in the Army Reserve Officers Training Corps may be eligible to receive non-repayable student aid from the Georgia Student Finance Authority.

Efficient administration of the programs requires activity at several stages of the educational financial aid procedure. The Commission maintains statewide dissemination of information utilizing various media. The recruitment of individuals into critical career areas is emphasized. One functional division of the Commission facilitates the process of applying for aid through the department. Another division is charged with the control and disbursement of funds. The collection of payments on direct or defaulted loans is increasingly important; and, providing a base of support is the use of electronic data processing technology.

The Commission consists of fifteen members, one from each congressional district appointed by the Governor, two from the state-at-large appointed by the Governor, and three statutory members: the state budget officer, the superintendent of schools and the chancellor of the University System of Georgia. Appointed members of the Commission serve six-year terms. Members of the Commission also serve as directors of the boards of the Georgia Student Finance Authority and Georgia Higher Education Assistance Corporation.

The Executive Director serves at the pleasure of the Members of the Commission and is the administrator and executive officer of the entire department. The Executive Director is also Treasurer of the Commission and its companion agencies.

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

The State Highway Department was originally created by Ga. L. 1916, p. 125. The present State Department of Transportation was created by Ga. L. 1972, p. 1015. The five Divisions in the Department are responsible for planning, and in many cases constructing air, water and rail transportation systems in a manner that assures their complementing each other. In addition, the Divisions have responsibility for cooperative

planning and/or implementation of public transportation systems for the State. The DOT has jurisdiction and control over the construction and maintenance of all roads and bridges on the State Highway System. Roads not on the State System may be improved by the DOT to the extent that funds are available, but the construction and maintenance of such roads are primarily the responsibility of the counties or cities in which they are located. The DOT also has jurisdiction and control over all State and Federal-aid funds appropriated for highway purposes except state funds rebated directly to counties from the state motor fuel tax. General funds are granted directly to cities through the DOT budget.

Commissioner of Department of Transportation

The Commissioner is the chief executive officer of the Department of Transportation. He has power and authority over the operations of the Department, with full authority to execute contracts and all other undertakings. The Commissioner has custody, control and supervision of the expenditures of all State Highway funds. He also has the power and responsibility for the employment of personnel.

Beginning in 1967 and in subsequent years, the Commissioner shall be elected by a majority vote of the members of the State Transportation Board present and voting, and shall serve for a term of four years and until his successor is elected by the Board and qualified (Ga. Code Ann. Sec. 95A 308).

The Commissioner also serves as a member of the Georgia Highway Authority (Sec. 95A-1203); a member of the State Tollway Authority (Sec. 95A-1240); a member of MARTA Board (Ga. L. 1976, p. 217).

State Board of Transportation

The Board, presided over by the Chairman, has the power and authority to formulate broad policy and the Commissioner has power and authority over the operations of the Department of Transportation. The Board shall meet in regular session one day in each month, and at such other special meetings as may be called by the Commissioner of the Department, or a majority of the members of the Board.

THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM OF GEORGIA AND BOARD OF REGENTS

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia is charged with the constitutional responsibility of governing, controlling and managing the University System and all of its institutions. (Constitution, State of Georgia of 1982, Art. VIII, Sec. IV, Par. 1).

The University System of Georgia consists of eighteen universities and senior colleges and fifteen junior colleges. These institutions offer comprehensive programs of instruction, research and public service, and are located throughout the state so that approximately 96 percent of the people of Georgia live within 35 miles of at least one of the institutions.

The fifteen-member Board of Regents includes one member from each of the congressional districts and five members from the state-at-large. The members, who serve seven year terms, are appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the State Senate. Two members of the Board are appointed each year; one additional member is appointed one year during each seven-year period.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS SERVICE

