The Leo Baeck Foundation, together with American Jewish University in Los Angeles, establishes Europe's first Conservative/Masorti Rabbinical Seminary



On November 17, 2013, the Zacharias Frankel College will open in Berlin's "Centrum Judaicum". The joint venture of the Leo Baeck Foundation and American Jewish University (AJU) in Los Angeles, California will educate and ordain future conservative rabbis. The program will form close ties with the University of Potsdam as an adjunct institute responsible for academic standards and accreditation, while spiritual supervision and ordination will be granted by AJU Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies. Its ordinands will become members of the Rabbinical Assembly.

Regarding the foundation of the new seminary, the Dean of the Ziegler School and Vice President of AJU, Professor Rabbi Bradley Shavit Artson comments :

"The Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies is dedicated to training a new cadre of Masorti/Conservative rabbis who are deeply versed in Jewish texts, committed to a life of mitzvot and the love of the Jewish tradition. Now, we make a further step with our transatlantic School: the Zacharias Frankel College. Our graduates will leave the campus in Potsdam as passionate, dynamic and creative thinkers, who can bring a sense of energy and holiness to the communities they will serve."

At its opening ceremony Rabbi Artson will bestow the title of *Doctor of Humane Letters honoris causa* on Brandenburg's Minister of Science, Prof. Sabine Kunst. The Ziegler School recognizes especially Minister Kunst's leadership in creating the first university department of Jewish Theology in German history. Professor Oliver Günther, the president of University of Potsdam, will be recognized with an honorary doctorate at AJU's 2014 graduation in Los Angeles.

The Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies was founded more than 30 years ago as the first Conservative/Masorti rabbinical seminary on the Western US Coast. It enjoys a reputation for academic rigor, emotional richness, and superb practical professional training. The new European educational institution is named after Rabbi Zacharias Frankel (1801-1875), who opened the Jewish Theological Seminary in Breslau (today Wroclaw, Poland) in 1854.
