

O'Brien He played one season with Randwick, in 1890.

O'Brien, William Usually a flanker, but occasionally a prop or lock forward who played in the backs ["Bill"] on the odd occasion, he came to Randwick from Queensland in 1937 and played 46 first grade games from 1938 to 1940. He played in the Randwick teams which won the 1938 and 1940 first grade grand finals. In both years Keith Windon was the other flanker. He later moved to Canberra where he coached North Canberra firsts to premierships. In the late 1930s he was rated a potential representative player but World War 2 unfortunately ended his playing career.

O'Callaghan, Denis C Originally a centre and fly half, he switched to flanker, where he played most of his 68 club games from 1961 to 1967, missing the 1964 season when he was out of Sydney, and in which he scored 20 tries [60 pts]. His 45 first grade games yielded 14 tries [42 pts]. He played in the Randwick first grade sides which won the 1965 and 1966 grand finals, represented NSW twice [in 1966] and was a member of the 1966/67 Wallaby team which toured Britain and France, but he did not play in a test match. He joined the St George rugby league club at the start of the 1968 season.

O'Connor, John A A forward who began in the front row and who occasionally appeared as hooker, but soon found his place as lock forward, where he turned in consistently good performances for the Randwick first grade side from 1925 to 1934, playing 131 first grade games and scoring 16 tries, 2 goals and 2 penalty goals, a total of 58 points. He played in Randwick's 1930 premiership side, and captained the firsts from 1931 to 1934. An injury late in the 1934 season prevented him from captaining the team which won that year's grand final against Manly. He officially retired at the end of the 1934 season, but occasionally played in lower grades in 1935.

Jack O'Connor toured New Zealand with the NSW Waratahs in 1928 and played in four tests, three against New Zealand and one against the Maori. He also appeared in five games against provincial sides. He played for NSW six times (from 1927 to 1930) against Queensland three times in 1929, against Victoria (1927 and 1930) and finally against the British Lions in 1930. In that game he played in his original position of hooker and participated in the Waratah's historic victory over the Lions by 28 points to 3.

Jack O'Connor was a top class swimmer and water polo player and represented NSW at water polo. In retirement he took up refereeing and achieved first grade status. His younger brother, Bill, also a forward, played for Randwick and NSW.

O'Connor, William B A back row forward, usually a No 8, renowned for his covering defence, he played ["Bill"] 66 first grade games from 1933 to 1939, scoring 19 tries [57 pts]. He played in the 1934 and 1938 first grade grand finals, both of which Randwick won. Keith Windon and Vince Phillips were with him in the back row in 1934 and Keith Windon and Bill O'Brien in 1938. He represented NSW six times. After World War 2 he coached Randwick junior teams. He was, like his brother, a NSW water polo representative. Brother of John.

O'Dea, A prop forward who played one first grade game in 1923.

O'Donnell, A fullback who played with the club in 1890.

O'Donnell, John Brook The first in a long line of Randwick hookers since 1923 who achieved representative status, O'Donnell played with Randwick from 1925 to 1931, appearing in 66 first grade games from 1925 to 1930, scoring 13 tries, then worth 39 points.

He toured New Zealand with the NSW Waratahs in 1928, appearing in seven matches and was later accorded Australian representational status in all games. He played in two tests against New Zealand which Australia lost 12 to 15 and then won 11 to 8. He also played in the test on that tour against the Maori, which Australia lost 8 to 9. His games against New Zealand provincial sides were Auckland [won 19 to 8], Hawkes Bay [won 19 to 6], Southland [lost 26 to 31] and Wairarapa [lost 10 to 17].

O'Donnell lost his position as Australian hooker in 1929 to Queensland's Eddie Bonis but represented NSW four times in 1929, in three wins against Queensland and one again Victoria. He broke a leg towards the end of the 1930 club season, and this prevented him from playing in the last game of that season, in which Randwick won the first grade premiership. He recovered to play several games in Randwick's reserves in 1931, before moving to the Western Suburbs club where he ended his rugby career.

John O'Donnell was the son of James O'Donnell, a wing forward, who toured Australia with the 1884 New Zealand national side and played in seven of the nine tour matches. James O'Donnell was an All Black but did not represent New Zealand in a test match. He settled in Australia at the end of the 1884 tour and represented NSW seven times from 1884 to 1888, playing twice against Queensland in 1884, 1885 and 1888 and once against the touring Great Britain side in 1888.