The Department of Veterans Service was created by the Act of March 8, 1945 (Ga. L. 1945, p. 319) and it was made a constitutional body by the 1945 Constitution (Art. V, Sec. 6). It is the duty of the Department to furnish information to the veterans of all wars, their dependents or beneficiaries, as to their

rights and benefits under Federal and State laws, to assist them in the preparation and prosecution of claims for the same, and generally to do all things necessary for the interest and protection of Georgia veterans. The services rendered relate not only to death and disability claims, but also to educational training facilities, health, medical and rehabilitation services, housing services, employment services and other benefits. The Department serves as the State Approving Agency for the G.I. Educational Program (Chaps. 78-4 and 78-4A of the 1933 Code). The functions, duties, powers and authority imposed by law upon the State Division of Confederate Pensions and Records transferred to the Department of Veterans Service (Ga. L. 1960, p. 882). The functions, duties, powers and authority imposed by law upon the Veterans' Home Commission transferred to the Veterans Service Board to provide that the Georgia State War Home facilities shall be under the control and administration of the Veterans Service Board (Ga. L. 1960, p. 1150).

Under the Reorganization Act of 1972, the Department of Veterans Service retained the same responsibilities to insure that veterans receive the benefits and services to which they are entitled. In addition, functions of the Department of Family and Children Services pertaining to the nursing home care of widows of Confederate veterans were transferred to Veterans Service.

The Board of Veterans Service consists of seven non-salaried members, all of whom must be veterans, appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. The Board elects its chairman and secretary from its membership. It is the duty of the Board to promulgate all rules and regulations necessary to accomplish its objectives. It elects the Commissioner for a four-year term.

The Commissioner is the executive officer of the Department and is charged with the duty of administering and enforcing all rules and regulations made by the Board. He is empowered to employ all necessary personnel and to maintain branch offices throughout the State for the convenience of veterans.

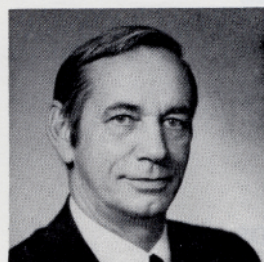

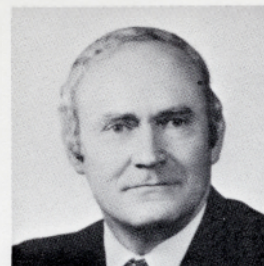

WORKERS' COMPENSATION MEDICAL BOARD

The Act of January 31, 1946 (Ga. L. 1946, p. 103) created a Medical Board to which the Board of Workers' Compensation must refer all controverted medical issues in claims involving occupational disease and disabilities (Secs. 114-822 and 114-823 of the 1933 Code). The findings of this Medical Board after hearings duly had are conclusive upon the Board of Workers' Compensation, but are subject to review and appeal in the same manner as are other questions of fact. The Medical Board is not subordinate to the Board of Workers' Compensation but is independent thereof, even though the latter Board pays the fees and expenses of its members and even though it functions only for the guidance and assistance of the latter Board in a specified class of claims.

The Medical Board consists of five qualified physicians appointed by the Governor upon nomination by the Medical Association of Georgia, or if the Association fails to nominate, then upon the nomination of the Board of Workers' Compensation. The terms of office are for two years each, staggered so that two vacancies occur in one year and three in the following year.

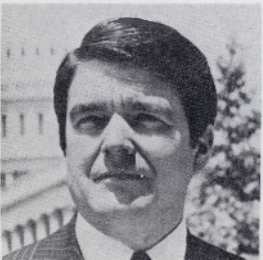

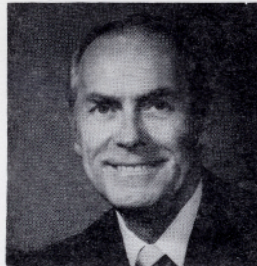

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The legislative power of the State is vested in the General Assembly, which consists of the Senate and the House of Representatives. The General Assembly convenes in regular session the second Monday in January annually, and it remains in session not more than forty days (Ga. Const., Art. III, Sec. V, Par. III) which need not be consecutive, so that it can adjourn to a fixed date and reconvene once. It may also be called into extra session by the Governor at any time upon the certificates of three-fifths of all the members thereof. With two exceptions, all bills may originate in either the Senate or the House of Representatives, but all bills must be passed by both branches and signed by the Governor before becoming law. The exceptions are bills for raising revenue and bills for appropriating money, which can originate only in the House. In the event of the Governor's veto of any bill during a session, it can be repassed by a two-thirds vote of both branches and becomes law.

