all it a three-peat. Or maybe, to be more Canadian, a natural hat trick of Brier titles.

That's what Team Canada, skipped by Brad Gushue is aiming for at the 2019 Tim Hortons Brier.

Actually, you might wonder what took so long for him to get to this point. Even though he won an Olympic gold medal in 2006, along with his long-time third Mark Nichols, it took Gushue until his 14th Brier appearance representing Newfoundland and Labrador before he won his first national men's title, fittingly enough, in his hometown of St. John's.

Since winning on that emotional, dramatic day on The Rock two years ago, Gushue's squad — which includes second Brett Gallant, lead Geoff Walker and coach Jules Owchar — has been the best-of-the-best in this country and the world, too.

Between the 2018 Brier in Regina (12-1) and St. John's (11-2), the Gushue gang is 23-3 at the last two Briers. After running the table (13-0) at the 2017 world championships in Edmonton, the only blip was a loss to Sweden's Niklas Edin in the 2018 world final in Las Vegas. Those numbers have to have most skips shaking in the hack.

Now they're back shooting for their third in a row.

# Gushue looking for a little more magic at Brier

The only other team to win three consecutive Briers was Alberta's Randy Ferbey, Dave Nedohin, Marcel Rocque and Scott Pfeiffer who won in 2001, 2002 and 2003.

There was, however, another blip for Gushue during those two years, losing out on a second trip to the Olympics when they ran into a red-hot skip, Mike McEwen, in the semifinal of the 2017 Tim Hortons Roar of the Rings in Ottawa eventually won by Kevin Koe's team from Calgary. Koe, who rarely lacks for competitive motivation, will certainly have some in the form of redemption for missing making the podium at the 2018 Olympic Games in South Korea.

Koe's team has a new look this season. When third Marc Kennedy decided the week-to-week winter grind was getting to be too much, Koe recruited McEwen's long-time third, B.J. Neufeld, with that team going its separate ways after more than a decade together. Second Brent Laing also returned to Ontario to hook up with his former front-end friend Craig Savill and skip John Epping. In his place is Colton Flasch who tried skipping his own squad last season after playing second for Saskatchewan's Steve Laycock, who, like Flasch, is back and playing for a different province. Koe did keep lead, Ben Hebert, though.

The team has gone through several experimental permutations since McEwen joined his good buddy, second Derek Samagalski and lead Colin Hodgson with former third Braeden Moskowy returning to his hometown of Regina. The lineup that worked at the provincial championship down Highway 1 in Virden was McEwen skipping and throwing last rocks. But like prairie weather, wait 15 minutes and that could change.

The team's connection to Brandon is big. The 38-year-old McEwen was born in Brandon and grew up here before moving to Winnipeg when he was 27. While in the Wheat City, he took two teams to national junior championships, coming third in 1998 and then losing the 2001 final to some guy named Gushue. (McEwen's former second, Matt Wozniak, will be the team's alternate.)


It was Brandon where Reid Carruthers booked his team's

spot in the Roar of the Rings by winning the 2016 Canada Cup. Who did they beat in the final? Gushue! Although he was nowhere near Brandon that week. Gushue was back home in St. John's nursing a hip injury and Nichols skipped the team that week with Charley Thomas filling in.

And, to top it off, Carruthers and Nichols have history together. For two seasons, Nichols played lead for Manitoba living legend Jeff Stoughton while Carruthers played second.


Since Curling Canada took the Brier and the Scotties Tournament of Hearts to a 16-team format the wild card play-in winner has been a force to deal with, although, so far, it hasn't been a route to a title. This year was a rematch between the 2018 semifinalists, Edmonton's Brendan Bottcher and Ontario's John Epping. Bottcher won then, and did so again last night winning 8-4, dominating from the start of the game.


The win lifts Bottcher into the 16th and final position and sending Epping to the sidelines.