O'Donnell, Thomas A winger and sometime fullback who played 13 first grade game in 1923 and 1925, scoring 2 tries [6 pts]. He continued to play in lower grades until 1929. ["Tom"]

O'Donnell, W A lock forward who played ten first grade games in 1940, scoring 1 try [3 pts].

Ogg, Brian A lock forward and No 8 who played with Randwick in 1955 and 1956, appearing in two first grade games. He later continued his rugby career in Newcastle.

Ogle, John A hooker who played 90 games from 1992 to 1997, missing the 1994 season, and scoring two tries [9 pts]. He appeared in one first grade game, against Gordon, in 1996. He played in the 1992 and 1996 premiership winning fifth grade sides.

Oglethorpe, Bruce A centre who played three first grade games in 1953, and whose career continued in lower grades into 1954.

O'Gorman, Michael A A very good No 8 forward, who played 126 club games from 1962 to 1968, scoring 20 tries [60 pts]. He was a permanent fixture in first grade from 1963, and in his 114 games scored 14 tries [42 pts]. He was a member of three of Randwick's first grade premiership sides, in 1965, 1966 and 1967. Jeff Sayle was in the back row with him in all three grand finals. He represented NSW once, in 1964, against Queensland. ["Mick"]

O'Grady, Walter J A prop forward, hooker and No 8 who played six first grade games from 1937 to 1941.

- O'Halloran, Desmond** ["Doug"] A fly half who joined Randwick in 1939 and played 41 first grade games from 1941 to 1943, scoring 3 tries [9 pts]. He was a member of the 1939 premiership winning third grade side.
- O'Hanlon, Vincent** ["Vince"] A prop forward who joined Randwick in 1939 and played 23 first grade games from 1940 to 1943, scoring 1 try [3 pts].
- O'Keefe, P** A winger who played first grade games for the club in 1914.
- O'Loughlin, Edward** ["Ted"] A tall, solidly built, blonde winger who scored 1 try [3 pts] in his only first grade game, in 1950.
- O'Neill, Gerry** A very fast winger and an excellent finisher who played 50 club games from 1979 to 1981 and scored 50 tries [200 pts]. In his 30 first grade games in the same three seasons he scored 25 tries [96 pts]. He played in the 1979 and 1981 first grade grand finals, both won by Randwick. In 1979 the other winger was Adrian Jones and in 1981 it was Tony Walsh. He also played in the 1980 reserve grade side which won that year's grand final. He represented NSW once, against Ireland, in 1979, and joined the St George rugby league club at the start of the 1982 season.
- Orbell, Bernard** A centre from West Harbour who joined Randwick in 2008 and played mainly as a full back. He appeared in 22 games that season, scoring 5 tries [25 pts]. Nineteen of those games and 4 tries [20 pts] were in first grade. Tom McColl and he were the club's most valuable players in 2008.
- Osborne,** A three-quarter who played with the club in 1897.
- Osborne, Douglas H** ["Doug"] A winger, originally from New Zealand, who played three test matches for Australia while with the Kiwis club in Melbourne. He played three first grade games with Randwick in 1977, scoring 1 try [4 pts].
- O'Shea, Darren** A prop forward who played 146 club games for Randwick from 2001 to 2008, scoring 8 tries and 1 goal [42 pts], all in lower grades. He played 13 times in first grade. He was a member of the 2002 reserve grade side which lost that year's grand final to West Harbour.
- O'Sullivan, Brian J** ["Bos"] A hooker who played 129 club games from 1990 to 1998, missing the 1995 season, and scoring 5 tries [24 pts]. He played four first grade games, two in 1990 and two in 1994. He was a member of the 1994 grand final winning reserve grade side, of the 1994 and 1996 third grade sides which lost those years' grand finals and the 1993 grand final winning fifth grade side. He also played in the fourth grade side which won the 1997 premiership. Son of Terry and brother of Paul.
- O'Sullivan, Gerald** ["Gerry"] A lock forward who joined Randwick in 1950 and played 19 first grade games from 1951 to 1955, scoring 1 try [3 pts]. Brother of Kevin and Terry.
- O'Sullivan, Kevin J** A flanker who played 27 first grade games from 1938 to 1942, scoring 6 tries [18 pts]. He lost his life during World War 2. Brother of Gerry and Terry.
- O'Sullivan, Paul** ["Pos"] A centre, winger and fullback who played 217 club games from 1982 to 1996, scoring 51 tries and 2 goals [216 pts]. He played in two fourth grade grand final sides [1987 and 1988 - Randwick won in 1987] and in four fifth grade grand finals [1985, 1986, 1989 and 1991], all won by Randwick. In 1985 he won the Dick Quinlan trophy as the best clubman in fourth grade. Brother of Brian and son of Terry.
- O'Sullivan, Terence** ["Terry"] A flanker who played 40 first grade games from 1942 to 1950, scoring 5 tries [15 pts]. He continued playing in lower grades until 1952, mainly as a flanker, but occasionally filling in as fly half, centre and winger. Brother of Gerald and Kevin and father of Brian and Paul.
- Outram, George H** A forward who played with Randwick from 1895 to 1899, missing the 1896 season. He represented NSW twice while with Randwick, in 1897. He was the club's secretary in 1899. He went to South Africa as a volunteer during the Boer war and remained there, becoming a big game hunter after the war ended. He was killed by a lioness.
- Outram, Michael J** ["Mike"] A centre and occasional fly half who played 19 games in the 1925 and 1927 seasons, scoring 5 tries [15 pts]. He played his last season in 1928 as captain of the reserve grade side.
- Outterside, Robert [AO]** ["Bob"] Wally Meagher and he are the only men to play for Australia, captain a Randwick first grade premiership side, and then coach a Randwick first grade premiership-winning