THE SENATE

The Senate consists of fifty-six Senators elected from as many Senatorial Districts. Presiding officer is the Lieutenant Governor who is designated as President of the Senate. The terms of office of the Senators are for two years and they are elected by the voters biennially in November of the even-numbered years. The minimum requirements for the office of Senator are age of twenty-five years, citizenship in the State for four years and residence in the Senatorial District for one year. THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The House of Representatives consists of one hundred eighty members from the one hundred fifty-four districts. The Presiding Officer is the Speaker, who is elected from the body. The minimum qualifications for the office of Member of the House of Representatives are age of twenty-one years, citizenship in the State for two years and for one year a resident of the district from which elected. The Legislative Services Committee has been in existence since 1959, although for the first two years it was designated as "The Joint Committee on the Operations of the General Assembly". Membership shall be composed of the Speaker, House of Representatives (Chairman of Committee); President of the Senate; Chairman, Appropriations Committee of the Senate; Chairman, Appropriations Committee of the House; Chairman, Judiciary Committee of the Senate; Chairman, Judiciary Committee of the House; Chairman, Banking, Finance and Insurance Committee of the Senate; Chairman, Ways and Means Committee of the House; Clerk of the House; Secretary of the Senate (serves as Committee Secretary). Duties included will be to study and adopt methods and procedures to operate more efficiently the General Assembly and each House thereof, and study and adopt methods and procedures to make more uniform the operations of the Senate and House. It shall have general supervision over the operation of the Legislative Branch of Government and to act for and to enter into contracts on behalf of agencies of the Legislative Branch, the General Assembly and each House thereof.

JUDICIARY

Section I

Paragraph I. *Judicial Power of the state.* The judicial power of the state shall be vested exclusively in the following classes of courts: magistrate courts, probate courts, juvenile courts, state courts, superior courts, Court of Appeals, and Supreme Court. Magistrate courts, probate courts, juvenile courts and state courts shall be courts of limited jurisdiction. In addition, the General Assembly may establish or authorize the establishment of municipal courts and may authorize administrative agencies to exercise quasi-judicial powers.

Paragraph II. *Unified judicial system.* All courts of the state shall comprise a unified judicial system.

THE SUPREME COURT

The Supreme Court was created by an amendment to the 1798 Constitution, which became effective under the Act of December 22, 1835, but no enabling legislation was passed until the Act of December 10, 1845 (Ga. L. 1845, p. 18). It was organized in 1846 some seventy years after Georgia had become a State and then consisted of three Justices who rode the circuits. The present organization of the Supreme Court is defined in the Constitution of 1976 (Art. VI, Sec. II, Pars. 1 through 7) and in the 1933 Code (Chaps. 24-38 through 24-46).

The Supreme Court exercises exclusive appellate jurisdiction in the following cases: all cases involving the construction of a treaty or of the Georgia or United States Constitutions and all cases in which the constitutionality of a law, ordinance or constitutional provision has been drawn in question; all cases of election contest; cases involving title to land; all equity cases; all cases involving wills; all cases in which a sentence of death was imposed or could be imposed; all habeas corpus cases; all cases involving extraordinary remedies; all divorce and alimony cases. It also has jurisdiction over cases certified to it by any state or federal appellate court, and may review by certiorari cases in the Court of Appeals of Georgia which are of gravity or great public importance.

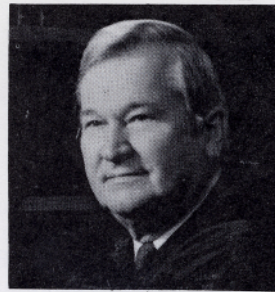
The Supreme Court supervises the Office of Bar Admissions, appoints the members of the two Boards responsible for the admission of persons to the practice of law (the Board to Determine Fitness of Bar Applicants, with seven members, and the State Board of Bar Examiners, with five members), and makes the rules governing the bar examination. It also has responsibility for supervision of the State Bar of Georgia.

There are seven Justices on the bench of the Supreme Court, and from time to time, they elect their Chief Justice and Presiding Justice. The qualifications for the office are admission to practice law for seven years and any additional requirements provided by law. The terms of office are for six years each, staggered so that two vacancies occur in one year, two in the second following year and three in the fourth following year.

