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CELEBRATING 20 YEARS

1989: Shock the World!

In one of the most storied tournament runs in the history of intercollegiate athletics, the Wolverines overcame overwhelming odds to reach the Final Four in Seattle where they completed their mission to "Shock the World."

Assistant coach Steve Fisher was promoted to interim head coach just two days before the team played its first tournament game at the Southeast Regional in Atlanta. The Wolverines remained focused enough to hold off a determined Xavier team, 92-87, and two days later, pulled away down the stretch against upset-minded South Alabama, 91-82.

From Atlanta, it was on to Lexington, Ky., for the Sweet Sixteen where they faced the North Carolina Tar Heels. Emotions were running sky high on both sides as North Carolina had knocked Michigan out of the tournament the previous two seasons. The third time, however, was the charm for the Wolverines as they recorded a thrilling 92-87 victory. A 102-65 win over Virginia in the next game, the largest margin of victory in Michigan's tournament history, opened the door to the Final Four in Seattle.

The Final Four that season was definitely not for the faint-hearted Wolverine fan. Michigan's opponent in the semifinals was Big Ten nemesis Illinois. The Illini had defeated the Wolverines twice that year, including the regular season finale. The semifinal game between the two rivals was extremely tight. The lead changed hands several times in the second half before Sean Higgins' shot at the buzzer sealed Illinois' fate, 83-81, and sent Michigan into the finals.

When Michigan clashed in the final with the Seton Hall Pirates, basketball fans were treated to one of the greatest tournament games on record. Michigan's Glen Rice and Seton Hall's John Morton squared off in an individual scoring duel that left nearly everyone that witnessed the game in awe.

The Wolverines' offense was on a roll, averaging 92 points per game behind Rice's blazing shooting hand. The Pirate defense, on the other hand, was consistently smothering its opponents in the last 10 minutes during Seton Hall's record-setting run through the tournament.

Michigan closed the first half with a 37-32 lead, but Seton Hall's defense tightened in the second half. At the end of regulation, the two teams were tied at 71, forcing the first overtime in a championship game since 1963. In dramatic fashion, Michigan's Rumeal Robinson sank two free throws with three seconds left in overtime to give Michigan an 80-79 victory and its first basketball national championship.

Morton turned in a game-high 35-point effort in the losing cause for the Pirates. Rice had 31 points in the championship game and was voted the tournament's Most Outstanding Player after netting an NCAA Championship-record 184 points in six tournament games.




Every year we would set our goals as a team -- win the Big Ten title, win the National Championship -- unfortunately, each year we would come up a little short. Our situation was very unique heading into





March 17, 1989 • First Round Atlanta, Ga. • The Omni • Southeast Region Opening the tournament as the No. 3 seed in the Southeast Regional, Michigan needed a second half comeback to defeat 14th-seeded Xavier. 92-87, in the first round of the 1989 NCAA Tournament. Down three at the half, the Maize and Blue continued to trail throughout much of the second half until Glen Rice gave the Wolverines an 84-82 lead on a three-pointer with 3:30 remaining. With the Maize and Blue leading by one, 86-85, Terry Mills hit a turnaround six-footer to put U-M up three with just 1:49 left. Demetrius Calip and Rumeal Robinson then each made a pair of free throws to preserve the victory for Rice and Robinson led the way for Michigan with 23 points apiece. Mills added 18 for the Maize and Blue on 8-of-12 shooting from the field. Mark Hughes came off the bench to lead U-M in rebounding with 10 boards. No... 


(3) MICHIGAN 92 vs. (2) North Carolina...... 87

March 23, 1989 • Regional Semifinal Lexington, Ky. • Rupp Arena • Southeast Region

In the regional semifinal, Michigan avenged losses from each of the two previous NCAA Tournaments against North Carolina with a 92-87 victory over the second-seeded Tar Heels. Leading by two with just 1:02 remaining, Glen Rice buried a three-pointer from the right baseline to put the Wolverines up by five, 90-85. Following a basket by J.R. Reid, Sean Higgins made a pair of free throws to seal the victory for Michigan.

Rice again led the way for Michigan, scoring 34 points, including 8-of-12 from beyond the three-point line. Rumeal Robinson added 17 points and 13 assists for the Maize and Blue, while Terry Mills and Higgins both reached double-figures with 16 and 14 points, respectively.


PLAYER REFLECTIONS






Michigan secured its first trip to the Final Four since 1976 with a 102-65 victory over fifth-seeded Virginia in the Southeast Regional Final. For the first time in the tournament, the Maize and Blue earned a comfortable victory as it raced out to a 44-25 halftime lead and never looked back. The Wolverines shot 58.6 percent overall, while limiting the Cavaliers to just 38.1 percent en route to reserving their spot in Seattle, Wash., for the Final Four.

Glen Rice poured in 32 points and was named Most Outstanding Player of the Southeast Regional. Sean Higgins, who took the crowd by storm, scored 31 points in just 20 minutes off the bench and was named to the Southeast Regional All-Tournament team. Joining Rice and Higgins on the All-Tournament team was Rumeal Robinson who added 13 points and a team-best seven assists in the regional final.

The Big Ten rivals battled down to the wire in a game that featured 33 lead changes and seven ties. With the game tied, 81-81, Terry Mills missed a iumper with four seconds remaining, but Sean Higgins grabbed the offensive rebound and sank a six-footer to give Michigan the lead. Following an Illinois timeout, Glen Rice came up with a steal to preserve the victory, sending the Maize and Blue to For the fifth straight game of the tournament, Rice led U-M in scoring, this time with 28 points.