side. A No 8 forward, who always played in a headgear, he joined Randwick in 1951 and played 164 club games before his retirement at the end of the 1961 season. His initial first grade game was in 1952, and he went on to appear in 146 first grade games, scoring 44 tries and 1 goal [134 pts]. He was the first grade captain from 1958 to 1961. He represented NSW five times from 1953 to 1959, and played twice for Australia, both against the 1959 British Lions. He toured South Africa with the Wallabies in 1953 but did not play in a test on that tour.

He captained Randwick from 1958 to 1961, including the Randwick first grade side which won the 1959 premiership by defeating Northern Suburbs 16 to 0. Randwick's back row that day was formidable - Bob Outterside, Terry Reid and Ted Heinrich, all internationals. In his last game for the club Randwick set a [then] club first grade scoring record by defeating Eastwood by 55 to 12 - the game in which Michael Cleary scored seven tries. The win was a fitting end to Outterside's playing career.

The **Rugby News** said of him: "Bob has won the admiration and respect of his team-mates by his unselfish disregard of his own personal well-being for the good of his team. Randwick has been his first and last love. Serious injury on several occasions undoubtedly interfered with his representative career". His fellow Randwick international, Peter Johnson, described him as the best skipper he had played under.

A Sydney Technical High School product, he became headmaster of Sydney Boys' High School and in 2002 led a campaign to maintain the tradition and importance of rugby and other sports at that school.

Bob Outterside coached Randwick junior sides after his retirement, was club coach from 1970 to 1976 and guided the first grade side to the semi-finals from 1971 to 1975, winning premierships in 1971, 1973 and 1974. He was unfortunate not to record three premierships in a row in 1975; that season the firsts were minor premiers by a large margin, losing only one home-and-away game; they then faltered badly in the major premiership series to lose the major semi-final and the preliminary final. Outterside was made a life member of the club in 1976. Brother of Billy.

Outterside, William T ["Billy"] A prop forward who provided great service to the club week after week and year after year, he played more club games [432] than any other Randwick player in a career lasting from 1953 to 1976, a remarkable achievement. In those games he scored 29 tries [88 pts]. His 205 first grade games from 1954 to 1975 yielded 16 tries, 1 goal and 2 penalty goals [56 pts]. He was a member of three first grade premiership winning sides, in 1959, 1966 and 1971 and captained the firsts in 1972. He also played in the 1964 reserve grade grand final losing side. He represented NSW once, in 1963. He coached Randwick fifths to a premiership in 1977 and the fourths to the semi-finals in 1978. He was awarded the Wally Meagher trophy as the outstanding club man in 1974 and was made a life member of the club in 1994. He and his brother Bob made a great contribution to the Randwick club.

Owens, Barry T A fly half who played 124 club games from 1961 to 1966, scoring 19 tries [57 pts]. His seven first grade games, all in 1964, yielded 1 try [3 pts]. Brother of Ken.

Owens, Kenneth W ["Ken"] A hooker and occasional back row forward who played 67 first grade games from 1960 to 1963, including 21 in first grade. He scored 1 try [3pts] in first grade. He played in the 1960 reserve grade grand final losing side. He played rugby league from the start of the 1964 season. Brother of Barry.