The Justices are elected on a non-partisan basis. The Governor fills any vacancy by appointment until the next general election when a successor to complete the unexpired term is elected.

The Supreme Court makes and publishes its rules covering every phase of practice in and before the Court. It has authority to appoint its clerks, sheriff, reporter, law assistants and other necessary personnel.

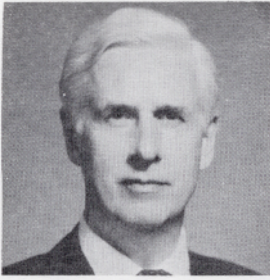

COURT OF APPEALS

The Court of Appeals was created by an amendment to the Constitution of 1877, ratified on November 6, 1906. The first term of the Court was held on the first Monday in January 1907, and the Court originally consisted of only three judges. The Court now consists of nine judges. The present organization of the Court is defined in the Constitution of 1976 (Art. VI, Sec. II, Par. 8) and in the Code of 1933 (Chaps. 24-35 through 24-36A). See pages 232-267.

The Court of Appeals exercises appellate jurisdiction for the correction of errors of law in those cases arising in the Superior, State and other trial courts over which the Supreme Court does not have original appellate jurisdiction.

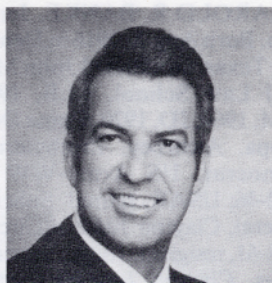
The Court sits in three Divisions of three Judges each, with the members assigned by the Chief Judge. The Chief Judge appoints the Presiding Judges of each Division. The Chief Judge is elected by the Court and serves in that capacity at the pleasure of the whole Court. The Court of Appeals is not an intermediate appellate court. Its decisions are not reviewable by the Supreme Court as a matter of right but only on the grant of a writ of certiorari. Statistics show that considerably more than 95% of the Court of Appeals decisions are final. Its decisions are binding on all lower courts.

By the Act of March 8, 1945 (Ga. L. 1945, p. 232), it was provided that Sec. 24-3501 of the 1933 Code be amended by adding the provision that from and after the first day of the April Term 1945 of the Court of Appeals, the three Divisions of the Court, sitting as one Court, shall pass on and determine each case in which there is a dissent in the Division to which the case was originally assigned, unless upon consideration of the case by the three Divisions as one Court there is an equal division between the Judges passing upon the case; in which event, the case shall be decided by the Division to which it was originally assigned. It was also provided that, in some circumstances, the three Divisions might sit as one Court even when there is no dissent in the Division to which the case was originally assigned.

To qualify to serve as a Judge of the Court of Appeals, a person shall have been a citizen of the State for three years, obtained the age of thirty years and have had seven years experience in the practice of law. The terms of office are for six years each, staggered so that vacancies occur at two year intervals. The Judges are elected at the same general election at which members of the General Assembly are elected. The Governor fills any vacancy by appointment until the next general election at which time a successor to complete the unexpired term is elected.

The Court of Appeals makes and publishes its rules covering every phase of practice in and before the Court (Chap. 24-36 of the 1933 Code). It has authority to appoint its Clerk, Deputy Clerk, Sheriff, Reporter and Assistant, Law Assistants and other necessary personnel.

Major publishers of law books and periodicals report that each Judge of the Court of Appeals personally writes and publishes more opinions than do the individual Judges of any other appellate court in the nation. A study dated July 1977 showed that the Court of Appeals Judges collectively wrote and published their last 3000 cases in an average of 41.06 days from the date of oral argument. All cases are published in full in the GEORGIA APPEALS REPORTS and in the SOUTH-EASTERN REPORTER, and all are annotated in the leading legal publications. The GEORGIA APPEALS REPORTS through June 1978 numbered 145 volumes and is increasing by some four volumes annually.

