Medical Practitioners of African Descent in Colonial Ghana

The topics of African medical history and the formation of a Western educated elite in West Africa have aroused a great deal of attention in recent years. This documentation of a surprisingly large number of medical practitioners of African descent in colonial Ghana is intended as an aid to scholars interested in these problems.

Medical pratitioners of African descent who experienced the British colonial era in West Africa are not generally known, even among their successors. They began to practice in West Africa as early as the second half of the nineteenth century, a fact which many still find difficult to believe. Not unlike their white colleagues, they possessed qualifications registrable in the United Kingdom. Accordingly, they are listed in the Medical Directory 1 and the Medical Register, 2 both of which provide professional information in each entry, but exclude racial origin.

The old series of the West African Medical Journal, 3 the earliest English language medical journal to be published in West Africa, and one of the most important for research into the history of medicine in the area, contains obituary notices only for members of the defunct West African Medical Staff, an organization from which Africans and Asiatics were excluded. The new series of the Journal, however, contains occasional obituary notices and other relevant information on doctors of African descent.

Other Sources of Biography

General biographical sources carry sketches of African doctors, however. Noteworthy are the Dictionary of African Biography; Who's Who in Nigeria: A Biographical Dictionary; Gold Coast Year Book; and the works of Macmillan, Hutchinson, Sampson, and Mbye. 4 As should

be expected, contemporary local newspapers are also fruitful sources of biographical and other relevant information.

Some special studies are also available. M.C.F. Easmon, himself a Sierra Leonean doctor, compiled and annotated a list of his compatriots who practiced in their native land from 1858 to the early part of 1956.⁵ He also published the history of his family, which included four other doctors, and discussed the life of John Farrell Easmon, the first doctor in that well-known family.⁶

Davidson Nicol, ⁷ another Sierra Leonean doctor, has written a short biographical sketch, and has also made available extracts, with introductory notes from the writings of one of his outstanding predecessors, James Africanus Beale Horton. George Shepperson wrote a brief but timely paper on this illustrious African doctor. ⁸ The paper shows how little indeed was, and still is known of early African doctors, even by some eminent members of the world press. Christopher Fyfe, for many years the government archivist in Sierra Leone, has written what appears to be the definitive biography of this African pace-setter. ⁹

In his book on history of health services in Nigeria, Ralph Schram includes contributions of some early Nigerian doctors to modern medical care. 10 But the relevant writings of the Nigerian neurosurgeon, Professor Adelola Adeloye deserve special mention. 11

However, there is not a single source for biographical data on all the doctors of African descent who experienced the colonial era in West Africa. Such data, including portraits and bibliographies, are being assembled for Ghana. Meanwhile, a checklist of these doctors is presented here. In the compilation of this list, some of the sources described in this paper were useful. But two other sources were especially useful, namely the <code>Gold Coast Senior Staff List12</code> and the <code>Gold Coast Gazette.13</code> The latter, from the 5 April 1913 issue, contains an annual list of medical pratitioners and dentists registered locally.

A Checklist of African Doctors in Colonial Ghana

The list is arranged in three parts; each part contains only persons whose first service in the country fell within the period.

Part I covers the period from 1859, when the first two African doctors, J.A.B. Horton and W.B. Davies assumed duty in the country, to the end of the nineteenth century. During the greater part of this period, although there were pockets of discrimination, all doctors officially enjoyed the same conditions of service and salary. Horton rose to be the head of the Army Medical Department in 1879; another African, Dr. J.F. Easmon, was appointed head of the Colonial Medical Service in 1893. In 1897, however, Easmon, the African Chief Medical Officer, "was ruthlessly hounded out of his post" by the new governor, Sir William Maxwell, and replaced by a European. If Ironically, Easmon was offered a handsome retainer by the merchants at Cape Coast in Ghana where he practiced until his death in June 1900.

Part II covers the beginning of the twentieth century to the end of 1945. During this period, the medical services in British West Africa were amalgamated and in 1902 the West African Medical Staff was formed. African doctors "were relegated to a separate service, with a lower salary scale." In the face of this racial prejudice, many West Africans turned from the study of medicine to law. 15

Part III ends on 5 March 1957, the eve of independence. During and after the Second World War, a liberal policy was adopted. In 1946 African and European doctors were placed on a common list. 16 Funds provided under the Colonial Development and Welfare Acts and the Government Scholarship Scheme for the Africanization of the Public Service, plus other grants, stimulated the training of more African doctors. More than half a century after Easmon was removed from his post, an indigenous medical practitioner, E. Akwei, was appointed in 1955 to the same position, chief medical officer of Chana. At the same time, another indigenous medical practitioner, E.W.Q. Bannerman became deputy chief medical officer.