# **Bottcher punches Brier ticket**

## Alberta team rolls to victory

I twas another loser-go-home showdown, just like the last time they met at the Tim Hortons Brier a year ago, and it was the same team moving on and the same one going home.

Brendan Bottcher's squad of third Darren Moulding, second Brad Thiessen and lead Karrick Martin will be Team Wild Card at the 2019 Tim Hortons Brier presented by AGI after defeating John Epping and his Toronto team 8-4 at Westoba Place Friday night.

"This was one of our goals to get back here again and try and be in the playoffs. I really felt we had a great year leading up to this and we've done our part. It would have been sad if our week was done already, we've had too good of a year for that to be the case," said Bottcher.

It was a rematch of the 2018 Brier semifinal in Regina won by Bottcher 6-4. Last year, at least, Epping's team got to stand on the podium by finishing third. This year the stakes were much more primal. The winners living to play not only another day but several more chasing Canadian curling's Holy Grail. Conversely, the losers are forced to watch on television, that's if they can stomach it after such a gutwrenching loss.

# Here's how format works

The 16-team, two-pool format was put into play by Curling Canada last season. It was introduced to make sure all 14 Member Associations have direct entry into the main round-robin portion of each event, in addition to retaining Team Canada, and adding another competitive team to bring it to an even 16 teams, while sticking to the traditional nine-day format so that players don't have to spend more time away from family and employers.

#### Here's what happens:

- The teams are split into two pools of eight, based on their ranking on the Canadian Team Ranking System as of Dec. 31. The Wild Card team was given the No. 3 seeding, regardless of who won the game, so that most of the schedule could be completed to allow fans to buy tickets to see their favourite teams once the provincial/territorial playdowns were finished.
- Pool A consists of seeds 1, 4, 5, 8, 9, 12, 13 and 16; Pool B consists of seeds 2, 3, 6, 7, 10, 11, 14 and 15.
- They play a round-robin within their pools during the first five days of the competition.
- The top four teams from each pool go into the Championship Pool, which begins round-robin play on Thursday. The teams carry over their records from their preliminary pools, and the four teams from Pool A then play the four teams from Pool B on the final Thursday and Friday. That means EVERY game on EVERY sheet has playoff implications!
- After those games are completed Friday evening, the top four teams from the Championship Pool will go into the Page Playoffs, beginning on Saturday (a tiebreaker, if necessary, would be on Saturday morning). The Page 3-4 playoff is Saturday at 2 p.m. (all times local); the Page 1-2 playoff is Saturday at 7 p.m.; with the winner of this game going directly to Sunday's final. The semifinal is Sunday at 1 p.m., and the gold-medal game will be on Sunday at 7 p.m. The bronze-medal game has been removed from the schedule.






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

Epping got derailed by Scott McDonald's Southern Ontario (London, Kingston and Marysville) team in the provincial championship. The resumes of all four players — McDonald, third Jonathan Beuk, second Wesley Forget and lead Scott Chadwick lack any Brier, Canada Cup or even Canadian junior appearances. But make no mistake, they make up a strong squad that is currently eighth in the Canadian Team Ranking System standings.

Then there's the team from Northern Ontario that doesn't lack for robust resumes. The 2014 Olympic gold medallists from Sault Ste. Marie skipped by Brad







"It's tough. Most of the events you play, you come here, you get comfortable, you play a long round robin, but then by the end of the week you're feeling good," said Bottcher. "Here, we're playing one of the biggest games of the week the very first draw. So mentally, it was really hard and it's hard to plan your whole life around whether being here for 24 hours or for 10 days."

This is their third season together, and the foursome seem to be getting stronger every year. Bottcher said staying relaxed was a key on Friday.

"I really felt at peace with the game today. Either way I was going to be OK with it," said Bottcher, 27. "We stuck with it, stayed calm and I think that really paid off for us.