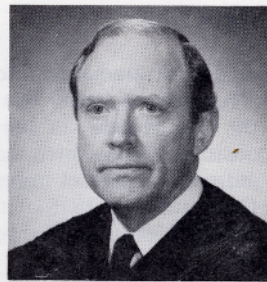

THE SUPERIOR COURTS

For seventy years prior to the organization of the Supreme Court, the Superior Courts of the various counties were the highest courts of record in the State. At present there are one hundred fifty-nine Superior Courts, grouped into forty-two Circuits. The Superior Courts, which are courts of both law and equity, have exclusive jurisdiction in cases of divorce, in cases respecting titles to land, in equity cases and in criminal cases where the sentence might be penitentiary confinement or death; and they have concurrent jurisdiction in all other classes of cases with the City Courts, Civil Courts and County Courts. Cases from Courts of Ordinary and Justices' Courts can be carried to the Superior Courts for appeal.

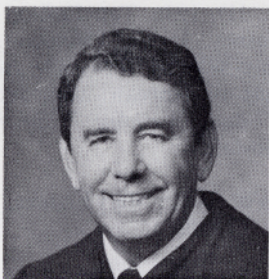

The Judges and Solicitors General of the Superior Courts are elected by all of the voters of the State at the same general election at which members of the General Assembly are elected. The term of office of each is four years (except Atlanta Judicial Circuit terms are 8 years. Ga. Laws 1956, p. 636), beginning on the first day of January next following the election. Vacancies are filled by appointment by the Governor until a successor for

the unexpired term is elected at the next general election. The minimum qualifications for the office of Judge of the Superior Court are age of thirty years, three years residence in the Circuit and seven years experience in the practice of law; for the office of Solicitor General the qualifications are age of twenty-five years and three years experience in law practice. Upon reaching certain specified ages coupled with specified years of service, a Judge or Solicitor General can, upon notice given to the Governor, retire and be appointed, respectively, a Judge of the Superior Court Emeritus for life, or a Solicitor Emeritus for life.

There exists in the State a large number of City Courts, Civil Courts and County Courts, from which appeals lie directly to the Court of Appeals. Each was created by a different local Act of the General Assembly, with the result that each differs from all others in one or more respects. The 1945 Constitution (Art. VI, Sec. IX) expressly relieves City Courts from that uniformity of proceedings, practice and process which is obligatory upon all other courts of the same grade or class. As a general rule, most of them follow closely the practice and procedure of the

Superior Courts, and most of them have county-wide jurisdiction over matters which are not reserved exclusively to the Superior Courts.

The Judges and Solicitors of the majority of these Courts are elected in their own counties for four-year terms of office, the qualifications and salary being determined by the Act creating the particular Court.

SMALL CLAIMS COURTS

Each Small Claims Court is created by separate legislative enactment of what is known as a general law with local application. With rare exceptions, they have countywide jurisdiction with the superior court, and all other courts in that county, in all civil actions at law where the amount claimed or the value of the property involved does not exceed the principal sum of \$500.00, but some such courts have jurisdiction of amounts up to \$1000.00. Small Claims Courts have no criminal jurisdiction but a judge thereof is authorized to issue criminal warrants, act as a committing magistrate, and perform all other acts and functions of a justice of the peace. These courts have no specified terms for holding court but are always open for transaction of business and hearings and trials are set for particular times in each instance by and in the discretion of the judge, but within prescribed limitations. All appeals from decisions of the judge are made to the superior court. One chief advantage of these courts is the dispatch with which cases are handled to final conclusion.

The qualifications of the judges, their powers, and the manner of their appointment or election, vary and are prescribed by law for each individual court. In some such courts it is required that the judge shall be a lawyer with prescribed qualifications but in other courts this is not required. Pleadings are simple and non-technical and the rules of practice are fairly uniform in all such courts, but the specific Act creating the court, and amendments thereto, should be consulted in each instance.

Title 34, Ga. Election Code

Section 34-801, General primary. 34-802, November election, 34-803, Special election for United States Senator. 34-804, Special election for Congressional Representative. 34-805, Special election for member of General Assembly. 34-806, Conduct of special elections.

Section 34-801. General primary—Whenever any political party shall hold a primary to nominate candidates for public offices to be filled in the ensuing November election, the same shall be held on the second Tuesday in August in each even-numbered year.