"In the past, experience caught us quite a few times. You get to a big game, and I'm playing against some of my idols in all of these big games still. And I still look at it that way. The first couple of times you play against your idols you're a little nervous and maybe it doesn't quite go your way, but for the last year and a half we've had a lot of repetition at it that it's starting to feel comfortable. I really feel we belong in that

group."

Bottcher and Epping earned the right to play the game by being the top two teams on the Canadian Team Ranking System that did not win a province.

Bottcher will slide in as the secondhighest seed in Pool A behind Northern Ontario skipped by Brad Jacobs. Bottcher and his boys won't get much chance to celebrate because first up for them today (2 p.m.) is Northern Ontario.

"We're on a little bit of a roll, but we'll see tomorrow. You're going to have to end up playing them all by the end of the week so you may as well play them first," said Bottcher.

One of the differences from last year was Bottcher opting for continuity this season, retaining his lineup while Epping gambled on tweaking it by reuniting Glenn Howard's former formidable front-end of lead Craig Savill and second Brent Laing while retaining third Mat Camm.

"Yeah, it sucks," said Epping of being one-and-done. "I'd feel the same way if you'd told me we'd lose the final next week. To have a chance to be in the final and lose it, I would be at the Brier, I would feel the same way. But, yeah, you want to have an opportunity to play here in front of a crowd like this and a chance to play in the Brier, you want every chance to be there."


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

# Brier Memories

#### Don Duguid Manitoba

We won the Brier twice, in 1970 and '71, but my most favourite memory would have to be winning the Brier in our hometown of Winnipeg in 1970. They sold out the arena I don't know how many times. The crowds were unbelievable. Even when we had the bye they filled the place. It was a great thing. That was very exciting. Also a bit nerve-wracking. If you win fours games and lose seven, there's no excuses. We had a really good team but that was a tough Brier. There was Hec Gervais from Alberta, Bob Pickering from Saskatchewan was there, so we had our work cut out. We played Pickering in the last draw to clinch the Brier title, which was very tough because the ice was very keen and very fast, and if you remember Pickering, he had that high backswing that pulled him out of the hack, so on keen ice he was damn near unbeatable. But we hung in there and beat him. We went on to win two world championships and never lost a game. That still stands as a record today. Nobody has



# Under-18 championship headed for Sherwood Park

Fans in Alberta will get a glimpse at Canada's curling future at the 2019 Canadian Under-18 Boys and Girls Curling Championships.

Girls Curling Championships.
The third annual Canadian
Under-18 Championships will be
played April 2-7 at the Glen Allan
Recreation Complex in Sherwood
Park, Alta.

The event, which will feature representatives of all 14 of Curling Canada's Member Associations in both genders (aged 17 and under as of June 30, 2018), will see athletes competing on arena ice as well as at the Sherwood Park Curling Club, which is part of the same complex.

"This is an exciting time for Canadian curling as we start our road to the 2022 Olympics in Beijing, but the athletes in Sherwood Park will be the ones we'll be looking at in 2026 and beyond, and to see them all under one roof is a tremendous opportunity," said Resby Coutts, Chair of Curling Canada's Board of Governors. "This truly is the competition where future champions learn HOW to become champions, and I know

Sherwood Park will do a wonderful job in giving these athletes a show-case for their talents."

The teams will be seeded into two seven-team pools, and will play eightend round-robin games. The top three teams will advance to the playoffs, with the pool winners advancing directly to the semifinals, and the second-and third-place teams meeting in crossover quarter-finals.

Assuming they meet the age requirements, athletes can enter the U-18 nationals as well as the 2019 New Holland Canadian Junior Men's and Women's Curling Championships, which are set for Jan. 19-27 in Prince Albert, Sask.

"Alberta takes pride in hosting national curling championships, and we're particularly excited to welcome the Canadian Under-18 Championships to our province for the first time," said Jill Richard, Executive-Director of Curling Alberta. "I know there's a dedicated group of volunteers in Sherwood Park who will take this event to new heights, both on and off the ice."