Section 34-802. November election—The Governor, State-house officers, Members of Congress, Justices of the Supreme Court, Judges of the Court of Appeals, judges of the superior courts, solicitors general, members of the General Assembly, county officers, justices of the peace and constables shall be elected in the November election next preceding the expiration of the term of office. Section 34-103m. The word "November

election" shall mean the general election held on the Tuesday next following the first Monday in November in each even numbered year.

Section 34-803. Special election for United States Senator—Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the representation of this State in the Senate of the United States, such vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired term by the vote of the electors of the State at a special election to be held at the time of the next November election, occurring at least forty days after the occurrence of such vacancy, and it shall be the duty of the Governor to issue his proclamation for such election. Until such time as the vacancy shall be filled by an election as herein provided, the Governor may make a temporary appointment to fill such vacancy.

Section 34-804. Special election for Congressional Representative—Whenever a vacancy shall occur or exist in the office of Representative in Congress from this State the Governor shall issue, within ten days after the happening of such vacancy, a writ of election to the ordinary of each county involved for a special election to fill such vacancy, which election shall be held on a date named in the writ, which shall not be less than thirty days after its issuance.

Section 34-805. Special election for members of General Assembly—Whenever a vacancy shall occur or exist in either House of the General Assembly during a session of the General Assembly, or whenever such vacancy shall occur or exist at a time when the members of the General Assembly shall be required to meet at any time previous to the next November election, the Governor shall issue, within ten days after the happening of such vacancy, or after the calling of an extraordinary session of the General Assembly during the existence of such vacancy, a writ of election to the ordinary of each county involved for a special election to fill such vacancy, which election shall be held on a date named in the writ, which shall not be less than thirty nor more than sixty days after its issuance. In all other cases and in cases involving vacancies occurring during the 1970 Session of the General Assembly, any such special election to fill any such vacancy shall be held if the Governor issues his writ of election therefor. If a vacancy occurs while the General Assembly is in session, and the Governor elects to issue a writ, it shall only be necessary to have one poll open in each county involved, which shall be at the county seat, if only one candidate has qualified for the vacant seat.

Section 34-806. Conduct of special election—Every special election shall be held and conducted in all respects in accordance with the provisions of this Code relating to general elections, and the provisions of this Code relating to general elections shall apply thereto insofar as practicable, and not inconsistent with any other provisions of this Code. All such special elections held at the time of a general election shall be conducted by the poll officers by the use of the same equipment and facilities, so far as practicable, as are used for such general election. At least twenty-nine days shall intervene between the call of a special election and the holding of same.

WHEREAS: Pursuant to said provisions of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1976, a proposed new Constitution (proposed Constitutional Amendment number 1) was submitted to the electors of the State of Georgia for ratification or rejection at the General Election held on November 2, 1982; and

WHEREAS: The number of votes cast for and against the ratification of the new Constitution and the 78 Constitutional Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1976 voted on in the General Election held on November 2, 1982, have been counted, tabulated, computed and canvassed by the Secretary of State of the State of Georgia, and the results thereof certified to me as Governor of the State of Georgia; and

WHEREAS: Said certifications are attached hereto and by reference are made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS: The Georgia Election Code provides that the Governor shall issue his proclamation declaring the results of the vote of each proposed Constitutional Amendment.


NOW, THEREFORE, PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME AS GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF GEORGIA, IT IS HEREBY

PROCLAIMED: That proposed Constitutional Amendments numbers 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 39, 40, 41, 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 55, 56, 57, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, 65, 66, 67, 68, 69, 70, 71, 72, 73, 74, 75, 77, 78 and 79 which appeared upon the 1982 General Election ballot, all of which are Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1976, having been ratified according to the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1976 according to the results of the November 1982 General Election held on Tuesday, November 2, 1982, are a part of the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1976. FURTHER: I do proclaim that proposed Constitutional Amendment number 1, the proposed new Constitution, which appeared upon the 1982 General Election ballot, having been ratified according to the Constitution of the State of Georgia of 1976 according to the results of the November 1982 General Election held on Tuesday, November 2, 1982, shall be the new Constitution of the State of Georgia, effective July 1, 1983.
